the Black Sea at the beginning of the war was put at the disposition of the Russian government and converted into a hospital ship, being entered at Odessa as a Red Cross ship and attached to the army of the Caucasia. While at anchor near Shatie on March 80, 1916, she was twice torpedoed by a German or Turkish submarine. There were no wounded on board, but among the 115 who went down with the ship were fifteen Red Cross nurses and several members of the Russian medical corps.

The Turkish government accepted the blame for the sinking and said that in the uncertain morning light the Portugal was mistaken for a transport.

On July 9, 1916, the Russian hospital ship Vperiode was sunk in the same sea. According to the Petrograd official report, "an enemy submarine, without warning, sank the hospital ship Vperiode, which carried all the distinguishing signs. Seven men lost their lives. The others were saved."



Huns Advancing Into Roumania

London, Nov. 24-Seemingly the forces of the Central Powers are endeavoring to drive on Bucharest, the Roumanian capital, from three directions. To the west the troops of General Von Falkenhayn have reached the Alt river; to the north, the Germans and Austro-Hungarians are pressing southwarh from the Predeal and Torzburger passes, and somewhere along the Danube, either to the south or southeast, the forces of Field Marshal Von Mackensen are crossing the

Western Wallachia apparently is entirely in the hands of the Teutonic allies, as both Berlin and Vienna report that the line of the Alt has been reached. Some Roumanians remain in the rear around Orsova, but that town, as well as Turnu-Severin, has been occupied by the Teutonic troops, and the Roumanians doubtless have fled into the mountains northward. The pressure of the German and Austro-Hungarian troops continues north and northwest of Bucharest.

The Russians and Roumanians have taken the offensive successfully in Dobrudja north of the Tchernavoda-Constanza railway, Bucharest and Petrograd assert. The Roumanians advanced on the whole front, especially in the centre and on the left wing, and occupied five towns about fifteen miles north of the railway line. The Rusisans progressed to twelve miles north of the railway. Berlin declares the Rusisan offensive in Dobrudja was thrown back.

In Macedonia, the Entente offensive continues to progress. Serbian troops have occupied Rapesh, east of Monastir. North of Suhudol the Serbians put German force to flight. Berlin says there has been renewed artillery firing along the front in Macedonia and Solia claims the repulse of attacks east of Paralovo and between Lakes Presba and Ochrida.





BY RECENT COLD WAVE

South and Western States, Especially California, Suffered Severely -Truck Farms Practically Rui-

Washington, Nov. 21—Widespread and severe damage to crops in the West and South was done by the record-breaking cold wave of November 10 to 17, according to a bulletin issued today by the weather bureau. Practically no harm to fall-sown grain was reported, and the damage to cotton was slight, but in California tomatoes were a total loss and truck suffered except in a few sections.

The cold wave spread southward from Alaska, November 16, driving temperatures in the Rocky Mountain states down to new low marks and, during the week following, causing freezing weather and frosts all the way south and east to Southern Florida.

"While a large part of the sweet potato yield had been harvested in Mississippi," says the bulletin, "there was much injury to the unharvested, and vines were reported killed in some other sections of the south. White potatoes were slightly damaged in Louisiana.

"Considerable damage to seed cane occurred in Georgia and Florida, but the injured came remains usable for syrup. In Louisiana the seed cane was mostly saved through warnings, but other cane, though generally windrowed, suffered some harm. Sorghum was mostly killed and sugar cane damaged in Texas, and the uncut cane in Mississippi was much damaged.

"Truck in northern South Carolina was killed and most tender truck in

"Truck in northern South Carolina was killed and most tender truck in northern and western Florida, Louisiana, Texas and other Southern States was killed, while in California tomatoes were killed, while in California tomatoes were an entire loss. Beans and lettuce were somewhat damaged in the coastal plain portion of South Carolina and Georgia. "Cabbage, turnips and sollards escaped injury in most of Georgia and Alabama, but in Louisiana young cabbage plants, beets and lettuce will be a 50 per cent loss, while hardy vegetables in Texas suffered as far south as Corpus Christi. In California severe injury to thuck occurred in all save a few sections, but celery, in the delta district, was mostly unhurt. In Georgia, Louisiana and other States seed beds and much truck in fields were saved through timely warnings.
