

Bradford, Newmarket, &c., are left behind, Ar and we come in view of the bright waters of Lake Simcoe, which tells us that Barrie, the beautiful County Town of Simcoe, will soon be reached. Barrie is situated on a most commodious and well sheltered harbour, where many hundred vessels could ride in safety. The country around is good for farming. At Barrie those who are going towards Orillia and the great Muskoka District change cars; the great Muskoka District change cars; we, whose destination is Collingwood, turn towards the west, and in about two hours Collingwood is at our feet, and the waters of the Georgian Bay stretch out before us. The country from Barrie to Collingwood does not appear to be so good as that between Toronto and Barrie. Collingwood is a stirring town of about 4000 inhabitants, and has increased very rapidly during the past few years. It has an excellent position for commerce, and an excellent position for commerce, and is surrounded by some rugged and pic-turesque scenery. On the south and east high and dreary bluffs, covered chiefly with primeval forest, meet our view. Here and there, on more favored spots, we can see little openings made by hardy yeomen. These, with the dark forest, the rocky steeps and the passing cloud-shadows form as delightful a landscape as any painter could desire. great deal is done here in the lumber trade. Several large mills are running night and day. Here, too, a vast quantity of square timber, which has been brought down the Georgian Bay, is transferred to the Northern Railway and taken to Toronto, where it is again put into the water and taken to ports below. Our journey is next continued on board the Frances Smith, and in less than five hours we reach Owen Sound, some sixty miles from Collingwood. Owen Sound is a thriving town, and at present quite jubilant over the expected opening of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway, which is now just about completed to this point. Leaving Owen Sound during the night, and touching at a place called Presque Isle for wood, when morning dawned we were far out on the water. On our right we behold a watery horizon, and on our left in the dim distance is the ever receding shore. Passing on for a few hours longer, leaving Lonely Island in our wake, the lofty hills of the North Shore are recognized, and grow higher as we near the shore. Wondering where we are going, for we are near the rocks, we suddenly turn down a narrow channel letween an island and the coast, when the village of Killarney conges suddenly in our view.
