MINUTES OF THE TENTH SESSION OF THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Conference assembled in the Central Methodist Church, Thursday, June 8th, 1893, at 9 a.m. The President, Rev. GEO. J. BISHOP, took the chair, and led the Conference prayer-meeting, which lasted for one hour, and was a session of great spiritual profit.

At 10 o'clock the Conference was called to order by the President, who announced the 712th Hymn. The Secretary read a part of Acts iv., and Rev. Dr. Sutherland led in prayer.

The President delivered an earnest and practical address.

The roll was called, and 124 ministers and 85 laymen answered to their names.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to call attention to the following statistical items:

There are within the bounds of the Toronto Conference 367 schools with a total membership of 4,336 officers and teachers and 36,811 scholars, with an average attendance of 25,468. The amount of \$28,199.07 has been raised during the year, of which \$4,583.55 are for Missions, \$431.54 for S. S. Aid and Extension Fund, and \$23,187.98 for School purposes.

There have been taken by our schools 5,041 copies of *Onward*, 8,571 of *Pleasant Hours*, 3,691 of *Happy Days*, 5,408 of *Sunbeam*, and 2,609 *Sunday School Banners*. We note with pleasure an increase in the circulation of these periodicals of 1,628 copies.

There has been a decrease of 1,036 in the number learning catechism, and an increase of 3,532 in the number taking total abstinence pledge. During the year there have been 1,499 conversions in connection with our Sabbath School work. It is to be hoped that when the new series of catechisms, now in course of preparation, are published that a great improvement in the study of this important summary of Christian doctrine will follow. We are pleased to observe that there is a decrease of over 500 in the number of periodicals, other than those published in our own Book Room, taken in our schools.

Your Committee beg to call the attention of the Conference to the fact that there are within its bounds 469 preaching appointments, and that there are only 367 Sunday Schools, leaving 102 appointments where no Methodist Sunday School is held. Of the schools only 273 are open all the year, leaving 196 appointments without schools during about half the year. This Committee therefore request the Conference to earnestly exhort its ministers to establish, wherever practicable, a Methodist Sunday School, and also, with the assistance of officers, teachers and parents, to

insure as far as possible that Sunday Schools shall be kept open the whole year, in the same manner as the day schools of the country.

Your Committee recognize the very important service which has been rendered by the Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund in the planting of new schools and in the assistance of needy schools, by granting aid of books and papers to schools in remote and destitute parts of the country. We beg to suggest that the brethren take advantage of this Fund as widely as possible in the planting of new schools and in the assistance of needy ones. We heartily commend the still more liberal sustenance of this Fund by all the schools throughout the Conference, as the funds this year have been overdrawn by the demands made upon them.

Your Committee desire to express their admiration of the general character and superior quality of the reading matter and illustrations of our Sabbath School literature, and would strongly urge all our schools to circulate in their neighborhoods our own Sabbath School publications as productive of the best results as to good citizenship, temperance and personal piety in the minds and hearts of both young and old.

We would recognize the faithful services of Rev. Dr. Barrass as Conference Treasurer of Sabbath School funds, and recommend his reappointment.

STANDING REGULATIONS OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

This Fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

All ministers, whether laboring on circuits or missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts shall have their claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz., married ministers, \$500; single ordained ministers, \$300; and probationers, \$250; the amounts to embrace salary only.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all our congregations in every circuit and mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied when possible by a layman, shall visit such circuits, and shall urge on the people as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3.00 per member for all members over sixteen years of age, and every mission that it has paid an average of \$2.00 in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the session of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

A treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for this Fund, to whom the Superintendents of circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee recommend that the time of making the collections shall not be later than the month of March.

REGULATIONS REGARDING THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. The Superintendents of circuits shall pay as soon as convenient the collections taken up on their respective circuits to the Financial Secretaries, who shall remit the same to the Treasurer.
2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint.
3. No application for special claims shall be entertained by the Committee unless they have passed the fourth Quarterly Meeting, and have been signed by the Recording Steward and recommended by the District Meeting; also no special claim shall be entertained where the claimant receives \$900 or over as appropriation from his circuit.
4. All applications for expenses incurred in the service of the Church, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted in detail to the Committee for their investigation.

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5. No grants shall be made for ministerial supply on account of affliction when the Circuit is deemed competent to pay for said supply, and in no case shall a grant be made for more than the salary of a single minister.

6. If grants be made to Districts to assist dependent circuits, said grants shall be fairly apportioned to the circuits claiming aid by the Financial District Meeting.

7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following resolutions, recommendations and suggestions:

1. In view of the fact that the electors of Ontario are to have the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic submitted to them in the form of a plebiscite, and recognizing the importance of securing an overwhelming vote in favor of prohibition, it is hereby recommended that the Sunday preceding the day on which the vote shall be taken be set apart upon all our stations, circuits and missions as temperance Sunday, for the purpose of preaching sermons, holding mass meetings, and otherwise educating public sentiment so as to secure a decided vote favorable to the suppression of the liquor traffic. Also to this same end, that a monthly temperance night be held in connection with our week-evening prayer-meetings and in the Young People's Societies during the next six months. Further, that we join as a Church with other temperance people as citizens, in prosecuting the campaign, and request that our publishing authorities and Church periodicals give special prominence to circulating such facts and arguments as will tend to create a public opinion and carry the vote in favor of prohibition. That each station, circuit and mission be requested to establish a literature and campaign fund for the purpose of the widest possible dissemination of information on the subject. And also that a standing Conference Committee on Temperance, consisting of five ministers and five laymen, be appointed to confer with committees of other Churches or organized temperance societies to prosecute the work after the vote is taken.

2. In this connection we wish to recognize the gain to the cause of temperance arising from the discussion in the Ontario Legislature on the introduction of a bill for the prohibition of the retail traffic in alcoholic liquors by G. F. Marter, M.P.P., a member of this Conference, and wish to record our appreciation of those members of the Legislature who supported the cause of prohibition.

3. Ministers and congregations are requested to see that each Church, Epworth League, Christian Endeavor or other young people's society, and Sabbath School Temperance Society, is represented at the Provincial convention of prohibition workers to be held in this city on the 2nd day of October next, for the purpose of opening the plebiscite campaign.

4. Attention is called to the fact that during the year 13,056 have taken the Sabbath School total abstinence pledge, being an increase of 3,532 over last year, and all our churches are urged to prosecute the moral aspect of the work in accordance with paragraphs 294, 295 and 296 of the Discipline.

5. It is important that all our people who are qualified electors should have their names registered on the voters' list, and use the ballot for the election to all public offices of men who are in favor of prohibition.

6. It is greatly to be deplored that the evil of social drinking is growing in our cities and towns, through the influence of political, social, athletic and other clubs, and every possible influence should be used to prevent such organizations being the means of temptation to our young men. It is indeed a question as to how far Christian men can permit such things in connection with any society to which they may belong.

7. We believe that the traffic in intoxicating liquors is in direct opposition to the home, the school and the Church, and subversive of the peace and prosperity of society, therefore "it cannot be legalized without sin;" and as such legislation for a money consideration makes all who support the same, either by voice, influence or vote, morally responsible for the results of the traffic; therefore, be it

Resolved,—That we declare it to be our solemn conviction that every Methodist should use his franchise so as to overthrow as soon as possible the great national evil of the liquor traffic by total and absolute prohibition.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund, for the year ending July 31st, 1892.

We have pleasure in being able to state that the income for the Annual Fund has increased from circuits, \$1,443.16, and from ministers' subscriptions \$435.41; thus enabling us to meet the claims in full, notwithstanding the increased expenses, as shown in the financial statement, and yet keep within the estimates for the year.

There has also been an addition of \$12,373.91 made to the capital account in the item of legacies, being an increase over the preceding year of \$5,936.66. This shows a very commendable disposition on the part of our friends to contribute in this way for the permanent benefit of the Fund.

It has been found very difficult to secure safe investments for our funds at present rates. We have therefore been under the necessity of keeping a larger amount in the bank than we thought to be desirable. It was, how-

ever, considered better to do this than to invest in doubtful securities. This has led to a falling off in our interest account of about \$340.

