The Domin ion revenues are drawn from custom duties, from excise, from public works, (that is railroads and canals,) from the post office department, from invested monies and from a few miscellaneous sources. Of these, customs and excise are taxes and the rest are not. How can a sane man suppose that the proceeds of our Government railroads represents taxation. If the roads do not pay running expenses it might correctly enough oe said that the balance would have to be taxed out of the people somehow and some time, but the Globe calculation makes no account of the expenditure and


