THE ST. VINCENT-STREET CELLAR TO BE FURTHER EXPLORED

IN SEARCH FOR A THIRD PITZEL CHILD

Matress Found Which Holmes Had in the House.

The Tragedy of the One Topple of Street Conversation Yesterday—The World's story of the Career of Holmes and the Murder of the Pitzel Children Sets the Whole City Agog—Detectives Geyer and Casey Found New Circumstantial Evidence to Bring the Mystery to a Conclusion—Philadelphia Monster—Holmes May Be Brought to Canada Immediately—The Feet of One of the Girls Missing.

Immemorable visitors hovered about St. Vincent-street yesterday from morning until night, to satiate their morbid curiosity by gazing on the scene of the hideous and almost unparalleled crime of H. H. Holmes.

Little else was talked of in the streets yesterday. Everyone had read "The World's story of the deed, and the account of the assassin, his antecedents, his maniacal craze for evil doing, his motives and the hundred and one complications of the most appalling history was recognized as the complete story of a crime ever published in Canada.

The post mortem on the bodies will be held to-day, having been held over from yesterday on account of the absence of Dr. Caven, who was giving evidence in the preliminary hearing of the Scollie murder case at Peterborough.

Today Detectives Geyer and Casey will further explore the cellar of the St. Vincent-street cottage, and every foot of the ground will be dug up. Officers do not expect that anything further will result from the excavation than the discovery of the missing bones of the feet of the youngest girl, Nellie Pitzel.

The inquest is being held upon the body of the elder of the two girls. When a verdict is reached the jury will be asked to record their finding upon the body of Nellie as well. The post mortem examination of the bodies will be held to-day by Drs. Caven and Harrington. Every bone in the body will be examined by a specialist.

While Detective Geyer is satisfied that the boy was killed in Detroit, and still remains in that city, he is not satisfied in a furnace there, the fact that Holmes caused to be carted to the St. Vincent-street cottage the trunk which he borrowed from Mrs. Pitzel at Detroit, gives rise to the possibility of the trunk having been hidden in the trunk and then conveyed to the house, where the body was removed and buried.

There is an old cistern in the back yard which is known to be in sanitary condition. This will be searched after the exploration of the cellar is completed and the back yard will also be dug up.

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
