DORCHESTER.—Some twelve years ago A indorsed a note for B. The holder of note never notified A touching his security. Is A responsible for note? ANS.—Not upon the facts stated. The indorser of a note is not liable unless duly notified of its non-payment when payable.

PLOVER MILLS.—A orders from an agent, B, a book, which was to be delivered on or soon after June 2; it is not delivered yet, Can B force A to take the book now, and if so, when is the latest date that he can compel him to take it? ANS.—A is bound to take the book now, or within any reasonable time, having regard to the particular facts of the case to be determined by the court should the parties disagree and the question have to be settled. The law does not fix the exact date; that is a question of fact, A year would be an unreasonable time, but a few months might not be unreasonable.

WAIDSVILLE.—The council of our township made an appropriation for a gravel road, which has been kept up by the council, exclusive of the annual ward appropriation. The money was spent by their commissioner as directed, and now after the lapse of a year, a majority of the present council want to charge the said grant to one of the wards. Can they do so? 2. It was moved that the said grant should be charged to the said ward, when the reeve unled the motion out of order, on account of said grant having been made and duly expended for a special purpose is smed in the resolution. Was he right or wrong? ANS.—The resolution appropriating money having been acted upon cannot be now altered, and the reeve was in our opinion right in ruling the motion out of order, although it would appear from your statement that charging it to the ward is a mere matter of discretionary management by the council, and the object of the majority or charging expenditure to any particular ward or part of the municipality, unless the money is raised by special or frontage tax upon the property against which it is charged.

—Upon the facts stated the executors had no legal right to open the road alter its non-use for twenty years, and A had acquired a title (by possession) to the road allowance. He is therefore entitled to the grass and to treat it as his own property. C cannot compel him to fence along the road, but he may compel him to maintain half the line fence between their respective occupied lands. A had better consult a lawyer upon a full statement of facts.

Can B force A to take the book now, and if so, when is the latest date that he can compel him to take it? Ans.—A is bound to take the book now, or within any reasonable time, having regard to the particular facts of the case to be determined by the court should the parties disagree and the question have to be settled. The law does not fix the exact date; that is a question of fact, A year would be an unreasonable time, but a few months might not be unreasonable.

WAIDSVILLE.—The council of our township made an appropriation for a gravel road, which has been kept up by the council, exclusive of the annual ward appropriation. The money was spent by their commissioner as directed, and now after the lapse of a year, a majority of the present council want to charge the said grant to one of the wards. Can they do so? 2. It was moved that the said grant should be charged to the said ward, when the teeve nuled the motion out of order, on account of said grant having been made and duly expended for a special purpose named in the resolution. Was he right or wrong? Ans.—The resolution appropriating money having been acted upon cannot be now altered, and the reeve was in our opinion right in ruling the motion out of order, although it would appear from your statement that charging it to the ward is a mere matter of discretionary management by the council, and the object of the majority might be effected in arranging for any subsequent expenditure. There is no authority for charging expenditure to any particular ward or part of the municipality, unless the money is raised by special or frontage tax upon the property against which it is charged.

He is therefore entitled to the grass and to treat it as his own property. C cannot compel him to fence along the road, but he may compel him to maintain half the line fence between their respective occupied lands. 

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

The case has been laid by Mr. Evans' friends before the Dean of Huron, who will doubleless call the Bishop's attention to it.

CETTING RATHER WARM.

The New Street Railway Company on the Aggressive.

Pursuant to the notice sent the City Council, the London Street Railway Company this morning commenced breaking up Dundas street, west of Richmond and east of Egerton for the purpose of extending their tracks.

The solicitor of the proposed new street railway company, on learning that the old company meant business, served a notice on Mayor Speneer Saturday, announcing to him that the new company had specified in their proposition that they intended to traverse these parts of the street and ciaming in effect that the old company were not entitled to them.

The mayor conferred with the chairman of the railway committee, the aldermen and the city solicitor, with the result that President Cronyn was notified late Saturday night not to break up the streets until after the council meeting to-night.

This morning men were at work with pick and axe on the spot, and cedar blocks were ripped up and ties laid. "A police sergeant came along and notified us to stop." said one of the men working on the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets about 11 a.m.; "but we had orders to go ahead, so we paid no attention to the order."

It appears that President Cronyn was in Toronto when the notice was sent him, so that it did not reach him in time to stop the work. It is learned, however, that he telegraphed shortly before noon to-day complying with the notice out of courtesy to the mayor and council. The matter comes before the council to-night and a warm meeting may be expected. The detailed proposition of the new street railway company will also be submitted.

SHIPS THAT ARE LOST-MAN'S RECORD ON THE SEA FLOOR.

It has, to many persons, been an inter It has, to many persons, been an interesting speculation as to the aspect of the countless wrecks which have been swallowed up by the North Atlantic since the churn of waters has been plowed by the keels of ships. Their number is probably to be reckoned by the tens of thousands, and the greater part of them lie in a comparatively small part of that field. If we count this portion of the Atlantic which is most peopled with wrecks as having an area of 3,000,000 square miles, and estimate the total number of such ruins within this space as 30,000, we would have an average of one sunken ship for each 100 square miles of surface. If all these crafts were at once sailing over the surface of the sca we should, from the deck of any of them, be likely to note the masts of several others. As this material is not attacked by the other agents of decay, it will doubtless be very perfectly preserved in the strata which are to bear the records of our time. In the eventual formation of a deposit containing a notable quantity of cinders, it may be that our successors in the far hereafter will interpret our, perhaps otherwise, unrecorded ways of voyaging. The Grain Fields.

—Beans do best on sandy soil, as it is warm and they are ready to pull before the fall rains come on, which always stain them and injure the looks so that they bring a less price. They are also easily hurt by frost, gand on that account must mature early. Phosphates are, in the majority of cases, the best fertilizer, one form of which is bone dust. This may be applied at the rate of 500 to 700 pounds per acre. This should be put on broadcast, if the beans are planted in the hill. If planted in the drill, which would probably be done if a large acreage was raised, put it in the drill and sow at the same time with the beans. Yellow eyes bring the best price of any on the market raised in the east, athough the ordinary white ones are considered easier to raise.
