Paris, Aug. 13.—France has not yet determined to materially assist Genceral Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevist commander in South Russia, as, according to an announcement from the ministry of foreign affairs, Premiers Millerand and Lloyd George agreed at Millerand and Lloyd George agreed at the Hythe conference that such aid was not to be undertaken, except in certain eventualities. It is considered that France will not act until after an exchange of views with Great Britain. The foreign office today issued a denial that France had even encouraged Poland to wage war with the Bolsheviki. On the contrary, the statement said, France has urged Poland to keep within her ethnographic boundaries and to realize that her dangers lay westward rather than eastward.



OTTAWA IS NOTIFIED

Ottawa, Aug. 13.-(Can. Press.)-An. empire chain of wireless stations, free from private monopoly and possible alien interference, is the prospect held out by an imperial wireless telegraphy committee, headed by Sir Henry Norman, according to exchanges just received here from the old country. The report of the ommittee states that by the adoption of a plan it puts forward a series of connections can be established and maintained at an initial annual loss of not more than one nundred thousand pouds. This sum, the report goes on to state, would secure a system vital i nits strategic and commercial potentialities.

That a scheme of imperial wireless communication be established connecting the communities of the empire by geographical steps of about 2,000 miles each;
That the wireless system employed be that involving the generation of radio-telegraphic energy by themionic valves;
That the service of communication between Leafield and Cairo by Poulsen arcs, shortly to be put in operation by the post office, be the first link in the chain of communication with the British communities in Africa, and that this communication be continued by a valve station near Nairobl, and by the alteration of the ex-German station at Windhuk, to a valve station to complete the connection with the Union of South Africa. POLISH DELEGATES LEAVING WARSAW

They Will Meet Soviet's Representatives on Road to Brest-Litovsk.

AT MINSK LATER

Formal Peace Conference Expected to Take Place at Latter City.

Warsaw, Aug. 13 .- Polish commissioners with authority to negotiate a preliminary treaty of peace expect to leave this city early Saturday morning to meet Russian soviet delegates somewhere on the road between Warsaw and Brest-Litovsk, the foreign cffice announced today. The meeting, it was said, will take place between five and seven 'clock Saturday evening.

British and American newspaper correspondents will be permitted to accompany the Polish delegates, the Bolshevik authorities having expressed a desire that they be present.

After meeting the soviet delegates on the road, the Polish commissioners

on the road, the Polish commissioners will probably be taken to Minsk, where the formal peace conference is expected to take place.

The two-man mission that went to the front to inform the Bolsheviki that Poland wished to send peace delegates returned here yesterday, and there is a more confident feeling in the city than has been prevaint during the past fortnight. High officials said they considered the fall of the city now out of the question.

The Polish mark which has teen quoted during the last few days at quoted during the last few days at 270 for \$1, took a decided turn for the

better today, rising to 175.

Every possible effort is being made by the Polish government to support the army against the Bolsheviki at the gate of the capital. Sleeping cars have been removed from all trains, except those sunning to Vienna, and the telephone system is being devoted exclusively to government recuted. the telephone system is being devoted exclusively to government requirements. Women are playing a prominent part in all activities, many society leaders supervising sidewalk lunch stands at busy corners, where soldiers are given food and drink. Waitresses from hotels and cafes have taken the places of men in all of Warsaw's commercial houses, the war offices and other branches of the government. More women are at present employed than at any time since the foundation of the republic.

Air raids over the soviet lines alons the Warsaw front are now a daily part of the city's defence, aviators flying from the Warsaw aerodrome every twenty or thirty minutes for the front. One airplane caught fire when it was starting on a raid, the pilot and observer being killed, and four civilians were killed and six injured by the explosion of bombs when the plane struck the earth.

Message Rate Service For Business Telephones

INDER the schedule of rates filed with the Board of Railway Commissioners, business telephones in this city are placed on the message rate basis.

An equitable schedule of telephone rates places upon all subscribers an adequate toll for their use of the service.

This allows to those whose outgoing calls are few the benefit of their restricted use.

All classes of users pay for what they get.

This principle has long been recognized as fair as applied to other services. Flat rates for gas, electric light and power have given place in most communities to metered service. The results have been satisfactory both to the users and to the organizations furnishing the service.

Similarly, flat rates for telephone service especially on business telephones—have been withdrawn in the majority of larger cities of this continent and Europe, and for the same

First: Under the flat rate the small user bears an unfair proportion of the cost of giving service. The big user, through the unrestricted service he gets, creates an operating load, an unfair proportion of the cost of which the small user must bear.

Second: To enforce an adequate average flat rate for business service, at present high costs of labor and material, would aggravate the injustice to the small user. No fair apportionment of the burden is possible until we apply the principle, as in other services, of payment for specific use.
