STEAMER LOST WITH 24 ABOARD

German Freighter is Driven Ashore on Spanish Coast

A MINE HORROR

London, Dec. 15.—The German steamer Palermo is a total wreck off Cape Corrubedo on the West Coast of Galicia, Spain. Her five passengers and crew of nineteen were lost.

COALITION MAJORITY IS NEARING THE 100 MARK

Only 64 More Seats Remain to Be Decided

NO CHANGE YET

Liberals Have Net Gain of One in The 606 Places Now Polled—Sons of Former Premiers in Contest—Asquith Calls on Balfour to Appear

London, Dec. 15.—Only sixty-four seats in the new parliament remain to be filled and the coalition parties already have a majority of ninety-two, although the Unionists as a homogeneous party still have the largest majority with a total of 287 elected to date.

There was much interest in the fight between the sons of two former premiers for the seat for the Walsley division of Cambridgehire, but Neil Primrose, of the sitting Liberal member, easily defeated the attack of Lord Robert Cecil, the Unionist candidate and increased his former majority of 200 to 540.

THEIR SPECIAL CASE

London, Dec. 15.—Mr. Asquith at Glasgow last evening intimated, as already anticipated by the Canadian Associated Press, that the Liberal bill will be passed immediately after the parliament bill. He invited an apology from Mr. Balfour for the latter's absence, but he kept home to see the election of a majority of the Liberal members had been decided.

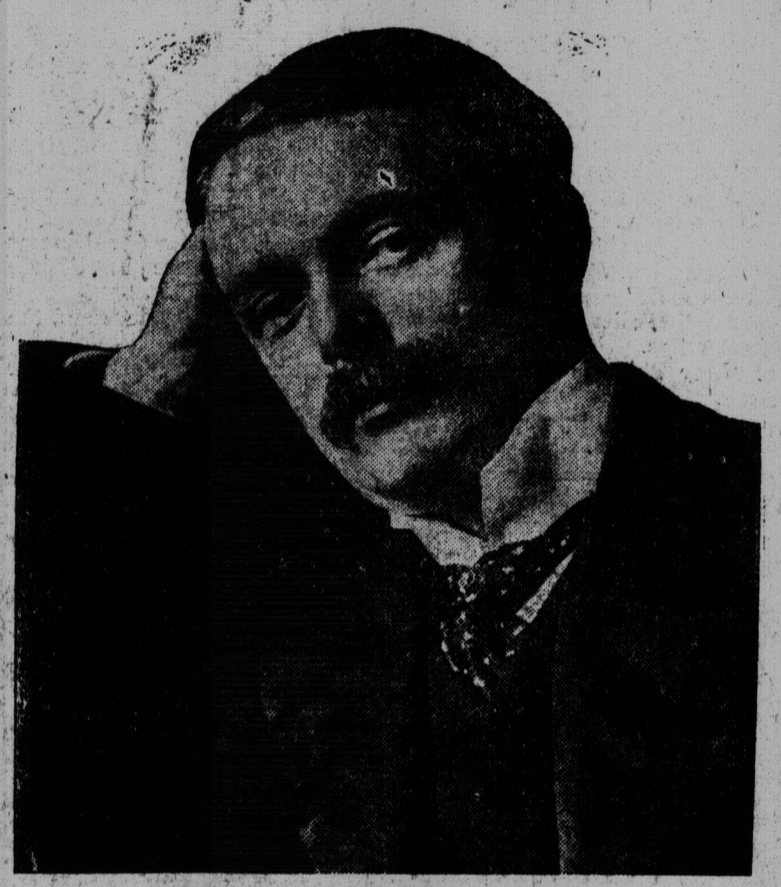

North Shore Smelt Fishery
(Chatham Commercial)


Notwithstanding the somewhat unpromising outlook which faced the smelt fishermen of the district a week or two ago, the returns from the industry have proved much more satisfactory than was at one time anticipated. Some good fishing has been obtained at Restigouche, Lower St. John, Black River, Bay du Vin, Lower Newcastle and Hartlogue. The best results have been obtained by a few men in each

of these localities, and success has not even been divided. Prices have now reached the level of five and six cents per pound, which must be considered exceedingly good money; and those who have been fortunate enough to get good catches, have done very well in the way of profit. Tom cods are selling at from 10c. to \$1.00 a barrel, which is considered fairly high, but the fish are somewhat scarce.

