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ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

Quebec Society for the Prevention of Cruelty TO ANIMALS.

THE Seventh Annual Meeting for election of office-bearers, &c., for the ensuing year, of the Quebec Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, was held at the Society's Office, Commercial Chambers, St. Peter Street, Monday, 12th December, 1876. Dr. Marsden, the President, occupied the chair; and there were also present Mr. H. S. Scott, Mr. A. Watters, Mr. H. Budden, Mr. S. Moore, Rev. C. Hamilton, Mr. R. Hamilton, Mr. W. Hossack, and Mr. A. Robertson.

The Chairman remarked that the Society was at present in a tolerably good condition, and had very fair prospects. The funds, he was glad to say, were in a somewhat better state than last year, and would consequently enable the Society to do an increased amount of good. In conclusion, he pointed out that the Society was having an excellent moral effect.

The Secretary read the Annual Report, which is as follows:—

Annual Report (1876) of the Quebec Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

The Committee of this Society, in presenting the Annual Report of the work undertaken and the results obtained, trust that it will be found that they have carried out the objects for which the Society was originally formed.

The Committee have reason to believe, that the whole community now appreciate the work that it has been instrumental in doing, and enjoy relief from the daily scenes of cruelty which were wont to occur in former years unchecked, and the result of its operations must undoubtedly be a source of gratification to all who feel an interest in its welfare.

Owing to the watchfulness of the Society's Superintendent, the Committee think it their duty to state, that cruelty has certainly been lessened to a great extent, and it is a note-worthy fact, and apparent daily, that if those who are ill-treating their animals be spoken to, and remonstrated with, they almost invariably pay attention and at once desist.

It has been the aim of the Society to educate to kindness if possible, and by remonstrances in almost all cases where practicable to point out wherein the cruelty consisted, and to endeavour to dissuade the guilty party—and the Committee, deeming that where the interest of the young is awakened on the subject, there is a strong point gained, would take this opportunity of urging upon those who have the care and guidance of children, the necessity of inculcating in them principles of kindness and sympathy for suffering. Much can be effected in this particular during their school life, and essays on the subject of kindness to animals might profitably form part of their studies.

In the report of the Scottish Society some little time ago, the Rev. Dr. Hanna moved the adoption of the following memorial to the Board of Education for Scotland:—"That where the whole question of proper subjects and methods of education is engaging so much of public attention, the meeting would represent how acceptable it would be were the teaching of natural history, especially in its bearing on

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the subject of humanity to animals, made to form an ordinary branch of instruction in the national schools of our country." In speaking on this subject he said:—"It has been the growing conviction of the most enlightened friends of education, that among the physical sciences natural history, in one or other of its departments, is the one that should be first introduced into the common teaching of the school. Nowhere can materials be found more fitted to interest youth. How easy to turn such fine materials to the moral purpose of impressing upon the tender heart of childhood the duty, and the benefit, and the exceeding happiness of a wise and tender treatment of animals, and birds, and insects. Their varied instincts, their wonderful organic endowments, their singular methods of operation, the place they fill in the great economy of nature, the services they render, and the ties so strong and tender by which so many of them are bound to us, their lords and masters—these teem with what could be turned at once to this account."

As to the finances of the Society, the Committee have pleasure in stating that they are in a better condition than they were this time last year. The results of the efforts of those gentlemen who kindly undertook to procure new subscribers and to stimulate those who were already members to prompter payments of their subscription, had an excellent effect, and the collector this year has not experienced the same difficulty as formerly.

The Concert in aid of the funds, held last March, also benefitted the Society considerably.

The Committee submit that donations, apart from the regular subscriptions, might be made, as they are in several other societies, there being many branches of work that could be undertaken were it not for the want of funds; such as the erection of good water-troughs, cab-shelters, prizes to children at school, distribution of the "Animal World," rewards among the schools in the city, to those who have the charge of animals and who are observable for their kindness towards them, &c.

The Committee would recommend that the carters drawing wood up the hills be strongly urged not to stand on their loads when ascending the hills, thereby making an additional weight to the already perhaps overloaded horse.

