A RICH FIND

Enormous Bone Found at
New Carlisle.

REFUSED \$800 FOR IT.

Supposed to be Some Part
of a Large Prehistoric
Animal.

Some time ago while some men were engaged in making an excavation on what is known as "the common" at New Carlisle, they came across a large bone just a few feet below the surface. Mr. A. M. Caldwell obtained possession of it and sent it to McGill museum.

It seems to be difficult to determine to what animal the bone belongs and it is thought that it is a rich find.

The bone is almost flat, measuring about 8x6 feet and about three feet thick. On one edge the bone is jagged as if broken, while on another there is the appearance of a joint.

The McGill authorities have placed the bone in their museum and in a letter to Mr. Caldwell stated that they would pay all expenses of transportation etc, which we understand has been done. They also request-d that they be given the option for purchase as too many of these specimens found their way across the border when they ought really to remain in Canada.

It is supposed that the bone is that of some pre-historic animal but on this point the experts have not as yet reached a conclusion.

We understand that Mr. Caldwell has refused an offer of \$800.00 for the specimen.

ANOTHER WRECK.

Str. Lunenburg Goes Down
at Halifax.

FOURTEEN DROWNED.

R. J. Leslie, M. P. P. for the
Magdalens, One of the
Victims,

HALIFAX, Dec. 5.—Another marine disaster occurred yesterday when the mail steamer Lunenburg, which plied between Pictou and the Magdalen Islands, was totally wrecked on Sand Beach, at Amherst Harbor. The steamer struck during a north-east gale and snow squall. Five of the crew managed to get ashore. The others are still aboard, but it is believed all will be saved. The steamer was owned by R. J. Leslie of Halifax, representative of the Magdalen Islands in the Quebec Legislature. The hull was insured for \$14,000.

MR LESLIE AMONG THE LOST

A later despatch from Amherst Harbor, Magdalen Islands, says the steamer Lunenburg was a total wreck and that R. J. Leslie, M. L. A. for the Magdalen Islands, in the Quebec Legislature, and from ten to fourteen men were drowned.

NEWS RECEIVED HERE.

Several messages reporting the sad disaster were received in this city to-day, among those to receive them being Premier Gouin and Mr J. U. Gregory, agent of the Signal Service. The latter despatch reads as follows:—

Meat Cove, N. S., Dec 5, '05
Agent Signal Service:

Steamship Lunenburg, from Pictou for Magdalen Islands, struck outside of Sand Beach, Amherst Harbor, Magdalen Islands, during snow storm at 3 a. m., yesterday. Five of the crew landed here in the forenoon and the ship began to break up in the afternoon. Rest of the crew including R. J. Leslie owner, who was on board, started for shore in one of the ship's boats, but this swamped when half way and all excepting the captain were lost. He held on until rescued by a boat from shore.

The drowned—R. J. Leslie, M. P. P., K. McConnel, purser, H. Messard, steward; R. McDonald, chief engineer; J. Joyce, cook; B. Ham, cabin boy; Vital Doucet, Delphis Doucet, Vignault S. Vignault, Jos Bourgeois, Chiasson, deck hands. The bodies of D. Vignault and McConnel have been recovered.

MUTINEERS SHOT

Troops fight Bloody Battle on Streets of Kelff

BERLIN, Dec. 4.—A despatch to The Lokal Anzeiger from Kelff via Podmoloczysk, December 3, at noon says that one company of a Pontoon battalion mutined to-day and fully armed marched through the streets trying to persuade the other troops to join in. Only an engineer corps did so. The mutineers then 2,000 strong continued their march. Two hundred Cossacks were sent to prevent them advancing, but Gen. Drake had an order to prevent bloodshed and subsequently withdrew the Cossacks and permitted the mutineers to pass. General Drake made repeated and kindly efforts to persuade the mutineers to abandon their foolhardy course. A part of them had complied when Governor Gen. Suchoniatoff telephoned an order that energetic measures be taken against the mutineers and that the latter be fired upon at the first opportunity. The mutineers halted before the barracks of an Ansoff regiment which was called upon to join the marchers. During the demonstration at the barracks several mutineers were wounded and two or three soldiers. The troops then fired upon the mutineers. Who returned the fire, and fled after several more volleys from the troops. The casualties on both sides were about 70 dead and three hundred wounded. Two hundred mutineers surrendered.

