INVASION OF PORTUGAL BY WAY OF SPAIN

Movements of Royalists Are Assuming More Threatening Aspect

Officers of Republic Stoned Amid Cheers for Church and Monarchy—Haytien Ports Closed Because of Revolutionary Outbreak There

(Canadian Press) Lisbon was today a hot and noisy city. An invasion by Captain Couceiro at the head of the Royalist forces appears imminent. All attention is now fixed on the north. The Portuguese monarchists possess thousands of rifles of the latest pattern smuggled into Galicia, Spain, from Normandy and Belgium and also many field guns and Maxim's.

When a detachment of the 20th regiment arrived at Guimaraes where it had been sent as a precautionary measure to prevent outbreaks, the soldiers were greeted with hostility by the people, who jammed the streets and cheered for the church and the monarchy.

Army officers who tried to harangue the populace were stoned with a mob and forced to seek refuge in the house of Governor Salgado which was immediately surrounded and besieged until reinforcements arrived. Advice from Coimbra reports street fighting there as a result of counter demonstrations. Many persons were injured.

The monarchists remain on the Spanish frontier conspiring against the Republic notwithstanding the continued assurances of the Spanish government. The socialists daily hold military drills and rifle shooting.

Influential opinion is convinced that the Spanish government is secretly protecting Portuguese plotters in Galicia and the press has begun a bitter campaign against Spain, alleging bad faith.

The government is anxious. It is difficult to obtain details of what is transpiring on the frontier. The newspapers are not permitted to publish anything sensational.

Port Antonio, July 21.—(Canadian Press) The government has proclaimed a blockade of the ports of St. Marco, Gonaves and Port Liberté. Having only one ship at its disposal, however, an effective blockade is impossible. The order for the bombardment of St. Marco and Gonaves has not been carried out, and the cruiser Antiope Simon, now anchored near Archangel, eighteen miles north-west of the capital.

General Septimus Marins, the minister of war, who failed to resign after his arrival here with the president, has been dismissed from office. War reaches here that the pillaging of the island has been stopped by energetic measures taken by the revolutionary committee. The American, German and Italian legations have made urgent requests for warships to Haiti for the protection of their interests.

The government, strengthened by 1,000 men who arrived from the south during the night on the German steamer, has organized a resistance to the revolutionaries who are threatening the capital from the north. President Simon is directing the defence of the palace. General Sylvain has taken command of the government troops concentrated at the fort of Archangel, several miles northwest of Port au Prince and into which district the rebels are advancing. The foreign legations have raised the colors of their respective countries over their homes.

When I went to claim her some months afterwards, I found that one of the subscribers to the orphanage had taken her away. Since then I have travelled nearly all over the world in search of her. I heard that she was in Australia, but failed to find her. I then heard that she was in England, and after another search I met her in a London street.

LAST MINUTE WORDS FROM MANY PLACES

Teheran, July 21.—News that the ex-Shah Mohammed Ali Mirza is hurrying to the capital, has caused consternation. The government has declared martial law. Pittsburgh, Pa., July 21.—Fourteen persons, half of them women, converted during the convention of the Gilt of Tongues sect, were baptized yesterday in the Monongahela River. Thousands of spectators in all kinds of craft and standing in the water, watched the ceremony.

LIGHTNING SETS FIRE TO GREAT GAS WELL

Chatham, Ont., July 21.—(Canadian Press)—Lightning struck a gas well on the farm of Joyce Bros. near Merin, last night, and ignited the gas. The fire spread to the main gas well, and the illumination was so bright that a newspaper could be easily read a half mile from the burning well. The gas is still burning in a gigantic jet.

BODY OF 'LONGSHOREMAN' FOUND IN WATERS OF HALIFAX HARBOR

Mystery of Disappearance of Leo Murphy is Solved—Brother Identifies Clothing

Halifax, N. S., July 21.—The body of Leo Murphy, whose disappearance nearly two weeks ago, caused much anxiety to his relatives, was found this morning in the Plant Line dock, badly decomposed. It was unrecognizable, in fact, but a brother identified the clothing and a membership card in the 'longshoremen's union' was found in a pocket of his coat. Mr. Murphy boarded with his widow on the evening of July 8. He left the house, and when he failed to return, she reported him missing. His brother said this morning there could have been no reason for any but accidental death.

VOTED DOWN SCHEME OF A GENERAL STRIKE IN CANADA AND STATES

Yet 124 Delegates at Miners' Meeting Cast Ballots for Such Action on Day of McNamara Trial

Butte, Mont., July 21.—(Canadian Press)—The proposal to declare a general strike in Canada and the United States on the day of the trial of the McNamara brothers in Los Angeles, was voted down 172 to 124, after heated discussion at last night's session of the conference of the Western Federation of Miners. It was finally voted to levy a monthly assessment of twenty-five cents on each member, the assessment to continue as long as the executive committee deems it necessary for the purpose of a defence.