Fishermen in other places have on the whole done much better than those in Chatham. The prospects for bay fishing are excellent.

The Evening Chit-Chat
By BUTH CAMERON

THE familiar epigram—
"Tell me what a man eats and I will tell you what he is."
"Tell me what a man reads and I will tell you what he is"—I have a new one to add:
"Tell me how many waits and I will tell you what he is."
Did it ever occur to you how many waits there are of waiting and how very expressive of character they are?
There is the man who, when he is waiting for a car which he knows will come across the road, a half dozen times in the space of ten minutes in the hope of seeing it coming.
Can't you imagine just what this man would be like in the business of living—just how unable to do a thing and then let it alone, just how unable to act and then wait for the passage of time to ripen his act into results?
Then there is the man who, while he waits, asks half a dozen people when his car is due. Can't you paint from that his tendency to suspicion and unbelief?
Then there is the man who, while he waits for the dinner he has ordered, drums upon the table with his hand, takes up his knife and says it down, takes up his fork and lays it down, then drums on the table again. If he is waiting for a car he paces up and down, up and down, up and down, for all the world like the poor pariah in the zoo, until the people about him get out of the contagion of his nervousness and don't you know just what kind of a man he is at home, just how nervous, how impatient, how easily worried, how quick to fly off the handle?
And then there is the man who finds out when his car is due and then simply folds his arms and waits. He knows that no antics of his can hurry the passage of time and he indulges in none.
He is master of himself, captain of all his forces, and when he has given himself the command to wait he expects unquestioning obedience.
Can't you get the whole man from that? Can't you realize the reserve force, the control, the power in leash, in his character?
Waiting is the hardest thing most of us ever have to do. Everyone knows that. And he who does it well is one of the greatest self conquerors.
Do you remember what that great poet, whose blindness transformed a life of passionate activity into a plank of eternal waiting, said about waiting?
"Then patience to prevent that murmur soon replied:
"God doth not need neither man's works or his own gifts,
Who best bear his mild yoke they serve him best,
His state is kingly: thousands at his bidding
Speed and post o'er him, like ocean waves,
THEY ALSO SERVE WHO ONLY STAND AND WAIT."
You will please notice he didn't say "Walk up and down and wait."

Daily Hints for the Cook

ORANGE CAKE
Cream together 1 cup of sugar and 1/2 cup of butter, add 2 eggs, minus two of whites, which must be used for frosting, add 2 cups of pastry flour with 2 teaspoonsful of cream of tartar, 1 of soda and 1/2 cup cold water and the grated peel of 1 orange and half the juice. The other half of juice is to be put in the frosting. Bake the cake in a long tin and when cold frost with the 2 beaten whites. Thicken with confectioner's sugar and flavor with the orange juice.

CREAMED BEEF
Chop or put through a food chopper one pound of round steak. Put in a very hot pan and toss about with a fork to prevent browning. Care must be taken that the meat is quickly and thoroughly browned or the juice will escape and the meat be dry and tasteless. When nicely browned add one tablespoonful of butter and stir it through the meat until melted. Dredge in one tablespoonful of flour and stir until the flour is well blended, then add one small cupful of rich milk and boil a minute or two. Season with salt and pepper and serve on hot buttered toast.

