All the New York anthracite producing and carrying companies have notified the trade of an advance of twenty-live cents a ton in prices, to take immediate effect. The advance is to all points cast and west.

According to advices received Maryland nackers are offering future tomatoes freely, but seem to be unable to interest buyers. Packers quote oc in the country for new white old stock on the spot is going out freely at higher prices.

A telegram received states that on account of a scarcity of fish a number of the Canadian lobster packing works are shutting down. The general report is to the effect that the pack this year will be the smallest ever known.

The Chicago Evening Post says that Henry Villaid, backed by a large number of European and American capitalists, has about completee a deal which will give them a through line from the Atlantic to the Pacific scaboard, including the Northern Pacific and Baltimore and Ohio.

Reports from special correspondents, om farmers themselves, and observers. from farmers themselves, and observer, state that cereals and vegetables in Manitoba are generally more advanced this year than last. Provided growth is not hindered by unfavorable cold weather, which need cause no anxiety at this late date, there is every prospect of a bountiful return, almost, if not quite, as early as lest summer. last summer.

Information has been received by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa that Department of Agriculture at Ottawa that a large consignment of apples from Tarmania by fast steamer have been seized by the provincial authorities of British Columbia, and ordered to be destroyed because the fruit is infested with an insect pest, which it was feared might be conveyed to the apple trees of the province. This is an unfortunate beginning for the direct shipment of apples from the Antipodes at a time when they would find a good sale in Canadian markets.

Several manufacturers of Fall River are preparing to urge a curtailment of production by mills in that city, beginning the first week in July and continuing alternate weeks during the summer or until business shows material improvement. It is understood that signatures will be asked to an agreement to shut down, and it is also said that during the next few days efforts will be made to induce other manufacturers in New E: gland to join the movement. By stopping alternate weeks or by running four days a week manufacturers hope to keep their trained help around them.

A brisk business has been going on in deals during the past few weeks, and large freight engagements have been made both by regular liners and ontside vessels. A large steamer was chartered to take 1,500 standard of deals from this port to a U. K. port at 41s 6d, which is the largest deal cargo that ever left this port. There are considerable quantities of deals still to go forward and tonnage is scarce.

The deposits of private and stock banks in the Bank of England are \$60,000,000 more than they were last October. and the bank's own reserve fund, and its stock of coin and bullion, are each \$60,000,000 larger than they were nine months ago. Mr. 1894 the Bank of Belgium increased It is not likely that any fewer felt Mudge's retirement will be much regretted generally, as he had not only the esteem of the more immediate connections of the Queen Insurance Company, but of the officials of all the other offices, and of all our citizens to whom he was known. The change has been made without causing any discharges from the staff of the Queen, the only change being that the offices will be in the Boyal's building. The change is of somewhat similar a character to that by which the Mercantile Fire Insurance Company of Waterloo was recently taken over by the London & Lancashire Fire Insurance Company. In the latter case the manager, Mr. Lockie, was appointed managingdirector, and the offices kept on exactly as before, the shareholders being bought out on very liberal terms. Both of these changes are significent of the growing tendency to concentrate fire insurance in the hands of very strong companies. It has become more and more apparent that this is a class of business which in volves such risks as should not be undertaken by institutions that are liable to be seriously crippled by one or two conflagrations; a risk they cannot avoid. To such companies as the Royal and others of admittedly great resources, disastrous conflagrations here and there are fully provided for. In fact, they may be said to be ordinary incidents in their very wide field. Even such catastrophes as the burning of Chicago, the vast fires at New York, Boston, St. John's and elsewhere made no great inroad into the resources of the great English be so ruinous to policyholders, that it is only common prudence for them to make certain of being protected by being insured in a company of high standing.

