



In his latest book "To Lhasa in Disguise," William McGovern tells of the yak of Tibet, which is in many ways a remarkable animal, and which is found wild as well as in domestic service. A cross between the yak bull and the Indian cow is the beast in largest demand, being found in domestic service, farm work, and trans-

Mr. McGovern describes the yak as a sturdy beast, rather resembling the American bison, with large heavy head which it bears close to the ground. The back slopes down to to the ground. Power Plant Roof Holds Too Tall Chimneys

Each of the chimneys has an outside diameter of 15 feet 6 inches at the bottom and of 11 feet at the ton. The minimum inside diameter is 10 fest. In the lower 50 feet a four-inch herds, sometimes with wild ass and fire-brick lining is used. Each chimney rests on a concrete mat 18 inches thick placed on an octagonal frame of steel girders. These girders are supported by the steel columns of the building structure

> The lower sections of the chimneys arc anchored by vertical steel rods, 11/2 inch in diameter, spaced about 18 inches from center to center and passing through the concrete base to the steel framework of the building.

> The roof of the power house do in the roof, which leaves a space of about eight inches between the chimney and the roof curb. A concrete apron overlapping the curb was cast in a recess around the chimney. The space between the roof slab and the chimney is utilized for ventilation



Britain's Mystery Race

Most people imagine that the earwas Roman. There are traces in Scotland of a mysterious culture earlier than that which followed in the wake of the all-conquered eagles of he Eternal City.

Long before the Romans set for ain the Caledonians built a ensive work in the shape o a "dyke," with forts along it at reguar intervals. It started on the East ast of Scotland, went to within a mile of where Galashiels now stands, and then turned south through Scott's Barderland to Pell Fell, in Cumber-

In three places this ancient fortification survives, and is known various ly as the Catrail, The Devil's Dyke, and the Picts' Work Ditch. The dyke was some twenty-six feet broad, supported on either side by ramparts, each about seven feet high and twelve feet thick.

Why Were They Built?

All over Scotland are hundreds of orts built on hill-tops. The White Caterthun, in Forfarshire, is a good example of these. It consists of four circles of stone, the diameter of the inner circle being eighty paces. The stones are twenty-five feet thick at the top and over a hundred feet thick. at the base.

Beyond the outer circle is a ditch with an earthen breastwork round it, while beyond this, again, runs a double entrenchment. The entrances to these various circles are zigzagged, so that each remains covered by for-

The fort at Bamukin, in Aberdeenshire, has five great stone circles, all perfectly round and flawlessly built, although there are no toolmarks to show how they were shaped.

These buildings are interesting but not puzzling, because we know for what purpose they were built; but there are others, commonly known as Picts' Burghs, to which no use can be

A burg is a single tower, perfectly round in shape, wide at the bottom and narrowing towards the top from the outside. The outer walls of these towers, shaped into perfect circles. have no openings of any sort except the entrance. Obviously then, the buildings were never intended for

Mountain Treasure Houses.

Inside, the walls slope the reverse way, and between the two are countless rooms, often too small for people ever to have lived in them. The largest of these mystery towers is that of Rousay, in the Orkneys.

At pottery the Caledonians not compare with the Romans, since unknown amongst them. But they almost excelled the "masters of the world" in their ornaments. The mountains yielded their craftsmen gold, silver, bronze, amber, rubies, and rock crystals such as agate. jasper and cairngorms and jet. From these they made ornaments and weapons.



Fair-Haired Folk Dying Out

Their Chances of Survival Under Modern Conditions.

ounty Council it is stated that a striking feature of an open-air school or convalescent home is the preponlerance of children of the fair type. Italians, Jews, and Welshmen, it is added, thrive and prosper under town conditions, where the fairhaired Northerner languishes.

This is borne out by observations over a long period, and there can be no doubt that in fighting the battle of life in most parts of this country he fair are handicapped against the

Children of the Northern typefair-haired and light-eyed-are susceptible to certain diseases, such as diphtheria, scarlet fever, and rheumatism, and in some centres of population, particularly London heir physical development is not equal to that of the dark-haired. This is strikingly shown in stage spectacles, most of the children chosen for which are Jews. Sometimes seventy-five per cent, or more of those selected (solely on account of physique) for a London production are of the Hebrew race.

Victims of Environment.

Later in life the fair have to contend against a similar inequality. They are unsuited to factory work, often suffer from a peculiar dread of closed spaces, and languish more or less in thickly-populated districts. Because, too, they have relatively protective pigment in their they are affected by the summer heat and glare in such districts, and often become neurasthemic. Under these conditions it is only the dark-skinned who can remain thor-

oughly efficient. This inadaptability of the fair to urhan life is shown by their distribution. Of every one hundred bersons in our population, according to judicial statistics, forty-three are ight, six red, and fifty-one dark-hair-1. Incidentally, the proportions sentenced to imprisonment are fortytwo, five, and fifty-there respectively, compared with forty-four, four, and fifty-two admitted to lunatic asylums. So the fair are not specially addicted to crime, at any rate.

The light-complexioned, however, are not equally distributed among heir darker brothers and sisters. They are much more common in the country than in towns, particularly in the northern parts of England and in the north of Scotland.

Even in towns, the Northern type is nuch better represented in the suburbs than in the thickly-populated parts. Everything shows, therefore, that town life is not suited to the fair. Both as children and as adults, they do not easily tolerate the conditions under which so many millions of our constation are obliged to live.

Indeed, we are slowly but surely osing some of the types with which England is always associated by foreigners. Where, for instance, are uch fair beauties as used to be drawn upon largely for the front row of the chorus? the type is certainly not extinct; but the theatrical manager will tell you that, whereas it was formerly plentiful, it is yearly becoming more difficult to find.

Scientists assure us that the fair race is dying out in this country. It is not the oldest-at least two darkhaired peoples having come to our shores before it-but for all that it is disappearing before the march of civilization. Modern conditions are wholly unsuited to it. The fair, however, need not be alarmed. Their exinction is taking place slowly-very slowly .- Tit-Bits.

Who Discovered America!

Charts published as early as 1534, said Dr. Larsen, show the names Joao Vaz Bay and Joao Vaz Land in the Labrador region.

Professor Leo Wiener, of Harvard University, presented a theory which onflicts with the history we learned n our school days. He declared that tobacco was well-known in Europe before the discovery of America, and at America got it from Africa.
