## NATIONAL ROAD SYSTEM WANTED IN AMERICA

### Conclusion Reached by Prominent American who Attended International Road Conference at Brussels.

Brussels, Aug. 6.—The International Road Conference, which opened its sessions here July 31, finished its work to-day and adjourned, the members remaining for several attractive excursions organized by the Belgian Government.

The delegates say that the great lesson of the conference is the showing of the absolute necessity for the introduction of a uniform system of road building in America. Jos W. Jones, of New York, one of the representatives of the Automobile Touring Club of America, said to-day that chaos is bound to prevail so long as the idea that local engineers should have full control of road building obtained in America.

"We need," said Mr. Jones, "a system like that in France, of national, state and country roads, decreasing in width according to the importance of the traffic, and built at expense of the national government and the states."

It is understood that Rev. ## PORTUGAL AND VATICAN ARRAYED IN ANTAGONISM

### Portugal Following the Lead of Spain in the Anti-Clerical Troubles--The Failure of the Catholic Demonstration has put a Quietus on the Ardent Hopes of Prince Jaime and his Adherents.

San Sebastian, Aug. 8.—The city continues tranquil, no further attempt at demonstrations having been made since a group of the more hot headed clerical adherents yesterday gathered in the streets with shouts of "Death to Spain, long live the Pope."

The troops, however, will remain in the summer capital for several days. The authorities express the greatest confidence that the fiasco of the anti-government manifestation marks the end of Carlism and of an attempt at revolution in favor of the pretender, but they are plainly nervous as they realize the blind devotion of the peasant population of the Basque provinces who had been moved on by the priests and the monks. Sixteen priests and monks were among the persons arrested on Sunday on charges of attempting to provoke disorder.

### RIFLES SEIZED AT BILBOA

Bilboa, Spain, Aug. 8.—Six thousand rifles were seized by the authorities today on board a tug which had been chartered to go to San Sebastian, where the great anti-government demonstration was proposed to be held yesterday, before the clerical leaders abandoned the manifestation. The local authorities at San Sebastian had held that the Carlists were planning to take advantage of the Catholic meeting to start a movement against the government. No statement however, is made as to which party to the conflict chartered the tug and loaded it with arms.

### MALICIOUS TALES OF KING

Paris, Aug. 8.—The Spanish ambassador to France, Senor Perez Caballero, declares that the report printed in the Croix here that King Alfonso is showing signs of mental weakness is a malicious invention of the clerical press. Marquis de Ojeda, who has arrived in Paris after being recalled by the Spanish government from his post as ambassador to the Vatican, said today that Marquis de Gonzales, counsellor of the Spanish embassy at the Vatican, has orders to attend the Pope's anniversary on Tuesday.

### TROUBLE WITH PORTUGAL

Lisbon, Aug. 8.—Portugal, like Spain, is almost on the verge of an open rupture at the Vatican, due to friction over the government's censure of the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Braga for suppressing a Portuguese Franciscan paper without submitting the order to the Portuguese government for approval and other incidents. Since the issue of the royal decree July 12, nullifying the action of the archbishop, the clerical forces, inspired, it is charged by Cardinal Merry de Val, the Papal Secretary of State, have been conducting a bitter campaign against the government on this account. At the same time the Vatican had been raising difficulties about filling the diplomatic vacancy caused by the death of Senor Martins D'Antas the Portuguese ambassador to the Vatican. The Portuguese government retaliated by deciding to allow the post to remain vacant for the present and the minister of justice has drafted a bill prohibiting for a civil register of births, deaths and marriages to be kept by the civil authorities. As this brings a big source of income to the clergy a meeting of ecclesiastics was held here today to protest.

### SYMPATHY FOR VATICAN

Rome, Aug. 8.—The Pope and Cardinal Merry de Val, the Papal Secretary of State, received this morning from Spain. The telegrams were sent yesterday, having evidently been delayed by the Spanish authorities. The telegrams encouraged the Vatican to assist the anti-clerical movement in Spain, the senders assuring the Pope and Cardinal Merry de Val that the movement does not find deep roots among the Spanish people.

## LESS THAN 75 MILLION FEET OF LOGS HAVE BEEN RAFTED

### President J. Fraser Gregory of St. John River Log Driving Company Says Rafting Returns Have Surprised Lumbermen.

Fredericton, Aug. 3.—Mr. J. Fraser Gregory, president of the St. John River Log Driving Company, was in the city over Sunday in his automobile, accompanied by a party of friends, and to the gleaner this morning Mr. Gregory stated the lumbermen had been given some great surprises by the rafting returns recently given out, as made up to the end of July. "The returns showed that up to August 1st there had only been about 72 or 73 million feet of logs rafted at the booms and the lumbermen expected that the amount would be upwards of 90 million feet.