Wm. Faucette, cruelly beating his horse with whip-handle; fined \$1 and costs.

Jacques Beaudet, cruelly beating horse with whip; fined \$2 and costs.

Joseph Béland, leaving his horse on market until he was trembling with cold and unable to walk; fined \$2 and costs.

George Doddridge, stabbing an ox with a small piece of steel on end of stick; fined \$3 and costs; also for dragging a calf by the neck; fined 50 cts. and costs.

Joseph Guay, for having a calf tied by the feet; fined \$1 and costs.

P. Chaumet, cruelly beating horses with whip; fined \$2 and costs.

Baptiste Beaulac, cruelly beating horse with stick; fined \$2 and costs.

John Dooly, having too many calves in cart, overcrowded; fined \$2 and costs.

Jean Paquette, driving horse with sore shoulder; fined \$1 and costs.

Philip Allard, kicking his horse; fined \$2 and costs.

Louis Laliberté, cruelly beating his horse with a whip; fined \$2 and costs.

Joseph Paquet, kicking his horse; fined \$2 and costs.

André Brousseau, driving horse with a sore shoulder; fined 50 cents and costs.

Pierre Labelle, driving horse with sore shoulder; fined \$2 and costs.

Joseph Hamel, cruelly beating his horse with a whip; fined \$2 and costs.

Augustin Trudel, driving horse with sore shoulder; fined \$2 and costs.

Honoré Martel, cruelly beating his horse on head with whip-handle; fined \$2 and costs.

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Joseph Bélanger, having a dog tied to a cart and dragging it along; fined \$2 and costs.

Wm. McCormick, driving a horse with sore shoulder; fined \$2 and costs.

Jean Lessard, driving horse with a sore back; fined \$3 and costs.

Besides those reported above, there were 45 cases entered in the Superintendent's book where the evidence was incomplete and where prosecutions were unnecessary. He also destroyed nine trap-cages, and wild birds offered for sale on the different markets were at various times liberated by him, and eight horses which had their legs broken were killed under his superintendence.

On motion of Mr. Budden, seconded by Mr. Watters, the reports were unanimously adopted; and the Treasurer's books were remitted to these gentlemen to be audited.

In the course of an incidental conversation, the Chairman expressed the opinion that the practice of clipping horses is a most barbarous one, and exceedingly dangerous to the animals so dealt with, as is abundantly testified by scientific experience. Persons so treating their horses would, in all probability, find out their mistake by losing them.

The following gentlemen were appointed the office-bearers for the ensuing year:—

Dr. Marsden, President; Mr. H. Budden, Treasurer; Mr. A. Robertson, Secretary. Committee of Management:—Messrs. R. Hamilton, J. C. Thomson, J. Dinning, J. J. Foote, R. R. Dobell, H. S. Scott, W. Hossack, S. Moore, W. C. Howells, and Adam Watters.

Mr. R. Hamilton moved that the Society address a respectful communication to the City Corporation, calling attention to the very bad state of Palace Hill, Dog Hill, and the Canoterie Hill, and the great hardships endured by overloaded horses in carrying up wood, &c.

Seconded by Mr. Hossack, and agreed to.

Some conversation took place as to the expediency of trying the experiment of having a horse stationed at Mountain Hill to help up carts—the carters to pay a nominal sum for the service; and the Secretary was desired to write for information regarding the means adopted for the same object in other towns situated as Quebec is. It was stated that the employment of a horse for the purpose referred to would cost at least \$3 a day.

Mr. R. Hamilton observed that in Ontario and other districts the horses were much more considerately treated than they were in the Province of Quebec. In the former places, the carters took a pride in their horses, and, as a rule, would not overdrive them, preferring to keep them in good order and condition. These men understood what was their own interest.

The subject of the horse for Mountain Hill was referred to the Executive Committee, who are to have a meeting with some of the carters with the view of receiving practical suggestions.

The advantages in a city like Quebec of the low-floored carts in general use at St. John, New Brunswick, were spoken of at some length.