INDUSTRIAL AND LABOR CONDITIONS VERY SATISFACTORY

Prosperous Conditions in all Branches of Manufacture in Canada Reported—Review for Last Month

Ottawa, July 20.—Very satisfactory industrial and labor conditions in Canada are reported by the July Labor Report. In its general summary it says: "There was general activity in nearly all branches of industry throughout Canada during the month of June. Prospects of an abundant harvest continued to be exceptionally good, sufficient rains have fallen during the first two weeks of the month to insure every prospect of good yields. While the coal-mining industry in Alberta and eastern British Columbia was impeded by labor disturbances, there was on the other hand, exceptional activity in the coal mines of Nova Scotia. In all branches of manufacture prosperous conditions prevailed, and arrangements were being made for the establishment of many new industrial undertakings.

NEW YORK STATE PEOPLE TO MOVE TO PRAIRIE PROVINCES

Toronto, Ont., July 21.—(Canadian Press)—From the number of inquiries about western railway rates and about western lands, it looks as if the Canadian prairies will soon have a strong influx of settlers from New York state. This assertion was made yesterday by R. L. Thompson, district passenger agent of the C. P. R.

ARREST BALLETT DANCER IN ST. PETERSBURG AS SPY

Cracow (Galicia), July 21.—Considerable sensation has been caused in St. Petersburg society, says the "Czas," by the arrest of Mme. Kresnaska, a ballet dancer, on a charge of espionage.

TURF BILL DEFEATED

Albany, July 21.—(Canadian Press)—The Gittins bill to relieve directors of racing associations from liability from gambling carried on on race tracks was defeated in the assembly last night 63 to 53. The measure passed the senate yesterday.

CHECKING DIPHTHERIA

The health authorities have been working on what was feared might be a diphtheria epidemic, but as the result of prompt measures it is believed that all cases have been averted. Several cases were reported and two deaths have occurred from the disease during the present week, both children. The fatal cases were just outside the city and following investigations the sale of dairy products by people in the vicinity has been forbidden. Medical Health Officer Melvin said this morning that these people would not be permitted to sell again until their premises had been thoroughly fumigated to the entire satisfaction of the authorities.

Silver Medal in Second Stage in King's Prize at Bisley

GERMANY'S ACTION

London Papers Begin to Express Uneasiness and Counsel Government to Stand by France—Strike Troubles at Cardiff Continue

(Canadian Press) Bisley, July 21.—Private Gredos of the Oxford University Corps, won the silver medal offered for the highest score in the second stage of the King's prize competition today. His aggregate for the two stages was 103 out of a possible 203. Corporal Trainor of Canada, winner of the first stage, was second with a total of 192.

London, July 21.—Some of the London morning papers are beginning to express uneasiness at Germany's rumored demands of territory in the French Congo, and for a sphere of influence in Morocco, while they are inclined to believe that the rumor exaggerates the real demands, they point out that if it is true Germany's attempt is manifestly provocative.

CANCER STILL Baffles SKILL OF PHYSICIANS

Small Progress Made in Efforts to Combat the Scourge—Experiments Not a Success

London, July 21.—(Canadian Press)—A report of the Imperial Cancer Research Fund yesterday disclosed the fact that small progress has yet been made in the experimental laboratory conducted by the Royal Society of Medicine, president of the Royal Society of Medicine, which methods for preventing the occurrence of cancer had been tested on mice affected by spontaneous cancer and had given "no evidence of power either to hinder the growth and the dissemination of the disease or to prevent recurrence of spontaneous cancer after the removal of the primary tumor."

SLAVE GIRL WHO BECAME A POWER AT KOREAN COURT

Seoul, Korea, July 21.—(Canadian Press)—Lady Om, consort of Emperor Yi Hui, who abdicated in 1897, died yesterday. She was a palace politician of great skill. She was attendant upon the Queen of Korea, who was murdered. She gained the favor of the emperor and was finally compelled to flee from the palace. After the death of the queen she was restored to the court with the rank of an imperial concubine. This conferred imperial rank upon her two children. She was originally a slave who became a power in the court.

La MARQUISE de FONTENOY

Crown Prince of Greece Restored in Army—Arnold Morley's Wedding—Soldier Who Married Canadian Girl

The Crown Prince of Greece has, by an overwhelming vote of the national legislature at Athens, been restored to his former post as inspector-general of the army.