WARSAW IN MOURNING FOR SLAUGHTERED JEWS

WARSAW, Dec. 4.—A decisive meeting of the league of Leagues is expected to be held to-day in St. Petersburg, where a project for a Constituent Assembly will be adopted and a demand for its acceptance will be presented to Premier Witte. The League will wait for an answer until Wednesday and in case the government refuses to grant the demand, it is understood that the league is resolved to act independently in accordance with what it declares to be the wishes of the people.

The Jews of Warsaw to-day are mourning for the victims of the massacres. The shops are closed and services being held in the synagogues. According to official Jewish information massacres of Jews occurred in one hundred and thirty localities in Russia.

TERRIBLE HARDSHIP

Of a shipwrecked Crew Near Port Arthur

PORT ARTHUR, Dec. 2.—Captain McIntyre and the remainder of the crew of the Monkshead, which was wrecked on Pitt Island were brought here last evening and they tell of hardship such as few sailors ever experienced. For ninety-six hours the men were without food and it was a great wonder they did not perish, as it was freezing hard and they were scantily attired and had little covering. When they landed on the island it was found that the seas had completely covered the land and ice many feet in thickness had formed, covering all the trees. Fortunately in an unexpected part they came across a part of an old house and this they set up and it afforded sufficient shelter to keep them from freezing to death.

The men chopped out ice and secured enough small wood to build a fire. There was so little heat from it, however, that several of the men, in their endeavor to get warm, burned their clothing by crowding on the blaze. When Captain McIntyre managed to climb on board the steamer and secure some food, some of the men became ravenous and ate it before it was thawed out. This made them sick, some of them almost being driven insane. Captain McIntyre states that it was one of the worst storms he ever experienced. The log had become frozen up and in the dense snow blizzard they got out of their course and before they knew it were on the shoals. They got in the trough of the sea and were driven on the rocks. The Monkshead has a big hole in her bottom.

HOPE YOUNG'S NEW TRIAL

Prisoner Confident of Acquittal Expresses Gratitude to Counsel

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 4.—The full bench of the Supreme Court gave a decision in the Hope Young case, reserved Saturday, granting a new trial. Only one judge was against a new trial.

This is the Digby murder case, the details of which have been fully reported. The young woman was sentenced to be hanged in the latter part of December if the Supreme Court did not interfere.

DIGBY, Dec. 4.—R. G. Monroe called on the prisoner at her cell Saturday night and said "I have some news for you."

Hope Young replied "a new trial granted?"

Monroe replied "Yes."

The prisoner said she had every confidence in her solicitor and knew a new trial would be granted. She expressed her gratification and said that if Mr. Monroe had not undertaken to intercede for her for a mere nothing, she would, no doubt, have been hanged on December 20th, as she had no means of her own.

The amount contributed has been far short of what was expected. The heaviest donation received was from a gentleman in Gardiner, Maine, the prisoner dwelt as some length on the uphill fight Monroe had experienced and the great advantage the prosecutor had over her from the start.

Monroe said that the worst feature in the whole affair have been the clergymen and others who have rushed into print with no knowledge of the case except from hearsay. When a wealthy lady in Boston attempted to bear the

full expenses of a new trial the Woman's Christian Temperance Union or some Society of that sort, began passing resolutions to assist at a new trial, as soon as the Boston lady heard she dropped out in their favor, but what have the Nova Scotia women done to help bear the expense?

The people around town and vicinity are very much interested in the new trial, and enquires are coming in rapidly to-day over the phone and otherwise. Monroe believes his client innocent of murder, and has taken hold of the case with a determination to win, if possible. Hope Young gets letters regularly from Elmer Young of Boston.

It is not known as yet when the new trial will take place, or whether special court will be held, or whether she will be obliged to wait until the regular session of the Supreme Court in June next.

BLACKWOOD ACQUITTED

Moncton Manslaughter Case

Ended Friday--Pris-

oner on the Stand

DORCHESTER, N. B., Dec. 7

The manslaughter case occupied

the entire time of the county

court today, resulting in the ac-

quittal of Blackwood of the charge

of killing young Howarth.

Promptly at 10 o'clock when

court opened the trial was resumed.

D. I. Welch made a motion

that the prisoner be at once dis-

charged on the grounds that the

crown had failed to make out a

case against the prisoner.

