

REPORT, &c.

February 13, 1840, (the second Thursday in February) being the day appointed at the last Annual Meeting for the Anniversary Meeting of the Church Society of the Archdeaconry of New Brunsvick," on the preceding day, viz., Wednesday, Feruary 12, the Clergy and Lay Deputies assembled a General Committee, after Divine Service, in Christ's Church, Fredericton.

Read Extract from the Report of the Society for the Propa-

gation of the Gospel for the year 1839, as follows:

"From New Brunswick, Archdeacon Coster reports mose favorably of the progress and increasing prosperity of the "Church Society," formed for the purpose of promoting the Society's objects in that Colony.

"The collections, he says, made during the past year, greatly "exceed every one's expectations; and the appropriations (chief "ly in aid of building Churches) appear to have had a beneficia "effect. The greatest anxiety is expressed in every quarter for "the speedy appointment of a travelling Missionary. We have "now, it will be observed, no less than £400 set apart for paying "the expences to be incurred in travelling; and any person of "persons, who may be appointed to that service will meet, I as "persuaded, with the kindest reception, and the most liber

"encouragement."

"It is unnecessary to say how desirous the Society are a comply with this reasonable request, but they have not yet been able to engage a Clergyman properly qualified for the office a question. They have however assured Archdeacon Cost how deeply they feel the importance of encouraging and supporting the Church Society of New Brunswick, and that liber a grants of money will be made, both for the support of a travel ling Missionary, should they be able to engage one in the Column, and for any of the other excellent purposes for which the Church Society has been established."

Sussex. The Committee report a collection to the amount of £16 3s. 3d. half for Books and half for Churches, and request a supply of Books and a grant in aid of the Church at Studville.

Butternut Ridge. The Committee report a collection of £3

2s. 6d. for General Purposes.

St. Andrews. The Committee report a collection to the amount of £27 18s. 9d.; (for Missionary Visits £3 5s.; Schools £6 11s.; General Purposes £18 2s. 9d.) and request a supply of Books, and recommend aid to the Church at Grand Manan.

Shediac. The Committee report a collection for General Purposes of £4 10s., (except 12s. for Sunday Schools, and 9s. 6d. for Books) and request aid for a new Church at Cocaigne.

Gagetown. The Committee report a collection of £8 5s.,

for General Purposes.

Prince William and Dumfries. The Committee report a

collection for General Purposes of £6 3s. 3d.

Carleton. Resolved on motion, That such sum as will purchase a Bill of Exchange for £50 Sterling be transmitted to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, for a supply of Prayer Books and Testaments; and that a like sum be placed at the disposal of the Executive Committee for procuring other Books. suitable for the objects of the Society, in any way which may appear to them most advantageous.

Resolved, That that part of the Archdeacon's Address which relates to the Constitution of this Society, and a Special Meeting of the Society under the personal superintendance of the Lord Bishop, be respectfully and most urgently recommended to the notice of His Lordship.

That part of the Address is as follows, viz:

"I am sorry to say that time does not appear to have remov-"ed the objections entertained in one section of the Province to "the Constitution or the proceedings of this Society. After hav-"ing given much consideration to this point, I venture to sug-"gest for the serious consideration of this Meeting, whether it "would not be well, as we are led to expect an episcopal visit of "some duration in the approaching summer, to lay the Society's "Constitution before His Lordship as soon as possible after his "arrival, and request him to point out any improvement of which

"he deems it susceptible, in order to its being made acceptable "to all the Churchmen of the Province; and to authorise the " calling of a General Meeting, for the full consideration of those " amendments, during His Lordship's stay in the country, and "under his personal superintendance. I recommend this course, "not because I think our Constitution needs any alteration-but "because I would not wish that we should lie under the imputa-"tion of being unconcerned about the wishes and feelings of any "portion of our Brethren, or indisposed to conciliate their good "will and engage their co-operation-and also because I would "wish to see our Constitution established one for all, with the "full and cordial approbation of the Bishop, upon some decided "basis, and not subject to the incessant fluctuation and change "to which everything seems liable in these days. I am confident "that the alterations which His Lordship would suggest would "be very few and simple; and if they should be such as to engage "for us the support of those who have hitherto stood aloof, I "should very greatly rejoice."

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Justice Botsford, seconded by the Hon. the Solicitor General, it was

Resolved, That the Archdeacon be authorised to call a Special General Meeting of the Society during the presence of His Lordship in the Province.

On motion of the Hon. the Chief Justice, se-

conded by the Hon. Colonel Wyer, it was

Resolved, That a renewed and urgent application be made both to the Lord Bishop of Nova-Scotia, and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, stating the deep anxiety which is still felt by this Society on the subject of Travelling Missionaries, as expressed in the Resolutions moved last year by Mr. End—the sum of £500 in the aggregate having been appropriated to that object.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Society be given to the Rev. F. Coster for his Sermon preached yesterday, and that he be requested to furnish the Archdeacon with a copy of it, that the same may be printed.