On account of the unusual mortality among our aged ministers, the expired claims will about balance the new claims placed on the Fund.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

TORONTO WEST DISTRICT.

St. Paul's.—That the request of St. Paul's Church, Avenue Road, to give a confirmatory deed to one John Harris for the sale of a lot on Hazleton Avenue, made by James Fairhead and others, as "Trustees of St. Paul's Church," be, and is hereby granted.

Euclid Avenue.—That the request of the Trustees of the Euclid Avenue Church property, to sell their property on Euclid Avenue to John Bainbridge, of 23 Euclid Avenue, Toronto, be granted, for \$5,000 (five thousand dollars).

Davenport.—That the Trustees of the Davenport Methodist Church be granted permission to sell the parsonage and endowment house, proceeds of sale to be applied to the erection of a new parsonage and to church improvements.

BRAMPTON DISTRICT.

Laskay.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Laskay parsonage to sell the parsonage, proceeds to be applied toward paying the debt on the King Circuit parsonage.

BRADFORD DISTRICT.

Bond Head.—That the request of the Trustees of the Bond Head Church, to sell their old church, be granted, proceeds to be applied to the reduction on the debt of the new church.

TOTTENHAM AND BEETON.

That the request of the Trustees of the Ballycroy Church, to sell their church, be granted, proceeds to be applied to the reduction of the Tottenham parsonage debt.

BARRIE DISTRICT.

Oro Station.—That the request of the Official Board, respecting sale or exchange of site, on which the Hawkstone Church now stands, for a more suitable site in the village to which the church may be removed, be granted.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report that there are 144 ministers in the active work, 49 superannuated ministers, 10 supernumeraries, and 40 probationers, within the bounds of the Conference.

The present total membership of the Conference is 33,829. Of this number 5,831 were received during the year from all sources, representing 356 more than those removed, yet the total present membership as given in the District records shows a decrease of seventy-eight when compared with the number published in the Minutes of last year.

In Connexional Funds we are unable to present a complete report owing to the fact that the Toronto East District has not reported, and Toronto West has not made full returns for the Missionary Fund. The other districts show a decrease of \$66.72, as compared with last year.

We have only imperfect returns of ministerial salary from the Toronto East District. Omitting this district, there is an increase of \$1,997 paid for ministerial support.

We desire further to state that unless the District Meetings insist on having the schedules properly filled and audited, it is useless to expect accurate returns by any Statistical Committee, no matter how painstaking they may be.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Rev. J. F. German was appointed Chairman, and Rev. T. Campbell, Secretary.

1. In reference to a memorial from the Toronto West District, requesting the Conference to ask from the Quarterly Official Boards an expression in reference to tickets,

Resolved.—That in our opinion no change is desirable, and as no request has come from the Boards, we deem it unnecessary to make any move in the matter.

2. Another memorial from the Toronto West and Collingwood Districts, *re* the Industrial Exhibition and other fairs,

This Committee recommends that this Conference respectfully and earnestly requests the Directors of the Industrial Exhibition to so arrange the programme before the grand stand, leaving out those offensive performances, that those who occupy places there, waiting for the more profitable entertainment, may not be forced to look upon those scenes which are so contrary to their conception of right, and which have a tendency to lower the standard of propriety.

3. Toronto East District, *re* District Records,

We recommend that all districts use the books specially prepared, and on hand at our Book Room.

4. From Collingwood District, *re* Objectionable Placards,

We are of opinion that the Conference, as far as possible, should request all township, village, town and city authorities to do their utmost to prevent the posting of all such indecent placards; and that we do all in our power to preserve the purity of the rising generation.

5. *Re* a communication from the Secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association,

We concur with the said Association in regretting that the reform petitioned for, in reference to the better protection of children, the reorganization of the boys' reformatory, the removal of the refuge for girls from the reformatories for women, etc., have not been effected; and we recommend the Conference to appoint a Standing Committee on Prison Reform, as desired by said Association, to co-operate with committees of other churches; and that as a Conference we cheerfully and heartily co-operate with said Association in securing such desirable reforms.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Epworth League Committee beg leave to report the organization of 13 new Leagues, and an increase in League membership of 1,272 during the year, there being at present 117 Leagues, comprising 6,276 members within the bounds of this Conference.

While recognizing in these evidences of progress and development great cause for gratitude to God, yet remembering that throughout the Conference there are more than three times as many Sunday Schools as Epworth Leagues, your Committee feel that a large portion of the ground is at present unoccupied, and we cannot too strongly urge the necessity of the development of this important resource of our Church, and hereby recommend the appointment of District Epworth League Secretaries to further organize and extend the work in each District.

Your Committee have noticed with great regret that, while the majority of the most excellent young women of our Church are found in our Epworth League Societies, a comparatively small percentage of the most desirable of our young men are found neither there nor engaged in any other department of Church work and thousands are outside the Church altogether. Believing that a considerable number of these young men might be

influenced to a change of life could their interest but be aroused, and were they but taught that religion is not a mere matter of sentiment propagated by those who are paid for such services, and suitable only as they sometimes allege for children, the old and the weak-minded, but is a matter of principle, that to be a Christian does not unfit, but rather qualifies one for the activities of everyday life, and is indeed an able, a courageous, a manly thing; therefore, your Committee respectfully suggest that the pastors and those in charge of our young people's societies endeavor, as far as possible, to instil these principles into the minds of the young people under their charge, and to develop in them a healthy, robust, courageous type of Christianity.

Further, recognizing that man has a mind to be instructed as well as a soul to be saved, and that an intelligent Christianity is one of the needs of the age, and as a further means of interesting those who are not Christians in the work of our Leagues, your Committee urge upon all young people's societies the importance of creating and developing a taste for good wholesome reading, and would recommend the taking up of some systematic course of study as outlined in the numerous reading courses set forth in our Epworth League leaflets, and especially that a study be made of the History of Methodism and the biography of her eminent sons and daughters.

Further, recognizing that man, in addition to a soul to be saved and a mind to be instructed, has a body which is "the Temple of the Holy Ghost," and which he should not carelessly or recklessly injure or impair or permit to fall into premature decay, and as a further means of interesting young men who are not members of our Church in our League work, your Committee recommend that the various Leagues throughout the Conference give their encouragement and support to all wholesome kinds of recreation carried on under Christian auspices, and with proper supervision and direction.

Your Committee desire to express their approval of the scheme proposed by the Ontario Methodist Young People's Association, for the holding of institutes in convenient centres throughout the Province for the systematic study of the Bible and methods of Christian work, which scheme is to be submitted to the General Conference Epworth League Board at its next session, and as preparatory to and assential to the successful operation of such scheme, your Committee recommend that each League take up the systematic study of the English Bible, book by book, following the order indicated by the International Series of Sunday School Lessons.

Recognizing the importance of cultivating a spirit of Church loyalty as well as of Christian fraternity, your Committee strongly recommend all pastors and those in charge to take steps toward the affiliation of all Methodist young people's societies with the Epworth League of our Church, under the name of Epworth League or Epworth League of Christian Endeavor.

Your Committee also recommend that the Superintendents of circuits be asked to call the attention of the Epworth Leagues on their respective circuits to the annual collection to be taken by the Leagues for the General Secretary's disbursements for printing, postage, etc., in connection with League organization and extension.

Your Committee would also urge the formation of Junior Societies of Epworth League wherever practicable, on the plan of the excellent model Constitution and By-laws provided for that purpose.

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As at the Provincial Convention of Prohibition Workers to be held in this city next October, it is provided that each Epworth League may send two representatives, with one additional representative for each 50 or fraction of 50 members, after the first 50 members, your Committee would urge all Epworth Leagues to send representatives to this convention, and in all other possible ways prepare themselves for active participation in the contest of January next.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee believe that throughout our Conference boundaries the Sabbath is faithfully kept and loyally observed by the Methodist people, and we regard it as a reason for profound thankfulness that the disturbing and godless elements that have corrupted other cities and countries and destroyed the sanctity of the Sabbath have not as yet obtained any strong foothold among us.

