N.A.A.C.P. Helps To Convict White Man in Louisiana

NEW YORK, April. —An epoch making case has just come to a conclusion in Louisiana, with a white jury convicting white men of murder for the brutal shooting of four coloured women at Eros, Louisiana two of the women being killed outright, and two of them maimed for life.

The shooting occurred on Christmas Day last and was called to the attention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People by an editorial in the New Orleans States, entitled "A Shocking Case. The trouble arose when a Negro tenant, charged by his landlord, Mrs. J Wingate, with the care of a valuable hunting dog, was refused the dog by white neighbours to whom it had been loaned. Subsequently a party of white men, including those to whom the dog had been loaned, went to the Negro tenant's quarters, some under the influence of liquor," and found the tenant's wife and four daughters and a grandchild.


Words passed between the white men and the colored women and the women were ordered to stand in line and be shot. The women, thinking the white men were joking, made no effort to escape. There upon the white men opened fire, killing a girl of 15, another of 20 with a baby in her arms, gravely wounding a third daughter of the tenant and hitting the mother in the shoulder.

The facts were substantiated by the NAACP and aid extended in prosecuting the murderers. With the co-operation of Dr. George W Lucas, President of the New Orleans Branch of the NAACP, communication by telegraph and long distance telephone was maintained with the scene of the crime; the Association's Assistant Secretary, Walter White, having gone South for this purpose.

The NAACP appropriated \$250 toward the legal expenses of this case, enabling the retention of a good lawyer to prosecute the white murderers of the colored women.

A letter written to Dr. Lucas, from the scene of the trial, thanking the NAACP for the assistance given, states:

who celebrated his 102nd birthday on April 5th last. He is one of the few surviving Torontonians who lived there when Toronto was known as "Little York." "Father" Brown is still active and healthy. He has been a Christian for nearly three-quarters of a century.

"It took them four days on the case. They drew 100 men before they could get a jury. They stayed in the jury room about a day after they heard the evidence. Part of them wanted to hang the two that did the killing and part wanted them to go to the pen. So the verdict was life in prison.

"Dr Lucas that was the first case that has ever been stuck (won) in this parish or anywhere close to here, of this kind. It generally turns out that they come clear where a white man kills a colored person. Dr Lucas, this has been the best help to the colored race that has ever happened in this country, for everybody that heard of it was there to hear the trial. So next time a fellow starts to kill a colored person he will see how these two men came out.

"Dr., the help I did and what you all helped, was what did the work. For the lawyer we had sure did work hard to stick them. He made the subject of a commendatory editorial in the New Orleans States the court summon 100 men before he could get the 12 that he wanted.

The case is regarded by the NAACP as indicating a most gratifying change in sentiment in the South

Colored People Are Assaulted

Miss Irene St. John and Mr. William Brown, both coloured, were assaulted by an Englishman at Hanley a few days ago, as reported in The News of the World, Sunday, April 6th. This poor Englishman's wife was a servant at the boarding house where Miss St. John and Mr. Brown were stopping as members of the theatrical company, "The Dark Town Scandal." The Englishman came into the boarding house and found his wife standing too near to where the coloured man was sitting and he assaulted him, Miss St. John and other members of the company and the boarding house keeper, who was befriending his wife as he had no means of keeping her and they were separated. Miss St John objected to the Englishman calling them niggers and let the Englishman understand she was not a nigger but English—For my part I do not no which of the two names I like best, for to me both are equally abominable.

But nigger, darkie, blackie, ape, etc. are used more in England and Scotland towards us than in any other countries I have ever been in. Even outside of this country where you hear the insulting names used it is by either the one or the other of these races of so-called Christians, lights of education and civilization, who are now flying all over the world trying to find more evidence of real civilization created by niggers over 7000 year ago, 5000 years before the Caesars came here with their plundered knowledge and greatness. I do not know how many schools, Colleges, steamships, railroads, airships or work-shops and art dealers and museums the Romans found here. The English do not boast of these times. But he is proud of the British Museum. "Niggers" should be more proud of it, but they do not know its value as a true propaganda master-piece! Strip the Englishman and the Roman of all that has its Negro basic creation and he would perish on account of his own insignificance.

And all their allied scions would die a natural death if we had strong hard-headed unselfish Negro leaders in international affairs. Then our people would be respected instead of insulted and molested by

Paper Assails Pro- hibition Hypocrisy

NEW YORK, April 12—"Prohibition in the South has feant prohibition for the Negro," declares the New York Herald-Tribune in an editorial entitled "The Hypocrisy of the South" and summarized by the NAACP. The editorial tells of Senator Blease's saying recently that he voted dry and drank wet and continues:

"This candid inconsistency is simply another aspect of the central problem of Southern politics, the race question. The Southern white citizens regard it as a paramount necessity to endeavour to keep the liquor from the Negro—But drinking by white men never halted. Especially was the business of illegal distilling developed to a high state of perfection. What the Northern states are learning to do now by crude experiments in the form of home brew, small distilleries and synthetic drinks, the Southern states have understood for generations.

Large Bequest To Race Institutions

NEW YORK, April 11—Educational institutions of the race received gifts aggregating \$325,000 under the will of Miss Olivia Eggleston Phelps Stokes, according to the appraisal of her estate filed on Tuesday. Miss Stokes left an estate valued at \$2,577,125.

