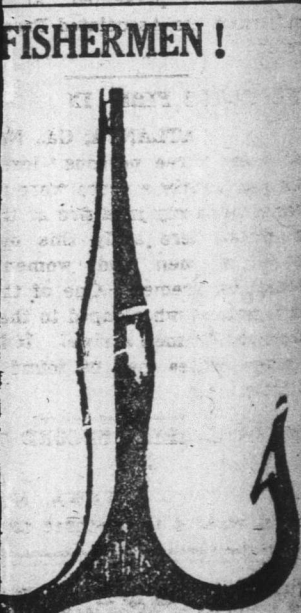

Peace Treaty Ratified By Austrians.

Big Blaze in Atlanta, Ga.—Finland Will Not Discuss Peace With Bolsheviki.

THE STRIKE SITUATION.
CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 7. New restrictions on use of soft coal were announced today, the sixth day of the miners' strike. In some localities orders were more drastic than during the war, but the general situation showed little change. While the production in West Virginia and Colorado was reported to be increasing since yesterday, there was no noticeable change in the ranks of four hundred and twenty-five thousand striking miners.

SHIPPING AFFECTED.
NEW YORK, Nov. 7. There are two hundred and ten ships in the port of New York affected by the order of the railroad administration control coal committee regarding the discontinuance of foreign tonnage bunkering. Many of these, however, are British vessels which will be able to proceed to Halifax for coal. During the Longshoremen's strike it was pointed out that many British liners were sent to Canadian ports for fuel. Shipping officials were unable to say what course was open to vessels of other nationalities which may be unable to clear, although there is a possibility that some of these will also be able to reach Halifax.

BOLSHEVIK SUCCESSES.
HELSINGFORS, Nov. 7. The Estonian bureau learns that enticement of a greater number of his troops after suffering heavy losses, but that 400 forces in the region of Gatchina and Luga were completely cut off by the Bolsheviki cavalry.

RATIFICATION HANDED TO CONFEREES.
PARIS, Nov. 7. The Austrian Delegation has handed to the Peace Conference a ratification document of the treaty of St. Germain.

KING OF HUNGARY.
BERLIN, Nov. 7. A wireless message received here from Vienna reports that Archduke Otto is about to be proclaimed King of Hungary.

WILL NOT DISCUSS PEACE.
HELSINGFORS, Nov. 7. Finland does not intend to discuss peace with the Bolsheviki and will not be officially represented at Dorpat Conference of the Associated Press is informed.

DISASTROUS FIRE IN ATLANTA.
ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 7. At least three persons lost their lives and nearly a score were injured, several seriously in a fire at the Willson Hotel here early this morning. Scores of men and women were rescued by firemen. One of the dead was a woman who leaped to the street before the firemen arrived. It is feared more bodies may be found in the building.

SENATE CARRIES SECOND READING.
OTTAWA, Nov. 7. By a vote of thirty-three to thirty-

five, the Senate early this morning rejected the amendment of Senator Ross, Halifax, providing for postponement of consideration of Grand Trunk Bill until next session. The second reading was then carried on same division.

NO PUBLIC HOLIDAY.
OTTAWA, Nov. 7. No public holiday will be proclaimed by the Government on Armistice Day, November 11th, according to the Secretary of State Department.

WILSON AGREES TO RESERVATION.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. President Wilson to-day told Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, administration leader in the Senate's Treaty fight, that he would be entirely satisfied with any reservations supported by the League of Nations Covenant and were designed for the purpose of interpreting the terms of the Treaty.

GERMAN SCHOOLS TO CONTINUE.
WARSAW, Nov. 7. The Polish Government, in conformity with the terms of the Peace Treaty, has consented to the continuance of German schools in the former Prussian part of Poland, in which the German population may continue their studies.

WILL WELCOME PRINCE.
LONDON, Nov. 7. The proposal, it is understood of the Canadian community here is to give the Prince of Wales a formal welcome home in recognition of his remarkable tour of the Dominion. The English newspapers give the Prince's speech at Toronto considerable prominence.

AUTOS FORBIDDEN.
DUBLIN, Nov. 7. A proclamation has been issued by the Commander-in-Chief of the Forces forbidding the owning or keeping of an automobile or motor cycle in Ireland, except by special permission. The order will become operative on November 15th.

