DOMINION DAY.

Domination Day never meant so much either to Canada as a nation or to Canada as a state in the Empire as it will mean tomorrow. Whatever racial or religious animosities may have existed in times past have lost their force in a crisis in which Canadians of every race and creed are thrown together by the consciousness of a common danger and a common duty, and their sons are standing shoulder to shoulder in the trenches to uphold the honor and preserve the integrity of Canada.

WAR AS A BUSINESS.

There is to be a compulsory registration of every person of both sexes, between the ages of fifteen and sixty-five, in the United Kingdom, with a statement of present employment and of fitness for any other special kind of employment. Only a great crisis would bring about such a measure, and the mere announcement shows how clearly the government and people now perceive the very serious situation by which the Empire is confronted.

A VAIN APPEAL.

The Financial Post of Canada has a very high opinion of Sir Robert Borden, but it continues to urge him to reorganise his cabinet on a national basis, disregarding party lines, to meet the present crisis in our affairs. It says: "With the proper national organization, guidance and direction, emigrants and money will pour in (after the war) and Canada can be made to prosper as we have never prospered before; and we can easily carry and pay off our present terrific burdens for municipal, national and railway development, as well as those that are accumulating for war and pensions. If we do not organize our government on business instead of political lines, we will have years of depression."

success of their own individual careers. On this point it says: "Big business men are rare enough, but it is the opinion of The Financial Post that they can be found and that they can be induced to leave the more lucrative portions they hold to serve their country. Selfishness and inefficiency in government is our habit, and it is a habit that we find very revolting in times such as these when other men are offering their lives. This is a time of sacrifice and it would be a strong indictment to say that big business men refuse to make the comparatively small sacrifice of giving their best efforts to government. But they must be assured that it is the nation's business and no mere political game of chess that they are to handle."

Tomorrow, Dominion Day, the Times will not be issued. The Manitoba enquiry is being brought right up close to the Hon. Robert Rogers. The country knows now why he was determined to bring on the federal elections.

The premier of New Zealand has offered to form a national ministry, without regard to party, until the close of the war. The leader of the opposition is considering the proposal. In Canada the opposition are not only giving their whole-hearted support to the government's war measures, but are philosophically endorsing the abuse of papers like the St. John Standard.

WAR NOTES FROM MORNING CABLES

To Register All British Adults—Premier Recommends Thrift—Coalition Government in New Zealand

A bill was introduced in the English House yesterday in London, by Walter H. Long, president of the local government board, providing for a national register, to be compiled, giving the names of all persons, male and female, between the ages of fifteen and sixty-five years. The bill is not to cover labor organizations, but to secure complete information as to the number available to aid in the national service. Thrift and economy formed the keynote of Premier Asquith's speech at the Guild Hall, London, last evening, in initiating a movement in support of the new British war loan. The war is costing \$15,000,000 daily, he said, and he asked for aid in floating the loan. The London Times suggests that England get in closer touch with her overseas dominions to let them realize their ambition of a greater share in the national conflict. Premier Massey, of New Zealand, has made the announcement that that country is prepared to have a national military ministry until the close of the war in order to concentrate the energies of the whole colony in the empire's service. In reply to L. Ginnell, Nationalist member for Methven in the English House yesterday, R. McKenna, chancellor of the exchequer, said that "it was a wholly scandalous and false aspersion" regarding the statement that German soldiers after laying down their arms, had been killed by British troops, instead of being taken prisoners. The government of Holland is issuing a new \$8,000,000 war loan to cover war



expenditures in connection with mobilization and other details. France is appropriating \$1,120,000,000 in a new war measure to cover government expenses for the three months beginning tomorrow. The Allied fleets at the Dardanelles have resumed their activities and are reported meeting with success. 

O'DONOVAN ROSSA DEAD

New York, June 29—Jeremiah O'Donovan, better known as O'Donovan Rossa, Irish patriot and revolutionist, died in St. Vincent's Hospital, Staten Island tonight. He had been ill for many months.

He spent the last half of his life in the United States, twenty years of which were passed under an edict of banishment from Great Britain and any of her possessions. He was granted a full pardon by Queen Victoria but remained an uncompromising foe to British rule.

He was born in County Cork in 1831 but later took the name of Rossa, and while still a boy became interested in the Young Ireland movement. He was particularly an admirer of John Mitchell, grandfather of the present Mayor Mitchell of New York.

He was arrested in Dublin on September 15, 1865, when the office of the Fenian newspaper, Irish People, was raided. He was sentenced to penal servitude for life, but six years later he was released and banished to America.
