New British Agreement is Ratified by Various Groups

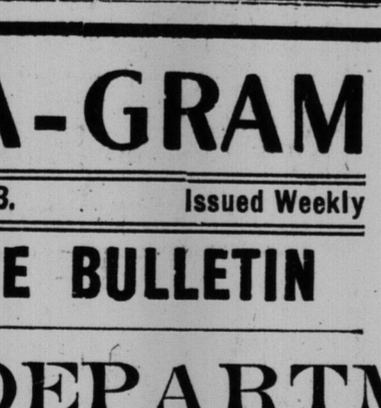

CABINET-MAKING.

PROTECT THE PORTS.

New Brunswick members of Parliament, now that the West India treaty is under discussion in the House, should give careful attention to the character of the steamship services which are to be an important feature of the arrangement.

It was pointed out recently in Halifax and here that the call for tenders would give the successful steamship company the option of calling at an American port. This would involve a distinct disadvantage so far as the Maritime ports are concerned, and it also raises the question about subsidizing steamers to carry freight and passengers to and from American harbors.

Mr. W. A. Black, M. P. for Halifax, takes the ground that the existing steamship services are sufficient. That is not the view generally held in the Maritime, the belief being general that these provinces would benefit materially under the treaty, and that a much better transportation service is essential.

CAMPAIGN IN BY-ELECTION IN ONTARIO OPENED

Labor Minister Scores Opponents For Causing Contest

SPEAKS IN STORM

Conservatives Plan To Start Speech-Making Program On Monday

Canadian Press STRATHROY, Ont., March 20—To the accompaniment of thunder and lightning and a downpour of rain, Liberal campaigners last night gathered at the party's committee's rooms here and listened to speeches from the Hon. J. C. Elliott, Minister of Labor, and Duncan Marshall, Federal organizer for the party.

"There is a general feeling of indignation that it should have been thought necessary to have a campaign at all," declared Hon. Mr. Elliott. "This campaign will mean more or less of a sacrifice for everybody. And there are those who desire that I be the main sacrifice. But I may say that I will make every sacrifice in my power in view of the splendid support you are giving me."

One reason for the contest might be found, he said, in the fighting spirit of Colonel Donald Sutherland, but the real reason for the campaign was his opponent, Tom Elliot, who had said that "if nobody else is willing to run I will."

"I'm hoping that on election day we will give them at least 1,500 times that number of reasons why they should not have had a contest," Mr. Elliott added.

Boy Hit By Truck Gets \$25,000 Verdict NEW YORK, March 20.—A jury before Justice Tierney, in the Supreme Court in the Bronx, has awarded Sidney Marofsky, ten years old, \$25,000 damages and his father, Walter, 1470 Wilkins avenue, \$10,000 damages, for loss of the boy's services, as the result of an automobile accident on June 29, 1923.

On that date Sidney was run over by a truck owned by the Gold Drink Company, while playing marbles at Wilkins avenue and Bosh road. As a result of internal injuries and the crushing of his right hand, the boy has undergone eight operations.

PAPERMAKER A N D WIDOW FOUND DEAD

PHILADELPHIA, March 20.—Bursting in a door when he received no answer to repeated knocks, the chauffeur of Charles E. Clinton, 42 years old, president of the Clinton Paper Company, found his employer and Mrs. Susan B. Johnson, 30 years old, a widow, dead in the Clinton home, a 50-acre farm at Sellersville, Bucks county.

Dr. John J. Sweeney, Bucks county coroner, said both had died of the effects of "impure alcohol" and ordered samples taken from the contents of a bottle and glasses from which they had been drinking.

While the death certificates issued by Dr. Sweeney read "suicide from impure alcohol," members of Mr. Clinton's family denied he had ended his life by drinking and said that the paper manufacturer was a victim of pneumonia. Officials were also reticent, refusing to divulge any information other

RATIFICATION OF WEST INDIES TREATY SOUGHT

Canada To Give Preference On Fruits, Liquors, Coffee, Sugar, Etc.

ISLANDS AGREE TO SOME CONCESSIONS

Meighen Favors Imperial Pacts And King Is Glad of His Action

OTTAWA, March 19.—The new trade agreement between Canada and the British West Indies, entered into in July last, was introduced in the House of Commons today for ratification, on a resolution by Hon. J. A. Robb, acting minister of trade and commerce.

BLACK CENSURES TREATY. W. A. Black (Conservative, Halifax) declared that the treaty had been negotiated by Canadians who were not familiar with West Indies conditions and the treaty suffered in consequence.

WHAT CANADA GETS. Jamaica, the Bahamas, British Honduras, Barbados, Trinidad and British Guyana give Canada preferences on flour, butter, cheese, lard, condensed milk, meats of all kinds, fish, apples and potatoes, boots, cement, prepared cocoa, confectionery and cordage.

MEIGHEN SPEAKS. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen remarked that members of the House naturally approached with apprehension any trade agreement negotiated by the Government.

5,000 SETTLERS FOR THE CANADIAN WEST. LIVERPOOL, Eng., March 19.—The steamers Antonia, Doric and Montrose left with some 5,000 intending settlers for Canada today.

CONSERVATIVE TREATY. Mr. Meighen could not remember that his government had failed during the several months it was in office the beginning of this trade agreement to give proper effect to the treaty.

treaty. If this was true, the failure was on the part of the present government. Mr. Meighen was apprehensive of the loss of revenue from reductions made, especially with respect to sugar.

PREMIER GLAD. Sir George Perley (Conservative, Argenteuil) was in favor of the treaty. He was glad to see the government take steps to extend Imperial trade relations.

