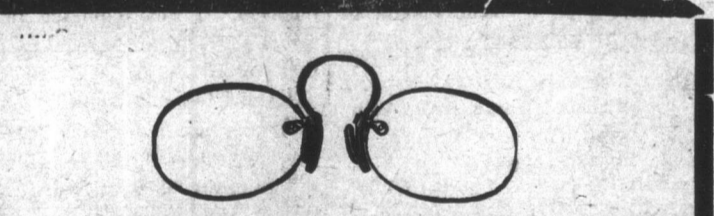

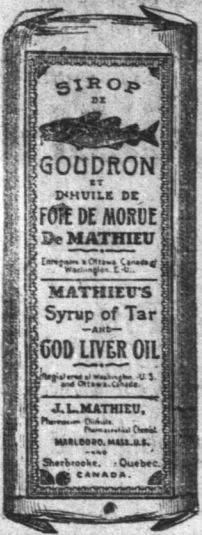

The Evening Chit-Chat

"I'm so discouraged," said the sick lady across the street. "Here I've been delecting and doing without candy and eating eggs, and taking exercises—a n d cold baths, and doing everything else that doctor tells me to, for six months, and I'm nowhere near well. I don't believe he's much good."

The sick lady across the way broke down after six years of overwork. For six years she worked in an office where she had to work overtime three or four days in a week. For six years she abused her stomach by hurried breakfasts, followed by wild dashes for the train and frequent cold and hasty lunches at noon. For six years she failed to take enough exercise and outdoor air. At the end of the time she broke down completely.

And now after six months of hygienic living, she is complaining because she is not entirely well yet.

It takes two or three days to tear down a house that it takes as many weeks to build.

Just why should one expect to reverse the ratio and build up one's body house in about one-hundredth the time it took to tear it down?

And yet how many men and women lose faith in their doctors because they can't accomplish that miracle.

Does it seem exactly san or reasonable or fair?

I heard a woman making a very extravagant purchase the other day. Or rather, I heard her telling about it. It didn't cost her but fifty cents, but I think it was one of the most extravagant purchases I ever heard about.

This was the way of it. We were on shipboard. The lady's ten-year-old son was sick and the stewardess had advised castor oil. "Didn't he make an awful fuss about taking it?" someone questioned. "Oh, no," she answered cheerily. "I suppose he would have, but when he starts to make a fuss, I always tell him I'll give him fifty cents if he will be good, so that's what I did to-day."

Many things lose their value if they are bought. Friendship is one of them and obedience is another. The woman who buys her child's obedience instead of receiving it as her due is making a most extravagant purchase, because she is laying up trouble for herself by every cent she spends that way.

I was telling some one of the incident and my feelings about it. "But I think it was nice to give the little boy fifty cents for taking anything so nasty as castor oil," she protested. "I don't see why he shouldn't have a reward."

Neither do I. But that wasn't a reward. It was a bribe. He wasn't given it because he had been good. He was offered it on condition he would be good.

And I think there's a world of difference between those two.

The British Advertiser

Something more than Hard Facts in His Appeal to the Public.

In newspaper advertising the English are certainly ahead of the Americans in Advertisements that make a distinct personal appeal in "Situations Wanted" and "Help Wanted" their advertisements have a decided literary quality that is lacking in those of this country. There is same-ness about most American advertisements. Take for instance, the familiar lines:

"Stenographer wants position; ten years' experience; \$15; highest references."
"You haven't a glimmering of the art of person who is advertising. You know only that it is a male or female according to the heading of the column."

It is the same with the woman who wants housework. Almost never there any clue to the kind of person who is behind the advertisement. By way of contrast, read the advertisement in the English newspapers. Most romances, of the advertiser's, are in an "ad" taken from a recent issue of the London Times: "Gentlewoman, refined, nice appearance, very reduced circumstances, sires temporary or occasional employment; only expert accomplishment graphology and physiognomy." Imagine, if you can, such an advertisement appearing in the columns of a newspaper in prosaic New York. Now women there would advertise for "reduced circumstances" anywhere, for it is generally believed that order to get employment you must appear to need it. Another London newspaper published this advertisement a few months ago:

"Young man studying for the church must have immediately £20, his whole career is wrecked."
And yet they say the Anglo-Saxons de their emotions.

Still another: "Will any lady or gentleman give employment to young lady left with widowed mother penniless?"

It would be interesting to know what response the following advertisement brought:

"Has anyone a good position, home abroad, to offer man of good birth and education, with no special abilities and no particular merits, save integrity and intelligence?"

Even more urgent is this, recalling a situation of poor Nora in Ibsen's "Doll's House":

"Young wife wanted to know if there is not some kind, wealthy person, who will give her £30 to take invalid husband to the seashore. Unless he can have the trip his life is spoiled of."

