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AN EXTRAORDINARY POSITION.

Many Violations of Terms of Protocol Which Americans Are Powerless to Prevent.

Havana, Oct. 23. The American Commission here is placed in an unfortunate position. The Spanish Government, it is alleged, daily commits some act in violation of the terms of the protocol or the reality of which is doubtful, such as the removal of guns or the sales of Government property, against which all the American commission is able to do is to protest, which it does regularly, only to see its protests unheeded and ignored.

As one of the commissioners says: "We cannot get out into the streets and stop the guns being carted away ourselves. We should have troops of marines here to enforce our protests. All we can do is to protest, to which action no attention is paid. It is the most extraordinary situation ever known. In the teeth of the American commission the Spaniards still dismounted the guns of the Alfonso XII. In the Santa Clara battery and quietly returned them to the cruiser and they now announce that she will sail for Spain on the 30th."

"These guns technically belonged to the fortress, where they are not accurately considered as movable property.
