

Many courts would handle nothing but rent cases. Streets in front of some courts were blocked and police reserves were called to handle the crowds, for whole families went to court, baby carriages and all.

Justice Morris of the Weschester court told a landlord that \$10 a month was too much to pay per room for basement quarters and informed the tenane he could remain until the lease expired in ctober and pay only \$6.

Dominion of Canada

Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income. as follows:-

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920/

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

SPRING CALF FEEDING

How to Feed and Handle the Young Arrival.

HE calf that comes in the Street. spring, comes just at a time! when everybody is so busy getting the spring work done that he is very liable to be neglected to a certain extent. Young calves are very susceptible to disease Street com- on to young cattle and a little lack of attention to spring calves is liable to cause serious trouble to

There are two menaces to calves in spring and summer, and those are extreme heat and flies, and one is on a par with the other. Arrangements should be made whereby the calves are kept in during the day and allowed to run out in a paddock at night. By this means they are afforded a liberal amount of exercise and good pure fresh air, and also. they are allowed to get some of the nice juicy green grass, which is the nearest thing to a complete and balanced ration that can be found outside of milk.

When the calf is dropped it may be well to leave it with the dam for a few hours in order that it may get the first milk (or colostrum) which is so necessary on account of its actions on the digestive tract. When the calf has received sufficient colostrum to set up the necessary action it should be removed from its mother into a separate stall, or it may be put into a stall with other calves of th same age or nearly so. If, by any chance, the cow's udder is inflamed, the calf may be left for a few days,

stays of eviction varying from one to six months.

For a few days the calf should be fed whole milk, but when it is two to four weeks old a change should be made, skimmilk gradually replacing the whole milk, from eight to ten days taken for the change. the whole milk is totally replaced the milk may be increased to eighteen or twenty pounds per day for a calf six weeks old. The best kind of skimmilk for calves is warm, just when it leaves the farm separator. However, everybody may not have a separator, and then this is not pos sible. In any event the system start ed with the calf should be followed as nearly as possible at all times, because radical changes in diet are sure to cause severe digestive frou-bles. Pails and all feeding utensils should be kept very clean to elim-inate any danger of disease from bacteria that might be lunking with-in. Skimmilk feeding may be contin-ued on as long as it is thought ad-visable up to eight or tan months. visable, up to eight or ten months old. Good thrifty calves may be weaned as early as three months old, roviding good substitutes for the

ing calves is indigestion or common scours. This trouble is usually caus-ed by overfeeding, feeding milk too ed by overfeeding, feeding milk too cold, feeding milk heavily laden with the disease germs, or by keeping the calves in a dark, dirty, poorly ventilated quarter. The calves should be watched carefully, and if they show signs of scours immediate steps should be taken to effect a cure. The ration should be reduced and a little lime water put into the milk. I immediate action is needed about immediate action is needed, about one-half cupful of strong black tea or some castor oil should be given.

As for meal for the calves, rolled oats are good, and if they are getting no whole milk a little linseed oil cake should be added. The oil cake cake should be added. The oil cake has a laxative property as well as supplying a little fat to the ration. A good meal for calves: 100 lbs. of ground oats, 50 lbs. bran and oil cake (nutted) 25 lbs. Good clover hay is essential at all times, giving enough to allow the calves to pick out the nice succulent parts, and still not be wasteful.— J. C. McBeath, O. A. College, Guelph.

Generally speaking, calves are better kept in the stable during the first summer, except where stable conditions are not good, and where there is not enough labor to look after them and keep them ary and clean. The only other exception is in the case of calves dropped in the early winter and which have had three to six months of milk and more or less dry feed. Such calves may be all right, if turned out to grass as soon as the pasture is good and the weather warm and pleasant, Par-ticularly is this the case where milk and other feed is scarce on the farm. ABOUT THE SEED DRILL

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

S the drill sows, so shall the farmer reap, is no fallacy. It is as true in its content as the maxim "As a man sows so shall he reap." Given the right kind of a grain drill, the seed is all planted at a uniform depth, evenly covered; the earth compacted just enough to retain the moisture around it. These conditions mean that the young plants will all come up at the same time, that the roots will be well protected, and that the grain will ripen uniformly. As the grain is planted, so will it grow and ripen. If some of the seed is planted too shallow, and some too deep, the seed that comes up first, ripens first. Thus it is that some of the grain is ready to harvest while other patches are still in the milk stage. The feeding device is the heart of

Grain seed drills are divided into four kinds, according to the type of furrow-opener — the open delivery single disc and the closed delivery single disc, the double disc, the shoe, and the hoe drills. The open delivery single disc furrow opener deposits the seed between the shield and the convex side of the disc. The space is open from the end of the boot between the disc and shield to the bottom or lower end of the shield. The shield prevents the falling seed from becoming mixed with the loose earth and surface trash and insures its free passage to the bottom of the trench made by the disc. It will also do excellent work in highly cultivated soil that is

free from trash.
The closed delivery single disc furrow opener has a closed boot, similar to a hoe furrow opener, which comes down at the rear edge of the disc and deposits the seed about two inches back of the disc. It does not plant the seed at as even a depth as either the open delivery single disc of the double disc, but deposits it at least eight inches in rear of the disc hub, and wherever it meets with an obstruction, rock or hard frozen soil the disc rises up and carries the boot with it, broadcasting the seed on the surface.