"The amount of lumber stranded up river is much larger than anybody imagined," said Mr. Gregory, "and there must be at least 35 million feet tied up somewhere."

## AGED NOVA SCOTIA FARMER BUNCOED

Lunenburg, N. S. Aug. 7.—A Lunenburg man, eighty years old was the victim of confidence men when the circus was in that town the other day, and the attorney-general's department so far has failed to recover the funds belonging to the too unsuspecting octogenarian, who parted with \$1,250.

On the road to Bridgewater the old man met a stranger who pretended to be interested in real estate. The two engaged in conversation. The old man's hobby was found to be electric belts. The two were soon joined by a third who said he wanted an agent for an electric belt. Before an appointment could be made, however, it would be necessary, he was told, for the applicant to put up \$1,250 as an evidence of financial standing.

A fourth man purporting to be a judge from Halifax, joined the trio who adjourned to a tent connected with the circus. But before they repaired thither the Lunenburg man went to his bank and withdrew the sum named. The cash was handed to the confidence men who got away with it and have not been heard from since.

## HOPEFUL FEELING AT CAMPBELLTON

### Many Contracts for Buildings Will Soon be Given Out.

### WHY THERE WAS DELAY

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 6.—Everybody in Campbellton is hopeful of the future, and while very little in the way of actual building has as yet been commenced it seems to be generally understood that the next two or three weeks will see contracts let for a number of substantial structures. Uncertainty as to whether or not the town council would make a fire zone and promulgate building restrictions has undoubtedly prevented many from starting operations. Another cause contributing to the delay has been the uncertainty as to the town's future with reference to its debt and the financial question. Now that there is assurance of government assistance along lines that will enable the place to meet its obligations the people who have been holding off will, it seems certain, make immediate plans for the construction of their dwellings and places of business.

There is on all sides belief in the future of the place. While the lumber mills that were the chief industry of the town have been destroyed the forests remain and the people are convinced that even if the mills are rebuilt outside the town, Campbellton will remain the shipping point and will also retain the advantage it has attained during the past few years as a distributing centre for the north shore and Gaspe country.

The banks are arranging for new and permanent buildings, the railway shops, etc., will be rebuilt as well as other government buildings, and ere long an army of workmen will be busy. It is regrettable that a whole month of the best building weather has slipped away, but in the uncertainty that followed the fire it was perhaps unavoidable. The delay will prevent the completion this fall of many buildings, but already some three hundred shacks of one

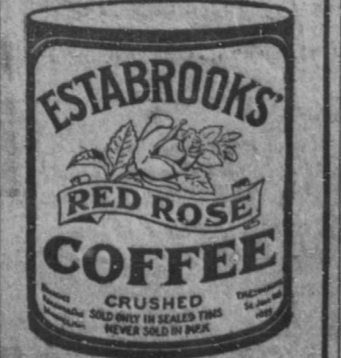

### New York Police Kept Busy Following Trail of Desperate Robber.

Chicago, Aug. 8.—Following close on the murder last Friday night in sixty-first street of Dr. Wm. F. Schell, another man was fatally shot by a robber last night near the scene of the dentist's death. Having the police to believe that a desperate thug operating in that part of the city committed both crimes, as well as several minor offenses previously reported. While the theory had been advanced that Dr. Machells was slain by the husband of one of his patients, the widow has contended that he was the victim of a foot pad. MAIN STREET WILL BE BRICK OR STONE.

Campbellton to Have New Building Regulations—Tailor Has Started Wooden Structure.

Campbellton, N. B., Aug. 5.—Mr. D. J. Bruce, tailor, is the only Campbellton merchant, who has yet started the construction of a permanent building and there is considerable feeling of opposition to him because he is building of wood. The town authorities have warned him of possible changes in the building laws and there may be an effort to have him desist. The council at its meeting this afternoon is expected to finally determine on rebuilding regulations. The general opinion seems to favor stone or brick on the front street and fire proof roofs elsewhere. The railway authorities are preparing to build on an enlarged scale and the banks are also arranging for new buildings.

