HISTORICAL MEMORANDA
 IN CONNECTION WITH
 THE FREE CHURCH, COTE ST.
 NOW
 CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH,

The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.

1844.—The REV. W. C. BURNS, arrived in the summer, and preached to large audiences in St. Gabriel Street Free Church.

“ The REV. J. MACNAUGHTON, of Paisley, arrived a little later, and continued the work in the same church.

1845.—The REV. J. BONAR, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Free Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May ordained the first elders, viz.: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.

“ The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.

“ The REV. A. N. SOMERVILLE, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.

“ The REV. W. C. BURNS, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.

1846.—The REV. G. STEVENSON, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.

“ The REV. T. MACLAUGHLIN, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.

“ The REV. J. MUNRO, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August.

“ The REV. J. ALEXANDER, of Kirkcaldy, ministered from November to March, 1847.

1847.—The REV. J. B. DUNCAN, then a Student, ministered during April and part of May.

“ The REV. J. MACGILLIVRAY, of Aberdeen, opened the Church in Cote Street, on Sabbath, the 16th of May, preaching morning and evening, while the Rev. Henry Wilkes preached in the afternoon.

“ The REV. J. BUCHANAN, of Bothwell, ministered from May to October.

“ The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.

1848.—The REV. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.

1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.

“ The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.

1850.—The REV. J. C. FAIRBAIRN, of Allanton, ministered from August to October.

“ The REV. D. COUPER, of Burntisland, ministered from November to February, 1851.

1851.—The REV. D. FRASER, ordained Pastor, August 8th, 1851. *Deid. London 13 Febry 1892*

1859.—The REV. D. FRASER, translated to Inverness, Scotland, February 3rd, 1859.

"That the report of the Deacons' Court, just read, be received and adopted, and that the same be printed and circulated among the members of the congregation." Carried.

Dr. Mackay then made some remarks upon the work of the past year, and suggestions for the future. The meeting was closed with the Doxology and the Benediction, after which an adjournment was made to the Lecture Hall, to partake of refreshments and for social intercourse.

“Not unto us, Lord, not unto us, but to thy name give glory.” Thus it becomes us on all occasions to acknowledge God’s majesty and goodness for blessing received and for work accomplished. The greater the tokens of blessing the deeper should be our desire to give God the glory. Even if we did all that we ought to do we would be unprofitable servants, and when our consciences so plainly remind us of our unworthiness, any glorying in ourselves would be most unseemly. That we have been able to accomplish anything, that we continue to this day in His service, is altogether of His grace and not at all of our merit.

The events in our congregational experience during the year 1890 do not call for any very special remark, and our individual and family life have had the same blending of dark and bright, bitter and sweet, sorrowful and joyful as comes to all. Are we being rightly exercised by these things? Are we becoming more and more partakers of God’s holiness?

During the year there were registered 30 Baptisms, 22 Burials, 4 Marriages. The number of names on the Communion Roll is 568. The services on Sabbath morning and evening have been more numerous attended than at any time since the church was built. The increased attend-

ance at the evening service is particularly gratifying, and I trust that it may steadily improve, and that all, as they have opportunity, may induce those who are inclined to be careless to come with us so that we may do them good. It gives me special pleasure to mark the number of young people who attend all the services, both on Sabbath and Wednesday evening, and I trust that many more of their class may be seen following faithfully in the old paths.

Towards the end of the year the name which stands at the head of our roll of elders, past and present, was permanently associated with our church edifice by the insertion of the Redpath memorial windows. We feel that it is seemly to raise some token over the graves of those we love; and surely such a monument as this, so beautiful, so full of instruction, continually before the eyes of those who are reaping the benefit of his "holy zeal, indomitable perseverance and sound judgment" in helping to organize this congregation, is better fitted than any other to keep before succeeding generations his honoured name.

I have been asked to give a short description of the windows, and for the benefit of all take this opportunity of doing so. So much could be said about them that the following is only a bare outline of their main features: and while it may show that they deserve a closer study and a fuller explanation, it will also show how much care and thought have been expended on them and how admirable is the result.

