AUSTRIANS MOVE ALONG TRIESTE RAILWAY ON THE ITALIAN FRONT  
Zeppelin Raids on London Failed Entirely in Main Object  
GERMAN FORCES NEAR VILNA SERBS HOLD AUSTRIANS IN CHECK ON FRONTIER

SLIGHT DAMAGE RESULTS FROM ZEPPELIN RAIDS

Destroyers of Belgian Cathedrals Hit Only One London Church.

OMNIBUS SMASHED Stable Hit, Only Casualty Being Death of Bantam Rooster.

LONDON, Sept. 17, 8:50 p.m.—An official description of some of the effects of the last Zeppelin raid upon the London district, written by an impartial observer at the request of the home secretary, Sir John Simon, issued to-night for publication, follows: "While it is absolutely necessary in the interest of public safety to maintain the rule that no unauthorized account shall appear, the real character of the outrages will be better understood from a collection of incidents, each verified on the spot and vouched for by the authorities as accurate. The home secretary takes this opportunity of stating explicitly that the total casualties resulting from these air raids have been correctly stated in all cases. The information is based upon an exhaustive inquiry by the police."

Reason for Secrecy. "In a letter some months ago First Lord of the Admiralty Balfour set forth the reasons which prevented the government from disclosing the exact localities in which damage has been done in the various Zeppelin raids. These reasons remain valid and there is no intention of departing from the rule adopted to prevent information being made available for the enemy either in regard to the routes taken or the places and buildings on which bombs were dropped. The experience in the raids last week combined with German aerial reports demonstrate that commanders of German aircraft often are grossly in error as to their movements and they have no means of estimating the effect of their promiscuous bombardments materially or morally. "Private Property Suffered. "In every case where damage has been caused it was private property which suffered and in most cases this has been of the smallest kind. Almost all the unfortunate people who have been killed not only were non-combatants, but non-combatants of a class who hitherto in the honorable practice of civilized warfare have been (Continued on Page 7, Column 1).

INFANTRY CLASHES ON SERB FRONTIER

Small Austrian Detachments Repulsed on Drina and Save.

BLUFF AT OFFENSIVE Artillery Duel Opposite Belgrade, Foes' Guns Being Silenced.

NISH, Serbia, Sept. 17.—The Serbian war office today made public the following official communication: "On the 12th and 13th of September small enemy detachments attempted to cross the River Drina at Visegrad, opposite Gouing Glava, but were repulsed. "On the 12th on the Danube front we prevented the construction of fortification works on the left bank of the river opposite Adalec. "On the Save front, opposite Belgrade, there has been a duel between our artillery and that of the enemy posted on the banks of Belany. The enemy's guns were soon silenced. "On the night of the 12th-13th an enemy detachment succeeded in crossing the Save near Zassovitz, but was routed by one of our patrols. The night of Sept. 13-14 the enemy attempted to cross the Save near Carcinitz with two barges filled with soldiers, but we prevented them from crossing. "On the 14th on the Danube front we prevented the erection of fortifications near Sajca. On the 14th and 15th on the Save front the enemy attempted to cross the Save in the vicinity of Urtsame with two boats, but was repulsed."

CONSPIRACY TO DESTROY SANT ANNA IS REVEALED

Eighteen Fuses Found on Steamer Carrying Italian Reservists From New York to Azores.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—In announcing to the state department today the arrival at the Azores of the Fabre liner Sant Anna, from New York for Italy, American Consul Schultz stated that 18 fuses had been found on the ship, and that many explosions had occurred before she reached the Azores. The steamer carried many Italian reservists. The substance of the despatch as given out by the department follows: "Sant Anna, Fabre Line, arrived Thursday morning. About midnight Sept. 12, fire was discovered in the twelfth hold, filled with general merchandise and baggage. Eighteen fuses were found. There were many explosions, six hundred and five passengers, including women, children and aged, transferred to the Ancona on Sept. 13. The ship is expected to proceed with 119 passengers on Friday or Saturday. All passengers safe."

