CANADA'S FLEET TO BE COMPOSED OF 11 PREMIER LAURIER OUTLINED THE NAVAL SCHEME

The Ships Will Cost Over \$11,000,000; Yearly Maintenance Will Be \$3,000,000.

LEADER BORDEN MAKES OBJECTIONS

Advocates Sending Money to Great Britain as Present Alternative.

Ottawa, Jan. 12 .- It was twenty-five past two o'clock when Sir Wilfrid Laurier rose to introduce the long-tromised bill which stands on the motion paper as "an act respect ing the naval service of Canada." half the members of the House were in their seats when the Premier rose. Sir Wilfrid referred to the unfortunate illness of Mr. Brodeur, whom he hoped would be able to move reading and give all details. He would confine himself today to the salient features of the bill. The Premier explained that the bill followed closely the lines of the militia bill, but differs in one important respect. The militia bill provides that the whole male population over 18 is liable to service. There is no such provision in this act. There is no suggestion of compulsion or conscription of any

Not Liable to Service.

"No man in this country," he said, "under the naval service act or any other will be liable to military ser vice on the sea. In this matter the present bill departs altogether from the militia act. Every man to be enolled for raval service in Canada will be enrolled by volunteer engagement. There is no compulsion of any kind no conscription and balloting. The bill provides that the naval force shall be under control of the department of marine and fisheries. It further provides that there shall be a director of naval service, who must be of rank

er rear-admiral, or at least of captair. "The department shall be assisted b a naval board, who will advise the department. The terms of engagement will be determined by the governorin-council. Commissions in the naval militia will be issued in the name of his majesty. These are general features so far as reorganization of force



IN A FURIOUS RUNAWAY CANADIAN PREDICTS SWEEPING VICTORY FOR BRITISH BUDGET BALFOUR AT YORK LAST NIGHT

Tremendous Crowd Heard the Conservative Leader, but He Was Not Convincing, for the Reason That He Is Unconvinced Himself-British People Are Not Likely to Forsake Free Trade Because of Speeches Being Made Against It.

York, Eng., Jan. 13.—Great audiences greeted Hon. A. J. Balfour here last night. It is said that thousands who sought admission were unable to procure tickets. Yet there was no crowding. There were seats for all, and the women and children in the gallery were as comfortable as they would have been at an opera.

A somewhat significant indication of the difference between the two political parties was that at this meeting all who could not be properly accommodated were excluded. while at some of Lloyd-George's meetings all the seats were removed except from the platform, so that the men could wedge in standing up until the walls bulged.

No two scenes could be more different than this and the Llovd-George meeting at Reading. There there was an electrified multitude—here it was a cosy audience listening to a cool political professor, who never warmed up his audience, notwithstanding his fine voice, his wonderfully choice words and the very evident admiration of his hearers.

BALFOUR NOT CONVINCING.

One was compelled to feel, as Balfour's speech proceeded. that he was a man who could not be convincing because he himself was not convinced. There was no ring of confidence in his defence of the Lords, his advocacy of tariff reforms, or his talk of the German menace.

The British people did not adopt free trade on the advice of hesitant advocates; nor does it seem likely that they will turn from it by such arguments.

Fifteen minutes later, Hamar Greenwood was heard ansring Balfour to a crowd of two to three thousand people from the windows of the Liberal headquarters.

To me. Greenwood predicted a sweeping victory for the budget, though he would have a hard contest himself. Tomorrow night, Lloyd-George speaks here in the same hall. All the chairs will be removed, and everybody will have

The report was as follows: "During the year 1909 the department responded to 185 alarms—45 were from street signal boxes, 115 telephone calls, 6 on private call bells, the worst botched job they had ever seen, and it would cause no surprise the character and 19 verbal alarms. 




