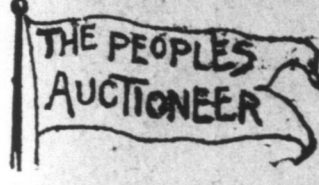

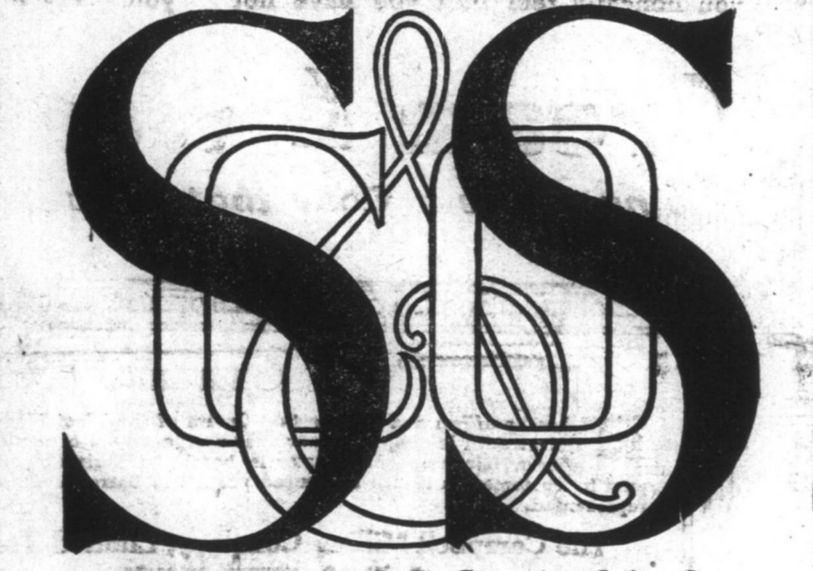

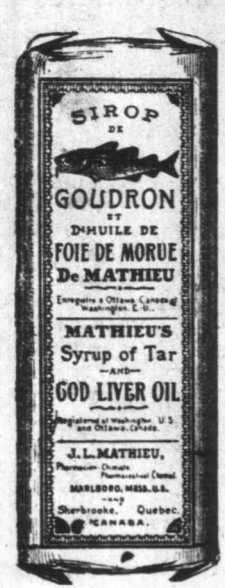

White Woman in Africa

4,000 Miles to Visit Grave of Explorer.

Miss Olive MacLeod, daughter of Sir Reginald MacLeod, late Permanent Under-Secretary for Scotland, reached England yesterday from Central Africa, where she has accomplished a tour of close upon 4,000 miles into the barely known regions of the interior. This great journey was made with the private object of visiting the spot at Maifoni where Lieutenant Boyd Alexander, the explorer, to whom Miss MacLeod was engaged, lies buried. Miss MacLeod left England in August last.

For six months Miss MacLeod, with her companions, Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Talbot, journeyed in a land where a white woman had not before penetrated; and during four months the route was in a region new even to Englishmen. Much of the time they made their way on foot along the scarcely traceable native tracks through the bush.

MACLEOD FALLS. Miss MacLeod in a statement given to this journal yesterday said: "French Ubangi was reached in October last, and after a great reception by the Lam'do at Lere, a successful attempt was made to find the falls on the Mau Kabi which by the testimony of French officials and natives had never been actually seen before. After this success the French authorities asked permission to name the falls 'Les Chutes MacLeod.' At Lake Chad an excursion was made to the north to visit the extraordinarily picturesque rocks of Had-el-Hanis, which are venerated for hundreds of miles around and even at Mecca as the spot on which Noah's Ark rested. Though the natives declared it an impossible feat, we climbed the highest peak. Lake Chad was crossed in canoes, and it took eight days, of which five were spent without a sight of land."

Among the things Miss MacLeod has brought back are two little lion cubs, which were three months old when they were given to her as a present. On the journey these lions refused to be led and had to be carried by natives, having a far easier time that the travellers. Miss MacLeod wanted to bring them back to her home near Maidstone, but by the time the Nile was reached they had grown too large for park companions, and were transferred to the Zoological Gardens. She has also obtained a unique collection of native house curios and weapons, with detailed drawings of the inside of strange native dwellings, and samples of primitive art.

Looks Ominous.

It is to be hoped that the strike at Southampton is not the beginning of that gigantic maritime strife which has been threatened for many months past. It would be a pity to mar the Coronation rejoicing by a great international strike which would tie up the chief shipping of the world. Its effect might be far-reaching, for not only would those passing to and fro along the sea ways be inconvenienced, but it might have the effect of raising food prices in Great Britain to famine rates. For it must be remembered that Great Britain is dependent almost wholly on sea borne traffic for its food. What might happen in war if the sea-ways were not maintained by a supreme British Navy, may be demonstrated convincingly by a great maritime strike.

