Picturesque Story of Bulgarians' Movements Leading to Final

Sofia, March 26—At an early hour this morning fires were raging in various sections of Adrianople. The maddened population, whose nerves had been shattered by the almost incessant bombardment for more than five months was fleeing about the streets from one point to another not knowing where to find shelter. Some of them rushed along the line of forts during the heavy infantry and artillery fire that was in progress.

The great artillery arsenal in the city was burning and the barracks lying between the hospital and the northern forts were also flames.

The Bulgarians, in strong force, gradually advanced their lines encircling the city and by short rushes the infantrymen approached near enough to prepare for the final dash.

On all sides the combined movement of the attackers on the ever-resisting city was continued. The eighth Bulgarian division operating against the series of forts along the southern section of Adrianople occupied some important advanced positions and captured twenty Turkish cannon eight machine guns and 800 Ottoman soldiers.

The Bulgarian infantry had reached within 300 yards of the main forts by five o'clock last evening. They entrenched themselves there while ammunition and provisions were brought up from the rear and preparations were made for the final deadly assault.

The entire line of fortresses defending the eastern side of the city was captured by the Bulgarians after a most spectacular assault at the point of the bayonet by long lines of infantry which were strengthened at glass window in the store of Isaacs rothers, Brussels street, was broken and accounted the place by hearding the asset was the presentation of a memorial of the late N. The advantages and disadvantages of an eight hour day for workingmen were discussed last evening at a public meeting held in the municipal chamber at the court nouse. The meeting had been called by Mayor Frink at the request of the Builders' Association and His Worship presided. There was a large attendance and many were unable to gain admittance. The subject was discussed at length and various other matters relating more or less to the subject of the meeting also received consideration. The discussion at times became somewhat lively.

James Myles.

In the United States, and said that warpenters received \$4 and \$4.50 a day there. I am rather surprised that this man is not now in the United States for he has been working here at \$3 per day. W. Frank Hatheway was next called upon and he made an exhaustive speech on labor conditions in other lands and compared New Brunswick with other countries. He pointed out that the tax rate of \$1.96 in St. John was very high and he advised the city commissioners to put the burden on the land and take it off the workers. "Electric power is also very high here," continued Mr. Hatheway, "and it is the fault of the city council and the legislative assembly of 1894 that the price is so high, ranging as it does from \$75 to \$250 per horse power."

Mr. Hatheway—"I am glad you mentioned it, as I thought I would not go the limit but the truth is that in small quantities the price has been as high as \$400 per horse power per year. Under new conditions I expect to see the price reduced to \$65 a horse power per annum. When men with money are looking for a gite for an industry they ask as to the tax fate, the cost of power and the cost of water. If these are right they do not consider the matter of an eight-hour day I do not know much of this eight-hour movement, but in Australia the eight-hour day has been in force since 1895 and the prosperity of the country has not suffered. Australia is about twice as far from the central English markets as Canada and yet Australian goods are able to compete with those of Canada and the rate of trade in 1906 was £28 per head as compared with £21 per head of Canada. I would advocate the Australian system for Canada."







Foreign agents have been in the city during the last week or two canvassing for houses even as far away as Glasgow, Scotland, but the tendency will be to buy locally if possible.

The St. John factory would be a branch of an American industry which is looking for a share of the Canadian trade. The founder of the business is Dr. T. S. Pitt, formerly of St. John, and with him would be associated, in the Canadian branch, Wilmot T. Pitt, of this city.

Doctor Pitt has a factory at Salem, Mass, but the business has outgrown the occommodation there and work was to be started yesterday on a large factory at Wels, Me., to continue the business on a more extensive scale. As the present facilities are inadequate to handle the business already offering it has been practically decided to secure a site in St. John and handle the Canadian business from this city.