We deem it advisable, however, to sound a note of warning against the efforts of evil and selfish men who would open our museums and public libraries, and who advocate the running of trains and street cars on the Sabbath, knowing as we do that the effect of this will be to convert the day of rest and worship into one of amusement and riot, and that many of those who are already overworked would be thus unjustly compelled to relinquish their day of rest in order to furnish amusement for others.

We earnestly request the members of our Church to discountenance in every way possible Sunday visiting and travelling, tending as they do to the neglect of public worship and the degradation of the Lord's day; and we trust our people will stand loyally against all foes from whatever quarter who would endeavor to rob us of this Christian institution which has been and is the minister of so much blessing.

Having considered the replies of the commissioners of the World's Fair, for Ontario and the Dominion, to the resolutions of last Conference respecting the opening of the Columbian Exposition on the Sabbath day, we are pleased to find them in sympathy with our desire, and willing, should the Exposition be opened, to discourage any display of Canadian products or merchandise during the Sabbath. Already the Fair *has* been opened on the Lord's day, and we desire to note with approval that the British and Canadian offices have been closed and their exhibits covered in so far as practicable.

We have learned with pleasure that the courts of the United States have declared that the opening of the World's Fair on the Sabbath is illegal and have ordered the gates to be closed. If our information be correct, we rejoice in the triumph of righteousness over the designs of bad men; and whatever may be the ultimate decision of the higher courts to whom appeal is taken, we cannot but look on the action of the directors in attempting to open the Fair on the Sabbath, after receiving the gifts of Congress on the express condition that the gates should be closed, as unmanly and dishonorable.

With reference to the letter from a legal firm in this city regarding the Grimsby Camp Ground Company, referred to the Committee by the Conference, in which the following charges are made: "Their great business day is Sunday, when the camp ground is in full swing, tickets sold at the gates, every agent of the Company on the alert, stores on the ground open doing a rushing business, and all sources of amusement taxed to the utmost, the whole being under the watchful care of the Methodist ministers," we beg to report:

The directors and officers of the Company gave an unqualified denial to all the charges except that an admission fee was taken at the gate.

The Committee asked for the name of the client on whose behalf the letter was written and the charges made, but this was refused.

They also notified the legal firm that it was admitted that an admission fee was charged, and requested them or their client to substantiate the other charges which were denied. A member of the firm appeared before the Committee, but produced no evidence in support of any of the other charges.

Your Committee feel very strongly that such charges should not have been made thus anonymously, and that they should not have been made at all when it appears they are without foundation in fact.

Respecting the taking of a fee at the gate, your Committee, while standing firmly by the sanctity of the day of rest, do not feel called upon to give a deliverance upon this point with the imperfect information at hand. If there is any violation of the sanctity of the Sabbath or the statutory laws, the directors can be proceeded against either as individual members of the Methodist Church before her courts, or as a corporation before a civil tribunal.

STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee in looking over the results of the past year's work find much to encourage and inspire, but at the same time regret to report a small decrease of seventy-eight in the membership returns. This may be accounted for to some extent by the following:—

1. The removal of many of our members from the city necessitated by the depression of trade.

2. The fact that a considerable number of our members annually remove to different localities, not beyond our own constituency, but are lost to the Church, because they neglect the important duty of taking their letters of removal with them.

3. The excision of a large number of members from the membership rolls which may have been due to an overcrowded growth of statistical returns which required in certain directions rather a vigorous pruning during the past year.

4. The fact that all our services do not partake sufficiently of the evangelistic character or spirit to produce in the ordinary means of grace, to the extent we desire, the fruits of conversion or entire sanctification.

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Your Committee would recommend the necessity of reminding members from time to time (from the pulpit) that none are to remove from one circuit to another without a certificate of membership; and if any members of the Church repeatedly, and without sufficient reason, neglect the means of grace, such as class-meeting, prayer-meeting, public worship, the Lord's Supper, the ordinances of God, let the superintendent visit and admonish them, and if they continue their neglect, let them receive notice of exclusion; nevertheless, to prevent any arbitrary use of power or destroy the sacred relationship between a church member's name and the membership roll, we would strongly and emphatically insist that no name be dropped without the consent of either the Leaders' Meeting or the Quarterly Board.

Recognizing the twofold mission of the Church, viz., to lead men to Christ, and build them up in Christ, the impression is strong and deep in our minds, that a higher type of spirituality is needed in all our churches, not only in the purification of the hearts and lives of our members, but such a sweetness and deepness of the perfect love of Jesus as shall cause others who take knowledge thereof to long for its fulness, enriching the experience, ennobling the manhood, beautifying the character, and manifesting itself in all the activities of life, reaching above a mere profession which consists in the hollow husk of form only, to the most aggressive activities of soul-winning, and building men up in that holiness without which we cannot see the Lord.

Your Committee are grateful for the fact that there is an increase of three in the catechumens not included in the membership reported, but are of the opinion that there must be great neglect somewhere or the returns would have been much larger from this most fruitful field of gospel toil. There ought to be thousands gathered into the Church annually of children definitely deciding to live for Christ.

We would therefore recommend,

1. That the children be gathered into class-meetings with spiritual and competent leaders.
2. That superintendents of all our schools insist in employing converted persons as teachers.
3. That ministers preach more frequently to the young people, and especially the children, enforcing the fact that conversion is a radical change wrought in our hearts by the power of God, and witnessed by the Holy Spirit, and not a mere change of mind, or the development of some acquired virtue, or the growth of some latent good which may have been handed down to us through heredity.

As voluntary and systematic giving is the only means of support enjoyed by the Lord and His apostles for the maintenance of the ministry and the Church with her benevolent institutions, and as the Methodist Book Room of this city has constantly on hand an abundant and first-class supply of the very best literature on this subject, we would strongly recommend the brethren to take their circuits a good supply, and thoroughly indoctrinate our people until in all quarters there shall be no lack of temporal support.

We further take pleasure in embodying the following resolution, that,
Whereas, there is a decrease in the membership of the churches, we, the ministerial and lay members of the Conference, desire to humble our-

selves before God and consecrate ourselves afresh to His service; and furthermore, with a view to better accomplish the great object of the Church, to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land, the Conference recommends that at all the Financial District Meetings there shall be a conversation respecting this important subject.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEACONESSES.

Your Committee appointed by the Conference last year to prosecute further enquiries on this subject, and to take preliminary steps with a view to maturing definite plans for submission to this Conference, beg leave to report as follows:

Your Committee have followed up the enquiries made by their predecessors and have obtained considerable additional information, chiefly from the larger cities in the United States. The information thus obtained is largely corroborative of that laid before the Conference of last year, and confirms the favorable impressions then received.

Your Committee did not take any definite steps towards obtaining money for a Home, as it is believed that this could best be done in connection with a visit from some of those who have been connected with the work, and who can speak from personal experience. Enough information has been obtained, however, to justify the belief that there would be a generous response to such an appeal.

It is believed that the following would be a fair estimate of the cost of furnishing a suitable Home in this city and maintaining it for the first year with a superintendent and say four or five candidates in training:

Your Committee have learned that there are several devoted Christian women in our churches in this city who would enter upon the work if a Home were established here. Your Committee would therefore recommend

1. That this Conference authorize the founding of such a Home in Toronto when the necessary financial aid shall have been secured, to be under the management of a Board composed of the President of the Conference, seven ministers (among whom shall be the chairmen of the Toronto Districts), seven women and seven laymen. The Board to be appointed for one year by the Conference on the nomination of a committee appointed for the purpose.

2. That the Board be authorized to bring to the city an experienced deaconess to enlist sympathy and support by the holding of public meetings and otherwise.

3. That when the state of the finances will warrant such a step a house in the central part of the city be secured, and an experienced and thoroughly competent person obtained for the position of superintendent.

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OBITUARIES.

JAMES GRAY.

In the death of the Rev. James Gray, which took place in this city on the 29th of October last, another who had been for many years a prominent figure in the councils of the Church has disappeared. He was "a good man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost;" and, though dead, he still speaks to us by the spotless record of his life. He rests from his labors and his works do follow him. The biography of such a man is worthy of careful study, and did time and space permit it would be a pleasing task to review it at some length, and to carefully gather up its lessons, but the limits of this sketch will only permit a concise record of its principal events, and the most salient traits of character which it presents.

