Fifty eight petitions in all have been filed against members returned at the recent Federal election. Of these petitions, 35 are in the Province of Quebec; 8 in Ontario; 7 in Manitoba; 2 in British Columbia and 2 in Prince Edward Island.



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

## LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Thirty-five Japanese fishing boats were caught in a typhoon off Haseo Island in Kwantau Bay the other day and swamped. It is reported three hundred and fifty fishermen were lost.

Paris newspapers express the belief that Castro has left Venezuela forever. They say for years he has been sending money to England, and France, where he has \$50,000 deposited.

In our report of the election results in the different districts, published in our last issue, we set down Mr. A. P. Prowse's majority in Murray Harbor at 55. This was a mistake; his majority was 65.

A fire late last Friday night destroyed the clothing and jewelry store of Anthony Shapiro, at Ducken City Pa. Five members of the family were burned to death. Shapiro's son and daughter, and Mrs. Shapiro's parents lost their lives. Mrs. Shapiro and two other children escaped by leaping from the second story window.

Seventeen persons perished in a furious storm, which lashed the Newfoundland coast for forty-eight hours before the 4th. Ten fishing vessels have gone ashore, most of them breaking in fragments on the rocks. The victims of the gale were members of the crews of three of these craft. The fishermen were all residents of Newfoundland fishing villages.

So expensive has been the campaign of the United States Department of Agriculture against the mouth and foot disease prevalent among herds of cattle in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Maryland, that Secretary Wilson soon will ask Congress for an emergency appropriation of \$500,000 for this work. The slaughter of herds is being continued with a view of eradicating the affliction.

Stanley Shanes, aged fourteen, went into the woods near St. John N. B. on Saturday with a team intending to gather wood. One sick lying across the wagon, caught in a moving wheel, flew up and struck him on the side of the head. Three days later having returned home the boy became ill and died a few hours afterwards. A year ago Shanes' brother, while in the woods, became ill and hurried home died in a few hours.

Having been unable to obtain an amicable settlement of outstanding differences with Venezuela, the Netherlands government has begun a naval demonstration off the South American coast. The battleship Jacob Van Heemskirk and the cruisers Gilderland and Frualand are engaged in the operation, which will continue indefinitely. The demonstration is regarded as indicating that the preparation for an effective blockade of the Venezuelan coast are complete.

On Saturday morning last, Portland, Maine, had its fourth large fire of the year. Two of the eight blocks of the Grand Trunk Railway were destroyed with three sheds and their contents and a steam engine. Two great elevators of the G. T. Elevator Co., were threatened on the sheathing of iron which covered them prevented the flames getting a foot hold. Spreading the fire to the steamship Carlsbad increased the loss by \$300,000. Total damage \$350,000. The Carlsbadman was in danger of sinking.

A sensational story in the Vancouver, B. C. World says British officers working among the Sikhs and Hindus of the Pacific coast unearthed the details of a proposed uprising against British rule in India. The story is to the effect that scattered outrages are now taking place in India for the purpose of scattering the British troops. The main rising will take place in April next at Amritsar. Stocks of arms of modern type, recently manufactured in Japan and smuggled into India, are hidden in various districts. The only lack is artillery.

Not knowing what they were playing with, two seven year old sons of Rodolph and Napoleon Couture, Ste. Claire, Dorchester County, Quebec, tossed a stick of dynamite and for a time a snowball battle. When it exploded the children were thrown many feet away and were all covered with blood when rescued by their mothers. One of the boys had only received minor wounds, while the other had lost three fingers and was severely burned about the face. It is supposed the dynamite came from the G. T. P. construction work at St. Malachi, a few miles from Ste. Claire.

Premier Botha speaking on the work of the convention engaged in the unification of South Africa, said: "There are two questions facing us. What can we do for South Africa, and for the Empire to which we must unite and strengthen ourselves and the Empire. The people have a great opportunity carrying with it the responsibility of saying whether they will go forward as one, or as different peoples. The good relations which prevail today will assist us in attaining an ideal, united action." Mr. De Wet, who proposed the unification of the convention, emphasized the necessity of a policy of give and take.

Wreckage which has been washed ashore at Cape Ray Newfoundland leaves little doubt that the sturdy little steamer, Soo City, which for twenty years plied as an excursion vessel on the Great Lakes, went down with her crew in the gale which lashed the Newfoundland coast for two days last week. The steamer was in command of Captain John Dillon, of Brooklyn, formerly commander of the United States Government transport Missonit. His wife and three small children awaited his return home. The exact number of the crew is in doubt. It is known, however, that no less than eighteen were aboard, and it is reported that the crew was recently increased to 28 men.

On Monday night of last week, about midnight, Police Constable Wilkins was shot in Lynwood Park, Simcoe, Ont., by Chief of Police Malone. Malone had made an appointment with Wilkins to meet him in the park and gained possession of Wilkins' electric lamp. Four or five shots which Malone fired at the victim took effect, one in the eye and three in the back. Wilkins managed to get across the street to the doctor's office, where he was recovered by passers-by, and taken to hospital. It is known, however, that it is quite possible that some knowledge which Wilkins may have had of Malone's movements is the reason that the latter desired to put Wilkins out of the way. Malone is now in Simcoe jail awaiting developments.

## LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

An engineer and fireman were killed in a C. P. R. train wreck at Fort William, Ont. yesterday.

A London correspondent cables to Montreal that the argument in the Steel-Coal case ended Monday. Judgment was reserved, and the possibility that it may not be delivered until February.

Latest advices from the west say that seven election petitions have been filed in Alberta and Saskatchewan in addition to those mentioned elsewhere, 4 Liberal and 3 Conservative.

