Bankers Transfer Deposits in U. S. to Holland and Switzerland.

#### British Labor Gives Benediction To War Debt Cancellation Note

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The Labor party has given its official benediction to the Earl of Balfour's war debt note. This was done last night through Arthur Henderson, secretary of the party, who,

in a speech at Heywood, said: "The only satisfactory method of relieving Europe from a intolerable burden and removing and sterilizing the uncertainty due to financial embarrassments is to arrange an all-round cancellation of mutual indebtedness. We welcome, therefore, the note issued by Lord Balfour. It is a great step forward in the right direction, and indicates, I believe, a sincere effort by the government, to solve the difficulties in which Europe finds herself.

"It means sanity at last is resuming its proper place in the common affairs of international life. It is a recognition of the stern fact that a general settlement of the problem of mutual indebtedness would be of more value to mankind than any gains accruing even from the most successful enforcement of legal obligations.

PROPERTY transfers in the city of London during the month of July reached a total of 136, and the aggregate of considerations involved was \$424,198. These figures have been taken from the records of the city registry.

Aside from the fact that almost one-half million dollars is involved in real estate deals consummated in London last month, the found they are good in making home to put the whole cigarette business total considerations almost double those of July, 1921. In the latter period 121 sales were made, involving a total of \$248,463.

That the figures of this year surpass those for the same month in 1921 indicates that more money changed hands in London last July on the real estate market. However, a most significant feature of the report this year is the fact that few of the deals registered were big ones, the largest consideration for any one piece of property during the month being \$28,000.

Diplomatic Overtures Result in Signing of Agreement in London.

#### RETAIN ALCOHOL EMBARGO

LONDON, Aug. 3 .- Diplomatic correspondence which has passed be-tween P. C. Larkin, Canadian high commissioner, the British foreign of-fice and the Soviet government, Moscow, has resulted in the signing of a trade agreement between Russia and Britain, which will be immediately applicable to Canada.

This agreement involves not only trade relationship between the two countries, but gives facilities for re-storing immediately postal, telegraph and wireless communications between Russia and Canada, thus assuring means of protection to Canadians traveling in Russia, and recognition of Canadian passports.

The agreement embodies Russia's pledge to cease from the dissemination of propaganda harmful to the British Empire, and gives each party thereto the privilege of having resident agents in the respective coun-Canadians are now free to Justice Pooley in supreme court.
