# PEN ITENTIARY ON FIRE

-No Lives Lost and Main Building Safe.

[Canadlan Press.] Montreal, Feb. 26.-A fire, which broke out in the St. Vincent De Paul Penitentiary this morning, destroyed the hospital annex, and did extensive damage to the surgical department. patients in the hospital were all moved safely to the main building, and no lives were lost, thought at one time it looked as if some of the prisoners had been cut off. There are 399 prisoners in the institution, which is a state penitentiary. The fire was first discovered at 6:15 this morning by J. B. Jardin, a watchman in the store department. The flames spread with tremendous rapidity to the hospital, and all hope of saving it was soon abandoned. The work of transferring the patients, of whom there were about a score, to the main building, was proceeded with without incident. urgent message for help was then dispatched to Montreal, about fifteen miles away, as it was obvious that the prison Hamilton, Feb. 26.-Brooding over fire department could not cope with the

> After consuming the hospital annex, the flames travelled to the little chapel which was soon consumed. Fearing that the main body of the penitentiary would be fired, and that it might be necessary to move the prisoners there, the guards were notified to be ready to march the convicts out. The arrival of steamers from Montreal, however, and the enormous amount of water they were able to throw on the flames, soon checked them, and at 10:30 the fire was reported as under control.

With Foot Wedged Between Tender and Engine, Sarnia Tunnel Man Meets Awful Fate When West-Bound Freight Crashed Into Slowly-Moving East-Bound Train at Mandaumin Crossover.

[By Staff Reporter.]

Mandaumin Station, Feb. 26.—Pinned between the engine and the tender. Fireman Charles Symes, of Sarnia Tunnel, was scalded to death in a wreck at the Mandaumin "cross-over" Fraser and Brakeman Harold Cheshire, all of the Tunnel, had a miraculous escape from sharing the same fate.

Both east and west bound main lines of the Grand Trunk were blocked by the wreck, which occurred when westbound freight crashed into the side of an eastbound one, backing onto the westbound track to allow an eastbound passenger train to pass.

Occurred at 2:10 a.m.

At 2:10 this morning extra eastbound freight 673, in charge of Engineer Duffield and Conductor Curran, of Sarnia tunnel, stopped at Mandaumin, the first station east of Sarnia, to allow a passenger train to pass. There is no siding there, and the freight was being switched to the westbound track, when 560 plowed its way into the middle of the train, wrecking eighteen cars-and piling them with its own engine and tender across both tracks. Engineer Fraser, who, with Conductor Mellick, both of Sarnia Tunnel, was in charge of the train, escaped man Cheshire, he was in the cab with white lights. Symes, but both managed to crawl from the wreckage after the big engine had been thrown across the eastbound track. missing. Search revealed his scalded body, wedged in the cab. One leg was broken, and he had sustained internal injuries, besides the terrible scalds.



#### PUBLIC LANDS IN THE NORTH- The way of the wind is a strange, wild WEST.

WHEN the provinces of Alberta, and Saskatchewan were constituted under the Liberal Government, their public lands were retained by the Dominion, as was the case with those of Manitoba. It was held that the control of these lands was necessary to the Dominion Government in carrying out its immigration policy. In lieu of these, however, the new provinces received better financial assistance than the older provinces. Objection was raised by some of the people in the Northwest to this arrangement, and that objection has been growing stronger with the lapse of time. Whether or not under present circumstances, with their great increase in population, it would be advisable to restore the public lands and other natural resources to the provinces, is a proper subject for inquiry and discussion. The Liberal Governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan, which accepted the original agreement, now think they should have the lands. The Conservative Government of Manitoba joins with them in their demand. And the Liberals in the Dominion Parliament are quite prepared to consider the question fairly, and treat the other provinces justly.

But the position of Mr. Borden and his colleagues is not creditable nor honorable. When in Opposition, in issuing what was called the Halifax platform, Mr. Borden declared himself unreservedly in favor of restoring the public lands to the provinces. During the last election campaign, in his western tour, he emphatically promised the people that if he were returned to power, the lands should be given over to them. He was very indignant with the policy of the Liberal Government. He told his hearers that they were free men in name, but they could not be really free until they had control of what was their own property. And he was the



OLD-FASHIONED BUCKWHEAT CAKES.