THE COAL STRIKE SITUATION.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. An eleven-hour effort by Samuel Gompers to settle the coal strike, was met to-night by emphatic declarations from the Government that injunction proceedings would be dismissed the instant the strike order was withdrawn and not before. This final decision was given to Mr. Gompers heading a delegation of high labor officials at the close of the third conference of the day with Attorney General Palmer and after Mr. Gompers had talked over the telephone with John L. Lewis, acting head of the United Mine Workers of America.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. R. H. McLean, Secretary and Treasurer of the St. Lawrence Sugar Refineries of Canada, which a few days ago offered for sale at an excessive

price two million two hundred and forty thousand pounds of sugar on ships in the harbor, called upon the Food Administrator, Arthur Williams, yesterday, and expressed his regret at the complications caused by his firm's offer, according to the New York World, McLean, who on Wednesday put this sugar on the market at a fair price, added two hundred and eighty thousand pounds to his offer yesterday. The price set by the sugar Equalization Board will be about eleven cents a pound. Williams said.

CONDITION HOPELESS.
BERLIN, Nov. 7. Doctors attending Hugo Haase, declare his condition is hopeless.

DIED FROM WOUNDS.
BERLIN, Nov. 7. Hugo Haase, President of the Independent Socialist Party, died this morning from wounds received Oct. 8th when he was shot three times when entering the Reichstag building.

SWEDEN'S REPLY.
STOCKHOLM, Nov. 7. Sweden's reply to the Allied note concerning imposition of blockade on Soviet Russia, will assert that no connection exists between Sweden and Soviet Russia, that no passports are issued, and that it is necessary for Swedes to obtain special permission of the Swedish Government to travel in Russia.

PEACE TERMS MUST STAND.
PARIS, Nov. 7. In a covering letter of the Allied reply to the Bulgarian delegation representations regarding police terms presented by Bulgaria, it is pointed out that the Bulgarian people cannot be freed from responsibility, and that therefore the decisions of the Peace Conference which have been made upon mature reflection cannot be materially changed. Conditions of peace terms as they were handed to the Bulgarian delegation, the letter sets forth, were not inspired by any idea of vengeance, and the Allies do not intend to make Bulgaria pay for all her past mistakes. They wish only to establish peace, just and lasting and fertile. It is declared, and they remind Bulgaria in this connection that they guarantee her an outlet to the Aegean Sea.

British May Put Tax On All War Profits.

Lord Beaverbrook's Scheme Finds Many Influential Supporters.

British capital is faced with the possibility of a tax on all profits made during the war. The plan has the support of many influential leaders of public opinion; lords and labor men alike are pleading for increased taxation to meet the growing deficit in the nation's finances, and though the plan for a tax on war profits does not find universal approval by any means, it has been seriously regarded by many as the only solution of the problems the Chancellor of the Exchequer must face shortly.

How Government expenditures exceed the revenue is shown by a statement contained in a copyright cable to the Toronto Globe, which gives expenditure to October 11 as £794,682,369; revenue, £482,481,978; deficit to date, £312,200,691. The Times calls on the Government for courageous action to increase the country's revenue, and in the event of inaction asks for the Government's resignation.

Dog in School Bites 12 Girls.
New York, Oct. 31.—Twelve of twenty-five girl pupils in the parochial schools of the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, Putnam and Ralph avenues, Brooklyn, were bitten by a stray dog that wandered into the classroom before the first recess, children ranging from seven to eleven years, were on the verge of panic until Policeman Anderson of the Ralph avenue station attracted by their screams, reached the scene and subdued the animal, which was turned over to the Health Department where it will be determined if it is suffering from rabies.

Suddenly Appears in School.
Where the dog came from or who owns it is a mystery. The animal appeared suddenly in the girls' classroom and began a reign of terror that did not end until fifteen minutes had passed. As it entered the first door on the school floor one of the younger of the girls screamed and the animal sprang at her. The attack started the uproar that passed throughout the department. Running from one room to another the beast stopped at intervals long enough to throw the pupils into excitement bordering on panic and bite one or two every several yards.