While the mills will be rebuilt probably outside the town limits, the people generally are hopeful as now that the matter in connection with the debt has been arranged by the government, it is expected that general building operations will be commenced and that within the next week or ten days a number of permanent buildings will be under construction.

Everybody is hopeful of the future and convinced that the new Campbellton will be even a more beautiful and progressive city than its predecessor. Many insurance policies have been already paid and the total will reach \$1,463,000.

STRIKING

C. S. Nesbitt, of Durand, an employee of the Grand Trunk who sacrificed his expectation of a pension of \$50 per month from the company, by joining the strikers three weeks before the pension was due is not to be congratulated for his heroism. He has a family, and they would almost have been justified in initiating a judicial inquiry as to his sanity, for he was hardly fit to exercise his own discretion in flinging away an income that would have stood between them and want as long as he lived. The labor organization which enacted such suicidal loyalty from him was not entirely blameless either, for his continued service to the company for so brief an interval could in no way endanger the success of the strike. If any intelligent workman whose union frequently drags him into strikes would keep a debtor and a creditor account of his losses by obeying the union and his profits out of strikes even when they succeed, he would be astonished how the balance would show on the wrong side. In Nesbitt's case, the whole account may be on the wrong side. He is too old for any other employment than switching, and if the strike does not succeed, which is more than likely, he will be permanently out of a job. Foolish Nesbitt.—Detroit Free Press.

TREASURE FOUND IN SUNKEN SHIP

Detroit, Aug. 5.—Believing they have a \$400,000 treasure in their grasp men are guarding night and day what is believed by them to be the wreck of the steamer Atlantic, off Long Point in Lake Erie. The Atlantic was sunk in collision in 1852 by the steamer Ogdensburg, and 150 lives were lost. Many were drowned in their berths. The wreck lies in 153 feet of water. In the hold, it is believed, divers found two boxes containing \$400,000 in gold. The wreck of the Atlantic is virtually intact. No skeletons were found in the superficial examination.

### U. S. EXODUS TO CANADIAN WEST

Washington, Aug. 5—Immigration from and to Canada is the subject of a statement just issued by the United States immigration bureau. During the 12 months ending March 31st last there were 74,918 arrivals of aliens and citizens from Canada for permanent residence in the United States, against 61,517 during the previous 12 months. In the same period there were 103,789 departures of aliens and citizens from the United States into Canada for permanent residence, as against 59,832 the previous 12 months. Citizens arriving were not counted during the whole of 1909, and it is estimated that 15,000 arrived during the year. That number has been included in making up the total of 61,517 arrivals.

### SEVEN LIVES LOST IN A N. Y. BLAZE

New York, Aug. 5—Seven lives were lost early today in a fire which destroyed a three-story lodging house in the foreign section of Jamaica, on Long Island. The fire started in a hallway, the only exit, and spread so rapidly that few of the inmates had any opportunity to escape.

The lodging house was occupied for the most part by poor workmen employed in the neighborhood. The owner, George Dunbeck, occupied apartments with his family on the ground floor. He and his household escaped safely in their night clothes by jumping from the windows to the street. The dead, five men and two women, were all foreigners. They were asleep at the time and were all suffocated by smoke in their beds. The blaze was a small one and a single company of firemen with one line of hose extinguished it within a few minutes of their arrival. The property loss will not exceed \$1,500. The bodies of the dead were carried out by the firemen and viewed by the coroner, who lived near and was one of the first to arrive on the scene. He declared that death had been due to suffocation by smoke and ordered the bodies removed to the morgues of three Jamaica undertakers. Two persons were injured escaping from the flames. Stephen Marcus, a farmer, 35 years old, jumped from the window of his room on the 3rd floor and was taken to a hospital suffering from concussion of the brain and internal injuries. J. D. Tagas, a laborer, was badly burned and partially suffocated by smoke.

The names of the dead are as follows: Stephen Congreve, 36 years old; Frank Mitko, 19 years old; Lawrence Hess, 28 years old; Stephen Ankenny, 30 years old; Martin Marsonka, 67 years old; Agnes Sineyto, 27 years old; Nellie Sudek, 25 years old.

