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Town Council.

The usual meeting was held on Monday evening. Present - the Mayor in the chair, and Messrs. Holliday, Elliott, Coffee, Crowe, Horsman, Richard Mitchell, Robert Mitchell, Chadwick, Davidson, and Howard.

The minutes of last meeting were read. Mr. Davidson, the newly-elected member for the East Ward, took his seat, and the minutes were confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS

Were read from Messrs. Cayley and Brough, Provincial Auditors, stating that they had calculated the amount due by the town of Guelph to the Province under the Municipal Loan Act, and that it amounted to \$49,669. The calculation is as follows:

Debt on Jan. 1. . . . . \$99,280 Less allowance in respect of Call & Goodby's \$31,500 Clergy Reserve allowance, as corrected. . . . . 4,504 \$2 per head of population, as per census, '71 13,756 49,660

Balance due by town. . . . . \$49,669 The attention of the Council was also called to the 6th section of the Act, as to the payment of interest subsequent to Jan. 1st, last, and it was stated that a form would be prescribed by the Lieutenant-Governor as to the debentures to be issued under the Act.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS.

Mr. Horsman read a petition from Jane Lewis, asking for relief. Mr. Crowe, one from Jeremiah Kelly, asking for support until he recovered from a serious accident sustained through stepping on a loose plank on the sidewalk and injuring his shoulder, disabling him from work.

Mr. Rich. Mitchell, from the Maple Leaf Base-ball Club, asking for the use of the Central Exhibition grounds on Aug. 11th. The two first petitions were referred to the Relief Committee, and the last was granted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Rich. Mitchell presented the 7th Report of the Roads and Bridges Committee. It stated that the Committee could not make any recommendation as to the petition of Donald Guthrie and others asking for improvements on Strange street, as that street is a Ward street. In reference to the petition of A. Macdonald and others concerning an obstruction on Duke street caused by the construction of a private entrance therefrom, the party making the entrance had expressed his willingness to make the matter satisfactory to the Committee. Steps had also been taken to prevent any further removal of gravel which might interfere with the property of Mr. Allan, referred to in his petition. The report was adopted.

THE \$20,000 BY-LAW.

Mr. Richard Mitchell moved, seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that a new by-law to raise \$20,000 by debentures be read a first and second time. Mr. Davidson asked why this was necessary, as there had already been passed a by-law to this effect.

Mr. Richard Mitchell said that there had been some errors in filling up the blanks in the former by-law, which might have the effect of invalidating it, so that it was necessary to frame a new one. Mr. Elliott asked what was to be done with the old by-law, which ought to be disposed of first, so that there might be no danger of the two by-laws being in force at once.

After some conversation, Mr. Richard Mitchell then moved that the by-law for the purpose of issuing \$20,000 of debentures, which has already been published by the Council, be withdrawn, and that another by-law for the same amount and purpose be substituted therefor, the first being defective.

This was carried, as was Mr. Mitchell's first resolution. The clerk then read the new by-law, and the Council went into committee of the whole upon it, Mr. Holliday in the chair.

Some questions were asked by Mr. Davidson, and replied to, as to the items of the town debt.

The various clauses of the by-law were then passed. Polling was fixed for August 15, the by-law to take effect from September 1.

The Council resumed, passed the by-law, and adjourned at about ten o'clock.

POLICE COURT.

Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., P. M. THE LIQUOR CASE.

Henry Newton, of the Newton House, near the G. W. R. station, was charged by N. Croft, with allowing liquor to be drunk after lawful hours on Saturday evening last. Mr. Paterson prosecuted, and Mr. Oliver appeared for defendant. Mr. Croft, Tavern Inspector, stated that at between eight or nine o'clock on Saturday evening he visited the Newton House, and saw a boy in the bar serving some men with beer. Two doors were open, and a light was burning. The beer was called for in the ordinary way. Mr. Oliver set up as a theory of defence that the boy had been intimidated by the customers, and asked for an adjournment that he might call them as witnesses. His worship said that if this statement was sustained, he would have the men prosecuted for larceny; but Mr. Newton was equally responsible for leaving such an incompetent person in charge. No application had been made to subpoena these men, although the summons was served before noon on Monday, and the defence seemed like an attempt to burk justice. He could not grant an adjournment. As the offence for which Mr. Newton was formerly convicted was of a different character to the present one, he would not impose the increased penalty but would fine him \$20 and costs.
