#### Mr. Richard Cashin

DIES AT THE HOSPITAL.

Mr. Richard Cashin, third son of Hon. M. P. and Mrs. Cashin, who broke his leg at Cape Broyle, on Wednesday last and was removed to the General Hospital on the same day, passed peacefully away at 5.30 yesterday afternoon. Early yesterday morning deceased was found to be suffering from pneumonia caused by his having lain for over one hour on the wet ground on the day of the accident. At 6.30 a.m. yesterday he became unconscious, and despite the skill of Malley, the specialist who had been attending Sir Wm. Reid, and of Drs. Keegan, Anderson, Cowperthwaite and McDonald, he passed away at the time mentioned. Rev. Fr. Du bourdieu was called to his bed-side and administered the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church. Deceased was only 24 years of age and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was educated at St. Bonaventure's College where he had a brilliant career. Leaving school he was attached to the Bank of Nova Scotis here and was later transferred to the branch at New Waterford, N.S. Last year he returned to Cape Broyle and assisted in his father's business. Left to mourn are three brothers, Lieut. Peter now in charge of a machine gun section of a British Regiment in France; Lawrence and Martin at Cape Broyle, and one sister, Miss Mary Cashin of this city.