Mr. Gray was born in the County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1820, and entered the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada in 1846; he was therefore in the seventy-second year of his age and the forty-seventh of his ministry at the time of his decease. He had the inestimable advantage of being descended from a godly ancestry, and being the child of devoted Christian parents. He was a Methodist of the fourth generation, his family being among the first-fruits of Mr. Wesley's labors in the north of Ireland. His parents were Christians of the primitive type, who regarded their children as lent of the Lord, and who felt it to be their chief business in rearing them to train them for His service. They not only diligently trained them in their own house in the doctrine and the discipline of the Lord, but they took them with them to all the means of grace. Even in his early childhood James was led by the hand to the class-meeting.

It is not surprising, therefore, that in very early life he was the subject of deep religious impressions. Even when not more than nine years of age he appears to have had a deep sense of sin and of the need of a Saviour; and though, through timidity, he concealed his feelings even from his godly parents, he says the groves and hedges contiguous to his father's house could bear testimony to the sincerity and earnestness of his pleading with God for salvation. On the ocean, on his way to this country with his parents and the rest of the family, he had a remarkable experience. In a great storm they were brought into imminent peril, and he felt himself brought face to face, as it were, with death and eternity. He cried mightily to God, and in answer to the prayer of faith the desired peace was given to him, and though the angry elements continued to rage, there was a great calm in his soul.

But though he had grown up in the atmosphere of piety, though he possessed a nature so deeply religious, and lived a life so comparatively blameless, like most of those who are designed of Divine Providence for extensive usefulness in the Church, he was not prepared for his life-work without the discipline of sore conflict and trial. There are few more touching chapters in religious biography than the story of the spiritual conflicts of this boy, when the Holy Ghost was revealing to him the exceeding sinfulness of sin, and giving him to feel, even to the innermost depths of his soul, that there was absolutely no hope for him but that which is founded upon the infinite love of the Father, the infinite merit of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the infinite grace of the Holy Spirit.

But grace triumphed, and when the rough, stalwart Irish boy was tried he came forth as gold. The fining-pot is for the silver, and the furnace for the gold, but the Lord trieth the heart, and the very severity of the process to which it is subjected bears testimony to the preciousness of the substance. Men who are to be eminent in ministering to the souls of others, must be touched with

the feeling of their infirmity; and this can only result from being tempted in all points like as they are. In this, as in everything else, our Lord Jesus Christ is our Divine Exemplar, and we must be crucified with Him, if with Him we are able to insert ourselves into the suffering lot of others, so as to bear their griefs and carry their sorrows. It was this that gave to James Gray that ineffable tenderness which made him such a welcome visitor in the abodes of suffering and of sorrow, and that divine sympathy which prepared him to bind up the broken-hearted, and to effectively proclaim liberty to the captive and the opening of the prison to them that are bound.

It was while his mother was pointing him to the Saviour that he attained to that view of the infinite love of God and the sufficiency of His grace—that wrought in him complete deliverance from all fear that hath torment, and that enabled him to henceforth run freely and willingly in the way of God's commandments, and to serve Him with the force of right affections. If he was not completely delivered from sin he had complete power over it, and was enabled to habitually triumph over temptation, rejoicing evermore, praying without ceasing, and in everything giving thanks. From a child he had been addicted to prayer, and in the trials of his childhood and boyhood his refuge was the mercy-seat. But now prayer became his delight, and he not only spent much time alone with God, but he and his brother used to go alone into the depths of the forest, that there, without fear of interruption, they might pray with and for one another.

From the beginning the ministry in the Methodist Church has not been regarded as a profession, but as a divine vocation. Fifty years ago, as now, no one thought of intruding himself into the office and work of the ministry unless he verily believed himself to be inwardly made to do so by the Holy Spirit. To James Gray this call was clear and distinct. A dispensation of the Gospel was committed unto him, and it was not to him a matter of choice whether he should preach or not. It was not until this question of a divine call to this work was settled beyond the possibility of a doubt, that Mr. Gray set seriously at work to prepare himself for the ministry. Already he had formed studious habits and had an extensive knowledge of the Holy Scriptures and of Wesley's sermons. After spending a time at Victoria College in 1846, he was received on trial for the ministry and entered fairly on his life-work. His ministry was characterized from the first by remarkable power and great promise. It may be doubted whether the promise of those early days was ever completely fulfilled. No one could have been intimately acquainted with him about the time of his ordination without being convinced that he possessed most, if not all, the qualities necessary to make a great as well as a useful preacher. But though he attained to eminent usefulness, he never achieved greatness. But even his family, in this respect, leaned to virtue's side. He was too intent upon soul-saving, and too painstaking in the care of the flock entrusted to his charge, to give himself time for that wide-reading and careful cultivation of the graces of style and delivery, without which the highest excellence in the pulpit cannot be attained.

But, after all, preaching is but a means to an end, and the degree of its excellence is to be determined by its adaptation to the accomplishment of the purpose it is intended to accomplish. Measured by this standard, James Gray's ministry was one of no mean order. "He that winneth souls is wise," and it is as a soul-winner that his rank among his brethren is to be determined. Few men could grapple more mightily and successfully with the consciences of sinners, or beget in them a more vivid and pungent realization of the evil and demerit of sin, or lead them in deeper contrition and self-abandonment to the foot of the cross. And he was equally successful in pointing out to them the way of reconciliation by the cross. The thoroughness of the work that he did in this way was its chief characteristic. Loyalty to his Divine Master and fidelity to the souls of men led him to seek to lay deep the foundation of the religious character of those who came under his ministry in a sound, scriptural

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conversion, and unless this was accomplished he felt that he had failed in the attainment of the chief end of his ministry.

Mr. Gray excelled as a pastor and as an administrator of the discipline of the Church. He watched for those under his care as one who felt that he would have to give account. The sick, the infirm and the aged were special objects of his attention. He took a special interest in whatever pertained to the religious welfare of the young in whom he recognized the hope of the Church. Perhaps in nothing was his wisdom and his fidelity more apparent than in his dealing with the wayward and the erring. He was a strict, but at the same time a prudent and tender disciplinarian. Few men knew the law of the Church so thoroughly, or could administer it so wisely. His business ability was of a high order, and it may be safely said that no interest of the Church ever suffered from being intrusted to his care. As the superintendent of a circuit, as the chairman of a district, as the president of a Conference, as the Head Master of the Dundas Boys' School, as Governor of the Murray Institute, as the Treasurer of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, in a word, in all the positions of responsibility in which he was put by the Church, he was not only found faithful, but discharged his duties in such a manner as to secure the universal respect and confidence of his brethren.

He was twice married—in 1851 to Miss Isabella Jackson, of London, and in 1855 to Miss Sarah Wharin, who survives him. Both these unions appear to have been eminently happy. He had but one child, the fruit of his first marriage, who died in infancy.

Brother Gray's death was such as becomes such a life. He died at his post. On the 29th of October he walked from his home to his office, as was his wont, and seemed to those who met him on the street to be in his usual health, and as likely to render several years more of service to the Church as any of his brethren. But he had only been a few moments at his desk when a peculiarity in his breathing attracted the attention of Rev. Thomas Keough, who, seeing that his head had already fallen and that he was about to slip from his chair, hastened at once to his assistance and quietly laid him upon the floor, where he almost instantly expired. He was not for God had taken. Thus did he, in the strictest and most literal sense,

"Cease at once to work and live."

DAVID C. CLAPPISON

Was born on the 10th of March, 1819, at the village of Sutton, Yorkshire, England, and died in the city of Toronto, December 31st, 1892. He was, consequently, in the seventy-fourth year of his age, and as he was received on trial in 1845, he was in the forty-eighth year of his ministry at the time of his decease. His parents were connected with the Established Church, to which they appear to have been strongly attached. His father, especially, had a strong dislike to other denominations, as was evinced in the bitterness of feeling which he manifested toward his son. David's mother died when he was two years old. He was thus left to grow up without a mother's care or a mother's love; but though thus deprived of what at the time he specially needed, the Providence that watches over and cares for those who need its kindly attention most, watched over and kindly cared for him. This was manifest, not only in early youth, but specially so when youth was developing into early manhood, for when seventeen years of age, he was converted to God, and at once united with the Methodist Church. This gave grievous offence to his father, who frequently importuned him to sever his connection with Methodism. This he did not feel that he could do. In order to avoid further trouble and satisfy the demands of conscience, after he had reached his majority he left the paternal home, and came to the city of New York. He was now twenty-three years of

age. He remained in New York about one year, and came to Toronto in 1843, and entered the employment of the late John Sterling.