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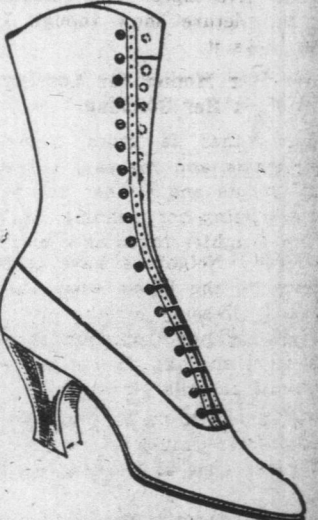

A neighbor of mine has been showing everyone in the neighborhood the present which her daughter gave her on her birthday.

"She is so generous," she says with tears evidently not far from her eyes. "I think I am lucky to have such a generous daughter."

And everyone agrees with her. Inside some of us have our reservations. It was a nice present to be sure—some pretty silk for a gown which the mother sorely needed.

The Facts in the Case.

But—here are the facts in the case. The daughter is a stenographer earning a good salary. She lives at home and pays a board which probably covers the cost of her food and her share of the rent. Her father is elderly and has been retired on half pay and that means that the mother, although she has enough to pay the household bills, has very little spending money.

She would not feel free to go down and buy herself some candy, she would have to stop and think of her fare before she took a trip to the next town to see some dear friends of hers who live there. She seldom goes to the picture show though I know she loves it.

She Scolds Her Mother for Leaving a Hole in Her Stocking.

Now this mother is quite clever with her needle and makes all her daughters' waists and all her underwear besides doing her mending. And all this the daughter takes as a matter of course. Neighbors have told me of being in the house when the daughter was dressing for the evening and hearing her reproach her mother because she had not noticed a hole in one of her silk stockings.

Now will you tell me any reason why the daughter should not pay her mother for the time she spends this way?

If the mother chose to do this sev-

ing for an outsider she could make plenty of pin money.

If the daughter had to get it done outside, she would have to part with plenty of her pin money.

Is it fair for her to make no return except an occasional present for which she expects credit and gratitude.

She Actually Gets the Supper.

I know of another daughter whose mother can never do enough for her. She is a teacher in a private school and has about five months vacation in the year. When she is away at school she sends her washing home to her mother who does that and her mending, besides a great deal of her sewing. When she was at home recently her mother said to a friend, with the same deep gratitude felt by the recipient of the nice gift she had earned so many times over: "You know I'm having such a good time with T. home. Why, sometimes she goes down and gets the supper and I don't have to even think about it."

What a vast return for all she does for her daughter.

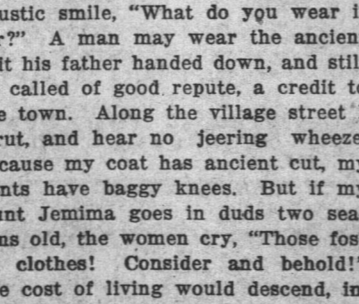

Notes and Comments.

Canada is asking for a loan of \$300,000,000. This money must be obtained if we are to prosper, for without it we would be unable to advance credits to provide markets for our surplus products, and unless the markets were available our trade would dwindle.

"It is certainly time," says the London Daily Chronicle, "that business men should begin to wake up to the possibilities of profitable trade with Central Europe before our friends the Americans, the French and the Dutch have planted themselves there to our exclusion. The war with Germany is now over. It would be folly to pursue a spirit of suicidal warfare now that peace has been made. In the interests of all Europe and ourselves in particular it is necessary that we should trade with Germany. The Government, we are glad to see, is waking up to the importance of this fact."

The Manchester Guardian, commenting on the change that is being made in Heligoland which proved of such great service to Germany in the war, says:

"The change which dug a huge fortress a hundred feet deep in the cliffs, covered them with gun emplacements, and girdled them with a labyrinth of walls fifty feet thick was a more than doubtful blessing, and Heligoland must have found her transformation into the most notorious and sinister speck of land in the world a severe strain on her zeal for the Fatherland. When the war actually came her fishermen were exiles; for they were one and all shipped off to the mainland, and the island was given over to the gulls and the gunner. It is now thrown open again, and a beginning has been made with the dismantling of its mighty forts. The inhabitants will cheerfully see the last of the guns, and apparently they would like, too, to be quit of German taxation; but they hope, quite reasonably, that the island's final disappearance may be at least delayed by leaving the great seawalls the Germans built. This might well be done, for Heligoland so long as it lasts will be a lodestar for the curious, and there would be a certain rough justice in the fact of its people profiting in the future by the world's interest in its sinister past that has cost them so dear."

