TROUBLE WITH SPAIN.

A rupture between England and Spain is imminent, and Spain with her starving peasantry, her brigandage and revolutions, is not in a very fit state to throw down the gauutlet to such an antagonist. It may be remembered that a considerable time ago, while Spain was carrying on the war against Chili and Peru, two English vessels, the Tornado and Victoria, were seized on the high seas by the Spaniards and carried into Spanish ports, for a supposed violation of the international laws. The crews of the two vessels were also thrown into prison, and treated badly. A correspondence between the British and Spanish Governments followed, which eventuated in Lord Stanley's sending an ultimatum to the Spanish Ministgr threatening reprisals if the vessels were not released. Iron-clads were at once despatched to the coast, and it was thought that war was inevitable. The Spaniards, however, did not allow matters to go so far; they released The Spaniards, however, did not allow matters to go so far; they released the Victoria and the crews of both The Tornado was seized bccause it was supposed that she was carrying munitions of war for the use of the people of Chili and Peru, the enemies of Her Most Catholic Majes ty. The case of this vessel was re served for the decision of the Superior Court, and that has recently been given, condemning the Tornado .-What then? The question is as much unsettled as if the Victoria also lay in a Spanish port, and the crews were still immured in Spanish dungeons. Another fleet of iron-clads steaming up to Cadiz will perhaps convince the Superior Court that it is in error, and that it is no light matter to offer an affront to England, or do a wanton wrong to any of her subjects. A war between Britain and Spain will not likely be a very serious matter, and if it be once begun, the Tornado or her full value will soon be restored to the

THE SOUTH AMERICAN WAR.

On Friday we received the intelli-gence that the Paraguayan stronghold of Humaita, so long and so obstinately defended, had at length fallen into the hands of the Allies. The report is certainly vague and unsatisfactory, none of the events connected with the taking of the fortress, if it was taken, being given; nor yet the terms of surrender if it was so that the Paraguayans laid down their arms and yielded at last to stern necessity and a foe terribly superior in numbers, Bacon, but whom they had once taught to dread them on the field. If Humaita has fallen this inhuman war which constrained women to use the rifle as the Amazons once used the bow is nearly at an end. The Paraguayans at first victorious even over the com bined forces of Brazil, Uruguay and the Argentine Republic, but finally repulsed and then beaten on every field, placed their last hope on the fortress from which it is asserted their flag has been hauled down. 