The horrors of the cotton famine are not yet forgotten in South Lancashire, where millions were kept out of work, because of the cutting off of the supply of raw cotton grown on American cotton fields for the Lancashire cotton mills. This occurred when the North blockaded the ports of the Southern States in the Civil War. It may demonstrate to Great Britain the risk of depending so much on the outside world for that which keeps up its vitality and feeds its millions.

M. G. B. Parade.

The largest number of the Methodist Guard Brigade for some time paraded in the armoury last night. A number of gentlemen sympathizers with the Corps were present, and at the conclusion of drill the lads were addressed by Major Hutchings, who denied the rumor that had been circulated to the effect that the Guards would be disbanded owing to the inter-battalion dispute. We hear that innovations will be made which will add greatly to the strength and efficiency of the Guards.

Dreadful Accident.

Passengers who arrived by the s.s. Fogota this morning tell of a dreadful accident that occurred to James Lane, of Fogota Island, last Tuesday. He was out shooting sea birds in a punt with Thos. Wick and Missach Down. He had the gun cocked lying on the thwart. He was the act of hauling his oar across to take up the gun and fire at a bird when the motion of the boat brought the hammer in contact with the side of the thwart and striking it down on the cap the gun went off. The contents, a heavy load of bird shot, entered his back just below the right hip. His companions thought at first that he was killed. He swooned, but recovered when they gave him a drink. They then stripped the wound, weather turned very cold and the wounded man suffered terribly from the cold. He had to be lifted out of the boat like a dead body. He was taken to his home and Dr. Smith and Dr. Jamieson were both called. After working two hours over him they succeeded in extracting—they believe—all the shot. They dressed the wound, and Thursday when the Fogota was coming back the crew heard that Lane was doing well and had a good chance of recovery. The doctors said that the effects of the chill on the long return journey was almost as bad in its results as the shot wounds.

Diana From the Straits

The S. S. Diana, Capt. Jos. Blandford, arrived here from the straits at midnight. The ship left Monday week and had partly fine weather on the run down. She met the heavy arctic ice midway between Bacallies and Green Bay on to Groais Islds, and took the run inside thus avoiding the necessity of penetrating the floe. The ice extended down to Red Bay and she reached Blanc Sablon on Friday the 2nd inst., leaving Lance au Loup on the return run on Wednesday at 2 p.m. She had a good run up and called at Wesleyville yesterday where she took a new motor launch in tow for Mr. Tasker Cook. She met some schooners going down the straits near Blanc Sablon and also passed the Beothic in the straits. She forced through about 30 miles of ice coming back between Red Bay and the south of Groais Islands. She landed 260 fishermen for Job Bros. at Lance au Loup, Forteau, Greenly Island and Isle au Bois, and reports that cod has not yet made its appearance in that section.

Reports filtering into the city from various sources say that more than a thousand persons were killed, and twice that number were injured, whilst scores of villages have been destroyed as the result of Wednesday's earthquake.

Queen Mary has decided that the Gift of the Marys, which aggregated \$60,000, shall be used for the purchase of her insignia of the order of the Garter in diamonds, and for portraits of King Edward and the Prince of Wales.

"Captain-General Blanco and his staff did not relish having a hostile warship in such an advantageous position in the event of war with the United States, which they regarded as a possibility, and it was decided to blow her up under such conditions as might make it appear she had been destroyed by the accidental explosion of her own magazines. A large boiler from the Navy Yards was taken to the Arsenal and filled with powder. It was provided with mechanism by which it could be exploded by electricity, and then hermetically sealed. The boiler was lashed in a sling under a lighter, which was towed across the bow of the Maine at night. When the lighter was directly in front of the battleship the lines which held the boiler were cut and it dropped into the mud. The explosion by which the mine was exploded was led to the end of Nachina Wharf. At a favourable time Boynton was taken to the spot, and turned the switch which blew the battleship into smithereens."

Action For Slander. The plaintiff charges that the defendant, Friedman uttered words in Bell Island in Dec. last to the effect that the plff. set fire to his shop on Bell Island, to get his insurance. The plff. was hampered thereby, in collecting his insurance and had to sue for it and received \$2,673, which was substantially the full amount—Friedman soon afterwards left the country and did not face the trial of the slander action which came before the court and a special jury to-day. Several witnesses were examined, who proved that Friedman had spoken the words complained of and also that he (Friedman), has posed as a detective or policeman in Bell Island. The jury retired at 12.45 to consider their verdict and came into court again at 1 o'clock with a verdict for the plaintiff for \$500.