Something of the comedy element in this:

"Young married couple without means wish to be adopted by wealthy grandparents."

Even the advertisements of societies take on a more intimate and personal tone than those in American newspapers. The S. P. C. A. might take a leaf from the book of the English organization by copying this advertisement, which is appearing this summer in London papers:

"Remember the Cats.—You are earnestly desired to make provisions for your cats or other pets while your house is empty during the holidays, and so save them from a terrible suffering or starvation or other cruelties when left in empty houses or turned adrift in the streets."

Complain of Motor Cars.

London, Sept. 26.—The Queen has consented to receive a petition from the "Cottage of England" on the subjects of hardships imposed on them by automobilists. The petitioners number 10,000, and they are all women living on the most frequented roads. They claim that their lives are made miserable by automobiles rushing past, endangering the lives of their children and ruining their households by dust. The Queen expressed the greatest sympathy with their complaints.

Evening Telegram Teachers' Meeting.

A meeting of the St. John's Branch of the Newfoundland Teachers Association was held last evening in the Board of Trade Building. Representatives of all the city schools and colleges were present including the teachers of the Manual Training School. An exhibition will be prepared illustrative of the work done at these schools as per request of the Manufacturers, made through Mr. J. Browning who was present at the meeting. He delivered an excellent practical speech and dwelt on the fact that from similar exhibitions in other cities great benefit had accrued to the communities in which they were held, as well as to the schools and teachers directly interested. He had seen several exhibitions of this kind in Canada where the great benefits of industrial training was brought home to the minds of the people in a way that made right impression.

The Herring Fishery.

This morning the senior organ of the Government, the Daily News, announces the policy of the Government in reference to the forthcoming herring fishery at Bay of Islands. The course followed the first few seasons will be continued this fall. Although the Hague Tribunal has definitely settled the competency of Newfoundland to fish for Americans within Newfoundland territorial waters, no advantage will be taken this fall of the decision in our favour. These valuable concessions will be continued to Americans gratuitously. This policy was not unexpected. Indeed it had been foreshadowed in the outside press almost a fortnight ago by one who is in the confidence of the Government. Here is the message:—

"ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 23.—The present conditions governing the winter herring fishery in the Bay of Islands probably will remain unchanged during the coming winter. Pending the appointment of any commission authorized by the recent Hague decision to determine the fairness of the local fishery, regulations made by the Newfoundland Government. It is understood that the Colonial Government will not attempt to subject American fishermen to any additional regulations. Why the outside world is taken into the confidence of the Government before the people of Newfoundland is a mystery. This is but one of a number of instances where this has occurred. The course adopted is a strange one and does not savour of what one might expect from a Government supported by a People's Party. For ways that are dark and tricks that are vain, The heathen Chinese is peculiar. And so is the Government."

He was taken on board the a.s. Ethie at Trinity yesterday and brought to Carbonear.

REID Nfld. Co. The Argyle left Burin at 2 p.m. yesterday going west. The Bruce arrived at Port aux Basques at 8.05 a.m. to-day. The Clyde left Change Islands at 6.15 p.m. yesterday and is due at Lewisport to-morrow. The Ethie left Carbonear at 6.45 a.m. to-day. The Home is due at Bay of Islands from the north. The Invermore left King's Cove this morning from the Labrador.

Two Crops of Hay.

It is not often that a farmer can be seen mowing hay on the 5th of Oct. in Newfoundland, yet such was the sight people witnessed this morning as they passed Sydney, the residence of Geo. H. Hutchings, Esq., on Portugal Cove Road. The first crop was cut on the 30th of July and so prolific was the second growth that the servant man instead of using the scythe found that it would be necessary to use mowing machines. Yesterday forenoon Mr. Hutchings had a second crop and certainly never before did he raise such excellent hay. Not bad for Newfoundland, whose soil is supposed by many to be anything but fertile.

An excellent supper was served to which the guests did ample justice. All the guests were delighted with the hospitality extended to them by Mr. and Mrs. Freilich. This morning service was at the Oddfellows Hall and prayers were recited, including a special prayer for King George the 5th.

Elaborate Plans Being Made for the Coronation. Many Crown Princes to Attend—Mr. Roosevelt Expected to Head American Mission. So far as the arrangements for the Coronation have been discussed at present there will be a torchlight tattoo of the troops at Aldershot on the night of Saturday, June 27th next, when the King and Queen will be in residence at the new Royal Pavilion, says Modern Society. This will be followed by the great review of the troops of the garrison, which is fixed for the following Monday. Their Majesties will return to London immediately upon the conclusion of this, and will that evening give the first state dinner party of the several that are to be held at Buckingham Palace.