He was taken on trial for the ministry in 1845, having served the Church the preceding year under the Chairman. In 1849, he was received into full connection and ordained. For more than forty years he occupied various important circuits, from the extreme east to the most western part of Ontario, with general acceptability and usefulness, until failing health compelled him to retire. Brother Cappison was married to Miss Botsford, of Duffin's Creek, who preceded him to the better land only by about seven weeks.

He settled in Toronto in 1886, but extreme weakness prevented him from taking an active part in public religious services, being the greater part of the time confined to his bed. In the summer of 1891, for a few days he experienced a singular revival of health and strength. He was able to attend a service on the second Sunday in July, in memory of the late J. W. McCallum. At the close, approaching a friend, he exclaimed,—referring to himself—"Life from the dead!" It was of very short duration. The following day he fell down in a paralytic fit and was carried to his bed, from which he never was able to rise. For a year and a half his sufferings were intensely severe. His nervous prostration was so great that it made him the subject of peculiar temptation, causing him sometimes in his mental agony to cry out with fear. In all this, however, ultimately "he was more than conqueror."

It was the privilege of several brethren to frequently visit and commend him to God in prayer. On all these occasions he would heartily respond, though articulation was often very difficult and imperfect. With marked gratitude, while gushing tears would flow down his cheeks, he would exclaim, "My brethren are very good and kind to me." While the poor body was fearfully weak and racked with pain, the blessed Saviour held him as one of the stars in His right hand until the end came.

It is said by those who knew him best, that certain apparently incompatible qualities were peculiarly blended in his character—qualities which have often been found in combination in characters of wise and good men. While he was meek and lamb-like, always ready to yield when he could do so, he was also stern, fearless in denouncing what he regarded as wrong-doing, and in declaring the consequences of persisting in it. He was a somewhat rigid disciplinarian of the old-fashioned type. He had the reputation of being a good and useful preacher of the gospel, a faithful minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, alike conscientious in warning the unsaved as to consequences of neglecting salvation, and testifying of the grace of God in building up God's people in the most holy faith.

CHARLES SILVESTER.

Charles Silvester was born in Boston, Lincolnshire, England, September 23rd, 1812, and was therefore in his eighty-first year at the time of his decease, which took place in this city on the 10th of April last. His parents were members of the Church of England, and in that Church he received his early religious training. But after his conversion, which took place in 1835, at Market Rosen in his native country, where he was employed in a lawyer's office at the time, he connected himself with the Wesleyan Church, of which he continued to be ever after a consistent and devoted member. Shortly after he became a Methodist he removed to Street, in Somersetshire, where he took charge of a school, and continued to reside for some years. It was here that he began to exercise his gifts in calling sinners to repentance. His labors appear to have been greatly blessed, and through his instrumentality a Wesleyan Society was organized, which was in existence in 1887, and probably continues to this day.

In 1844, he came to Canada and took charge of a school at St. Sylvester in the Province of Quebec. In the following year, though he was not formally received on trial until the year after, he was called into the itinerant work by

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the District Meeting which met that year in Montreal, and sent to Russelltown as the colleague of the late Rev. Malcolm McDonald. In 1846, he entered regularly upon his probation and was appointed to St. Armand. The union of 1847, by which the missionary districts in this country, connected with the Wesleyan Conference of Great Britain became incorporated with the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada, brought him to Upper Canada, which was destined to be the field of his labors down to the close of his ministry. In 1850, having completed the prescribed course of study for candidates for the ministry, and honorably and usefully passed through his probation, giving satisfactory evidence of the possession of the gifts, graces and usefulness, which marked him out as one divinely called to the work of the ministry, he was received into full connection and ordained.

In addition to the fields on which he served in Lower Canada, he occupied the following fields in Ontario: Stratford, London, Wardsville, Goderich, Elora, Bradford, Collingwood, Prince Albert, Canton, Balfamore, Grimsby, Niagara. On each of these circuits he gave full proof of his ministry as a successful soul-winner, and as a conscientious, diligent and painstaking pastor. He was remarkably methodical, having a place for everything, and everything in its place; and this extended to the division of his time and the discharge of the duties of his calling, as well as to everything else that made up the warp and woof of his everyday life. In this way, without bustle or hurry, he succeeded in getting through more work than many who appeared to move with greater rapidity. His discharge of duty was marked by punctuality as well as fidelity. He was a man that might be relied upon to be always found at his post, ready to discharge the duty of the hour to the best of his ability, not only at the hour but at the minute.

Mr. Silvester was, above everything else, a man of deep and fervent piety. The rather scant memorials which he has left behind him in the form of autobiographical notes, bear abundant testimony to this. He was not content with preaching the truth, shunning not to declare the whole counsel of God, but he sought to be a living illustration of the doctrine that he preached. He probably thought little about the estimation in which he was held by men, being mainly anxious that he might enjoy the approval of God and always have a conscience void of offence; but if he had any ambition, it was to be known as a good man rather than as a great man. He was a deeply conscientious man, carrying his sense of moral obligation and accountability to God into everything he did. He was, moreover, pre-eminently a man of prayer, and of intimate communion with God. He believed fully in the doctrine of full salvation, or entire sanctification as it is held by the Methodist Church; and though he was specially severe in his judgment of himself and careful to profess less rather than more than he possessed, there can be little doubt that he enjoyed that perfect love that casteth out fear.

In 1850, he was united in marriage with Miss Sarah Worts, youngest sister of the late James G. Worts, Esq., of this city, which proved to be, in every respect, one of the happiest events of his life. In this estimable woman he found a helpmate every way suitable for him. After ministering to his happiness for nearly forty-three years, she still survives him, a beautiful example of the Christian matron, enjoying the respect and confidence of all who know her. Of their family, which consisted of four sons and one daughter, but two are still alive, Mr. William T. Silvester, of New York city, and Mr. Charles F. Silvester, whose home is in Chicago. To these gentlemen their revered and lamented father has bequeathed the principle of a pure example and a spotless name.

JAMES ELLIOTT, D.D.

The death of Rev. James Elliott, D.D., in his seventy-seventh year, has removed one who was for many years a prominent standard bearer in Canadian Methodism, and who possessed in a very marked degree the confidence and affection of his brethren, clerical and lay.

He was born in Kingscourt, County Cavan, Ireland, in 1815, and came with his parents to this country in 1830, settling in the township of Fitzroy near Ottawa.

He entered the itinerant ranks of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in 1841, and was received into full connection and ordained in 1845, when he was stationed at Kemptville. Thus more than half a century ago he began his work as a Methodist preacher. He was superannuated in 1885, having spent forty-four years in active ministerial service.

Few men were more popular or useful than James Elliott. He was a member of the most important committees of the Church, occupied its most prominent positions and exerted an influence widespread and beneficial throughout the whole Connexion. During the greater part of his ministry he was Chairman of the District in which he was stationed. In 1856 he was made Secretary of the Wesleyan Conference; in 1867, elected as its President, and after the union of 1874 made President of the Montreal Conference, to which office he was re-appointed the following year. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Victoria University in 1876.

Thus his brethren delighted to have one of rare modesty of character and purity and nobility of spirit.

As to the estimate in which he was held as a preacher and pastor, it is enough to say that it was his privilege to occupy the principal churches of the Connexion.

In London, Hamilton, Toronto, Kingston, Brockville, Montreal, Quebec, as well as other places, his ministry was eminently useful, and his name is still held in very warm and affectionate remembrance.

James Elliott was in the highest sense a manly man. He was incapable of a thought that was not upright and chivalrous and noble. He was a man of strong and simple faith. All that was mean and disingenuous and dishonorable he regarded with unspeakable scorn. No man who knew him could conceive of him as being a party to anything that was unworthy or questionable in spirit or act.