Short of Food. BLANC SABLON ON VERGE OF STARVATION. We learn by the Diana that for the past few months the people of Blanc Sablon were very short of food, and when the steamer arrived there they were on the verge of starvation, most of the families being on an allowance to husbands, while the little food they had remaining to keep life in them until succour should arrive. Mr. Grant, who went along on the Diana, supplied them with necessaries when he arrived, and had the ship been delayed by ice, it is not impossible that some would have succumbed to the privation caused by lack of food. At Lance au Loup and other places no such destitution existed.

SEALS IN STRAITS.—During the month of May old seals were plentiful in the Straits, we learn by the Diana, and fairly good catches were made. One man named Davis killed 100 and others from 30 to 50. The seals were about there up to a short while before the steamer arrived.

Council Meeting.

A full Board was in attendance last night. The complaint of James Harris about the crossing in front of the Board of Works Office will be attended to by the Engineer. The question of taking down the fence between the Colonial Building and the Park will be dealt with very soon.

The Harbor Master reported that the owner of the submerged schooner in Rogerson's Cove promised to remove her shortly. Permission was given the Children's Festival Committee to use the Park for the procession on Coronation Day.

The complaint of Henry Blatch re the failure of the watering car men to sprinkle Long's Hill will be attended to by the Engineer. It was also said that the drains there had not been flushed for two weeks. The man in charge of the sprinkler on being asked about this said that with the outfit available it was not possible to sprinkle Long's Hill. The cars were too heavy for the horses to draw.

The statement of Mr. Blatch that refuse was being left on the street there for two days was contradicted by the Sanitary Inspector. The Sanitary Supervisor reported that the horses imported recently for the Council were in good condition. Councillor Ryan said that he doubted this.

Mr. T. C. Morris sent in a letter drawing the attention of the Council to the condition of the fence around Parade Street School. James Anderson asked the Council to prohibit the people who run the Chinese laundries on Gowar Street from using gasoline. The petition was referred to the Police Department.

W. Knight asked for arbitration on the Cullen property, Banbrick St. Referred to the Solicitor. Permission was given to Thomas Bros. to lay crossing over King's Bridge Road, also to R. Purcell to repair house on Walsh's Square; to Mary Mullings to repair house on Parade Street; to M. Bennet to repair house on Water Street; to Mrs. Murphy to repair house on Casey Street.

Permission was given to J. Carberry, Freshwater Road, and George Berry, Power Street, to erect houses. The requests of R. Bartlett, of Hamilton Street, and P. Murphy, of Plank Road, to build a back kitchen were referred to the Engineer.

The dumping of refuse near the Cross Roads, complained of by the Health Officer, was ordered to be stopped. The report on health showed that there are four cases of scarlet fever and sixteen cases of diphtheria in the city.

In response to recent complaints, some of the business men on Water Street who have suggested that they be asked to raise them higher. Councillor Mullaly again introduced the question of the need of a public wharf, which he showed would be a great convenience to the citizens. He proposed that the Council approach the Government on the subject.

Councillor Ryan proposed the motion on the grounds that it was the duty of the Government to provide the wharf out of the Marine grant. There being no seconder, the motion was dropped.

Councillors Coaker, Myrick and Mullaly were appointed to see about the erection of the market. After passing pay rolls the meeting adjourned.

Cable News.

LONDON, To-Day. The Stock Exchange is practically unaffected by the suspension of the Bank of High Holborn with liabilities of \$1,333,091. Small numbers of depositors gathered about the Bank and have been there since day-break, but the crowd when at its largest was less than 1,000. Pathetic scenes were witnessed in the neighborhood of the suspended institution all day. Many depositors were elderly men and women, whose whole life-savings were behind the closed doors. An authoritative statement given out by the directors to the effect that the bulk of the deposits are amply secured, had a reassuring effect. According to general opinion, the suspension will not be so much of a disaster as was at first feared.

SOUTHAMPTON, To-Day. A strike of coal porters broke out yesterday. The steamer St. Paul scheduled to sail to New York will be delayed. The White Star Liner, Olympic, had a difficulty in obtaining a crew. A whole fleet of ships, chartered by the Government and others for the naval review, are laying off the port unable to take coal.

NEW YORK, To-Day. America crushed England's hope of regaining the International Polo Cup at Meadow Brook yesterday, when a throng of continually thrilled spectators saw four of the challenging British cavalry officers' general Assembly manoeuvre and finally defeated by a score of 4 1/2 to 3 1/2.

OTTAWA, To-Day. The Queen's University at Kingston will be separated from the Presbyterian Church of Canada. After a discussion the Presbyterian General Assembly in session here approved of the recommendation of the Board of Trustees. A vote to that effect stood 132 to 72.
