OTTAWA, March 20 .- Messrs. Tisdale and Weldon, two Ministerial members, practically monopolized all the time of the House of Commons to-day. The first with a speech based on a motion respecting a canal around St. Mary's Rapids between Lakes Huron and Superior, and the second with his Anti-Bribery Bill which proposes to punish electors who take bribes but says nothing about the politicians and electors who give the bribes.

A number of questions regarding the industrial returns of the census were answered with the usual ridiculous features. answered with the usual rioractions seattles.
In reply to Mr. Flint, Mr. Wood said there were 144 brewerles in Canada, employing 1,840 hands. There were nine distilleries—one in Nova Scotia and eight in Ontario -employing a total of 404 hands, and with an annual output of the value of \$2,199,000.

London's Railway Bill Escapes a Year's Delay.

No. 45, Incorporating the Company Was Promptly Passed,

But 170, 47 Evoked Various Objections and Came Near Meeting Its Death.

Ottawa, March 20.—The House in com nittee of the whole to-day reported bill 45, incorporating the Cleveland, Port Stan ley and London Transportation and Rail-way Company without amendment, and passed on to the consideration of the bill No. 47 respecting the London and Port Stanley Railway Company.

The band numbered in all 374 persons, including a large number ons sentenced to exile for political es. In accordance with the the convicts were marching to their various destinations. They had spent the night at Tomsk, Western Siberia, and various destinations. In any a spons the night at Tomsk, Western Siberia, and continued their march early in the morning. A snowstorm was prevailing, and, when six hours' march from Tomsk, the storm had become so severe that all the roads were obliterated. Chained together, the convicts struggled on until gradually the weaker ones fell in the deep snow, dragging the stronger ones down with them. Despite the efforts of the Cossack guards, the exhausted people could make no attempt to save themselves, and they were abandoned to freeze to death while the others were driven forward, those in charge of them hoping to get into shelter. The storm continued to increase in violence. Traveling became worse and worse. Now and then prisoners would drop by the wayside, where they would soon be covered by the rapidly-falling and drifting Now and then prisoners would drop by the wayside, where they would soon be covered by the rapidly-falling and drifting snow. When the guards managed to get what few remained of their charges to a piace of safety, they found that of the 374 persons they had started with only 91 survived. Sixty-two of those who had perished were political prisoners. Among those lost were Madame Lazarov, six other women and four children.

WASHINGTON, March 21 -At last night's WASHINGTON, Blatch 21.—At last night's meeting of the Congregational Club the Chinese question was considered. Justice Drew, of the United States Supreme Court, held that it was injustice for Congress to pass laws discriminating against and ostracising the Chinese. "I know they not assimilate with our insti-ns but neither do those of other tutions but neither do those of other nationalities. He held it up as worse than mockery that thousands of persons should go to the polls to vote while knowing nothing of the laws and carring nothing for them. The alien should not be allowed to vote until after being a resident of 21 years in the country. If we exclude one we should exclude all, he said.

HOW NOT TO PROCEED

The McGreevy-Connolly Cases Come Up for Trial,

But the Government's Counsel Ingeni-ously Has It Delayed-Robert Mc-Greevy Said to be Missing-Officers After Him.

OTTAWA, March 21 .- The final chapter in the book of boodle known as the Mc-Greevy-Connolly trial was called at the assizes this morning before Mr. Justice Falconbridge and the lawyers in the case gave an exhibition of how not to proceed. Hon. Thomas McGreevy and Mr. N. K. Connolly, the defendants, were in court and Michael Connolly as well. Among the witnesses present were Dr. Bourinot, clerk of the House of Commons, Mr. Chapleau, clerk of the crown in chancery, Mr. Walter Todd, clerk of the committee on privileges and elections, the chairman of the Quebec Harbor Board, and other well-known

First Mr. S. H. Blake, Q.C., counsel for N. K. Connolly, asked for an order com-pelling the crown to disclose by further particulars the precise grounds of attack instead of calling on them to prepare defense against all the matters produced before the investigating committee in 1891. Mr. Osler resisted the application and the judge refused it.

The way was now cleared for the beginning of the celebrated trial, but Mr. Osler slowly rose and announced that in the absence of an important witness the crown was not ready to proceed.
Climax of surprises! The presiding judge stared. The defendants looked on in wonder, and the crowd smiled. Mr. Osler explained that an im-portant witness, without whose presen-the trial could not be proceeded with, had the trial could not be proceeded with, had left Quobes for Ottawa yesterday, but got off the train at Three Rivers and doubled back to Quobec. The crown had two officers after him and he might be brought to Ottawa by midnight to-night. He therefore asked that the case be allowed to stand till to-morrow morning, to which, after a little delay, the court acceded.

The trial is as hard to get to a beginning as it is to get the Government to grant any other committee of inquiry, and if it does begin it will inevitably fall to pieces long before it is finished. 
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

Is it not a fact that the Dundas cotton factory, now kept idle at the sweet will of the combine, was successfully run and gave employment to many hands when the Canadian tariff on cotton was 15 and 17½ per cent.? Who can deny that the Lybster cotton mills, established at Merritton in 1860, were run at a substantial profit under revenue tariff? Then came the Parks cotton mills, established at St. John, N.B., in 1861; the Cornwall cotton mills in 1875 the Hudon cotton mills at Montreal in 1874, and the Valleyfield cotton mills in 1877.

We defy any combine apologist to suc-cessfully assert that these factories would not have continued to thrive if the tax had never been increased at the demand of edy manipulators of the Cittawa. The operatives would have con-tinued as skillful, and the demand for the products would assuredly not have dereased if the prices had not been increased to combine rates.

The more threats they utter, the more they try to excuse their conduct, and to bamboozie the electors, the stronger must become the public impression that the high tax advocates are arrant humbugs.




