

The history given of the ori-gin of the Modoc war may explain the difference. In 1852 Capt. Ben Wright was commissioned by the United States Government to punish the authors of Indian outrages on the Klamath river. He suspected the Modocs of being the guilty parties, invited a large number of their most prominent men to a confer-ence, and offered them poisoned meat. Warned by a friendly Indian in the em-ploy of the whites they refused the deadly feast prepared for them, and were immediately fired on by their hosts. About twenty were killed. Among those who escaped the slaughter by flight was Capt. Jack. Wright and