On the proposal of the Rev. C. Hamilton, the Secretary was requested to communicate with the city clergymen and teachers, so as to remind them of the direct way in which they might help to inculcate such principles as the Society's aim is to extend.

On motion of Mr R. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. Budden, a cordial vote of thanks was awarded to the retiring office-bearers,

LAW OF THE DOMINION RESPECTING CRUELTY
TO ANIMALS.

*Extract of an Act respecting Cruelty to Animals, (32 and 33
Victoria, Chapter 27)*

WHEREAS it is expedient that provision should be made, *extending to all Canada*, for the punishment of cruelty to animals; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. Whosoever, wantonly, cruelly or unnecessarily beats, binds, ill-treats, abuses or tortures any Horse, Mare, Gelding, Bull, Ox, Cow, Heifer, Steer, Calf, Mule, Ass, Sheep, Lamb, Pig, or other Cattle, or any Poultry, or any Dog, or Domestic Animals, or Bird, or whosoever driving any cattle or other animal, is by negligence or ill-usage in the driving thereof the means whereby any mischief, damage or injury is done by any such cattle or other animal, shall upon being convicted of any or either of the said offences before any one Justice of the Peace for the District, County or place in which the offence has been committed, for every such offence, forfeit and pay (over and above the amount of the damage or injury, if any, done thereby, which damage or injury shall and may be ascertained and awarded by such Justice,) such a sum of money not exceeding *ten dollars*, nor less than *one dollar* with costs, as to such Justice seems meet.

BY-LAW OF CITY OF QUEBEC RESPECTING ILL-
TREATMENT OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS.

*Passed 27th September, 1867, at a Special Meeting of the
City Council.*

The Council of the said City makes the following By-Law, namely:

1st. Whosoever shall abusively, or without any legitimate cause or reason, ill-treat in any manner whatsoever, a domestic animal, within the limits of the said city, shall in-

cur, on conviction for each offence, before the Recorder's Court of the said city, a fine not exceeding \$40, and in default of payment of the said fine and costs of suit, the said offender shall be imprisoned for a term not exceeding two months, in the common jail of this district, unless such fine and costs of suit, and those of imprisonment, be sooner paid.

2nd. All By-Laws or parts of By-Laws, contrary to this present By-Law, shall be and are hereby repealed.

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CONSTITUTION.

Article 1.—The title of this Constitution is “The Quebec Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.”

Article 2.—Its object shall be to provide effective means for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Article 3.—Any person may become a member of this Society by paying the sum of two dollars or upwards as an annual subscription. The name of any member neglecting for one year to pay this subscription, or at any time utterly refusing to pay it, may be erased by the committee from the list of members. The Society may from time to time elect Patrons and Honorary members.

Article 4.—A committee consisting of ten members, who shall manage the affairs of the Society, shall be elected at the annual general meeting of the same, on the second Monday in December of each year. A President, Secretary and Treasurer shall also be elected at the annual meeting, who shall be *ex-officio* members of the committee. The committee of management may make such rules or by-laws as they may think fit, provided that these rules be not inconsistent with this Constitution. They may also fill any vacancies that may occur in any offices of the Society.

Article 5.—The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Monday of December in each year, when the out-going committees shall present a general report of the proceedings of the Society, and an abstract of the state of accounts and general concerns of the Society up to the thirtieth day of November previous, and the committee for the ensuing year shall then be elected by ballot or nomination, as may be decided upon at the meeting.

Article 6.—A special meeting of the Society may be held at the call of the committee, and shall be held upon the written request of five members of the Society, due notice of the meeting being first given by the Secretary.

Article 7.—At all the meetings of the Society, seven members present (who have paid their subscriptions) shall constitute a quorum. Three members shall constitute a quorum at meetings of the committee.

Article 8.—Any article of this Constitution may be altered, amended or suspended for any length of time by consent of a majority of the members present at a meeting specially convened for that purpose, provided that such alteration, amendment or suspension shall have been specified in the notice summoning the meeting. A week's notice of such meeting shall be given by advertisement in the public newspapers of the city.

The Committee of Management meets on the first TUESDAY of every month.