It may be recalled that the military promulgation which some three years ago took place at Athens, reducing the crown and the cabinet to impotency and substituting in their stead a military oligarchy of the most tyrannical character, gave as one of the chief pretexts for its action the necessity of removing the crown prince from his position of inspector-general of the army and of severing his connection with the latter, by the resignation of his commission.

In fact, the military junta actually forced him to leave the country, and to reside abroad, at the same time depriving both his brothers and his sons of their commissions. Their aversion to the crown prince is due to the fact that, having received his military training in Berlin, he is possessed of ideas of discipline and of military experience and ethics, all wholly foreign to Greek officers and to their soldiers who from a military point of view, are a mere joke, and have little remaining of that heroism which enabled them to win their independence from the Turks nearly 100 years ago.

Of course King George was anxious to abdicate after this affront had been placed upon his children. But at the pressing instance of the great powers, he remained in Athens bearing himself with the utmost dignity and encouraged in his moments of greatest bitterness and depression by the assurances which he received from some of the older and more experienced Greek statesmen that the nation would soon tire of its military despots, turn them out of office, and call for a restoration of the old order of things.

These predictions were realized, for within two weeks after the crown prince had given orders for the removal of all his belongings from Athens to St. Petersburg, where he had accepted an offer from his kinsman the Czar, to enter the service of the Russian army with the promise of an important command, he received a telegram from his father that the tide had turned in Greece, that better times were at hand, and to suspend the arrangements for the removal of his belongings to St. Petersburg.

About three months later the crown prince returned to Greece on the invitation of the national legislature and of the municipality of Athens, where he was received with the utmost enthusiasm and popular acclamation.

Now he has been restored to his former military dignities, and after having undergone a very severe trial, has resumed his place at the head of the army with increased prestige and influence. In fact, the manner in which he has borne himself during the last two years has served to convince not only the Greeks themselves but also the foreign powers that when the time comes for him to take his father's place on the throne in Athens he will show himself to be an even sterner ruler, more judicious, able and above all energetic ruler of the most unruly and troublesome nation of Europe.

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON

In a recent novel, Elizabeth, the young heroine, in a moment of insane anger with the man she is engaged to and really loves, marries a man for whom she cares nothing.

Of her state of mind afterwards the author writes: "She would fall to thinking with vague amazement that the irretrievable catastrophe was out of all proportion to its cause. It was monstrous that a crazy moment should ruin a whole life—two whole lives—hers and David's."

"Suddenly it seemed to her as she looked across the roaring gulf that separated her from the past that all her life had been just a sunny slope down to the edge of the gulf."

All these harmless tempers which had had no results had pushed her to this result. "It is not the pebbles that turn the current. It is the easy slope that invites it. All her life Elizabeth had been inviting this moment—just as some of us are today inviting painful tomorrows. When we fall back from the depths of these tomorrows and see what we have done, then will we call on the mountains to fall on us and the hills to cover us."

I quote these paragraphs because I think they contain a lesson that more people need than will read the novel. There are no isolated wrong deeds.

We give way to temper, we tell a lie, we fall a friend we are cruel or mean or impure in any way and perhaps nothing happens. And we think we are fortunate because there are no consequences to our acts. But we are wrong.

There are always consequences. You think perhaps I mean merely by effect upon the character, and you think you do not need to worry about such vague spiritual consequences as long as there are no material ones. I do mean that, but I mean much more than that. Every act you do affects your character and ultimately your character affects your life. Just as surely as you get the spiritual results you will also get the material consequences.

In another passage in this wonderful novel the author says of Elizabeth—"She gasped at the realization—which comes to most of us human creatures sooner or later—that sins may be forgiven, but consequences are eternal."

This is something we fail to realize as we have to. We are slow to appreciate that although our yielding to this and that and the other small temptation brings no perceptible consequences, it is slowly but surely paving the way for some larger yielding than she is doing. The only way you can escape the consequences for weak and wicked acts is to neutralize them by good and serious acts.

You cannot prevent the wrong doing your hand by trying to wash it off, but you can save yourself from serious burn by promptly neutralizing it with an alkali.

Today is the day for those of us who need it to apply the alkali of self-control and good deeds to our characters.

This lady became the mother of the late Samuel Morley and the grandmother of Arnold Morley. She was a woman of character, and it was due to her influence that the brothers arranged to open a London warehouse for their Nottingham goods.