He was ever what he seemed to be. Seldom would you meet with one who had a greater contempt for mere show or pretence, or who would denounce more vigorously all ostentation or mere display. But he could commend as well as condemn. It was no slight compliment to hear him say concerning another, "*He is a decent man.*" On his lips it was the highest praise, to his brethren it was the assurance of the truest confidence and appreciation.

Our brother was not among those who "are given to change." He was slow to accept new theories and new practices. With a signal disregard for *sentimentalism* on the one hand, and "*higher criticism*" on the other, he held fast to the "form of sound words."

Strongly attached to the Methodism of his earlier days, it was no easy matter for him to anticipate or mentally consent to great and radical changes. Yet was he ever willing and anxious to follow the guiding hand; and when the thought of union took possession of the churches he had the high honor of taking one of the first official steps toward the same. As Convener of the Wesleyan Committee on Union, he invited the members of the committees of the other Methodist bodies to the first united meeting which was held in Toronto in 1874.

Any record of Dr. Elliott that would not give the foremost place to his gifts as a preacher would be defective. The pulpit was his throne. Without any of the arts of rhetoric, he was in the highest sense popular and successful. His preaching was a rare blending of tenderness, simplicity and strength. Ofttimes was he in his ministry the "Son of Consolation" to the sorrow-stricken people.

With a heart full of deep sympathy and ever in close and constant fellowship with God, he preached to save, while his public petitions as he led the congregation were toned with marvellous unction and power. His sermons were full of

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evangelical truth. They were clothed with an originality of thought and terseness of expression which ever marked them essentially as his own, for he was no man's imitator, and were presented with a pathos, naturalness and earnestness that touched the hearer's heart. *He felt himself, hence others felt.* The "common people heard him gladly," and all who waited on his ministry prized and loved him.

In 1844 Dr. Elliott was united in marriage to Miss Harriet Flynn. In 1854, after his removal to Hamilton from Brockville, he passed through a most painful ordeal of suffering and bereavement. Mrs. Elliott and a little daughter of seven years were stricken with cholera. He also was afflicted with the same terrible malady. When he came back to consciousness from the gates of the grave, he found that his home had been desolated by the removal through death of both wife and child.

In 1856 he married Miss Lydia Jane Nealey, in whom he found a faithful and true helper in his great life-work.

Our departed brother in his late years was the subject of much affliction, having been almost completely paralyzed. With great patience and resignation he bore his suffering. Through it all his mind continued clear, his faith unshaken, his hope undimmed. Prayer was his highest joy, Christ his constant Friend. He has triumphed through the precious blood. The surviving widow and bereaved sons and daughters are heirs of the richest legacy—the memory of a life of stainless integrity, sanctified influence and consecrated devotion. The Church has lost another Elijah. "He rests from his labors and his works do follow him."

JOHN FOSTER.

John Foster was born on Sunk Island, near Hull, Yorkshire, England, on the 28th of October, 1822, and died at Thornbury, Ontario, on the 28th of June, 1892.

From a brief record, prepared shortly before his decease, it appears that at a very early age he was the subject of serious impressions, under the influence of which he most reverently attended the public worship of God, and studiously read and meditated upon His Word. At the age of sixteen, on a Sabbath morning, he was so filled with longings after God that he fell upon his knees in the open field and there consecrated himself to God in vows which were faithfully kept unbroken during the long life which followed. His conversion was followed by a conviction of a call to the work of saving others; hence, in the following year, we find him engaged in holding prayer-meetings in the villages contiguous to his home; and his gifts and usefulness soon led to his appointment as an exhorter, and in due time his name appeared on the plan of the circuit with which he was connected as a local preacher.

In the spring of 1845 he married and emigrated to Canada. In 1850 he entered the itinerancy in connection with the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was ordained deacon in 1852, and elder in 1854; he continued in the effective ranks until 1872, when failing health compelled his superannuation. As a superannuated minister he was ever ready to do such work as his strength would permit, and he was loved and revered by the community in which his declining years were spent. As a preacher Brother Foster was distinguished for the clearness of his perception and the firmness of his grasp of his subject, as well as for his deep spiritual insight of the Word of God, in consequence of which he never failed to interest and profit his hearers, especially the more thoughtful of them. He was a close student of the Bible—his constant companion; a man of much meditation and prayer; he was a man, moreover, of most transparent purity of character and of stainless life. His death was not unexpected. Some months before, while conducting a public service in the Thornbury church, he fell under an attack of partial heart failure, which he accepted as an intimation that his work was done. Writing of it subsequently, he says:

"I would have gone, He bade me stay ;
 I would have worked, He bade me rest.
 He bent my will from day to day,
 He heard my yearnings unexpressed,
 And said them nay."

Thereafter he waited patiently and joyously for the final summons of the Master—his work done, and he himself like a shock of corn fully ripe, and ready to be gathered into the garner above.

EDWARD SALLOWS.

Edward Sallows was born in England on the 8th of July, 1815. He came to Canada when eighteen years of age, and two years later he was converted to God in Guelph under the ministry of the late Rev. Benjamin Sleight. He was received on trial for the Methodist itinerancy in 1841, and was set apart for the work of the ministry by the imposition of the hands of Revs. W. Case, W. M. Harvard, Ephraim Evans and Robert Cooney, in the year 1846. In 1847 he was united in marriage to Miss Louisa Upton, who survives him. During his probation he travelled Brock, Barrie, Woodstock, Stratford and Whitchurch Circuits. After his ordination he travelled the following circuits: Amherstburg, Chatham, Sydenham, Wardsville, Cornwall, Newash, Bruce Mines, Collingwood, Penetanguishene, Teeswater, Garden River and Cape Croker and Colpoys Bay. Owing to failing health Bro. Sallows was granted a superannuated relation and settled in the town of Collingwood, where he resided until the 4th of October, 1892, when the Lord called him home to receive his reward. Bro. Sallows was seventy-nine years of age at the time of his death. He was an acceptable preacher and a diligent and faithful pastor. His life as a superannuated minister was quiet and uneventful. For some months he was debilitated and afflicted, and unconscious of approaching dissolution, he calmly and patiently awaited the coming of the Lord. While partaking of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper with his pastor and a few intimate friends a short time before his death, he rejoiced with joy unspeakable and full of glory. An appropriate funeral sermon was preached by his pastor, the Rev. W. R. Barker, Chairman of Collingwood District, to a large and sympathetic congregation.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS.

On motion of the Secretary of Conference it was

Resolved,—(1) That we reaffirm the principle of standing resolution, page 81, of the Minutes of Conference for 1891, and appoint the President, Secretary and Assistant Secretaries of Conference a committee to arrange and harmonize the disciplinary questions with our present Discipline.

(2) That with a view to facilitate the orderly and rapid dispatch of the routine business of the Conference, the District Secretaries shall be a Tabulating and Statistical Committee, whose duty shall be to meet on the Tuesday morning previous to the meeting of Conference, at the call of the President, and

First. Tabulate the District replies to the disciplinary questions :—

- (1) Are there any objections to or charges preferred against any of our Ministers and Probationers?
- (2) What Probationers for the Ministry are now received into full connection with the Conference and ordained?
- (3) What Probationers for the Ministry remain on trial?
 - (a) Who are Probationers of three years?
 - (b) Who are Probationers of two years?
 - (c) Who are Probationers of one year?
 - (d) Who are Probationers on the list of reserve?
- (4) What candidates for the Ministry are now received on trial?
- (5) Who are the Superannuated Ministers?
- (6) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?
- (7) Who are now located?
- (8) Who are the Laymen elected by the several Districts to this Conference?
- (9) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (10) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath School Committee?
- (11) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Epworth League Committee?
- (12) What representatives have been elected by the District Meetings to the Stationing Committee?
- (13) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

Second. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate committee or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

Third. Having selected a suitable secretary, shall through him be prepared to report to the Conference at the call of the chair. The report to be read from the platform, and in such manner that the pleasure of the Conference may be ascertained on every item presented.