Judge Wells ruled that the

case should go to the jury.

Mr. Welch in opening the case

extended to Solicitor-General

Jones a cordial welcome from the

barristers, this being his first

official visit to this part of the

province. The prosecution called

John Sutton, A. J. Tingley, chief,

of police, was also on the stand.

John P. Palea was sworn and

stated that the gun which figured

in the case was destroyed in the

furnace of the cotton mill.

Blackwood took the stand in

his own defence and in substance

he claimed that he was on his way

home when he met the Howarths

on that fateful day. A few mo-

ments after coming up to the party

they were making inquiries as to

game when a man said, "Your gun

is cooked." He repeated my gun

was cooked and took it from my

arm to examine it, when just at

that moment it discharged. "I

turned round and saw an awful

sight. The boy was trying to get

up. I put a silk handkerchief in

the wound and besought them to

go for a doctor quick. We placed

the boy on coats. Howarth said

to me, "Let's load the guns and

haverit out." I went to the

Howarth house. I bore the ex-

posure of the funeral. I asked How-

arth to have an inquest. He re-

plied he did not want one. I

gave myself up to the custody of

Chief Tingley. I don't know

where Howarth is. I would pre-

fer having him here."

Blackwood at different times

broke down and wept bitterly

while giving his evidence.

The address by the solicitor-

general was forceful and very logi-

cal. Hon. F. J. Sweeney's address

was in keeping with and well sus-

tained his reputation at the bar.

The judge's address was mainly a

charge to the jury to weigh well

the evidence in their own minds.

He made some very strong re-

marks directly against the prisoner.

The jury were not more than half

an hour in arriving at the verdict

of not guilty and the prisoner was

at once discharged.

OBITUARY

CHARLES MURRAY, Esq.

On Monday morning about one o'clock occurred the death of Charles Murray, Esq., after an illness of only six days. On Sunday morning, the 26th ult., Mr. Murray attended church as usual and in the afternoon complained of being unwell. The next day he was not able to attend to his business duties and medical aid was summoned. Towards the end of the week he rallied somewhat and it was hoped that he was on the road to recovery, but Saturday morning his condition was pronounced serious, and he grew gradually weaker until he passed peacefully away on Monday morning, aged 85 years.

The deceased was one of Campbellton's most respected citizens, taking a prominent place in benevolent and public matters of various kinds. He was president of the Rural Cemetery Co. at the time of his death, which position he has held for a number of years past. Mr. Murray also was American vice-consul and a justice of the Peace for the parish of Addington. The deceased was a life-long member of the Episcopal church in which he held the office of Church Warden at the time of his demise.

Mr. Murray also belonged to the order of Free Masons and was probably the oldest Master Mason in the Dominion, having joined the order sixty-one years ago at Halifax.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at two, the remains being taken from the residence of Mr. W. W. Doherty his son-in-law, to Christ Church, where an impressive funeral service was held, the rector, Rev. R. J. Coleman officiating. Mr. Coleman in the course of his remarks referred to the exemplary Christian character of the deceased, being foremost in all benevolent enterprises and a liberal supporter of the church of which he was a member. In fact it was largely due to his energy and indomitable courage that the church building was erected here some twenty seven years ago. The funeral was one of the largest seen in Campbellton for a number of years. Interment took place in the Rural Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs. W. A. Mott, J. H. Taylor, Thos. Wren, Wm. Parker, John McAlister, J. S. Benedict, J. Bradshaw, McKenzie and Oswald Smith.

The deceased leaves one son Charles Murray of St. John, and one daughter, Mrs. W. W. Doherty of Campbellton.

MR. C. TUPPER MORTON

The death occurred on Sunday morning of C. Tupper Morton a promising and highly respected young man. The deceased was a member of the Bank of Nova Scotia staff and was compelled by ill health to leave that institution. He went to Richibucto where he spent the summer and returned much improved in health.

His death came as a surprise to his many friends. A sorrowing father and sister remain to mourn the loss of a devoted son and brother.

The floral tributes were numerous the principal being wreaths from the Bank of Nova Scotia staff, I. O. O. F. M. U. and the Hockey Club.

The funeral which took place on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock was largely attended. The following were the pall-bearers Messrs R. R. Roop, W. Marquis, W. Wilkinson, St. Clair, Jellett, J. T. Mowat and F. E. Lockhart.