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APPENDIX.

THE ARCHDEACON'S ADDRESS.

My Reverend Brethren and Brethren.

From an unwillingness to take up time which I thought might be more profitably employed, I abstained last year from addresing you. But having since felt doubtful of the propriety of mitting that customary mode of opening such proceedings as ours, I shall not do so on this occasion, but request your attention for a short time, although what I have to say may not appear

o you very important.

The doings of this Society in the past year have not, I fear, seen equal to the expectations you had formed. But you will con be satisfied that on this account no blame can attach to the fficers of the Society, who have done all in their power to carry comptly and fully into effect all the instructions you had given hem. To the Secretaries in particular we are indebted for the nost strenuous and praiseworthy exertions. The Books and Tracts imported from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowedge unfortunately did not arrive till the winter was setting in, ut even at that most unfavourable season, they were rapidly istributed. The travelling Missionaries whom we are all so esirous to see employed have not yet been procured; but those o whom that business was entrusted have done their utmost for is accomplishment.

In a new design like ours, some disappointments must lways be expected; and I do not apprehend that you will conder that which we have suffered as being of sufficient magnitude damp any one's ardour in the cause, or to shake his confidence the benefit to be derived from perseverance in the course we are adopted. Nor are we without considerable encouragement the other hand. For I am happy to say that we may depend non receiving the powerful aid of that Venerable Society to hich the Church of this Province is so immensely indebted.—single copy of their last Report was sent to me by the last acket in which I find a declaration of that Society's approbation four design, so strongly and cordially expressed, that it cannot the last that the may justify the expectations they evidently entertain with

regard to us. It speaks of the Church Society in New-Brunswick as an auxiliary to themselves, which "they deeply feel the "importance of encouraging and supporting," and promises "li" heral grants of money both for the support of a travelling Missionary should we be able to engage one in the Colony, and for "any of the other excellent purposes for which the Church Society "has been instituted."

Two years ago I stated that the need of such a Society as this was not less evident then, than it had been at its first forma-I can now say that the events of the past year have rendered the need of such a Society more evident than it then The Church in this Archdeaconry has sustained a very serious less within that period. One of her chief and most valued Pastors has been removed from us by a calamity worse than death. I need not tell you that I allude to Dr. Somerville: and I am persuaded that no member of this Society would wish that I should forbear, on such an occasion as the present, from uttering the feelings with which my heart is full, when I think of the most melancholy close of his useful and honourable career -for closed I fear it is, so far at least as we are concerned. On the contrary, I feel that you would blame me, were I to let slip such an opportunity as this for commemorating his virtues and his services.

His very long residence in this place, occupying all the while situations of high responsibility, must indeed have made his worth well known to most of those who hear me; and I can fear no contradiction when I affirm that by all those who knew him he was beloved. My own acquaintance with him was of more recent date than that of many among you; but there were circumstances, as you know, that rendered it particularly intimate. I was constantly associated with him in the transaction of business, as well as the intercourse of private life; and ever did I find in him a constant friend, a prudent and a faithful counsellor.

His eminence as a Scholar and a Divine all of you will acknowledge—the best judges equally with the rest. His integrity and benevolence were, I believe, equal to his learning His discourses from the pulpit abounded always with valuable instruction. Happy expressions were on all occasions at his command; and when he had to speak of matters with regard which he fett strongly—of the College for instance which a several occasions he came forward to defend—I need not reminly you of the powerful eloquence he sometimes displayed.

Of the part he took in the formation of this Society, and on his zealous exertions in its support, you all were witnesses; and you must all agree with me in lamenting the discontinuance of those exertions, from so unhappy a cause, as a serious misfortune.

to it. Our loss, however, is exceeded by that which has been sustained by the neighbouring parish, of which he had the spiritual charge. I know not whether there be among us to day any representative of that parish. But, if there be, I am confident he will be ready to testify, that in the execution of his sacred charge, he did for it whatever could be done by a non-resident pastor, cheerfully undergoing labours not suited to his years, and often encountering hardships which a much younger man might have shrunk from. Unhappily, his place there is unsupplied; nor is there at present any candidate for it. This vacancy was in my thought just now, when I said that the events of the past year had still further manifested the necessity of such a Society as this.

For such events are always to be expected; and when vacancies do occur in country parishes we must always look for similar difficulty and delay in filling them up, while the number of the clergy continues to be too small for the work they have to do, and while there is such an absence of sufficient inducement to men in Holy Orders to come to us from other parts. Altho' great and successful exertions have been made to induce the Churchmen of England to come forward to our help—yet, such is the demand for Clergymen on the spot, that we are assured none can be found, who are well calculated for this service and

willing to engage in it.