Fourth. That, to facilitate the work, each District Secretary prepare, previous to coming to Conference, separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by his District to the Conference.

Fifth. That, for convenience, the Secretary of the Tabulating Committee shall be *ex officio* an Assistant Secretary of the Conference.

Sixth. Prepare and present the Report on Statistics.

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REPORTS OF COLLEGES.

Rev. Principal Austin, of Alma College, presented the annual report of the College, and on motion of Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. G. Washington, the Conference

Resolved,—That we have heard with great pleasure and satisfaction the excellent report presented by Principal Austin. It affords us the deepest satisfaction to learn that the attendance of pupils is larger and the financial condition more hopeful than at any previous year of its history. We also particularly notice the gratifying fact that four of its pupils have entered the Foreign Mission field. We congratulate the learned Principal and those associated with him in their noble work, and heartily pledge ourselves to further its interests.

Rev. E. N. Baker, B.D., read the report of Albert College, and on motion of Rev. Dr. Smith, seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts, it was adopted,

That the Conference, having listened to the report of Albert College presented by Rev. E. N. Baker, desires to express its pleasure to learn of the remarkable success which is attending the work of this educational institution.

We rejoice to know that the numerical increase of the students in attendance has been so large, and that the College is now doing such a grand service in the work of higher education.

Rev. Dr. Burns, of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton, addressed the Conference, and on motion of Dr. Smith, seconded by Dr. Potts, the Conference

Resolved,—That the report of the Wesleyan Ladies' College having been presented by its learned and scholarly Principal, we have heard with the utmost satisfaction and delight of the prosperity and efficiency of this famous institution for the higher education of young ladies.

We believe that the enviable reputation which this institution enjoys is amply sustained by the splendid record it has made during the past year.

We rejoice to know that this oldest educational institution of the kind is still fully abreast of the highest literary requirements of the times, and is giving to our young ladies the highest intellectual culture accompanied with the most careful attention to their moral and religious welfare.

We congratulate the gifted Principal and his efficient staff upon the excellent work they have done, and earnestly commend this model Ladies' College to the practical support of the Methodist Church.

Rev. J. F. German, D.D., read the report of Ontario Ladies' College, and Principal Hare briefly addressed the Conference, whereupon it was moved by Rev. W. J. Maxwell, seconded by Rev. A. Langford, and

Resolved,—That we have heard with pleasure the report of Ontario Ladies' College, assuring us of the marked prosperity which has attended the labors of the energetic Principal and his numerous and richly endowed staff of teachers and assistants.

We are glad to know that success is attending the departmental examination, as well as the Junior and Senior Matriculation work which is being made a specialty.

We assure the managers that, as opportunity affords, we will gladly give the College our endorsement and support.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

Moved by Rev. J. A. Rankin, seconded by E. J. Davis, M.P.P., and
Resolved.—That the Committee on Conference Services be instructed to arrange for a service at which the Ministers to be superannuated shall be expected to speak on their experience in the Christian ministry, and that a layman and a minister be appointed to move a resolution embodying an appreciation of the services rendered to Christianity by the retiring brethren.

Moved by Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. W. R. Barker, and
Resolved.—That we have listened with great pleasure to the report of the Superannuation Fund given by Rev. Dr. Griffin, the Treasurer of said Fund. We rejoice to learn that the endowment has reached upwards of \$200,000, and that the Fund has never been in a better condition than at the present time, and pledge ourselves loyally to support it.

Moved by Rev. Geo. Washington, seconded by Mr. David Graham, and
Resolved.—That this Conference has heard the deputation from the Dominion Alliance of Ontario with the greatest satisfaction. With them we rejoice in the tokens of the unparalleled interest taken at the present time in this greatest of national questions, and we pledge ourselves to continue our efforts in behalf of a prohibitory law, especially because we have every reason to believe that with continued and faithful effort our great end will soon be attained.

Moved by Rev. A. M. Phillips, seconded by Rev. W. J. Maxwell, and
Resolved.—That we have heard with pleasure the report of Dr. Potts, Secretary of Education, and Chancellor Burwash, of Victoria University, touching the educational work of our Church, and express our gratitude at the successful opening of Victoria College in Queen's Park, in federation with the Provincial University, thereby opening to all students of Victoria College the advantages of that institution. Therefore, be it

Resolved.—That the above reports be published in the Minutes of Conference, and the attention of our people called to the importance of supporting our Educational Fund and sustaining Victoria College by sending our young men and women there for their university course.

Rev. J. E. Slater, Superannuated Minister, in feeble health, sent his fraternal greetings to the Conference, and on motion, Rev. W. S. Blackstock was requested to convey the sympathetic greetings of the Conference to Bro. Slater.

Re SUSTENTATION FUND.

Moved by Rev. Geo. M. Brown, seconded by Hon. Chas. Drury,
Whereas, the General Conference having made provision for the establishment of a Sustentation Fund, by each annual Conference, for the purpose of securing salaries of not less than \$750 for ordained married ministers, \$400 for ordained unmarried ministers, and \$350 for probationers; and whereas, the Fund established by this annual Conference having been hitherto so inadequately sustained, that only \$882 was contributed for 1892, and for the year just closed \$935, giving no more than enough to raise ordained married ministers' salaries to \$452, ordained unmarried ministers' to \$276, and probationers' to \$230, exclusive of rent and horse keep, leaving a large number unaided whose salaries were inadequate to their support; and believing this lack of funds arises in a great measure from a want of knowledge of the object and needs of the Fund; therefore, be it

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Resolved,—That on every circuit and mission, in accordance with the standing regulations of this annual Conference, the object of the Fund be fully explained to the congregations, and collections and subscriptions be taken up, and in addition the Quarterly Boards on circuits which pay their ministers \$1,000 and upwards be requested to make an appropriation to the Fund in some measure commensurate with their ability and the amount of salary paid to their ministers, so that thereby as nearly as possible the disciplinary allowance may be given to the ministers and probationers on the circuits and missions which, after a fair investigation, can be shown to be unable to make up the amount.

Moved by Rev. G. M. Brown, seconded by Mr. John W. Macdonald,

That the above resolution be brought before the Financial District Meetings by the Chairmen of Districts for consideration.

Rev. J. F. Ockley moved, and Rev. S. C. Philp seconded the following resolution, which was adopted:

That all ministers and laymen who shall in future desire a billet at Conference shall send application to the Billeting Committee and enclose two dollars, with their address, not later than June 1st of each year.

On motion of Rev. W. S. Blackstock, seconded by Dr. Dewart, that in future the Pastoral Address shall be known as the Annual Address of the Toronto Conference.

RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS.

Moved by Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts, and adopted,

That the thanks of the Conference are hereby tendered to the Rev. G. J. Bishop for the fidelity with which he has discharged his duties as President of Conference during the past year. We also desire to place on record our approval of the uniform courtesy and brotherly spirit shown in his official relations to the members of this Conference, and pray that his useful life may be long spared to bless the Church and the world.

On motion of Rev. A. M. Phillips, B.D., seconded by Rev. R. Cade, the Conference adopted a resolution of thanks to the Rev. R. N. Burns, B.A., ex-Secretary, and his associates, for the faithful manner in which the duties of the secretariate were discharged last Conference. The ex-Secretary and the Journal Secretary acknowledged the vote.

The ex-President, Rev. G. J. Bishop, moved, Dr. Potts seconded, a resolution which was unanimously adopted,

That the hearty thanks of the Conference be tendered to the Rev. Dr. Fawcett, of Chicago, for his able, appropriate and eloquent sermon preached at the ordination service yesterday morning, and we pray that he may be long spared to proclaim the gospel of the Son of God.

The resolution was adopted by a rising vote of the Conference.

Moved by the Hon. C. Drury, seconded by Rev. Dr. Smith, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has listened with great interest and satisfaction to the address of the Rev. Dr. Dewart, the honored editor of the *Christian Guardian*, and the Rev. Dr. Withrow, the cultured and able editor of our *Magazine* and Sunday School publications, and heartily commend all these publications to the increased patronage of the Methodist people throughout the Dominion.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Moved by Mr. J. T. Moore, seconded by Mr. Chester Massey, and *Resolved*,—That the Conference rejoices at the gratifying showing made by the Rev. Dr. Briggs, in connection with his stewardship of the Book Room, and heartily records its most unqualified appreciation of the signal ability which has characterized his successful administration.