Premier King expressed his satisfaction that "for once the opposition and government seemed to be in entire accord." He was glad that Mr. Meighen had approved of the government's efforts to extend inter-imperial trade.

At this point Mr. Meighen interrupted to say that this was not true. His reference to the West Indies treaty had been a remark that he had not yet seen the treaty and would speak neither for or against it until he had.

It provides that Canada should extend tariff preferences on bananas, cocoa beans, lime juice, limes, arrowroot, coconuts, pineapples, sugar, cigars, cigarettes and alcoholic liquors, being produced or manufactured in any of the island colonies mentioned.

Mr. Black declared he was "strongly opposed to the coupling up of steamship services with trade treaties." He objected to that portion of the trade agreement.

Mr. Robb briefly reviewed the negotiations between Canada and the West Indies since 1880, when Sir George Foster, then Minister of Finance, had visited the islands.

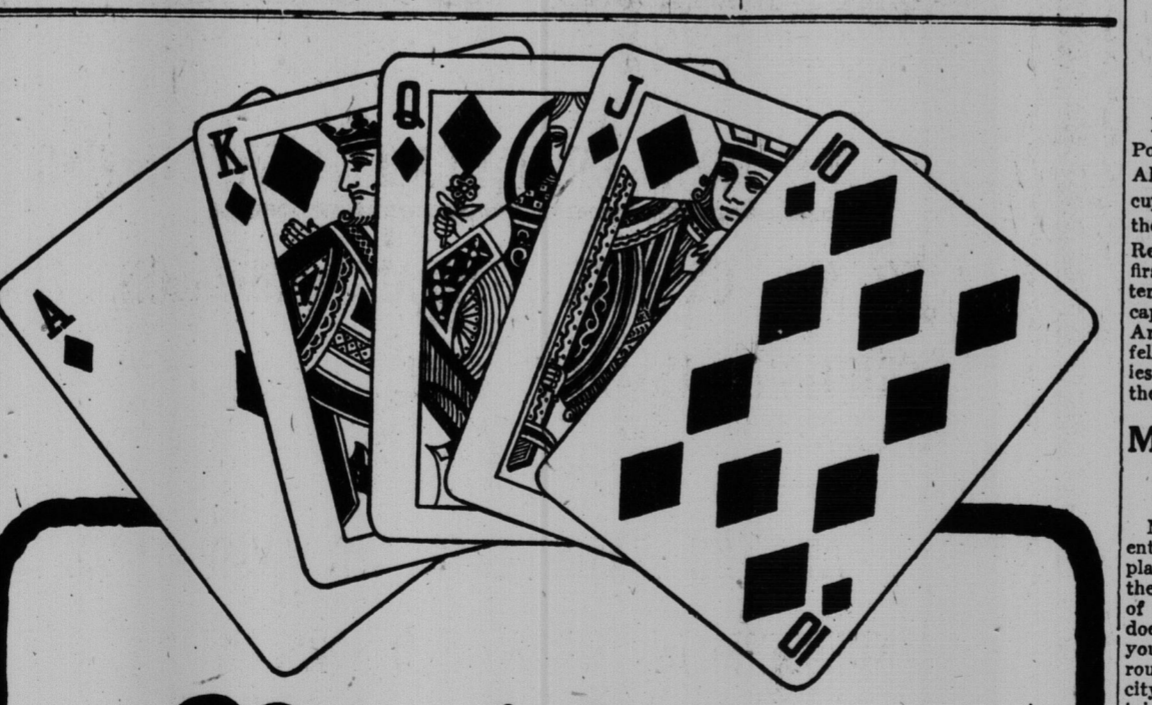

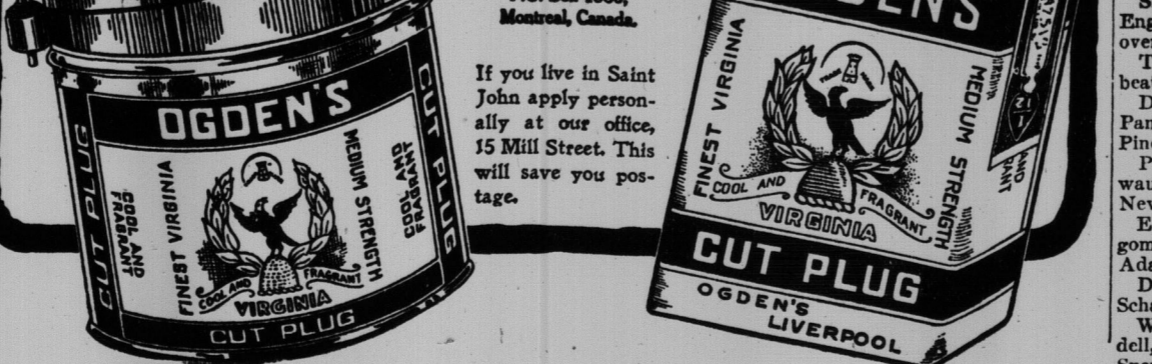

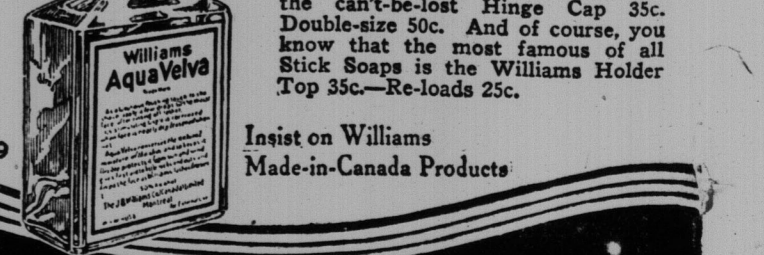