After a long illness at New Richmond, N. B., Mrs. Roberts died Nov. 25 age 23 years. Mrs. Roberts was taken ill Sept. 28th and since then has suffered more than could be realized having a complication of diseases, and she passed away Saturday noon. Mrs. Roberts was the daughter of John Willett New Richmond and was moved there two weeks before her death it being her wish to die at home. She was married last May to A. T. Roberts of Selwood, N. B. where she has since lived.

Her sister Ida Willett who is a trained nurse with her during her illness. Mrs. Roberts shall long be missed as she was a general favorite with all those who knew her. She leaves besides a young husband, a father mother five sisters and eleven brothers to mourn her great loss. The funeral took place Monday and was largely attended. 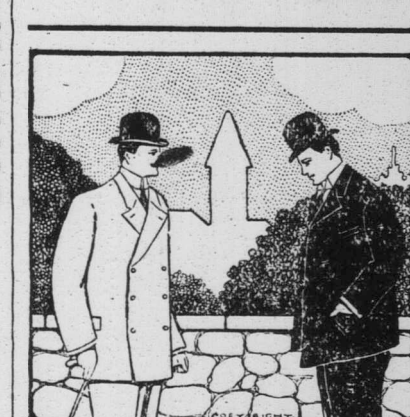

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GAME HUNTING.

Fur, Fish and Feathered Fauna a great Asset

WANT PROTECTION

Meeting at Quebec will Consider the Matter—Advocating won by the I. C. R.

Big game hunting in the province of New Brunswick has developed into quite an important business. There has always been abundance of game in the province and what is singularly to its advantage, moose, caribou, deer and bear are to be found within a comparatively small radius, in sections quite near the line of the Intercolonial Railway. The astute people of the counties of York, Northumberland, Gloucester, Kent, Westmorland and Restigouche appreciate the benefits that are derived from the visits of wealthy American hunters. Guides make good money, receiving \$3. to \$5. per day, besides being in many cases liberally tipped. Storekeepers in the towns and villages near the best hunting districts find the business of supplying hunting parties quite profitable. The Intercolonial Railway, alive to the importance of the ever-increasing hunting travel, has done a great deal to exploit the territory, issuing some well-written and handsomely-illustrated pamphlets, which are mailed free to applicants, and which have been distributed very widely in the United States. The railway has through the medium of its travelling exhibits, done much to promote the travelling of sportsmen. It is not long since one of the young men engaged in this work, in an interview published in the Halifax Recorder, showed that what had been done for New Brunswick could also be done for Nova Scotia. New Brunswick received over \$20,000 the past season for game licenses, wealthy sportsmen cheerfully paying a fee of \$50. for the privilege of shooting one bull moose. The young man was of the opinion that the Nova Scotia game laws needed

revision, and that the guides should be licensed and made responsible to a chief game commissioner or to properly appointed deputies. Then the various of big game territory should be exploited, and every effort made to induce sportsmen to visit the province in the hunting season.

There is no danger of the moose becoming extinct, he argued, if the hunting is looked upon as a valuable asset, and the people become interested enough to see that game laws are rigidly enforced. In spite of the great influx of hunters into New Brunswick every fall, moose are more plentiful than they were years ago, and seem to be increasing each year.

It would seem that the Province of New Brunswick and, in fact, all the Maritime provinces, might carefully investigate the question of the wealth of the fish and feather fauna as well as that of the big game. Seemingly, the Province of Quebec is moving in this direction. The Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries has just issued a circular letter in which he says:

The more extensive knowledge of the value of our wild game and inland fisheries which have come to me during my brief charge as minister of the Department of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries, has confirmed the impression which I had previously formed in regard to the necessity for certain reforms to better assure the efficient protection of our fur, fish and feather fauna. My earnest desire is to so improve existing conditions in this respect that sportsmen may always find here the success which is dependent upon an abundant supply of fish and game.

I am more than ever convinced, too, that there is room for quite a large increase in the revenue to be derived by the province from those who come here to enjoy the sport afforded by the pursuit of the inhabitants of its woods and waters. Before enacting the reforms which I believe to be desirable, I am anxious to meet and confer with a number of those who are most interested and most experienced in the angling and the hunting of the Province of Quebec and with this end in view has resolved to invite them to join me in a Fish and Game Congress to be held at

Windsor Hotel, Montreal, on the 13th and 14th of December.