There is a unity in the series which is very suggestive, and harmony which is very satisfying. Taking the central window as expressive of the central thought designed to be conveyed and dominating all the others, we have in the upper part of it standing in majestic prominence, Moses and our Saviour, in harmony with that great word of John, "The law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." The law is seen in one hand of Moses and in the other the rod of God. Our Saviour bears the book in which he is proclaimed the Alpha and the Omega and holds up his pierced hand to bless us. Thus the distinctive features of these two great dispensations of the law and the gospel are set before us in the upper part of the central window; and in the lower part of the same window, their deep and essential unity are beautifully exhibited. There we have the type and the antitype, the shadow

and the substance so brought together that all can see that they hold forth the same grand truth of redeeming love. On the left we see the brazen serpent lifted up for the healing of the bitten Israelites, and on the right we see the Son of man lifted up for the salvation of the world. These two are coupled together by the Saviour's words, "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the Son of man be lifted up," and both proclaim the glorious truth of that passage which has been called the little gospel within the gospel, "God so loved the world that He gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have eternal life." This in short is the teaching of the central window.

Grasping this central thought we see how the left hand window leads up to it and the right hand window develops it. In the upper part of the left hand window we have Abraham the friend of God and by his side Melchizedek priest of the most High God, and king of Salem *i. e.* Peace. First we have Abraham the father of all that believe, who rejoiced to see Christ's day and who saw it and was glad; then Melchizedek, the great type of Him who is both King and Priest made not after the law of a carnal commandment but after the power of an endless life. Such an high priest became us who is holy, harmless, undefiled, separate from sinners and made higher than the heavens.

In the lower part of the same window we have the same two represented. On the left Abraham is seen offering up Isaac, most touching and expressive type of the Father who spared not his only begotten Son. On the right Melchizedek is seen blessing Abraham, who kneels to receive bread and wine from his hands, equally striking picture of that everlasting life and abiding joy and eternal blessing which can only come to us through Christ made a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek.

As the windows on the left thus lead our thoughts up to the teaching of those in the centre, so those on the right develops this teaching. Peter and Paul, the apostles of the circumcision and the uncircumcision, God's great ambassadors to preach the glory of the cross to all men for the obedience of faith, stand there before us. Peter bears in his hands the keys of that kingdom which he threw open to the Jews on the day of Pentecost and to the Gentiles in

the house of Cornelius. Paul stands with the sword of the Spirit which is the word of God, by which he sought to compel all men to come into that kingdom through faith and repentance.

In the lower part of the same window we see at the left Peter receiving Christ's charge "Feed my Sheep," and on the right Paul preaching to the men of Athens. That is to say we have in these the two-fold ministry to the church and to the world which Christ has established. Thus we have a visible representation of the great work Jesus has left his church to do during the era of his absence.

Looking again at the work as a whole, every part directs our thoughts to the Saviour, they all testify of him and urge us to be faithful in prosecuting this work he has left us in these days to accomplish according to his parting words "ALL AUTHORITY hath been given unto me in Heaven and on earth, go ye therefore and make disciples of ALL THE NATIONS, baptising them into the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe ALL THINGS whatsoever I command you; and lo I am with you ALL THE DAYS even unto the consummation of the age."

May we as a congregation be more and more faithful to the truths thus set before our eyes in remembrance of one to whom they were very dear. Holding fast by the ancient oracles in these days of defection when many throw doubt on the devotion of father Abraham and on the glory of Moses the man of God; when wolves in sheep's clothing tear the flock, and preachers proclaim another gospel which is no gospel, let us each strive to hold fast the truths we have been taught, to feed the flock of God, to disciple all nations, and to place the cross of Christ in the very centre of our lives, saying with Paul, "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of the Lord Jesus Christ, whereby the world is crucified to me and I to the world."

Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1890.

The Court in submitting to the Congregation an account of its stewardship for the past year, does so with feelings of gratitude to God for the manner in which all the departments of the congregation's finances have been maintained. The total receipts from all sources amount to \$19,418.92, the details of which, as also of its disposal, are fully set forth in the Treasurer's Accounts.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The total receipts under this head for the year amount to \$8,524.15, of which \$7,149.02 in envelopes, and \$1,375.13 by plate collections, making a weekly average of \$163.93.