Put into a stone jar with a rather narrow neck one teaspoonful of salt, three and three-quarters cupfuls of buckwheat flour, and one teaspoonful of molasses. Then slowly mix in a quart of water from which the chill has been taken, and half a cake of compressed yeast that has been dissolved in two tablespoonfuls of tepid water. Beat the batter until smooth and very light, cover the top of the jar with saucer and stand in a fairly warm place overnight (about 65 degrees). In the morning dissolve half a teaspoonful of baking powder in two tablespoonfuls of hot water, stir this into the buckwheat batter, beat thoroughly and bake immediately on a hot griddle. A cupful of this batter may be saved and added to the cakes of tomorrow, instead of using fresh yeast, and may be continued for a number of mornings if these cakes are fre-

Controller Coles would also have the proposed new police station erected on the court house grounds, thus making sort of a second federal square, where all the departments concerned in the administration of justice, civil and criminal, would be centered.

Should Take Man Home. "Instead of arresting a man when he takes a drink or two too much, I would like to see the police instructed to take that man home. If a carriage is necessary, charge the cost of it to the hotelman who sold him the liquor. Many men who are perfectly good citizens in every other way are unable to resist the temptation of liquor; it is a disease with them, and we should not disgrace their wives and families by sending them to

"I think we have one of the best chiefs and one of the best police forces in Canada. They certainly do splendid work in keeping criminals away from London. But apparently they consider it their duty to see how many convictions they can secure in the course of a year. Instead of pointing to increased receipts in the police department through fines, would give the magistrate the greatest credit who could cut the fines down to \$500 a year.

Golden Rule Idea. The idea of Controller Coles in this matter is exactly similar to that adopted by Fred Kohler, former chief of police Cleveland, Ohio. Kohler was called the golden rule chief, for he substituted the helping-hand treatment of drunks instead of lugging them to jail. Kohler was lauded from one end of the continent to the other for his inauguration of this system.

Demand Vergara's Body.

The consul's visit to Hidalgo today was largely to formally demand that Vergara's body be surrendered to the family for burial. Opposition to this was not expected, for, at last reports, the body was still hanging to a tree, and the Mexican troops have not denied the manner of his death. There is something of the indifference here that they have in England. I have the feeling that the churches ought to speak out on the question of mixed marriages, demanding at least a common marriage The Protestant churches ought to advocate the ignoring of the temere' decree. There seems to be willingness here to submit to the decree, which I think is very humiliat-

Against Vatican Politics. "I would be in favor of home rule in Ireland, if it were not for the aggressiveness of the Roman Catholic

Church. I believe in religious equality. I have no protest to make against the religion of St. Peter's. It is the politics of the Vatican that I quarrel "I am in favor of the principle of

self-government in Ireland as long as the Church of Rome is prevented from introducing foreign government. "Canadian patriotism impresses me

as an intelligent patriotism. It is more standing for a principle than mere shouting for a crown. Yes, you are demonstrative here, as we are in Ireland, more so than in Great Britain. But why shouldn't you sing 'God Save the King' more than we do? British Isles are united by parliamentary bonds, while the crown is the only link binding Canada to the Empire.

Disregard of Law Causes a Setback to Importation to the United States.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Detroit, Feb. 25.-The importation of has been given a severe setback by the failure of breeders to observe the provisions of the inspection law as enforced by the United States bureau of animal

It was found by the local inspectors that with the advent of the new tariff law United State farmers crossed the border and began buying up cattle and shipping them into this country.

They failed, however, to kill the cattle, as required by the law under which they were imported, and used the animals for breeding purposes, instead, because of the fine quality they were able to purchase. able to purchase.

This fact has induced the Government to compel all cattle bought in this country from Canada to undergo the tuberculin test if the shipments are of the breeding type.