STAR GAZER MISSED CHANCE TO REACH KOWKASH FIRST

Indian Offered to Guide Ottawa Official to Place Where Gold Was "Heap Big," But the Proposal Was Declined.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 17.—Michael Grimes, who is connected with the Dominion Observatory, and spends a good deal of time gazing at and sorting out stars in the sky above northern Ontario, missed an opportunity to be one of the first discoverers of the new Kowkash gold fields. "Mr. Grimes, who recently returned from the north country, encountered an Indian guide, who was down on his luck, in June last. For a grubstake, the Indian offered to show the Ottawa man where gold was in "heap big" quantities. Owing to his work Mr. Grimes refused the offer. "It was shortly after that the gold was struck and the great rush was started for the Kowkash country, the very district to which the Indian offered to guide the Ottawa man."

ARTILLERY COMBAT RAGES IN FRANCE

Bombs and Hand Grenades Also Figured in Infantry Struggles.

TURCKHEIM SHELLED A GREAT GATHERING

French Reply to Bombardment by Firing on Electric Works.

PARIS, Sept. 17.—Heavy artillery fire, interspersed with the throwing of bombs and hand grenades between the French and German trenches at various points on the front, continued to mark the operations today, according to an official statement issued by the war office tonight. Struggles with bombs and hand grenades took place near the sawheads of the rival field fortifications on the front between Angres and Souchez, and in the sector of Neuville. French batteries also effectively shelled the German works. Grenade fighting was also reported from the region of Roye. Men in the opposing trenches also engaged in a well-sustained fusillade in this section. Artillery firing was active on the Crinchen front, south of Arras, and also on the front extending between the confluence of the rivers Vesle and Aisne, to the Aisne-Marne Canal. French artillery of various calibre and French trench pieces responded to the fire of the enemy quite efficaciously on the lines extending from the Aisne to the Argonne, in the Lafontaine-aux-Charmes, and at Courts-Chaussy. Efficacious firing was done by the French batteries in northern Vesvre, and on the Lorraine front, in reply to a German bombardment. In answer to a bombardment of Milsenfirst and Hill No. 425, south of Steinbach, in Alsace, French artillery poured a destructive fire on the electric works at Turckheim.

PATROL ENGAGEMENT IN DIRECTION OF OLT

Also Combat on Road to Van on Caucasus Front, Petrograd Reports.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 17, via London.—The war office made public today the following official communication concerning the operations in the Caucasus: "In the coastal region there has been rifle firing and cannonading. In the direction of Olti there was an engagement between patrols near Tevetch-mechan. In the direction of Van there was an engagement near the Village of Van. On the remainder of the front there is no change."

LITTLE OTHER CHANGE Near Eastern Politics Believed Reason for Galician Offensive.

VILNA'S FATE IN BALANCE FOES DROP MANY BOMBS

Cannonading is Incessant in Neighborhood—Government Institutions Evacuated and Civil Population is Rapidly Leaving.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—A Reuter despatch from Petrograd says: "The fate of Vilna hangs in the balance. The latest letters received from there state that cannonading is heard without interruption day and night. Bomb-dropping aeroplanes are constant visitors. Three of them have been brought down recently. The evacuation of government institutions has been completed, and factories are being removed. "Thousands of workmen already have left. The supply of sugar has been exhausted, and the price of various commodities has doubled. Newspapers have suspended publication."

GALLIOLI LULL STILL UNBROKEN ALLIES CHAFING

Position is Virtually Unchanged Since Heavy Fighting in July.