It is desired that the people of Newfoundland shall at 11 a.m. on Tuesday next, 11th November, suspend all normal activities for the space of TWO MINUTES, during which time all thoughts will be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead.

Code Telegram from Secretary of State:

(Received 7th November, 1919.) I am commanded by H. M. the King to send you for immediate publication the following message which is addressed to all the peoples of the Empire.

TO ALL MY PEOPLE.

Tuesday next, November 11th, is the first anniversary of the armistice which staved the world wide carnage of the four preceding years and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my people in every part of the Empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling, it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the armistice came into force, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, there might be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities.

(From To-day's Trade Review.) Lusenburg reports a splendid Bank fishery this past season and the catch is fully fifty thousand more than last year.

The news from foreign markets is not encouraging. Spain will purchase only very limited quantities. Italy is negotiating, but wants to get lowest prices going and will not be a big buyer this season.

Cuba and Porto Rico are in need of supplies and would purchase liberally if suitable vessels were offering.

Brazil is working hard for a reduction of 16% on recent prices but with the big shortage of hard dried shore fish they are not likely to be successful this time.

Present prices are quotations only as the weather has been too stormy for large arrivals.

Common Cod Oil. The market shows a firm tone at \$3.50 per ton, and we do not see any reason why good well strained oil should sell for less this year.

Cod Liver Oil. The trade is practically over for this year. The refiners have all marketed their manufacture, and from all reports are well satisfied.

Sugar. No change in the sugar situation. Local price is \$16 to \$16.50 per 100 lbs. It is difficult to obtain full supplies owing to the scarcity.

Molasses. The imports here to date show an excess of 747 puncheons over last year's figures for a corresponding date.

three cargoes yet to come in. The St. John's fall trade is now absorbing a large proportion of the stocks in hand.

Hay, Oats, Potatoes, Apples. There is a fair supply of imported hay in town selling at \$33 to \$55 per ton.

Oats are selling at \$3.50 to 6.00. Potatoes will be higher soon. A late report from P.E.I. says that the crop has suffered considerable damage.

Fall keeping apples ('King's'), are in and selling at \$7.50 to \$8.00 per barrel. The brisk demand for apples in England is keeping up the prices.

Herring. The fall herring fishery has begun at Bonne Bay, Bay of Islands and Notre Dame Bay. The price from the net that is being paid is \$4.00 per barrel, a low rate as compared with pre-war times.

FLOUR. Shipments of wheat from Russia are arriving in England and it is stated that the internal conditions of that Empire are very much more satisfactory than is generally supposed from newspaper reports.

Pork and Beef. The price of provisions was on the up grade the past week. Pork has advanced several dollars per barrel from lowest figures.

Unusual Conditions.

The past week has been one of excitement throughout the country and it is going to take quite a little while to quieten down.

The frightful storm of last week which continued with violence for fully three days has created havoc along our coast.

The losses to Insurance Companies will be extensive, but the greatest sufferers will be the merchants and fishermen who rarely have anything like full value covered against these calamities.

Our fishermen are so familiar to the perils of the sea that they think less of it than the risk a pedestrian runs when crossing a busy London street.

The storm of last week was no ordinary one and experienced men say we have not seen the like during the past thirty years.

The extraordinary heavy sea was raging for many hours before there was any wind whatever. The waves that beat against our shores were not the long swell from the Atlantic but were a rapid continuation of heavy choppy waves that broke with terrific force like the breakers on a sunken reef.

In one instance a vessel moored in a place where there was plenty of water. The extensive washouts along the Railway line where beaches had to be crossed is proof to all that we have great reason to be thankful that our country has been spared any serious loss of life which happens so often when perils of this kind break with little of no warning.—Trade Review.

Future Resources of British Empire

Sir C. A. Parsons Says Britain Must Discover Some New Source of Power, to Maintain Her Present Problem.