Hon. William Templeman, Minister of Ireland Revenue, who was defeated in the recent Federal election, in Vancouver, B. C. has resigned from his cabinet office, and it is said the portfolio will be offered by Laurier, to Ralph Smith M. P. Nanaimo.

The second session of the thirtieth Congress opened at Washington Monday with the usual immense crowd. Secretary Cortelyou has submitted a table of appropriations for 1910, the estimates totaling \$84,100,000, being fifty-eight million over the present year.

Gilbert Waters, of Bangor, Maine, Superintendent of Stearns Mills, while coming from the woods alone, on Saturday last, attempted to cross the lake on thin ice. The ice gave way and he was drowned. Later in the day his body was found. Deceased was 34 years of age, and leaves a widow and three children.

The City Council of Moncton unanimously adopted a report to place the Water and Light Department under a commission. Legislation will be asked at the next session of the Legislature to this end. The Council will reserve the right to appoint a commission, including a chairman, the latter to receive a salary of \$1,800.

An explosion of a magazine station at Calcutta resulted in killing eleven men and wounding twenty-six others. Most of the injured will die. At the time of the explosion the men were engaged in converting ball cartridges into blank cartridges. It was first reported that the accident was the work of agitators but the rumor was quickly disproved.

The three masted schooner Jennie Stubbs, with lumber from St. John, N. B. arrived at Boston yesterday after a voyage of forty days. This was the longest stay of any of the coasters. She was laden with lumber, and on the voyage ran against all sorts of weather; was driven back several times; but finally came into port without serious damage.

In spite of the sturdy opposition of the railways, it was decided in Montreal on Monday evening that a winter carnival will be held there towards the last of January, with ice palaces. The opposition to the carnival arose from the fact that the past carnivals created the impression abroad that Canada was a country of ice and snow, but the Montreal traders and hotel keepers won the day.

The Fall Mail Gazette, of London, announces the forthcoming treaty and attitude between Great Britain and Holland, and predicts that other governments will soon arrange treaties for the protection of the Netherlands. If this is true it is another step in the diplomatic isolation of Germany. The possibility that Germany might acquire Holland has long been regarded as a menace in England.

Navigation closed at Quebec on the 9th with the arrival of the Government steamer Druik, from the St. Lawrence with the balance of the boats from the channel. On the previous day the last steamer from Montreal passed down and the north shore liner Arrammore arrived up from Natasquan, Anticosti, and Seven Islands, which ports which ports will now remain all winter without steam communication, unless the Government permits the Montreal to make a winter trip to two or three islands, as it did last year.

On the eve of his departure from Kinross, to take up the practice of his profession at Pease's Station, Dr. M. Donahoe was presented with a complimentary address, accompanied by a valuable Morris chair, by his brother members of Branch 379, C. M. B. A. He was also presented with an address of like nature by the people of Kinross, accompanied by a well filled purse. In these addresses Mrs. Donahoe was kindly remembered. To these evidences of good will, the Doctor suitably replied.

The Ottawa Government is prepared now to actively begin business as to the issue of Old Age Annuities. The final order in council approving of the actual rates has been passed, and literature explaining the advantage of the system, as a guarantee against penury in old age, and detailing the investment features, has been sent out for distribution by the postmasters throughout the country. Applications for Annuitants received from intending purchasers will be promptly dealt with. In Ottawa a staff of lecturers to explain and popularize the scheme will hold public meetings in all districts in Canada throughout the winter.

The great flow of a Mexican oil well at Dosobos has been productive of most fatal results, especially since the recent fire configuration which consumed several million barrels of oil. During two months' continuous the best engineering skill has been in effort to control the flow and conserve the oil. Immense earthen reservoirs have been built, but the oil passed over these and spread over a lagoon for several miles. Men and animals are dying from the effects of the noxious gases constantly thrown off by the wells. Cholera, seven leagues distant, and Tampico, sixty-five miles, are experiencing the blackening of metal from this cause, and all ships passing near the well show the effect of the poison gas. Two men with ten miles encountering the current of deadly fumes were instantly killed. The Government has sent to the well three hundred ladders to assist the company to protect the lives and property of the people living in the vicinity.

drank on the road, and induced to vote from two to nine times each in the name of men who were on the list, but who were not in the neighborhood. The deputy returning officer and poll clerk were, of course, suitable persons to hold such a poll, and no Conservative knew that voting was going on until afternoon, when one happened to visit the place.

The whole programme is in line with the "Munroe M." affair, and the other election frauds which killed the Ross Government and which have disgraced Ontario Liberalism. It shows that there is no repentance and no reform, that the old machine is still engaged in its old practices, and has the confidence and protection of the government of Canada.

Number 80 was Mr. Furlonger, who represented Richmond, N.S., in the last House, and is now a judge. Number 81 is Mr. Cyr, late minister for Provencher, Man, now appointed immigration agent in France.

Canadian Women Under the Old Regime.

Not Canada as it is but Canada as it was when it belonged to France is the subject of some lectures which recently were delivered in Ottawa by Charles W. O'By, professor of history in McGill University, and which are now reprinted in a book entitled "Canadian Types of the Old Regime" (Henry Holt & Co.). The author's aim is to discuss various aspects of French colonization, and to secure distinctness. Examples have been drawn, chapter after chapter, from some one individual career. Or rather, a single personage has been made the representative of a class, and in considering the large subject with which he is connected the author has rendered prominent certain features of his experience. Toussaint-Champain stands for the type of the explorer; Brebeuf, for the missionary; D'Iberville, for the soldier; Du Lhut, for the coureur de bois, or private fur trader; Talon, for the intendant; Laval, for the Bishop, and Frontenac for the Governor. The book before us also contains a chapter on the women of New France, and as this is a subject which hitherto has been almost entirely neglected we shall here direct to it particular attention.