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Let me then beg your attention for a moment longer to the case of the parish of Douglas. Nearly a year ago I was requested by members of that congregation to exert myself in its behalf. I did what I could—but that was only to report the case. It is easy to conceive what must have been the effect of the long suspension of religious services which has unhappily taken place. have probably already joined themselves to other religious bodies; and those who remain stedfast are probably discouraged by their defection from taking those steps which would be the best adapted for obtaining a Clergyman of their own Church—so that when the means of supplying them shall present themselves, they will, it is to be feared, be found unprepared to comply with the reasonable requisition, which will of course be made upon them, for assistance towards the clergyman's support. And there is nothing in all this, but what is likely to occur on every similar occasion that may arise. Nor can I conceive of any remedy, except through the vigorous operation of such a Society as this, whose plan, if it were fully carried into effect, seems to be the very thing required in such cases. That plan provides for occasional clerical visits to places destitute of regular religious superintendance.— It proposes to give encouragement to Catechists by whom part of the Clergyman's duty might be regularly done, and possibly the congregation kept together. And it supplies Books by which

church principles may be kept alive. I would a what better means could be adopted for meeting such an exagency; and what better thing the members of the Provincial Church could possibly undertake, than to support, and render fully efficient the Society I now address. Depend upon it, other cases of the same kind will be occurring from time to time, even in places where perhaps they are now the least expected; and I would most earnestly exhort you to labour to keep up and to extend the means of providing for them. If any one can produce a Plan better calculated for the purpose I have mentioned, I heartily

wish he would bring it forward for your consideration.

That the Parochial system of the Church of England is admirably calculated for the maintenance of sound religious principles, none of us can doubt; and we must all agree that a great thing would be accomplished, if this Society could acquire the means of preventing any of our Parishes, after they have been once properly settled, from being again thrown into confusion by the death or removal of a clergyman. But to be thoroughly efficient for this purpose, we must have at our disposal a sufficient number of catechists well qualified for the work they would have to perform; and that I fear, we never shall have, unless we can devise the means of training men for the employment—which a you know is one of the Society's objects, and one that I would strongly recommend to your especial patronage.

There is also another of the Society's objects which appear to me to deserve more attention than it has yet received, viz. the establishment of Divinity Scholarships in the College. We surely ought to bethink ourselves of some means of inducing native young men to fit themselves for the Ministry, seeing as we do such a difficulty of obtaining a supply elsewhere, and that diffi

culty one which is likely to be of some duration.

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In framing the existing Constitution it certainly was our earnest endeavour to make it such as would be generally acceptable. We strove to define with accuracy the several objects to which the efforts of the Society were to be directed; and we flattered ourselves there was not one among them to which any Churchman could possibly object. And it was so arranged that, if any one, contrary to expectation, did object to either of them, he might avoid being considered a contributor to that object which he disliked, without infringing the right of others to do as they pleased in the business. The design at least of this regulation was one of which no man need be ashamed. I myself reflect upon it with pleasure.

Nor while endeavouring to form a Constitution that would work easily and efficiently, did we omit to guard against the danger of running into any kind of excess. I cannot but think, after a trial of several years, that we succeeded in both of these respects. If however there be any who think that we need other safeguards—more especially if the Bishop should be of that opinion—I am not, I never was, averse to any reasonable ones

being introduced.

The principles which ought always to be kept in view in the formation of voluntary societies have lately been laid down by an eminent writer in one of the United States—a country in which such associations are constantly being formed for purposes of every sort, and multiplied to an injurious excess. He requires -1. That the object for which men associate should be capable of so exact and palpable a definition, that it may be always clearly distinguished from every other that might from time to time be amalgamated with it. 2. That the manner in which it is proposed to carry such objects into effect be clearly and accurately set forth. 3. That the object itself, and the manner in which it is to be promoted be perfectly and entirely innocent i. e. such as are incapable of violating the rights of any human being. I am content to have our Constitution judged of by these strict rules; and if there be any thing therein which stands condemned by them, I for one shall be happy to see that particular

struck out or amended.

Most sincerely do I rejoice that we formed this Society as we did antecedently to that great movement in favour of the Colonial Church, which is now making such happy progress in England; and that the support it has hitherto met with in the Province is such as to furnish our friends there with an incontrovertible proof, that the Churchmen of the Province are not indifferent to the success of their endeavours; but that they love the Church, and are prepared to do their part in supporting and extending it. We have put our hand in earnest to that holy work; and I trust you all feel with me that in so doing we have given a pledge to our Church and Country, that we carry it on, from which we cannot recede without dishonour.

I shall not detain you longer from the business of the day, upon which I humbly implore a blessing from the Most High.