BOURNEMOUTH, England—After a lapse of three years the British Association for the Advancement of Scientific Knowledge resumed its annual meetings at Bournemouth this year. The presidential address was delivered by Sir C. A. Parsons, K.C.B., B. Sc., F. R. C. The advances in engineering during the last 70 years, he said, were too many and too complex to allow of their description, however short, in one address, and he had decided to refer only to some of the most important features of this wide subject. In reviewing the past, he continued, it appears that England has gained her present proud position by her early enterprise, and by the success of the Watt steam engine, which enabled her to be the first country to develop her resources in coal, and led to the establishment of her great manufactures and her immense mercantile marine. James Watt had considered the practicability of the turbine, he continued. The turbine of to-day carries the expansion of steam much further than has been found practicable in any reciprocating engine, and owing to this property it has surpassed it in the economy of coal. Turbines have become the recognized means of generating electricity from steam on a large scale, although they have not superseded the Watt engine for pumping mines or drawing coal. Referring to the large increase in the engine power of ships, he said that in the Royal Navy the engine power of battleships had increased from 12,000 horsepower to 30,000 horsepower before the war, while the speed advanced from 17 knots to 23 knots. During the war the power obtained with geared turbines on the Courageous class was 100,000 horsepower with a speed of 32 knots, while in destroyers speed up to 39 knots had been obtained.

Developing the Steam Engine.
While on the subject of steamships, he continued, it might perhaps be opportune to say one word as to their future development. The limiting factor to further development in size is the depth of water in the harbors. With this restriction removed there is no obstacle to building ships up to 1000 feet in length or more, provided the volume and character of the traffic are such as to justify the capital outlay. Probably the most interesting development during the war, Sir Charles said, has been the extensive application of sound-listening devices for detecting and localizing the enemy. The sound-ranging apparatus developed by Professor Bragg and his son, by which the position of an enemy gun can be determined from electrically recorded times at which the sound waves from the gun pass over a number of receiving stations, has enabled the Brit-



investigation into this unexplored region of the earth. In Italy, at Lardarello, bore holes have been sunk which discharge large volumes of high pressure steam, which is being utilized to generate about 10,000 horsepower by turbines. At Solfatara, near Naples, a similar project is on foot to supply power to the great works in the district. The whole question of the future resources of the British Empire, Sir Charles said, demands the serious attention of all natural scientists. In such a task some people might suggest they need encouragement and assistance from the government of the country, but surely they had this in the great experimental step toward this which was being taken by the government at the present time. Dealing with the uncontrolled use on the part of a nation of the power which physical science has placed within its reach with which to menace civilization, he concluded by saying that physical science had forged the remedy by making the world a small arena for the activities of civilization, by reducing distance in terms of time. Alliances and unions had therefore become possible on a wider and grander scale, thus uniting nations in a great League to maintain order, security, and freedom for every individual, and every state and nation, liberty to devote their energies to the controlling of the great forces of nature for the use and convenience of man, instead of applying them to the killing of each other.

About the Streets of Havana.

"Many of the streets of Havana," says A. Hyatt Verrill in "The Book of the West Indies," "are as narrow as bypaths, and lead, like canons dim and cool with shadows, between Spanish buildings, the tiled fronts and jutting balconies with scarce a dozen feet of space between them. "Great archways in ponderous walls lead to huge colonnaded patios wherein fountains splash, birds sing, and flowering plants fill the air with perfume; . . . while the tinkle of guitars and the strains of soft Spanish music mingle with the roar of traffic and the honk of automobile horns. "For ancient, picturesque, and delightfully foreign as are these byways of old Havana, yet through them flows a constant stream of modern traffic, pedestrians of every class, color, and race; rubber-tired victorias; mule-drawn drays and ox-carts; ponderous motor trucks and vans; rushing motor delivery wagons; softly purring limousines and clanging trolley cars. Marvellous it seems that the narrow lanes can accommodate the jam, . . . but the traffic moves swiftly and with scarce a hitch, for the police are efficient, and the drivers skilful. "Overhead, during the sunny hours of the day, stretch canopies gay with color, gorgeous with painted advertisements and strange Spanish names and which, far above the streets, form a covered way like an oriental bazaar between the stores of the shopping districts. And such shops! No dingy, dusty, old-fashioned affairs are these, but modern stores with enormous plate glass windows, brass and mahogany fronts, and within which every article known to the world may be found."

