The University Question.

Bystander and the 'Varsity after him have brought out a good idea, namely, that unless our university system is improved and centred, rather than spread out into one-horse concerns, our more ambitious youth will pass them all by and look to Cornell, to Harvard, to Ann Arbor and to Europe for their university training. There is a great deal of truth in this,

The same idea is also forcibly brought out in the V. P. Journal (Victoria university), an article in which asks what we are doing in Ontario for science? We have the poorest of facilities for mastering botany, zoology, biology, mineralogy, or electricity. None of these subjects are taught and illustrated as they should be.

There is only one way of Ontario ever doing any university work that can claim to rank with the leading schools of the United States and Europe, and that is by a conservation of her teaching energy, so to speak, the creation of a strong central teaching university, the development of a university city with a student and professorial life, and by liberal, assistance fro both the state and from the wealthy.

But the prospect is not by any means discouraging. We are glad to hear from a correspondent of the V. P. Journal that the manifest destiny of Victoria university is "coming to Toronto."

The feeling for this is so strong that it is well said that, with each alumnus living out of this city, Foronto is the spot chosen for Victoria next to his own locale. There can be no doubt Victoria is obscured to a great extent by her distance from the provincial centre, and limits are placed thereby to the contact of her professors and students with other trained minds, and the fire of friendly or unfriendly rivalry. They have few opportunities to refer to the stores of research and learning contained in works outside of their own libraries, which are in too many cases not too complete—not from lack of a wish to make them so, but from lack of a wish to make them so, but from lack of means—for her professors have wretched pittances, and the college library is an antiquated delusion. It makes your correspondent blush with shame and glowith pride, both at the same moment, to think with what meagre means and poor appliances, yet with what untiring devotion and great success Victoria's professors have labored. Not that he would belittle the efforts that Cobourg has put forward to assist the college.

We also hear from other directions that the manifest destiny of Victoria is Toronto. If that is so there must be negotiations of one kind or another between the authorities of Toronto university and of Victoria and if these are begun we sincerely hope the provincial institution will take no other than a most liberal stand, and that above all the methodists of Toronto will come forward and provide the necessary buildings

The continued prevalence of intermittent fever after a month, during which the ground has been covered deeply with snow, ground has been covered deeply with snow, and having throughout an extremely low temperature, while in some degree supporting Oldham's theory of its being caused by exposure to extremes of cold, would seem to require other explanation, since the disease is reported mostly from those districts which during warmer seasons are essentially malaria districts. Enteric or typhoid has disappeared from amongst the twenty most prevalent diseases, and does not appear prevalent diseases, and does not appear prevalent in any district. Concerning zymotic diseases, there appears a not appear prevalent in any district.