These figures show a falling off of \$149.91, as compared with the year 1889. The amount contributed, however, for Missionary and Benevolent purposes is actually \$34.98 greater than last year, owing to special contributions which are also included in this account. Our Pastor has recently called the attention of the Congregation to this regular and systematic mode of giving, urging increased liberality with the view of making our annual offerings reach the sum of \$10,000. The Court trusts that there may be a hearty response to this appeal.

PEW RENTS.

The income from this source for the year amounts to \$4,352 66, showing a decrease of \$27 19 as compared with last year. It may be stated, however, that the receipts of 1889 were somewhat increased by payments on account of arrears, so that the receipts for 1890 are really in excess of the ordinary returns of the previous year. Reference to the account will show that it has been more than sufficient to meet the claims against it, including the charge for Manse Rent, which for the first time appears here. Deducting the balance at credit, 1st January, 1890, the year's results shows a surplus of \$535 18. The balance at credit of this account at the close of the year, it has been agreed to transfer to the Building Fund or Real Estate Account.

BUILDING FUND, OR REAL ESTATE ACCOUNT.

The payments during the year, on account of promised subscriptions, amount to \$4,150. Referring to our last Annual Report we may say that all the works or improvements therein mentioned have been carried out, as well as others which have been found necessary for the proper care of the Church property, and the comfort of the Congregation. The introduction of the electric light, which is now an accomplished fact, adds very much to the comfort of the Church, and the Court is hopeful that since the heat and impure air arising from gas have now been got rid of, the pews in the gallery may be more sought after.

MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT ALLOCATIONS.

FOREIGN MISSION SCHEME.

The receipts for this Fund have amounted to \$1,502 24, which has been more than sufficient to cover the claims against it. The letters which have been received from time to time from our Missionary, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, and read to the Congregation, have been full of interest, and the Court trusts the effect may be shown by amply sustaining the Fund for the Work in China.

THE JOHN REDPATH MEMORIAL WINDOWS.

The Court feels that it cannot close this report without referring with grateful appreciation to the beautiful memorial windows which have been recently put into the Church by Mr. Peter Redpath, a former member of this Court, and still a warm friend of the Church, in memory of his father, the late Mr. John Redpath, for many years an Elder of the Church. These windows not only add to the beauty of our building, but they also serve to keep before us the name of one who is worthy of being remembered by this Congregation.

In submitting the Sabbath School report for the year 1890, we desire first of all to express our gratitude to God for the increasing prosperity of the School as evidenced in every department of its work. Our statistics are as follows:

These figures show an increase of four teachers and forty-five scholars, as compared with the year 1889, while the average attendance shows a corresponding increase. It has

been felt for a long time that we have not a sufficient representation of male teachers on our staff, this want we should be thankful to see supplied.

BIBLE CLASSES.

Connected with the direct work of the School, the three Bible Classes referred to in our last report are still maintained, and the number of young people in attendance at these classes is very encouraging. We have been enabled to supplement our staff of teachers from these classes, and in all departments of work find them willing and useful helpers. The Congregational Bible Class has also been conducted during the winter under the care of the Rev. Principal MacVicar, with an average attendance of about one hundred.

MISSIONS.

In our last report we expressed the hope that the interest of the School in Mission Work would be stimulated by the receipt of letters from our Church Missionary, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar. These letters have come, and it seems as if they have been productive of good, as our Missionary offerings exceed that of any previous year. The figures are as follows :

In addition to the questions upon the lessons for the last quarter of the year, the Catechism questions for the same period were also included in the examination. We have again to express our disappointment at the small number who took part in this exercise.

MEETINGS.

The usual business meetings have been held during the year, and also the Sabbath afternoon meeting for prayer, at all of which the attendance has been most gratifying. A successful praise and prayer meeting has also been organized, and held on Saturday evenings, to which the members of the Bible Classes were invited, and some of whom also take part in carrying on the meeting.

