GOVERNMENT IN STEW OVER BEEF

Liberals Appoint Massey To New Government Sinecure

OTTAWA, Mar. 13 — (PUC) — Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent announced last night before the Commons that the Right Honourable Vincent Massey had been appointed to the post of Governor General of Canada.

The announcement followed a concerted demand by the Liberals that with the possible abolishment of the present system of party appointments to the Senate in the next five or ten years it was imperative that a new sinecure be established for old and deserving members of the party.

The Prime Minister's statement came as no surprise to the Opposition members of Parliament but put an end to months of speculation among the government members as to which old and trusted member of their ranks would be the lucky boy.

The Nova Scotia M.P.'s would not comment on the appointment other than to say that while it was unfortunate that Mr. St. Laurent had not seen fit to choose a Nova Scotian since they had been one of the first to jump on the Liberal band wagon back in 1933, they were sure the Prime Minister knew what was best for them.

In making the statement Mr. St. Laurent said that while others had been considered for the post it was considered advisable to appoint someone who would out-British the British and so still all possible unfavorable comment. When this was taken into consideration he said, Mr. Massey was the only logical Liberal choice.

This announcement was made following inquiries into an unfounded rumour that the popular P.M. was not even considering visiting the Province this month.

Current rumours gave no indication that St. Laurent would be in Newfoundland this spring. A check with top authorities in the Provincial capital revealed that they didn't know anything.

About an intended visit by the Prime Minister and that, therefore, these rumours did not convey a false opinion.

That's the story. The Prime Minister will not be in Newfoundland this month and there never was any indication that he was even considering such a move.

Loonenburg Schooners Return To Port With Record Catch Of Season

Engineers Liable For Libel

The robbery was well timed, premeditated and executed with a minimum of violence and as a result of this no charge on this count are being laid.

According to authoritative sources several Engineering students are implicated in the robbery and upon Administration requests, the names are withheld until such time as the action is started. According to the police the papers were stolen and taken to some secret hiding place and there defaced with the word "Engineers" which has turned out to be a brand of shame. The lewd thieves thereupon inserted a mimeographed manuscript in each issue and distributed same to the campus.

It is due to the context of their supplement that all the trouble is evoked. Certain interested parties have termed remarks therein made as "libelous", "defamatory", "obscene" and "malicious" and in view of this the University officials have met behind closed doors to determine just what drastic course of action this calls for.

The names of the people who have been thus unjustly held up for public ridicule and contempt, it was learned today intend to open civil proceedings which, although criminal proceedings have been by-passed, will result in serious consequences for those concerned. It is rumoured that suits for damages ranging up to \$25000 have been or will be filed which may have the collateral effect of resulting in their expulsion from the University.

From a legal standpoint, it was learned today, that the ingredients of libel are all manifested in the incident and as a result the plaintiffs have an air-tight case. One University official is quoted as saying "Never before in the history of our University, and indeed, in the history of the Courts of Nova Scotia, has such dastardly libel, such revolting malice, such premeditated ignominy, been seen in this usually tranquil Province.

At press time one of the victims of this slanderous attack was heard to say "I'll take this case to the highest Court in the country, if I have to!"

Peron Falls To Three Kings

RIO, March 10—(URP)—Argentine President Juan Peron was victoriously re-elected yesterday in the first general election in that country in four years.

When the final results were in President Peron had high praise for the new system of voting initiated this year which gave him a 2-1 majority over the Opposition. Under this system Peron supporters had two polling booths in which they voted while the Opposition had only one.

It is reported that following the counting Peron sat down to a game of poker with his friends. In the last hand Peron bet his night's earnings but lost all. His opponent had three of a kind but all the President could do was put a Peron on the table.

Ottawa (BURP) Mar. 48. Theophilus Smithers (LC-Baffin) in a raging debate on the government's handling of the foot and mouth disease in Saskatchewan was thrown out of the Commons for indecent use of language when he said the Minister of Internal Diseases was of doubtful descent.

Ruled out of order by the speaker, Mr. Gasper, the member for Baffin land was ejected from the Commons for the faux pas.

The Minister of Internal Diseases when asked by reporters for a statement discredited the outbreak. In the light of the present situation in Saskatchewan he remarked that Smithers was suffering from a corollary of that disease—foot-in-mouth.

Govt. Circles Speculate Following French President's Surprise Move

PARIS, France—(PUC)—President Oriel made a surprise move today. Someone placed a tack on his chair. Thinking quickly, he got up.

Speculation as to who did this raced through Paris today. Some blamed the Communists. This seemed like one of their tactics. It was a severe stab in the back. Side opinions seemed to think this was logical.

Even the Democratic party took some of the blame. It is well known that the French will miss Eisenhower when he leaves to take the Republican nomination. It seems the Democrats thought the French would blame the Republicans and kidnap the General before he leaves France and thereby help the Democrats in their election next Fall.

This theory was not given much credit.

Official reports said that a clerk had left it when he was posting the name of the latest French Premier. Before he posted the news, he left to get the name of the one who was appointed while he was posting the name of the one appointed before that one. The President returned before the clerk did.

When asked for a statement President Oriel's only comment was "Ouch!"



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