At this will be present such of the distinguished guests as have then arrived for the Coronation, as well as representatives of the different Services and other officials at home. The gala performance at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, will take place on the eve of the Coronation. Following the service at Westminster Abbey will come the Royal progress through London, when the route followed will be substantially the same as that taken by King Edward and Queen Alexandra after their crowning. The events of the following day will see a State Ball at Buckingham Palace.

Review of Army and Navy. Friday may be devoted to a review of the London units of the Territorial Army in Hyde Park, or on the Horse Guards parade, while the week's ceremonies will be brought to an end on Saturday by a Royal review of the combined ships of the Home and Atlantic Fleets off Spithead. Every ship in commission in home waters will take part in this, and it will take the Royal yacht some considerable time to pass through the lines of the war vessels. At night the fleet will be illuminated from end to end, while there will be a fine display of fireworks upon a mammoth scale on the Southsea Common.

Room will have to be found in the week's lengthy programme for the reception of addresses at Buckingham Palace from those numerous bodies that have the right to present themselves to the Throne on such occasions, and the King and Queen will be kept constantly engaged in receiving calls from the distinguished visitors who will be assembled in London, and in returning them. Visits to Scotland, Ireland and Wales will follow quickly on the heels of the Coronation as possible, and it is anticipated that before 1911 is at an end their Majesties will have visited every one of the four corners of the United Kingdom.

Array of Crown Princes. It is not usual at a Coronation for foreign crowned heads to attend, and thus it will probably be found that the only reigning monarch to be present at the crowning of King George V. in addition to the King of Norway, who will attend by reason of his close connection with the English Royal Family, will be the King of Spain. Most of the other monarchs of Europe will be represented by their heirs. Thus there will be a very notable array of Crown Princes present, including those of Germany, Greece, Sweden, Denmark, and Italy. England will be represented by the Grand Duke Michael of Portugal by the Duke of Oporto, the Netherlands by the Prince Consort, and France by its Foreign Minister. It is not yet known who will represent the King of the

Belgians, and there is just a possibility that King Albert will decide to attend in person. A Special Mission is expected to arrive from the United States, and Mr. Roosevelt is fairly certain to be at its head. His Majesty has not lost sight of the fact that some amount of disappointment was caused at the funeral of the late King owing to the preponderance of the military element, and he will take care that this approach cannot be levelled at his Coronation. Special places will be allotted in Westminster Abbey to the heads of every profession and calling, and special attention will be paid to the accommodation provided for the Members of the House of Commons.

From Labrador. The Danish scho. Harvis arrived here this morning from Dark Tickle, Labrador, with 1,850 quats. codfish. She could not obtain a full cargo there and will take the residue here and sail to Europe. The vessel left there on the 26th ult, and had very rough weather on the run. She had to shelter at Trinity on Saturday last. She is consigned to Job Bros. & Co., which firm will give her the balance of her cargo.

The S.S. Leontes. We learn from Hon. E. R. Bowring that there is an extensive strike amongst the dockers of Glasgow, and as a result it is feared that some delay will occur in the building of the new S.S. Leontes. It is hoped, however, that she will be delivered in time to come out here and prosecute the seal fishery next spring.

In Germany this question has now been answered. To the village of Zarkau, near Glogau, in Silesia, must be given the honor of installing a system of automatic electric lighting for the streets. The electric lights burn every night from the outskirts of Glogau through the village of Zarkau until ten o'clock at a mutual cost to the community in general. Then they are switched out. At each end of this stretch, on an iron pillar, stands a small iron cupboard lighted by a tiny electric light. Those persons who are out after ten o'clock wishing to have their way lighted must insert a tenpenny piece into a slot in the side of the iron cupboard. Then the nine lamps placed along this stretch burst forth into a twelve-minute life, thus enabling the passenger to find his way in lightness to his house.—New York Tribune.

The Voyage of the S. S. Beothic.

The s.s. Beothic, which arrived here yesterday from Boston, will lay up to be thoroughly cleaned and overhauled. Mr. Whitney, who came here, went to Brigus to-day where he will be the guest of Capt. Bob Bartlett. The summer was agreeably spent by the party cruising the western coast of Greenland and Ellesmere Land, where with the help of Eskimos they had two months' exciting work hunting walrus, musk ox, bear, foxes and Arctic hare. The ship then sailed north as far as Kane Basin, where an impenetrable barrier of ice was met and they had to turn back. The Beothic came back by way of Ellesmere Land and the party had great sport killing big game. The plan was to capture some of the animals alive for the Zoo, and for this purpose the lasso was used. Several were secured in this way, but some of them were maimed and killed in being hoisted on board. A large number of polar bears and musk oxen also fell before the rifles of Messrs. Whitney and Rainey. Being fully satisfied with the result of the trip, Capt. Bartlett left Cape York Sept. 1st for home, and reached Boston on the 11th, after touching at Bristol, Rhode Island. The live game was carefully taken on shore for the Zoological Gardens, viz., six musk oxen, two bears, two walrus and two Arctic foxes, which are now on exhibition in Bronx Park. A moving show picture man who accompanied the party secured 31,000 feet of film, showing some of the most interesting sights that are to be seen in the Arctic regions, including the hunting and capture of the wild animals. When the Beothic arrived at Boston it was found necessary to effect repairs to her bows, where heavy ice had caused several bad "squats" near the waterline. All the crew are Newfoundlanders. They are well pleased with the trip and speak in high terms of the treatment given them on the ship.