### FIRE LOSS ADJUSTMENTS.

The history of thirteen loss claims collected from different companies by one man upon the same small lot of damaged wearing appurel, recently published, shows the need for some better system of cooperation among the comparies in handling loss claims. The policy-hole er in the case referred to would notify the company that he had suffered a loss; an adjuster would be sent to the residence, and partially burned wearing apparel would be exhibited, with the explanation that the assured's valet lit a match in a closet to find an article of clothing and accidently started the fire. The adjuster would make the actilement after aworn proofs of less were furnished. The closing of the negotiations would be a matter taking very little time, as the assured would appear to be well-todo, and would evince a willingness to settle at reasonable figures on some pretext. The swindler in this case collected his alleged loss thirteen times, but was caught when he endravored to defraud the same company twice, or he might still be living in comfortable style at the expense of the insurance companies who had large underwriters. 

> In reply to the United States Minister at Vienna, the director and chief engineer of the Austrian mint states that pure nickel for minor coins has many advantages. It does not change color, it is very hard and wears very well, yet it receives a beautiful. clear impression, works well in the presses. does not oxydize, feels soft and velvet-like to the touch, is strongly magnetic, and is in every way far superior to every other metal or combination of metals for minor coinage. The only possible objection to it which has been found in Austria Hungary is that sometimes during the process of milling the edges of pare nickel coins. nickel dust is formed in the coining ring which adheres to the coins and sometimes dulls their brilliant surface. For this reason the authorites of the mint in the United States advise minor coms of pule nickel to have smooth edges. The analysis of pure nickel as used for minor coins in Austria-Hungary is as follows: Nickel, 97.37 per cent; cobalt, 1.30 per cent; copper. 0.32 per cent; iron, 0.80 per cent; selenium, 0.14 per cent; carbon, 0.07 per



### CHINESE ACUTENESS.

The naive readiness with which the Chinese man of business takes advantage of the gaps in other people's intelligence is beautifully illustrated by an incident which occurred in connection with the visit of a troupe of Chinese actors to the States last year, and which also shows forth incidentally and in a nutshell the kind of thing that may happen when a nation deliberately allows its currency to become debased. Leon Nam was the leader of this troope of artists, who, by the way, were entitled to the name in a double sense. Leon Nam learned before leaving China that the curious barbarians whose country tney were to visit were willing to pay twice as much for silver as it was worth, with the simple provision that it have a certain stamp on it. Accordingly, Leon Nam provided himself with a die which imitated with true Chineso accuracy the half-dollar of the United States, and worked up about \$5,000 of Chinese silver into 20,000 silver half-dollars, which were, of course, barring a slight informality of their mintage, precisely as good as the coins they so neatly imitated. Equipped with this wealth the Chinese actors proceeded to unload their wares on the American public. The sequel of the operation, which succeeded admirably for the time, we have not yet learned. that Leon Nam has nothing against him but a technical irregularity. Morally speaking, he inflicted no wrong on the people to whom he paid that half-dollar stamped with a Chinese die. He was doing precisely what the free silver advocates are howling for the privilege of doing, although he did it with more decency and order than they. There was just as much



The Fisheries Department has received returns of the spring catch of seals by the Canadian schooners taken off the coast of Washington and British Columbia, says the "New York Sun." The returns show a falling off of nearly 1000 skins, the figures being 8,928 this year as against 9853 last spring. The schooner Favorine made the largest catch, 544, the nearest approach to her being the Dolphin and Libby. each with 502. A singular fact in connection with the catch is that schooners owned by Indians failed to secure a single skin. An important feature of the returns this year shows that of the seals killed females were greatly in the mmority.

A shipment of live lobsters, caught in the waters surrounding Nova Scotia, will be made this week from Halifax to British Columbia, where it is intended to plant the crustaceans, with the hope that they will live and multiply, and the breed of lobsters be firmly established on the Pacific coast. One or two experiments of the same kind have been made in the past and did not succeed. E. E. Fisher, who has the matter in hand for the Marine and Fisheries Department, has been in Halifax for some days superintending arrangements for the safe shipment of the lobsters. 