The bequests were as follows: Tuskegee Institute, \$125,000; Hampton Normal and Agricultural College \$200,000; Union Theological Seminary, \$50,000, and \$50,000 for the establishment of a school in Liberia on the general plans of Tuskegee.

MATERIALISM AND CHRISTIANITY

How long is this barrier of Color to stand in the way of the striving of our people to attain human justice and fair play in this Dominion which received its name because of Him who is a Father to all.

UNIVERSAL PREJUDICE AGAINST THE NEGRO.

The English Sunday papers with their many millions of readers had two special articles on March 31st, 1929: "The Black Peril—It's Reign of terror in South Africa—Alarming Attacks on White Women." Of course there was no mention in this article about white men attacking their own women, any other men's wives, daughters and mothers.

There is no mention of how many of these flow, lewd white people who go out there from England, are fetched up to live from 5 to 14 in one small ill-smelling dirty room, mother, father, brothers and sisters, all living huddled together like so many pigs. No wonder crime of the lowest order follows them wherever they go they would even make the devil worse than he is, if such a being exists outside of their own fable stories or domains. They will soon be lynching South Africans under the Union Jack, as Negroes under it are thought no more of than they are under the stars and stripes, if as much.

Universal trade and commercialism of Negroes by Negroes for Negroes is the only hope for our Negro sons and daughters. Let the Negro youths travel and study the world for themselves.

Why should it be left to ignorant, prejudiced hypocritical intermediate alien races to do it? What have the so-called well educated and well travelled Negro leaders done for the people in an international, industrial capacity? **Kills Boy For
 Winning a Race**

NEW YORK, April 18th—Detectives are seeking an unknown white youth who threw a stone at Henry Clarke, 14 years old, as he was leaving the 102nd Engineers Armory last Saturday night after the track meet of the Hudson District Athletic League. The stone struck White in the right temple, fracturing his skull. He died a few hours later in the Presbyterian Hospital.

According to the police, Clarke confided to schoolmates from P.S. 157, at 116th Street at Lenox Ave., shortly before the running of one of the races that he had been approached by an unknown white boy and warned he had better not win that event.

"If you do" the boy is reported to have said, "I'll take care of you" Clarke won the race.

After the meet, Clarke was leaving the armory with his schoolmates, the police say, when the same white boy approached, hurled a stone and ran away. The boy collapsed and his friends took him to the hospital. Clarke had a reputation in Harlem as a dancer. He appeared on the stage last fall as Snowball in the "Big Fight," which featured Jack Dempsey. He was buried on Tuesday

Iowa City, Ia., April—What is expected to be a spectacular duel is looked for when Ed Gordon of Iowa and Portmess of Northwestern, both Sophomores, meet in the broad jump.

Gordon came to Iowa from Froebel High School, Gary, Ind. He made the American Olympic team before he had ever experienced college athletic competition. He jumped against Ed Hamm of Georgia Tech, the holder of the world's record and Hamm beat him by a quarter of an inch. Gordon jumped 24 feet 11 3/4 inches.

Portmess is Gordon's keenest rival this year as far as showing in performances this year are concerned. Portmess has done better than 24 ft.

Atlanta to Give Graduate Work

Atlanta, Ga.,—On April 11, 1929 an arrangement was completed between Atlanta University, Morehouse College and Spelman College for the affiliation of these three institutions in a university plan, the graduate and professional work to be carried on by Atlanta University, the college work to be done by Morehouse College and Spelman College. Dr. John Hope was invited to become President of Atlanta University.

The arrangement contemplates an immediate change in the activities of Atlanta University. No freshmen are to be admitted next fall, and as rapidly as the present undergraduate classes can be taken care of, the University is to become an institution for graduate and professional work only. It is expected that certain graduate courses will be offered during the coming academic year 1929-1930, but time will be taken to build up with care and with a definite eye to the needs the graduate faculty and the graduate school.

Henry Ford Visits Negro Church

DETROIT, Mich., April 11—By the Associated Negro Press—Henry Ford, auto magnate, and Mrs. Ford were present at the Easter Sunday morning services at St. Matthews Episcopal Church. The Fords were simply part of the audience and no effect at undue publicity was made. Father Daniel preached the Easter sermon. This is the only colored episcopal church in Detroit.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The Reb. John Gwyon, for 33 years rector at Bisley, Surrey Co. England, who hanged himself while I presume he had a Negrophobic attack or soon after, in his rectory, left a very strange will, in order to perpetuate his name and hatred toward "black boys" and poor unfortunate English underdogs who have been so unfortunate as to have been forced to the parish or from... itable organization. It reads: "The whole of this fortune of 9976 pounds is to be devoted to the establishment of "Gwyon's Foundation for Clothing Boys." The money is to be used solely for supplying boys with one garment—a pair of knickers—"and for no other purpose whatsoever, whether educational or otherwise."

Only white boys between the ages of 10 and 18, the sons of parents living in the Farnham District are eligible. No boy whose parents are in receipt of relief from the parish, or from any charity organization, may be supplied with garments, nor can any black boy benefit.

Each successful boy shall receive one garment, once a year, to consist of one pair of knickers. The words "Gwyon's present" shall be written in capital letters by the tailor with black (why on earth black) marking ink on the lining of the right waist of each pair of knickers of any kind, which lining must be of unbleached material, and no boy shall tear away the words or obliterate them.
