The first decade of the new century wilt probably see the completion of one
of the grandest engineering feats ever undertaken by man, the opening of a
waterway-between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. If Great. Britain and the United States come to terms over the
Clayton-Bulwer treaty, the way will be States of the Nicaragua canal. It will be a fitting end to a long series of at-
tempts, disasters and eniormous expentempts,
ditures.
The
The project of a waterway between
the Atlantic and the Pacific- was a favorite one with early spanth expror
ers. and geographers. They belieyed bowever, that a natural roite existed
and spent much money in the endeavor to discover it. The unbentitiy condi-
tions prevailing in many parts of this region caused innumerable deaths and
umeh loss of treasure. Other Spaniard of the early time believed that a water
way would have to be cut and that the way would have to be cut and that th
project was practicable. Gomara, th
Speidl Spanish historian, who died sbou 1560, indicated four rontes where
trans-isthmian canal could be cut-the Nicaragus route, now upheld by
United States ; the Tehuantepec row across the isthmus of that name in