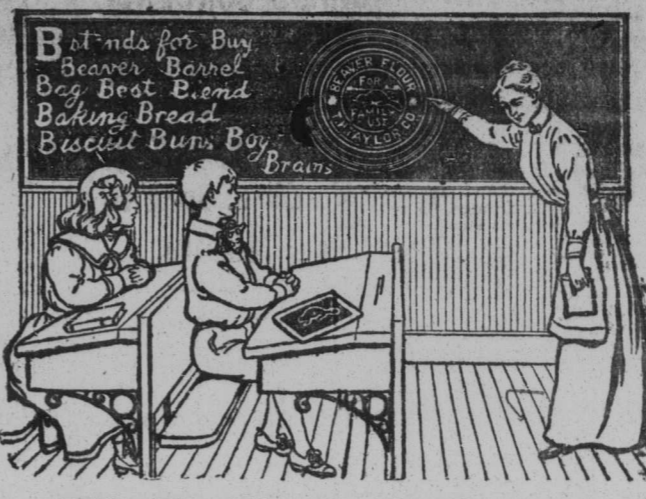
### MCCARTHY—DONOVAN

#### LOTS OF RAIN.

Over Two Inches Fell in Fredericton Yesterday—Hay Fields Suffer.

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 5.—Fredericton was visited by a rain storm last night which almost approached a cloudburst. Almost two inches of rain fell by actual measurement. During fourteen hours yesterday the rainfall was 2.3 inches or almost half as much as the total rainfall in the month of July. Rain of yesterday caused water in the St. John river to rise upwards of eight inches and many brooks and streams in the country have been swelled so that they have overflowed their banks and this morning covered the hay-fields.

This summer has been an unusual season for rain. According to statistics furnished by Dr. C. C. Jones, who is in charge of the Dominion Meteorological Bureau at the University of New Brunswick the total rainfall in the month of June was eight inches, while the average for the past few years for June has been 3.6 inches, and in July there was also a heavier rainfall than usual, it being 4.8 inches as compared with 3.6, the average figures. The unusually large amount of wet weather has made it particularly hard for farmers to carry on their work this summer.

An editorial in the Boston Herald says of Campbellton:—"Despite the liberal gifts of supplies and money which Campbellton has received from outside friends, the stricken inhabitants are facing the extremities of a severe winter. Towns spring up like mushrooms over night in Alaskan or Nevada gold fields, beside the transcontinental railroad surveys or when backed by some huge corporate interest, as did Gary in Indiana. But when a town is smitten with flood or fire, like Galveston, Jameston Martinique, Messina or San Francisco, there comes the great test of its utility. Small towns like Campbellton are the strong pegs which hold nations together."

## Laurier's Special TRAIN WRECKED

Express Crashed Head-on With Freight While Going 60 Miles an Hour. Both Engines Wrecked and Interior of Sir Wilfrid's Car in Ruins.

Regina, Aug. 7.—While speeding along at sixty miles an hour late Friday night with what the engineer believed to be a clear track before him, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's special train collided head on with a fast train westbound, about midway between Moosejaw and Regina. The premier was thrown from his seat to the floor amid a litter of broken dishes and overturned furniture, but rose and declared himself uninjured.

Hon. George P. Graham and Senator Gibson, who were in another car, were also thrown down, and Mr. Graham limped for some time afterwards, but was otherwise uninjured.

The conductor of the special sustained the most serious injury, having several ribs broken.

The engineers and firemen of the two trains jumped and escaped with bruises and scratches.

The press suffered the most severely of any in the special, many of the newspaper men receiving painful bruises. None was seriously hurt, however.

The wreck occurred far out on the prairie, about three and a half miles west of Pense. The night was dark as possible and a driving rain was falling. Some of the press men made their way along the track to Pense and a wrecking crew was summoned from Moosejaw.

The engines of both trains were smashed, as well as four freight cars and the baggage car of the special.

COUNCIL ASSISTS CAMPBELLTON

Held Special Session at Dalhousie Last Week at Call of Warden

\$2,000 VOTED

A special meeting of the Restigouche County Council was held at Dalhousie last week at the call of the Warden.

The meeting was called for the purpose of taking necessary steps to assist the town of Campbellton to provide for the homeless people.

After discussing the matter the council voted \$2,000 towards the town's general fund, and also voted 1,500 for the Hotel Dieu Hospital. This latter amount will be paid in five yearly payments of \$300 each.

A LARGER AND BETTER CAMPBELLTON

In the course of a conference between Hon. Dr. Pugsley, minister of Public Works and the Relief Committee that gentlemen made some important statements.

In reference to the rebuilding of the Post Office and Custom House he stated that when the department rebuilt, which would be at once, the new building would be much larger than the old as the department intended to build for a larger and better Campbellton.