Care of Tan Shoes
Many women have trouble in caring for tan shoes; that is, in keeping them bright and fresh-looking, and free from the discoloring spots that often mar them. Tan leather seems to be subject to discoloring spots, while the leather remains in a very good condition, and the shoes are not otherwise injured. Shoe dealers now sell a shoe soap that is most excellent for keeping new shoes in a bright, fresh, clean looking condition.
The shoes should be brushed thoroughly before using the soap, in order that every particle of dust and dirt is removed. The shoe soap is then rubbed well into the leather until the surface is practically dry. This can be accomplished with a soft rag. Then rub the leather briskly with a soft rag, and this gives the high luster.
It should always be remembered that in rubbing leather with a rag it should not be done so briskly that the leather is burned. The shoe-soap applications are kept up for a month. Shoe trees are quite necessary to retain the original shape of the shoe.

POMMES POLAIRES.
Peel, core and quarter some good cooking apples. Cook them gently till tender and set aside till quite cold. Arrange them in a deep glass dish, cover with Devonshire cream, scatter chopped pistachio nuts over all and serve as cold as possible with water biscuits or sponge fingers.

PIG SANDWICHES.
Chop one fourth pound of figs fine, add to them one fourth cupful of water, and cook to a smooth paste. Then add one third cupful of blanched almonds, chopped fine and pounded to a paste, with a little rose water and the juice of a lemon. When cold spread upon either bread or cake. Dates or raisins may be used in place of the figs if liked.

CARDAMON CAKES.
Beat three eggs light without separating. Add to them gradually two pounds of sugar beating steadily. Add three ounces of butter. Mix four tablespoonfuls of ground ginger and three of cinnamon with one pound of flour. Add to the eggs and sugar and beat until smooth. Bake in greased shallow pans, sprinkling the top with blanched almonds split in halves before putting in the oven. Cut in squares to serve.

Prof. MacNaughton Speaks to Canadian Club on Hudson Bay Route—The Trip Taken With Earl Grey
About 100 members of the Men's Canadian Club and Women's Canadian Club were taken just evening over the course followed by Earl Grey and his party on the recent trip to Hudson Bay. The club members were given an interesting presentation by Prof. MacNaughton, of McGill, who delivered a pleasing and eloquent lecture on the subject. He was followed by the president, Miles E. Aggar, at the close of his address.
Prof. MacNaughton told of the many places of interest visited, and related many incidents of an interesting nature which occurred during the voyage, beginning with the start made at Winnipeg.
He had never met a man who was quite so hearty, quite so good a man to go into the wilderness with as Earl Grey. They had to paddle a good deal but at times they could sail. Water lilies grew in profusion in these lakes. At some of the portages they had to walk through the woods. He never saw an abundance of berries and will currants both red and black. The red ones were very good to eat but the black were rather sour. The wheat could be got out by the Hudson Bay route. The G. T. P. will relieve the tension of the railway. It will build the amount to be taken away if it creases faster than the power to move it. The Canadian officials detained six as a result of sickness and sixty for lack of the requisite sum of money.

ST. JOHN BOYS HEARD FROM AS CLIFF CLIMBERS

Gavon and Raymond Baxter Scale Lofly Mountains of North Vancouver—Western Paper Tells of it

"The Express," of North Vancouver, B. C., tells of a mountain climb, in which two former St. John boys took leading parts, namely Gavon and Raymond Baxter, who lived for many years in Victoria street, North End, but who went west about three years ago, settling in North Vancouver.

The article speaks of their leaving North Vancouver, in company with a few others from that place, and going by automobile to a spot near the foot of the mountains, known as "The Lions," the guardians of the city and harbor. These are almost perpendicular and 1,000 and 1,200 feet from base to summit, with but little shrubbery, trees or other means to enable the climber to ascend, easily or rapidly. The party left on a Friday night and camped on the saddle of the hills in order to make an early start up the mountains on Saturday morning. For quite a while they were engulfed in a bank of dense fog, the Express narrates, but when it lifted they were easily repaid for their trouble by the splendid view which met their gaze.

