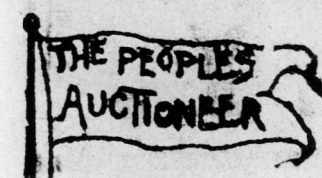

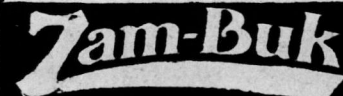

Treating One's Relatives Like Friends.

A little girl, perhaps eight or nine years old, came skipping out on the veranda of the hotel where I was staying this summer, and exchanged greetings with a man who stood looking out across the mountains.

"Good morning," said the little girl, "how do you do this morning?"

"Why, good morning," said the man, turning towards her with evident pleasure. "I'm fine as silk, thank you. I'm trying to make up my mind whether it's going to rain or clear off. What do you think?"

The youngster took a look at the clouds and with youthful optimism promptly decided that it was going to clear off, then she put her hand in his and still chatting sociably, they walked down the veranda. Just as they passed out of ear-shot I had a shock; I heard the little girl call the big man papa.

Why was that a shock? Because they had been talking together with so much evident pleasure, so much sociability, that I had never occurred to me that father and daughter could be their relationship. I had fancied the man was a hotel acquaintance or possibly an uncle.

Nor was this an unaccountable mistake of mine. I am sure you would have been deceived in just the same way. For if you will take notice, I think you will find that you seldom hear members of the same family talking to each other with the same sociability, the same courtesy, the same interest with which they would talk to outsiders.

A little boy I used to know once

gave a most naive proof of this fact. He had taken a deep interest in two of his mother's guests, and after they had gone, he asked his mother what relation to each other they were. She told him that they were husband and wife. "Are you sure?" he asked. "Of course," she said, much astonished at his doubts; "Why?" "Well," answered the youngster, "I didn't think they could be, because even when you were out of the room they talked a lot to each other just like—why just like friends."

There is no doubt whatever that ninety-nine people out of a hundred have a totally different tone of voice and manner for their family from that which they use for their friends. Notice when some member of your family goes from the family circle to the telephone—surely a whole jar of honey has been suddenly upset into her voice—there is such an astonishing change in it.

Or mark how differently father speaks to mother and the maid when something is wrong in the household economy. Not that he prefers the maid to mother—it is simply because the maid is an outsider and, therefore, entitled to a decently pleasant voice and a measure of courtesy, even when fault must be found.

Now, of course, I realize that it is not either possible or desirable to treat one's family exactly as one does outsiders. When the train reached Huntsville, deputy sheriffs were summoned and a posse organized to search the territory around where the men left the train.

MORRIS' DUPLICITY.

Yesterday we exposed the conflicting claims put up by Sir Edward Morris in reference to what the Tories call the Secret Letter. We showed that in appealing for the confidence of the country and the defeat of Sir Robert Bond, he not only made use of arguments he knew to be unsound, but he used fiction as facts, and that all this could be proved to be so by words which had proceeded out of his own mouth.

We showed that in one of the appeals issued he claimed that a Secret Letter had cost the Colony \$1,250,000. Now, Sir Edward never was and never is strong on figures or finance. The country has had many illustrations of his weakness in respect of exact measures of value. When he entered into the contract for the building of the branch railways, he had the most exact idea of the length of the lines he agreed to pay for. He had also a most erroneous idea of the financial risks he was thrusting on the country.

He agreed to pay the contractors in cash instead of bonds, and he showed an absolute lack of grasp of the figures which would measure the obligation cast upon the country, when he led his supporters to believe that his first railway loan of \$4,000,000 sterling would pay for the completed railways. Those who had put their faith in Morris's ability to grasp financial propositions received a staggering blow when he introduced his second loan Bill in the House, and they got a second shock when they found how badly Morris had been left in the rotation of that loan. They will receive a third shock when they find that the two loans will not pay for the completed branch lines.

This, however, is strictly in accord with his recklessness in dealing with figures and finances, and the statement that the "Secret Letter" cost the Colony a million and a quarter dollars is an example of his reckless use of figures. The letter under reference was used only in the Lyttelton Arbitration. Now the total award in that arbitration was about \$800,000.