They began in a very unpretentious way in Rusea Row off Mill Street, in the city, where John and his wife were content to "live over the shop." As the business grew, they took a modest house at Homerton, where their six children were born. The late Samuel Morley was the youngest of these and was born in 1809. In fullness of time, Samuel Morley became the head of the firm, and in 1841 married Miss Rebecca Hope, daughter of a Liverpool banker, who brought him a considerable increase of fortune. Everything he touched prospered till he counted his employees by thousands, and his profits by millions of dollars. He was one



The six year old son of George Mosher was drowned yesterday at Lunenburg, N. S. His body was found in shallow water, near the shore.

The Superior Pulp & Paper Co. works will be at the Canadian Soo. The plant will employ nearly 400 hands, and will cost about \$2,000,000.

Wm. J. Burns, detective, who is working on the David Russell case in Montreal, reached that city yesterday. He said that some startling information in connection with the matter would be known before long.

The I. C. R. board of management members left Montreal last night for Clitham en route to Montreal. They met several delegations yesterday, including one asking revision of the clerk's schedule.

It is announced from Montreal that Hon. A. K. MacLean, who recently resigned the attorney-generalship of Nova Scotia, will open an office in Montreal and would be associated with Hector McInnes, and that they would conduct much of the legal business of the Canadian Northern.

A London cable says that a royal residence in Ireland has been suggested, and will probably be accepted.

The post office department is issuing a new summer uniform for the letter carriers—blue blouses of light material with gilt buttons and gold head trimmings and helmets of pith.

The damage by forest fires at Squamish, B. C., has been estimated at \$300,000, according to advice from Vancouver.

Hartland, July 20—Examined before Stipendiary Magistrate Shaw at Bath this afternoon for shooting at Herman Green with intent to do bodily harm, G. W. Green, of Hartland, was held in \$1,000 bail to await trial before the Circuit Court. There is much interest over the affair.

Moncton, July 20—The I. C. R. Brotherhood have raised \$200 for the X-ray machine to be installed in Moncton hospital. At a meeting tonight a report was made showing satisfactory progress with the movement.

Amherst, N. S., July 20—At a meeting of ratepayers today to consider the question of granting Mayor Lowther \$1,000 salary as chairman of the street committee, the vote stood 220 against to 187 for. The fact that Mr. Low, as mayor nominated himself chairman, and that the position has never before carried a salary, is no doubt responsible for the adverse vote.

Daily Hints For the Cook

SUNSHINE CAKE.

Take the whites of seven eggs and when partly beaten add three-fourths teaspoon of cream of tartar and one-half teaspoon vanilla. When beaten to a stiff froth, add slowly one cup of fine sugar, yolks of five eggs and three-fourths cup of flour, sifted three or four times. Put the flour in slowly through a sieve. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes, or until it begins to lower. The pan should not be greased, and must be inverted as soon as taken out of the oven, or it can be turned over five minutes before it has finished baking.

SOLITARY PEER WAS ONCE THE GOVERNOR OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Baron Stanmore Who Stood Out in House of Lords Against Colleagues Was Sir Arthur Hamilton Gordon

A London despatch last night announced that the House of Lords passed the third reading of the parliament bill, otherwise known as the veto bill, without division, after only three hours' debate. The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize. All the threats of the extremists to throw out the bill at this stage and precipitate a crisis proved a bluff. One solitary peer, Baron Stanmore, raised his voice to demand a vote and he found no support in his role of Horatius at the bridge.

There is special interest in New Brunswick in the fact that Baron Stanmore alone stood out for a vote for he is well remembered here though under another name. Baron Stanmore was Sir Arthur Hamilton Gordon, one time lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick. He held that position at the time of Confederation.

In 1855 the first election on the question of uniting the provinces was held, and the anti-Confederating delegates defeated the supporters of Confederation. The latter secured only six seats in the house of forty-one.

Governor Gordon had lent his influence very strongly against the confederation project, but next year changed his course, and it was said, by a hint from the powers at home.

In the next year the people voted again on the question, and confederation was carried by a great majority as well against it in the first election.

CALAIS HAS AGREED

Baseball Air is Clear Again—Marathons Get Three New Players

Matters in connection with the N. B. and Maine Baseball League have again been smoothed over, and the league will run along as before. The Calais manager, Mr. Murchie, has agreed to submit the matter in dispute to one of the presidents of the Big League in the states, and the team will continue to play in the league. Manager Donald, of the Marathons, has signed on three new men, all of whom will be here for Saturday's game. Two of the men are coming from the states and are somewhat short-handed now on account of Donald being suspended, and Fraser having his wrist broken. One of the trio is a pitcher named Mabee, who comes highly recommended. He comes from Saranac Lake, and has been playing fast ball this season.

The other American import is Dutton, who hails from New York. He is a University of Vermont player, and is said to be rated as a catch-er.

The Fredericton management are importing some new players and have now about fifteen men on the payroll.
