So the Canadian rate of forty cents per barrel has doubtless been fixed to meet this. It is doubtle if our early varieties of froit will ever be able to be shipped, to any great extent, to England; and if these are shut out of the United States by a pretty stiff duty it would seem to be but just to our fruit growers that the local markets should be preserved to them, Mr. Martin to the contrary notwithstanding. 