Referring to the increase of the British Air Service during the war and in view of the recent Atlantic flights, Sir Charles stated that he felt it would be being equal. On the other hand, with the airship the advantage increases with the size, as in the case with all ships. The airship appears to have a great future for special commerce where time is a dominant factor and the demand is sufficient to justify a large airship. It has also a great field in the countries where other means of communication are difficult. The only limitation to size will be the cost of the airship and its sheds, just as in steam vessels it is the cost of the vessels and the cost of deep-sea operations to make the following observations on the comparative utility of aeroplanes and airships for commercial purposes: In the case of aeroplanes, the weight per horsepower increases with the size, other things being the same. The weight of the aeroplanes and their sheds, which limit the size of the Atlantic liners.

Newfoundland and Union.

The question of the union of Newfoundland with Canada is not at all a live issue in this country. In this respect, however, it is very much to the fore in the present election campaign in Newfoundland that each party is declaring loudly that it would not have anything to do with a plan to link the island up with Canada and that the other party is scheming to accomplish this wicked purpose.

The St. John's Advocate, the organ of the Coaker wing of the Opposition forces, offers what is described as "Proof" that Mr. Coaker "was not mixed up in any Confederation scheme" and denounces the Government leaders as being concerned in just such a scheme. The "Reids and the Canadian vultures," the paper says, "are watching and waiting for bad times to strike this colony," waiting, presumably for the opportune moment to force union. Confederation, the Advocate says in another passage, would mean "the death-knell of all local industries. When Confederation comes the factories will have to close and thousands of workmen will be thrown out of employment. Under Confederation, we would be under the heel of A. B. Morine, who would hold the office of lieutenant-governor, and we should be the servants of Canadian speculators."

On the other hand, the St. John's Telegram, a Government Journal, accuses Mr. Coaker and Hon. R. A. Squires, the leader of the second wing of the Opposition group, of plotting Confederation. Referring to a trip made to Canada by Mr. Coaker a year or two ago the Telegram asserts that "all the proceedings there" were "part of the Reid scheme for Confederation." To force Newfoundland into union with Canada is declared by the paper to be "the object for which the Squires campaign is being so generously supplied with money by Canadian capitalists."

Lord Fisher's Stories.

"ULTIMATUM" TO LORD KITCHENER.
Admiralty and when I said, "If the Queen Elizabeth didn't leave the Dardanelles that night I should"; he got up from the table, and he left and wrote an unpleasant letter about me to the Prime Minister! Lucky she did leave! The German submariners prowling around for a fortnight looking for her (and neglecting all the other battleships) blew up her duplicate wooden image. "Lord Fisher adds: "We had constructed a fleet of dummy battleships to draw off the German submarines. This squadron appeared with effect in the Atlantic and much confused the enemy."

Lord Fisher's Stories.

Lord Fisher's opinions on the Dardanelles adventure and the events which led to his resignation are described by him in a recent instalment of his memoir in the Times. He also tells the story of an "ultimatum" to Lord Kitchener to stop him from denuding the shipyards of men. "Without any doubt," he writes, "the 'beseechings' of the Grand Duke Nicholas in the Caucasus on January 2, 1915 (for a demonstration against the Turks to relieve the pressure on the Russians), addressed to Kitchener in such soldierly terms moved that great man's heart; for say what you will, Kitchener was a great man. "But he was a great deception, all the same, inasmuch as he couldn't do what a lot of people thought he could do. Like Moses, he was a great commander-in-chief, but he was not a Napoleon or a Mahdi; he was a Carnot in exelsis, and he was the facile dupe of his own fallings. "But speak well of those who treat you well." I went to him one evening at 6 p.m., with Mr. Churchill's knowledge, and said to him as First Sea Lord of the Admiralty that if his myrmidons did not cease that same night from seducing men from the private shipyards to become "cannon-fodder" I was going to resign at 6 p.m. I explained to him the egregious folly of not pressing on our shipbuilding to its utmost limits. He admitted the soft impeachment as to the seduction; and there, while I waited, he wrote the telegram calling off the seducers. "If only that had been stuck at after I left the Admiralty, we shouldn't be rationed now in sugar nearly a year after the armistice, nor should we be bidding fair to become a second Carthage."