His inability to enter his machine was due to a movers' strike in Paris, delaying its departure, and a slow boat which landed at New York one day late.

VLADKAVAKAZ, Oct. 4.
Troops sent in pursuit of the victorious brigand Zelim Khan, were ambushed by his band, and a rural captain, three officers and twelve soldiers were killed, and many others injured. Reinforcements have been sent against the outlaws, but the absence of roads in the mountain fastness hampers the operations. The depredations of Zelim Khan have been on such an extended scale that the authorities were compelled to detail three companies of Infantry and a company of Cossacks to run down the marauders. The expedition tracked the band to the border of Tiflis Province and surrounded its camp which was pitched in an almost inaccessible gorge; the soldiers succeeded in capturing Zelim's family, his cattle and much booty, but further pursuit of the outlaws resulted in a reverse when the soldiers fell into an ambush.

Municipal Matters.

How Did It Happen?

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir.—In my last letter I endeavored to show that the number of depraved organisms discovered by analysis of the Windsor Lake water did not warrant a peremptory condemnation of our water supply as dangerous or unwholesome, but that no serious danger was threatened except in the event of its being proved that the condition of affairs found to be existing at the time of the drought was attributable to an inflow of sewage from the houses and farms on the lakeside, and that that condition was likely to become permanent. I now push my argument a stage in advance and maintain the proposition that the malevolent germs found, to be inhabiting the Lake water at the time the analysis was made owe their existence in no degree to sewage pollution, but solely to circumstances which were adventitious and temporary and created within the body of the Lake itself or no higher up on the shore than the water line. In support of the proposition I shall appeal to the evidence of facts which are very generally known, and draw inferences from them which will, I hope, carry conviction to the minds of those who, though inexperienced as myself in matters of sanitary science, are yet capable of drawing a sound conclusion from well understood premises. In this letter I must content myself with showing how entirely unlikely it is that the Lake should become polluted from houses or farm buildings on the shore emptying their pollution into the water; in my next I shall state the facts which seem to me to demonstrate the source whence the pollution actually did come. Anyone who thinks for a moment upon the physical conditions existing in the neighbourhood of Windsor Lake must be impressed with the opinion that the ground in that locality is singularly unfavourable to the percolation of water. This Lake and

the neighbourhood of the Lake are sufficiently distant from the shore to protect the water from sewage pollution percolating through such dense ground. In such soil what nuisance exists is restrained within very contracted limits, and the rise of the land is such that nothing less than a torrential flood could wash any of it into the Lake. Furthermore, the configuration and physical characteristics of the ground are of a nature which makes it easy to divert from the direction of the Lake any drainage from which infection may be feared. If, when the fears of the Council were aroused, they had taken any steps to divert the flow from cess-pools or other sources of nuisances away from the Lake, we should have applauded them for taking a most proper precaution. But because they took no steps of the sort but lay indifferent for two years while a condition of affairs which they themselves advised regard, or pretend to regard as dangerous continues to exist with unimpeded activity, I think I am justified in holding them blame-worthy in a high degree. Such precautions as I have indicated would not only have been cheap, but they would have been effective. It is, I contend, a perfectly simple matter so to police the Lake as to prevent all danger of pollution from houses or farms, and if authority were needed in order to enforce such policing, it could as readily have been got from the Legislature as the authority to spend the large sum of money which is now, it seems clear, to be devoted to buying out the farmers was. And if in enforcing such a policing of the Lake a house or a stable or two had to be removed, the cost would be a fraction of what we shall now be called upon to bear. I ask my readers now to consider the fact which must be well known to most of them, that the streams which flow into the Lake are exceedingly few in number and insignificant in volume, so that the work of protecting the Lake from pollution through that source must be very light indeed. In addition to the foregoing facts, I adduce the remarkable one which Dr. Tait has drawn to my attention, that the time when this pollution was supposed to have entered Windsor Lake through the medium of sewage percolating through the soil was the very time of all times when such a pollution was rendered impossible. 
