Emerson, who for a time after the publication of this volume of essays was regarded with little less than abhorrence by a majority of his contemporaries, is now accepted everywhere as one of the few great seers and philosophers of his century. Certainly man is a god in ruins if the Mosaic account of the creation is correct in all of its details. Already he is becoming insane and rabid. Scientists assert that a large majority of mankind are to-day carrying "bees in their bonnets," and the assertion cannot be disproved.