Very few have scaled these mountains, and it is a notable feat to have one's name inscribed on the rocks at the top of the slopes. It will be interesting news to their friends in the North End, and to their former associates in the "Scott" Brigade, to learn that the names of Gavon and Raymond Baxter are hewn in the jagged rocks at the summit of "The Lions."

PROBATE COURT

In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Catherine Murdoch, there was return of a citation to pass the accounts of R. Keltie Jones, the sole executor. The accounts were gone into and found to be satisfactory in every way and were passed and allowed and ordered the distribution of the balance made. W. A. Ewing, K. C.P.R. TO USE 'PHONE FOR TRAIN WORK

Will Establish Telephone System for Dispatching of Trains Between St. John and McAdam—To be Inaugurated in Spring

Following the successful operation of train dispatching by telephone on other portions of the system, instead of the telegraph, the C. P. R. has decided to install a telephone line between this city and McAdam Junction and will inaugurate dispatching trains by this method in the coming spring.

William Downie, general superintendent of the Atlantic division said this morning in answer to a query from a Times reporter regarding a rumor that a telephone system was to be established, that the company had decided to put in a line from here to McAdam and to operate their trains in this way. He added that the work would be undertaken soon and men would be sent out to put up the wires for the service.

It is not likely that the inauguration of the telephone system will affect the telegraphers at present employed by the company as they will be kept on as operators of the telephone. The telephone is said to have proved very successful wherever it has been adopted. The telegraph lines will be kept up for use in an emergency and for this reason it will be necessary to have men who can operate a telegraph key as well as the telephone.

THE PETITION AGAINST TERRY IS DISMISSED

Judge McKeown Decides Fairville Liquor License Case—Practically All Taverns there, He Says, Are in Violation of Law

Judge McKeown disposed of the following matters in the King's Bench division this morning.

In the Fairville liquor case, which came before him on the petition of William J. Linton and others, asking that the tavern license of William W. Terry be revoked if cancelled on the ground that Mr. Terry has not complied with the act, which says that each tavern must have a certain number of sleeping rooms and stabling accommodation, His Honor found that practically all the taverns in Fairville were violating the act in that respect, and the penalty for such violation was the non-granting of the license for the period of three years. He said that, as he had discretion in the matter, he would dismiss the petition.

J. D. P. Lewis appeared for the petitioners and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., for Mr. Terry.

In the case of Hall vs. Donaldson Bros., an action brought by the plaintiff under the Workmen's Compensation Act for injuries received while in the employ of the defendants, F. R. Taylor for the defendants took a number of technical objections, all of which were dismissed. Dr. W. B. Wallace and J. A. Barry appeared for the plaintiff.

In the case of O'Regan vs. the C. P. R., His Honor made an order for the plaintiff to pay the costs of a prior action before this court can be continued. J. R. Taylor for the defendant was in support of the order and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., and H. D. Forbes for the plaintiff, contra.

The case of Folkins vs. Campbell, His Honor referred to the full bench. This is a review case from the parish court of Sussex, presided over by a stipendiary magistrate. The question is as to the authority of a stipendiary to preside over this court.

ROSSI MAY BE FREE AGAIN AT AGE OF 41

Likely Away to Penitentiary Tomorrow—Relieved to Escape Death on Scaffold

It is probable that Andrew Rossi will be taken tomorrow morning to the penitentiary at Dorchester to commence his sentence of twenty five years. The young Italian will be in custody of Turnkey Cunningham.

Since being imprisoned in June last when arrested by Detective Killeen, Rossi has been conducting himself well, and it is the belief of the jail officials and others who know his disposition that he will continue to do so in the penitentiary. If this is the case and he receives the usual accolade "good conduct" he will be liberated in about twenty years, which would make him a free man at forty-one years old, as he is now twenty-one. Should he, however, have to serve his full time, he will not be liberated until he is forty-six. He seems greatly relieved at finding that he does not have to die by the hangman's rope and is awaiting his leaving for the prison with a remarkable degree of complacency. So far as is known his family in far-off Sunny Italy are unaware of his misfortune.