FACE WINTER CAMPAIGN Army Is Anxious About Making of Necessary Provision.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—The Anglo-French financial commissioners who are seeking to establish a mammoth credit loan here and American financiers who expect to supply the money were reported today to be at odds over the burning question of including munitions of war among exports to be paid for the proceeds of the loan. On several details of the loan the commission and the bankers have agreed, but on this major question, it was said, their views are diametrically opposed. There is a split on the question in the ranks of the American financiers. "To Cover Munitions? The commission's attitude is that the big credit, whether a billion dollars or less, should provide funds for all exports and that munitions of war certainly should be included. "Some American bankers think so, too; but a great many are said to be of the opinion that the loan should cover only commodity exports, such as wheat, cotton and manufactured products and that another method must be found to pay for munitions of war, even if this method involves the shipment of huge stocks of gold across the Atlantic to the United States. "The situation has not reached the acute stages of a deadlock, nor anything approaching it, but the line of demarcation is clear and well defined. "Role Russia Will Play. A minor point of variance between the commission and some American bankers is the role that Russia is to play in the participation of the loan. CHURCHILL GIVES FAULT-FINDERS PUBLIC REPROOF

"Artificial Divisions" Deploable When Fight for Liberties is On.

NEED WHOLE STRENGTH Some Hopes Disappointed, But Cause Must Win in End.

RUMORED SPLIT IN CABINET IS CAUSING STIR IN BRITAIN

General Belief is That Proposal of Conscription is Unlikely to Gain Much Support in Present Parliament.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—England is absorbed in the rumored cabinet crisis over the question of conscription, to which it is reported David Lloyd George and Winston Spencer Churchill had been converted. Lords Curzon and Lansdowne, Andrew Bonar Law, Walter Hume Long, J. Austen Chamberlain, the Earl of Selborne and Sir Edward Carson, the conscriptionist members, are said to be threatening to resign unless Premier Asquith, first Lord of the Admiralty Balfour, Sir Edward Grey, Lord Kitchener and other cabinet members adopt their chosen policy. "Lacking positive statements from Premier Asquith and Lord Kitchener that compulsory service is necessary for the safety of the country the system is likely to find little support in the present parliament with the Radicals, Laborites and Nationalists opposed to it. Many members opposed to conscription are prepared to accept, however, the verdict of the premier and war secretary on the question which now is a subject of serious consideration in the cabinet. "Some Disappointments. Mr. Churchill added that during the past four or five months the allies had done as well as they might have hoped. There had been events which, while not disastrous, were disappointing. In France and Flanders a series of resolute and costly attacks was made on the German lines and although ground was gained, the lines of the Germans were not pierced. In the Dardanelles, he said, the allies had gained invaluable ground which led them towards a decisive conclusion, but they had not gained the advantage at the points at which they aimed. Then there had come the retreat of the Russians, and with the Russians were recovering and rearming their strength a new and unmistakable burden had fallen upon Great Britain. The situation was a serious one, but the allies had it in their power to carry the war to a successful conclusion, and they could do it, the chancellor said, if they utilized their whole strength. "Will Preserve Liberties. After all, Mr. Churchill continued, the allies did not seek the struggle and if they did their duty they would have done all they could. If, at the end of the speaker's comments, the liberties of Great Britain and of Europe remained intact and inviolate those who afterwards looked back upon "this unhappy but not inglorious generation" would be able to say "we did not fall under the test and we preserved the liberties of the world."

WANT PAYMENT FOR MUNITIONS BARRED IN LOAN

OTHER MINOR ISSUES

Anglo-French Commissioners Hold Out to Include War Materials.

Italian Aeroplane Bombed and Damages Line Near Garovio.

INFANTRY SHELLED Effective Work Done by Italian Artillery on Carso Plateau.