He also made the same statement in reference to the I. C. R. Already the various departments are preparing plans for the rebuilding of the station, machine shops and round house.

With the International and Atlantic, Quebec and Western railways nearing completion, and the plans for the erection of the railway and passenger bridge over the Restigouche at Campbellton well under way an important link between Gaspe and Boston will be closed and this will make Campbellton an important railway centre, as well as the business centre for a very large territory.

Already many merchants are planning the erection of large brick and cement buildings and before long Campbellton will be rebuilding in a more permanent and up-to-date manner.

MAKES APPEAL FOR METHODISTS

Rev. George Morris Addresses Congregation at St. John on Sunday.

NEED \$10,000 TO REBUILD

(St. John Telegraph).

Rev. George Morris, of the Methodist congregation, Campbellton, preached in Centenary church yesterday morning, in Portland church last evening, and addressed a mass meeting in Carmarthen street church Sunday school room in the afternoon, making strong appeals for help to enable his people to rebuild their church and parsonage. Collections were taken in Centenary at all the services yesterday in aid of this object and it was announced that contributions would be received in Carmarthen street next Sunday.

Rev. T. Deinstadt, pastor of the Carmarthen street church, presided at the Mass meeting. He read a circular issued by the special committee of the conference which had been considering the matter, making an appeal to all congregations in the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference to raise not less than \$5,000 for the relief of the Campbellton congregation.

Rev. Mr. Morris described the conditions which had resulted from the conflagration. The Methodist congregation, he said, was not a large nor a wealthy one. While they appealed for help it should be understood that, as far as they were able, they were striving to hold themselves. Only two of them escaped being burned out and yet they had agreed to try to pay their minister's salary this year.

It had been said that the most pressing necessity of the situation was to build homes for the people before they thought of building churches. The people of Campbellton were, however, as anxious to build their churches as they were to build their other homes. The Methodist had lost a church valued at \$7,000, a parsonage valued at \$2,000 and the furniture of the parsonage worth \$800. On this insurance to the amount of \$2,500 was carried, and it had been estimated that \$10,000 was required to build their property again.

Last year the congregation had finished paying off the last of their debt and had at the same time increased their pastor's salary from \$750 to \$900. They had also raised, during the same period, \$1,200 for denominational purposes.

In conclusion the speaker made strong appeals to the generosity of the Methodists in St. John.

THE I. C. R. WORKS

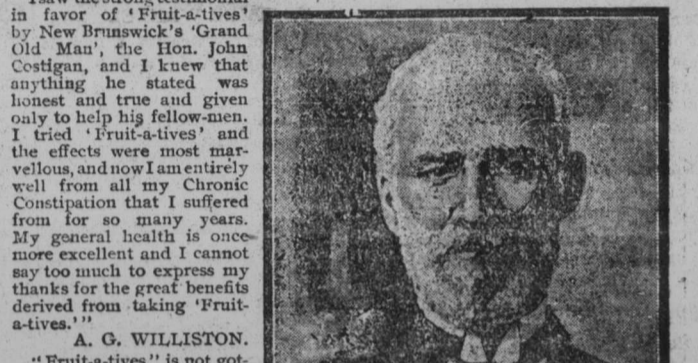

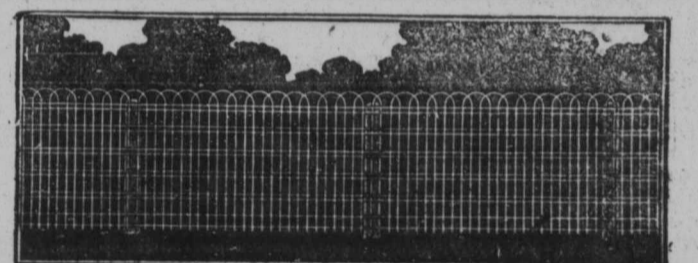

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

### HAD TO HOLD HIS NOSE WHILE HE SEIZED EGGS

Could Not Stand Odor of Canned Product So Shut His Nostrils With Clothes Pin.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 4.—A federal food inspector armed with legal papers and a clothes pin clapped over his nose, has seized 125 cases of Nebraska eggs which were marked "canned fancy mixed and frozen," and yet "guaranteed pure and fresh."

An analysis by chemists of the agriculture department in Washington is said to have disclosed about 2,156,000,000 bacteria in a single ounce of the canned product.

John H. Jordan, United States district attorney, says that within two months 20,000 pounds of Nebraskan eggs have been brought to Pittsburg.