Special rates will be arranged for this convention and the minister will gladly welcome the attendance of those interested in the subject. —Globe.

NOT GUILTY

Jury in Famous Boston Dress Suit Case Acquitted Dr. McLeod

Boston, Dec. 2.—A verdict of not guilty was reported in the superior court to-day in the case of Dr. Percy D. McLeod, charged with being an accessory after the fact to the illegal operation which resulted in the death of Susan Geary, the victim in the suit case tragedy and with concealing the crime. The prisoner was discharged.

William E. Hunt and Lewis W. Crawford, who pleaded guilty several days ago to the charge of being accessories after the fact to the illegal operation, were then brought into court, and each was sentenced to not less than six years nor more than seven years in state prison.

Judge Stevens expressed regret that the public statutes prevented him from making the penalty heavier.

ST. JOHN SENSATION

Doctor under Arrest Charged With Abortion.

YOUNG WOMAN DEAD

Case Came to Light Through Suspicion of Clergyman

St. John may have a sensation which to a lesser degree, may even rival the famous dress suit case mystery which has horrified Boston. Sensational reports are in circulation connecting local physicians with the death of several young ladies which occurred recently in this city.

It is alleged that these young women died as a result of criminal operations which were unsuccessful, and it is further alleged that these operations were performed by duly registered physicians who practice in St. John.

Edith Clarke, aged 24 years, daughter of Robert Clarke, 69 Adelaide street, died on Wednesday after being ill of congestion of the lungs and pneumonia. A physician had been attending her, but fearing that the young woman would not recover, her parents called two other physicians in consultation.

On Wednesday Miss Clarke died, and it was given out that the cause of her death was congestion of the lungs. The Rev. R. P. McKim, who, in the course of his parochial duties, was called to bury her, became suspicious. He had heard reports that the young woman's death was not due to the cause given out. He notified the police and refused to perform the burial service, over her body until an investigation was made by the proper authorities.

The police took the case in hands and Coroner Berryman this morning countermanded the order for burial. A postmortem examination will probably be held to determine the real cause of death.

This afternoon Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen arrested Dr. E. A. Preston in connection with the case. A west end clergyman said this morning that he was suspicious that the recent death of a young woman in the west end was due to a similar cause. It is understood that this case is also being investigated.

Dr. Preston was arrested at his residence and taken to the central police station. He is charged with illegally attempting to procure an abortion. He refused to say anything when arrested. It was stated that Dr. Scammell and Dr. W. F. Roberts were called when Miss Clarke's condition appeared to be critical. Dr. Roberts when communicated with this morning refused absolutely to discuss the case.

Dr. J. H. Scammell when communicated with said he had been called in with Dr. Roberts when Miss Clark's condition was critical. When he saw her the young woman was very ill, and he refused to say from what cause. He also declined positively to state who issued the death certificate or what was the cause of death. Saying:—"I can't say anything about that."

Howard D. Camp, a young man, was arrested at three o'clock this afternoon in connection with the case. He is a moulder, employed in Fleming's Foundry and resides at 78 Paradise Row.

He was arrested by Sergt. Kilpatrick at the Clarke home on Adelaide St. he having gone there to attend the young woman's funeral—St. John Times 1st.

SHOULD CO-OPERATE TO GET SETTLERS

W. T. R. Preston Says New Brunswick Should Have a Share

W. T. Preston, the Canadian immigration commissioner in Great Britain, attended a meeting of the council of the Board of trade yesterday afternoon and urged upon the members the necessity of offering inducements to the incoming settlers in order to secure for the province a share in the increasing numbers of immigrants who came to Canada every year. H. B. Schofield, the president of the board occupied the chair and eleven members were present to meet Mr. Preston.

The commissioner after referring to the vast immigration traffic passing through this port every year, spoke of the desirability of the foreign peasant as a laborer on a farm. He mentioned that 20,000 settled in Ontario last year and were proving satisfactory. If the farmers, he said, would hire the men as they arrived they would find them excellent farm helpers. Mr. Preston impressed upon the

board the advantages of co-operation with the provincial government in offering inducements to secure settlers, and outlined the work done in this direction in Ontario.