ROME, Sept. 17.—The following official statement was issued today at the headquarters of the Italian general staff: "The serious nature of the damage caused by our raids of the 14th on the enemy's defences commanding the Presena (Genova) valley has been confirmed. In the upper Gordole, our artillery scattered a column marching from Varda towards Corvara. "In the valley of the Torrent of Ponte-brana (Fella) one of our detachments made reconnaissance met an enemy detachment, which it attacked and put to flight, taking seventeen prisoners, two of whom were officers. "On the Carso plateau, columns of infantry and wagon trains of the enemy were effectively shelled by our artillery. "Aerial reconnaissances disclosed the presence of numerous tanks at the stations of Nabresina and Santa Croce along the Trieste Railroad. The line was bombarded and damaged by our aeroplanes in the vicinity of Garovio. "An aeroplane dropped a bomb on our hospital depot at Begliano, happily doing no damage."

The promoters of the scheme were requested to get a sponsor to stand behind the venture to insure its success, and when the men who were managing the affairs of the Field Comforts League were unable to do this, the action of the police followed as a precautionary act to protect the interests of the public who might feel inclined to help to provide for the Christmas needs of the soldiers.

Chief Grasset stated yesterday that the World that there are a great many so-called patriotic societies which are soliciting funds for the soldiers and which do not give a proper accounting of their collections. "The larger ones of course," said Col. Grasset, "we pay more attention to, and as long as they have a responsible officer at their head, who will stand sponsor for the enterprise, that is all that is necessary as far as this department is concerned."

## YORK COUNTY ...AND... SUBURBS

### WOULD NOT STOP APPEAL OF BOARD

Citizens Refuse to Support Motion to Influence Controllers.

### FARNHAM AVE. DEAL

Immediate Solution of Transportation Difficulty is Discussed.

It was a big meeting of the Central Citizens' Association, composed of the businessmen of Deer Park and the "tracks," which last night strongly affirmed its approval of the decision of the mayor and board of control to appeal the recent award of the Ontario Railway Board in the Farnham avenue deal. Practically every member of the city council from wards two and three, together with others from different parts of the city, were present, and with the single exception of Ald. McBride, all favored the appeal.

The gathering was presided over by President McIntosh, the local association, and a resolution, introduced early in the meeting by T. R. Haig, asking the board of control and council not to oppose the award of the railway board, formed the basis of argument throughout the evening.

Commenting on the resolution, T. R. Haig declared that the existing conditions at the C. P. R. since the Metropolitan tracks had been removed were unbearable, and that the railway board made on Thursday disclosed the fact that \$5,000 people passed over the intervening space between Prince street and Farnham avenue on that date.

Jerry Nelson of Moore Park urged some concerted action on the part of the city and company, and stated that Moore Park had been promised railway service, a promise which had never been kept.

"I am firmly of the opinion that if H. J. Fleming were approached by the city council in an agreement, mutually satisfactory could be found for the trouble on upper Yonge street," declared Ald. Ramsden.

"I would concede the Toronto Street Railway nothing, but I would agree to put down the tracks between the present northern terminus and Farnham avenue, giving immediate relief, and leave the question of legal rights for the supreme court or privy council to decide," said Ald. Maguire.

Ald. Ball strongly favored the action of the mayor and board of control in entering an appeal, but declared that they were reserving of course in withdrawing from the members of council information vital to the whole question. The whole matter was referred to the city council, which was to be held on Tuesday.

Ald. Cameron, together with a number of private citizens, spoke briefly, and later the resolution submitted earlier was voted on, but the meeting refused to support the motion calling a halt in the appeal.

