



GLACIER HAS BEEN ON FUNERAL MARCH

Ice Mass Nearing End of Journey With Tourists' Bodies.

Paris, Sept. 14.-The people of Chamounix, the little Alpine town at the foot of Mont Blanc, are anxiously watching the great Bossons glacier in its slow progress downward. Embedded in its icv mass are the bodies of J. C. Randall, an American bank treasurer, and five guides, who, with two other tourists and three guides, perished in a snowstorm while climbing Mont Blanc 40 years ago.

The bodies of Dr. James Bean and the Rev. George McCorkindale. a Scotch minister, with three guides, were recovered at the time of the disaster in 1870. Mr. Randall's body and those of the other guides have lain in a tomb of ice ever since, and are being carried downward inch by inch. Freedom of City Was Extended Thought To Be With Bradley the Vegetable Men Last On the West Coast of Greenland. Night.

[Associated Press.] Copenhagen, Sept. 15.-The Danish Government steamer Hansgede arrived here today with the news that John D. Bradley, the financial backer of Dr. Frederick A. Cook's north pole expedition, was on his way to Etah to secure the much-talked-of records and instruments which Cook has said he left at that Eskimo settlement on the northwest coast of Greenland. The captain of the steamer thinks that Cook is with Bradley, but gives no particular reason for this belief.

The Hansgede, which is the vessel upon which the explorer travelled to civilization after his exploit in the Arctic a year ago, fell in with a yacht at God Haven, a Danish settlement on the south coast of Discoy Island, Greenland, and in the course of exchanges between the masters, it was earned that Bradley was aboard the other craft. The polar hunt promoter admitted his identity, and explained that he was bound for Etah to recover whatever had been left there by Dr. Cook. He refused, however, to either deny or confirm the report that he was

accompanied by the explorer. The government vessel also brings the information that two missionaries who are working among the Eskimos who accompanied Cook on his expe tion, say that these Eskimos insist that the doctor reached the pole, as he claims, prior to its discovery by Commander Peary.







To the Editor of The Advertiser: Premier Laurier's western tour was time well spent. It brought out clearly the desire of the whole western people of all classes for United States trade. The same desire exists in rural Ontario, if it only had organization to give expression to its wishes. The organization they should have should be exactly like that the west. Coming at the time when Ottawa was invited to meet Washington for the purpose of improving trade rela-tions between the two countries, the western demand was most fortunate. A revenue we must have. After the luncheon Mr. King and Mr. Lemieux were received by the Minister of Foreign Affairs at the foreign office. The Belgian minister referred in the highest terms to Canada's part in the Brussels Exposition and to the improved commercial relations between Belgium and Canada. During his stay in Brussels Mr. King has brought to the attention of the representatives of several countries present at the conference the work of the royal commission on industrial training and technical education in Canada, and has taken steps to facilitate the work of the commission when it visits Europe. In company with other delegates to the international conference, Mr. King was received by the King of the Belgians at the Royal Palace.