We held our annual pic-nic at Beauharnois. We went by boat on the last Saturday in June. The day was all that could be desired, and all enjoyed themselves.

We have a well-assorted Library, to which we have recently added a number of new books, and it is used generally by the school.

The scholars are also freely supplied with religious papers and tracts.

Prizes are also given to those who correctly repeat the Golden Texts for the year, and the Shorter Catechism, and a silver medal is given to the one bringing in the largest number of new scholars during the year.

The Lady teachers have met every Tuesday since October 7th, as a Dorcas Society, and Clothing, Shoes, &c., are distributed to those who are in need.

Singing classes have also been held every Tuesday since October 7th, conducted by Mr. A. Hyde and Miss Dawson and Miss Traquair.

The Band of Hope resumed its meetings on October 17th, and are held fortnightly since. There is a large attendance, and considerable interest is manifested in them. A choice programme is prepared and an address given, and the principles of Total Abstinence are brought prominently before them.

A Missionary Society of the young people of the School meets regularly, when missionary news is read, and considerable interest shown in it.

We have received during the year several letters from the Missionary of Crescent Street Church in China, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, these have been read to the school, and much interest shown in them.

We are deeply indebted to the Rev. Mr. MacVicar for these, and other remembrances.

Mission Work in Griffintown.

During the past year the work has continued along the same lines as in former years, the attendance at the Sabbath evening services being larger in comparison than at the same meetings last winter. An encouraging feature is seen in the large number of men who attend. As a rule it is found that women are more susceptible to the influences of the gospel. It was women "who were last at the cross and earliest at the grave," and ever since women have taken a prominent place in gospel work.

The weekly meeting on Thursday evening, as a rule, is attended by few men, sometimes indeed none being present. During this winter, however, we were much encouraged by the large number of men who attended the Sunday evening services.

The meeting on Thursday evening is of as simple a character as possible, short addresses being given.

On Sabbath evenings we preach alternately, and occasionally have addresses from other students of the college.

Services of song we find very acceptable. On such occasions every seat is occupied, and an unusual interest is displayed. Besides singing by a choir, we have short addresses, and the singing of familiar hymns by all present. We would take this opportunity of thanking the many friends who have assisted us in this way.

Visiting is an important feature of the work. This is carried on not jointly but apart and simultaneously; in this way a greater amount of work can be done, and better opportunity is given for personal dealing. In almost every case we find the people accessible, and the visitor received in a kindly manner.

During the winter we have found many cases of misery and want. The great cause of this is drunkenness, intemperance and poverty going hand in hand. Appeals

have been made from time to time to help in the way of clothing, fuel and money. Here great discrimination is necessary, because many seeking aid are professional beggars, and often what is received is spent or sold for drink. Nevertheless genuine cases of extreme poverty are found. These are in every case aided as much as possible.

We would gratefully acknowledge the kindness of D. Morrice, Esq., assisting us by donations of flannel and tweed, also to the session of Crescent Street Church for the sum of twenty dollars.

In cases of sickness requests are sometimes made for medical attendance. Dr. Telfer of St. Antoine Street has assisted us much in this way, on many occasions furnishing families with attendance and medicine gratuitously.

At the beginning of the new year we feel very thankful to the great Master of the harvest, that He has afforded to us the opportunity of "preaching the gospel to the poor," and of ministering unto Him in the persons of the destitute and afflicted during the year that is past.

PUBLIC WORSHIP on Sabbath commences at 11 o'clock A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M.

SABBATH MORNING PRAYER MEETING in the Library at 10.15 o'clock.

WEEKLY PRAYER MEETING in the Lecture Room every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

SABBATH SCHOOL AND BIBLE CLASSES meet every sabbath afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Teachers' meeting for business is held on second Thursday of each month.

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM is dispensed at the forenoon service on the first Sabbath of each month. Applicants must give notice to the Minister during previous week.

THE ELDERS visit their districts quarterly and distribute cards for the Communion. Any who may not receive their cards from the Elders, can get them at the close of the Friday Preparatory Service, or from the Elders at the door on Communion Sabbath morning.