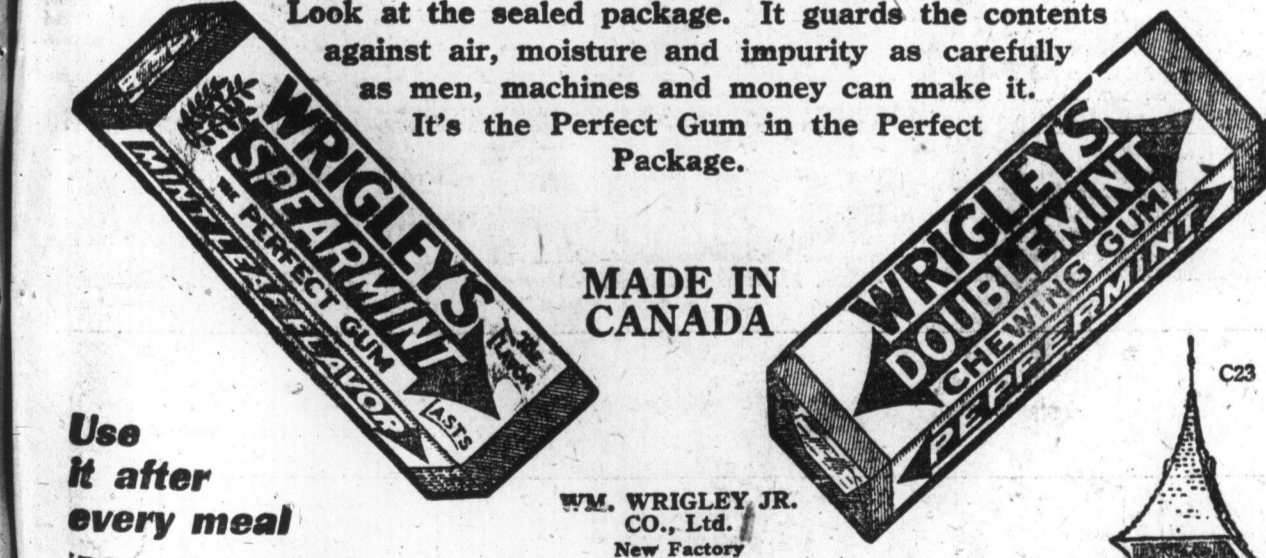

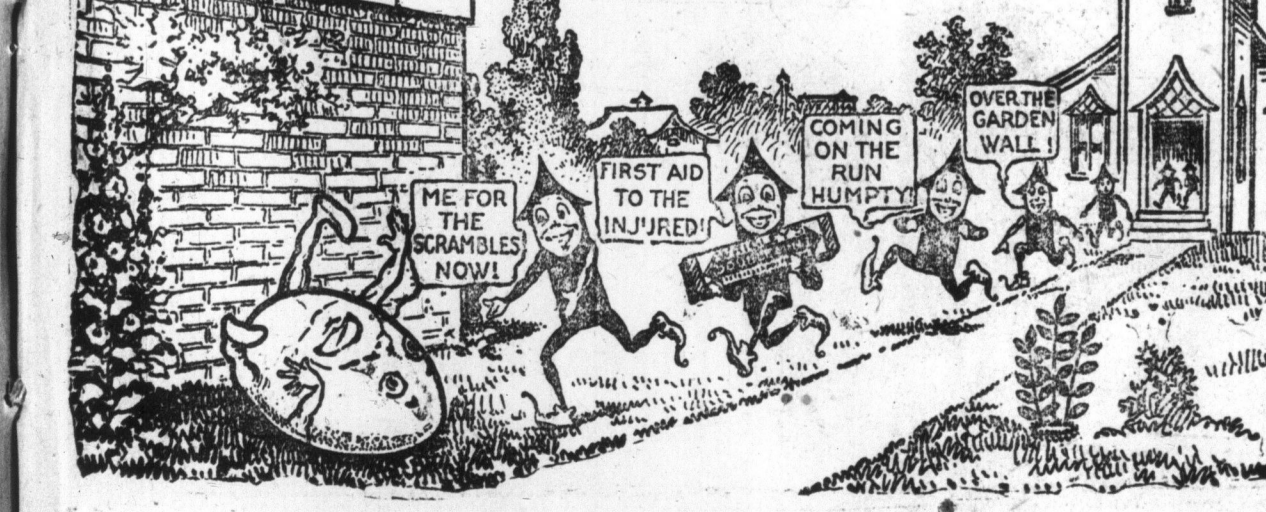