Moved by Rev. H. S. Matthews, seconded by Rev. J. F. German, and adopted,

That we as a Conference have listened with great pleasure and satisfaction to statements of the Rev. Dr. Sutherland, Missionary Secretary. We desire to place on record our appreciation of his services to advance the interests of the Missionary Society, and pledge ourselves to sustain him both morally and financially in his important work.

On motion of Rev. J. C. Speer, seconded by Rev. J. F. Ockley, and adopted,

That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Press for the excellent reports which they have published. The reports have been both accurate and extensive.

On motion of Mr. A. Ogden, seconded by Mr. Rowell, the Conference tendered its thanks to the Rev. W. J. Maxwell and the members of the Billing Committee, and the friends who have entertained the members of Conference during their stay.

CONFERENCE SERVICES.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

A religious service was held in the Central Methodist Church preparatory to the Conference. The President, Rev. G. J. Bishop, took the chair at 8 o'clock p.m. Rev. H. S. Matthews, ex-President, read the Scripture lesson and led in prayer.

The choir sang a suitable anthem.

Rev. Dr. Parker and Thos. Manning, B.A., delivered addresses. Hymn 561 was sung.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then administered, which was conducted by Rev. W. J. Maxwell, assisted by several ministerial members of Conference.

The whole service was pervaded by the powerful influence of the Holy Ghost, and was a time of great joy and full consecration.

RECEPTION SERVICE.

The Conference Reception Service was held in the Conference Church, on Friday evening, June 9th, at 8 o'clock. The President, Rev. Dr. Parker, occupied the chair.

The 678th Hymn was sung and Rev. Dr. Shaw led in prayer.

The choir rendered an anthem, "Soldiers of Christ."

The Secretary, Rev. J. J. Redditt, presented the names of the young men to be received into full connection and ordained: W. C. Sanderson, J. H. Oliver, J. E. Gardner, F. E. Fletcher, B.A., E. I. Hart, B.A., E. C. Laker, W. E. Hassard, B.A., H. Lee, W. F. Roach, J. R. Aikenhead.

The young men in a few well-chosen words related their Christian experience and call to the work of the ministry.

Moved by Rev. A. Brown, seconded by Rev. J. V. Smith, D.D.,

That these young men now presented to the Conference be received into full connection with the Conference, and on Sunday morning next be ordained to the work of the ministry of the Methodist Church. The addresses were eminently practical, couched in beautiful language.

The President put the motion, which was carried by a rising vote of the Conference.

The President addressed the young men in an appropriate manner.

A collection was taken on behalf of the fund to defray the expenses of Conference.

The meeting adjourned a few minutes after 10 o'clock, Rev. J. F. German, D.D., pronouncing the benediction.

SUNDAY SERVICES.

The Conference Love-feast was held at 9.30, led by Rev. M. Fawcett, and was a season of great spiritual refreshing.

At 11 o'clock the Ordination Service was held. Rev. Dr. Fawcett, of Chicago, preached from 2 Corinthians 3rd chapter, 5th verse, "Our sufficiency is of God," the theme being the fountain of ministerial power.

The following brethren were then ordained to the office and work of the ministry: W. C. Sanderson, Joseph H. Oliver, John E. Gardner, F. E. Fletcher, E. I. Hart, B.A., E. C. Laker and W. F. Roach.

In the afternoon an interesting service was held in connection with the Sabbath School. Rev. W. J. Maxwell presided.

Addresses were delivered by Mr. N. W. Rowell, who gave an interesting account of the Jarvis Street Mission in connection with the Metropolitan Church, and of his visit to the Chinese quarters in Victoria, B.C.

Rev. E. R. Young spoke impressively respecting his work among the Indians in the North-West, and of the wonderful advancement made by these poor people in recent years. Rev. G. Webber pronounced the benediction.

The Conference Missionary Meeting was held in the evening, which was addressed by Rev. J. W. Saunby, B.A., recently from Japan.

CLOSE OF THE CONFERENCE.

The stations of the ministers and preachers on trial were read, the Chairmen of Districts were elected, and the Financial Secretaries appointed, the Minutes of the session were read, the Doxology was sung, Rev. E. Barrass, D.D., pronounced the benediction, and shortly after midnight on Wednesday, June 14th, 1893, the Conference adjourned *sine die*.

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PASTORAL ADDRESS.

To the Members of the Methodist Churches in the Toronto Conference:—

DEARLY BELOVED,—With devout thankfulness to Almighty God we note the tokens of Divine favor resting upon our cherished Zion. For self-congratulation there is no place since "our excellency is of God." Greater devotion, greater zeal, greater consecration would have been honored by the Master in greater results. Therefore, it behoves us to humbly ask forgiveness for shortcomings, and to implore the baptism of the Holy Spirit for more effective service.

In these times of activity and progression, times of restlessness and impetuosity, there is urgent need that the injunction, "Be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord," find clear demonstration in the lives and actions of our people. It is one thing to be called a Methodist, and quite another thing to be a Methodist in the true sense of the word. Worldly prosperity and position need to be sanctified to be saved from doing harm. Otherwise, to accept their patronage in exchange for a galvanism of religion will blight and betray our great mission.

Home life leaves an indelible impress upon the character. The words, actions, dispositions and tempers of parents will find reproduction in the children. How important, then, that the subduing and sweetening influences of the Spirit should hallow domestic relations and pervade the home. The dance, the card table, and the decanter dissipate and destroy holy aspirations. These snares in the home have plunged multitudes of the young into perdition. Let Methodists then beware lest, under any pretext, these devices of the devil be smuggled within the hallowed precincts of the family. Guard well this citadel of religion.

Declension in spirituality is the evil consequence of neglect of the social means of grace. The family altar, the week-night prayer meeting, and the class meeting cannot be deserted without deplorable circumstances. When a member regards any of these as irksome or superfluous, it is time to take alarm. Investigation will show instances where these seasons of blessing are crowded out by the theatre, the race track, and the athletic grounds. If there is one thing that is a greater abomination than another it is a "sporting" Methodist (?). Keeping "unspotted from the world" requires the avoidance of places, pursuits and pleasures that do not tend to the glory of God.

It is gratifying to witness the rapid growth that Young People's Associations, Epworth Leagues and Endeavor Societies are making. Only let "Scriptural holiness" fill the hearts and pervade the lives of the members, and the prospect is inspiring. Great responsibility rests upon the leaders of these important movements to encourage and cultivate deep spirituality, so that the activities of these valuable organizations may not degenerate

into mere ecclesiastical athletics. No better safeguard can be adopted than the liberal admixture of Bible reading and Bible study. The Bible is the Christian's curriculum whereby he may graduate into higher realms of thought and attainment, and without which the wide expanse of learning is but a dry and "thirsty land where no water is."

As a missionary Church, let us be true to tradition and to duty. This means not only sustaining the work of God in our own neighborhood and nation, but also carrying the joyful tidings to the "ends of the earth." And, furthermore, not only to strive for conversions abroad, but also for conversions at home. The consecration of substance and the consecration of self will win the world for Christ. Revivals in all the Churches would then be the record. God help us to stand by the

OLD-TIME RELIGION,

by which wonders have been wrought in the past, and also to steadfastly withstand any modern innovations which ignore the need of sincere repentance and sound conversion. When any of us become so rich or proud, dignified or cold, that an old-fashioned revival is not an agreeable environment, the sooner we come to the Fountain the better.

It is scarcely needful to refer to the claim that every social and moral reform has upon the hearty sympathy and support of our members. Methodists are the friends of every cause that makes for the physical, social, moral and spiritual welfare of our race, and the opponents of every movement that would menace any of these. Hence we find them ready to do valiant service for Sunday observance, temperance, public morality and religion. Any who detach themselves from the rank and file of our Churches in any of these agitations may bring discredit upon the Church when it properly should attach only to themselves. Methodism never has countenanced compromise upon any of these great questions, and let us pray that it never may.