Even if the total award had been due to that letter, it could not have cost the Colony \$4,000,000 more than the total award. The original accusation made by Mr. Watson was that the letter had cost the Colony \$300,000. When Morris came out, the figures were magnified and the amount was multiplied by four and an odd fifty thousand and thrown in as a tilley.

But as we showed yesterday, the accusation of Watson was refuted by Morris himself, who stated the letter had nothing to do with creating this liability.

Mrs. Roberts came to Gloucester from Pimlico, near Yarmouth, N.S. The murder of Mrs. Roberts is a very mysterious one. She had been missing from her home two weeks. On the night of the day she disappeared, fishermen at Manchester heard a woman's screams as they roved past a yacht in Manchester harbor, where revelry was going on.

Murder of a Family.

Lisbon, Sept. 12.—News has been received here of a crime, involving the death of seven members of one family, in the village of Monte Valepaio, in the Province of Alentejo.

While returning from washing linen in a river a woman was murdered with her five children, the mother being killed with her baby in her arms. The other four children, two little girls and two boys, were found dead a short distance from each other, all with their throats cut. A little later the father was discovered murdered.

A former neighbour of the family is being pursued by troops, and his farm is watched, as the eldest son of the murdered family is working there and the murderer may seek to put him to death also.—Reuter.

Fatal Accident at Bell Island.

Patrick Scurry, a Native of St. John's, fell off Ore Car and had Two Legs Crushed—Injuries Prove Fatal.

Yesterday a serious accident occurred at the Nova Scotia Company's pier at Bell Island, in which Patrick Scurry, aged 62, and a native of St. John's, had both his legs almost crushed to a pulp. He was brought to the General Hospital and arrived there at 11 o'clock last night where he died from injuries received after a lapse of three hours.

The facts as gleaned to-day by a Telegram reporter are: The victim, Patrick Scurry, who is an employee of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company was off from work on a week's holiday. He had made arrangements to go through the mines of the Nova Scotia Company for the purpose of witnessing the work carried on and yesterday after his dinner left home to pay his visit. He proceeded to the Scotia's pier which was reached about four o'clock, and got upon an empty ore car which runs to the mines. Shortly after the car was in motion Scurry was thrown off and almost instantaneously another car, which was coming out of the mines in an opposite direction and filled with ore, passed over the lower limbs of his body, crushing and mangling them fearfully. The victim was picked up in an apparently lifeless state and tenderly borne to a nearby residence. The Company's physician, Dr. Ireland, who was called into requisition, pronounced Scurry's injuries to be of a dangerous character and advised that he be sent to the General Hospital. In the meantime the physician gave the best treatment he could to the patient who did not regain consciousness. Inspector General Sullivan at this end was acquainted with the accident by telephone and asked to have a conveyance ready at 8 o'clock at Portugal Cove to meet the patient, who was accompanied by Dr. Ireland. On arrival at the pier, he was taken to the special ambulance, which left the city in charge of cabman M. Kelly. After he was transferred from the Bell Island steamer to the ambulance Scurry was in a critical condition and received the unremitting care and attention of Dr. Ireland en route to the Hospital, which was reached at

11 o'clock. Up to this the injured man was unconscious. At two o'clock this morning he succumbed to his injuries, death being due to the awful shock. The sad occurrence has created sympathy in St. John's as well as on Bell Island. The deceased was an employee for many years with the firm of Goodridge & Sons, and later carried on a fish business for two years on the Southern Shore. Subsequently he went to Bell Island where he brought his wife and family to reside. To the bereaved family, relatives and friends the Telegram joins in the much sympathy expressed.

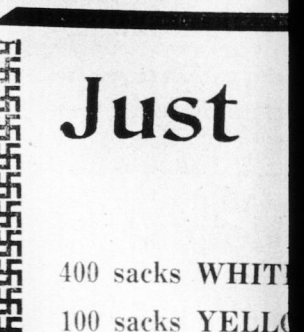