There are many styles of double discs, but the one that plants the seed under or slightly back of the disc axle, or hub, is the one to use, for that point is the deepest part of the furrow. The furrow opener that shoots the grain forward of this centre is to be avoided, for the reason that the seed reaches the ground before the furrow is fully formed, and it is, therefore, mixed with the soil as the seed trench is being made, causing what is termed "wavy" sowing. The double disc type of opener tends to spread out the seed more than other kinds, so that each seed has a somewhat greater area from which to draw moisture.

The hoe furrow opener or shovel opener does not penetrate the ground readily and clogs easier than any of the other types. The shoe opener does no better work, and rather than clog will run over trash and thus plant the seed at varying depths. In selecting a drill the bearings should be given careful inspection. They should be dust proof. The hard oiler must be considered superior to all others for this kind of work, as the oil can be forced into the bearing from the centre, and as it works out it carries all the dirt with it. It should have a well-braced seed box with steel hopper bottom to allow the seed to pass freely into the cups; strong frame and substantial wheels are important features. The distance between the furrow opener varies to some extent but six inches is the usual spacing. The seed tubes may be of rubber or of steel ribbon. The rubber tubes give good satisfaction, but are not durable if exposed to the weather. The steel ribbon tubes serve the purpose well, and if painted will last as long as the drill.—Jno, Evans, O. A. College, Guelph,

FIGHT SMUT AND SCAB

Treat Wheat, Oat and Potato Seed Before Planting.

Dilution of Formalin or Formal dehyde Recommended, by Immersion or Sprinkling - Corrosive Sublimate Also Used for Potato

REAT losses frequently occur through the prevalence of smuts in the grain crops Numerous experiments have seen conducted in the Field Husyears past in making a practical application of the treatments reconimended for killing the smut in grain As the result of five years' experiments with five treatments with wheat and seven treatments with oats it was found that very complete work was obtained by immersing the grain for twenty minutes in a solution made by mixing one pint of formalin or forty per cent, formaldehyde

in forty-two gallons of water. In preparing wheat for treatment care should be taken to separate the broken smut balls from the wheat, either by cleaning the grain or by placing the seed in water and removing the smut balls as they float on the surface. Not only is it necessary to treat the grain but the forma-lin solution should be used to kill the smut spores which are lodged in the bins, on the barn floors, on the bags, in the grain drills or wherever the living spores have an opportunity of again coming in contact with the

For seed select smooth, sound po-tatoes, as free as possible from scab, and disinfect by soaking them before they are cut, for two hours in a solu-tion made by adding half a pint of commercial formalin to 15 gallons of used to advantage in treating the PHOSPHONOL FOR MEN Re seed. The potatoes can be placed directly in the solution or first put in crates or coarse sacks and then imcrates or coarse sacks and then im-

After treatment spread the pota-toes out on a clean floor or on the grass to dry. Wash all crates, bags, etc., which are used in handling the potatoes with the formalin solution. The same formalin solution can be used to treat successive lots of pota-toes. Fifteen gallons is sufficient to treat from 20 to 25 bushels if ordinary precautions are taken not to waste too much of the fluid as each waste too much of the fluid as each lot of tubers is dipped. If the potatoes are not all treated the same day it is advisable to make up fresh for-

malin for each day's work.

Corrosive sublimate (mercuric chloride) can be used also to treat potatoes to prevent scab. Soak the uncut tubers for three hours in a solution of two ounces of corresive sublimate to 25 gallons of water. Corrosive sublimate is a deadly poison, and potatoes treated with it are ren-

dered unfit for food for man or beast. Formalin is a clear liquid disinfectant. It is a 40% solution of formaldehyde gas and water. It can be purchased from almost any druggist. It is sold under the names of formalin and formaldehyde. It is important that the purchaser, whatever name he buys it under, secured a guaran-teed solution of 40% formaldehyde. The stock solution should always be kept in a well-corked bottle, and should not be allowed to freeze.

If possible plant the treated seed potatoes on clean soil, that is soil that has not produced a crop of scabby potatoes. Practice a rotation of crops. If scab is very bad it is not advisable to plant potatoes on the same land oftener than once in five years. Heavy applications of barnyard manure should not be made to the potato crop, but if necessary given at some other point in the rotation. Plant potatoes after clover sod if possible. Avoid alkali fertilizers such as lime and wood ashes.—Prof. J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

Planting the Cultivated Creps. To ensure good crops of carrots, mangles, sugar beets, potatoes and corn, the land should be well prepared and seed should be secured of the highest quality. Under average conditions the Irish Cobbler variety (early potatoes) and the Green Moun-tain (late potatoes) are recommendsuits with the potato crop, it is al-ways better to plant them not later then the 15th of May. This year plant half your seed ten days earlier than you have been accustomed to doing, and plant the other half at the usual time. The experiment will prove to your satisfaction the value of early planting, If the potato planter and sprayer has not already been over-hauled, a rainy day may be very pro-tably employed in this work.
