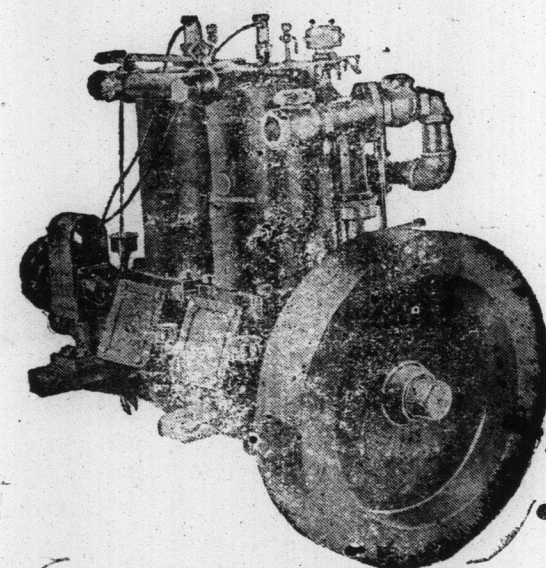

The early mailing of Christmas and New Year parcels for Naval Reservists and members of the Newfoundland Regiment at the front is urged by the Post Office department. The mailing of such parcels should take place before the middle of the present month. It is possible that letters mailed up to within the last week of November will be delivered to Overseas Troops before Christmas, but irregularities and uncertainties in the Field Mail service cannot be avoided.

## Market Notes

(From Trade Review, Nov. 18.)

### CODFISH.

Shore merchants hold their own at \$8.60 to \$8.20. Labrador Shored, good, dry, is \$7.70. There has, however, been a slump this week in Labrador Soft from \$6.80 to \$6.30, and with some firms to \$6.00. This is due to two facts that have arisen lately—first, there are large quantities of Icelandic fish coming into Spain and Italy since the beginning of this month, and it eminently suits our markets for Labrador Soft; second, it is more difficult than ever to get permits in England to send large steamer cargoes into Greece. Last week this condition amounted to a "hold up". When the news reached here, exporters, especially those already well supplied, shied off from buying.

### COD OIL.

There were large transactions here in common oil the past week, when some seventy schooners were in port with the season's catch. The regular price paid was \$175.00 per ton for good oil. There were two more, and some who received less, transactions depending on the quantity to be sold by each individual, and the quality of the oil. The foreign markets are holding good, and the price will keep up, probably going to \$180.00 in the New Year. Refined oil has not improved on last week's prices, and independent sellers, who search the town, are glad to get \$1.40, when they find that the general offer is \$1.30 to \$1.35. The foreign demand is showing little signs of improvement.

### FLOUR.

The flour situation is stronger than ever this week. Leading brands are now quoted at \$11.50, and second qualities from \$10.90 to \$11.30, wholesale. Wheat has reached the \$2.00 a bushel point in some of the U. S. markets. The war demand and damage reports to crops in Australia and Argentine have aggravated the situation, and dealers are now looking forward to \$15.00 flour before midwinter.

### PORK.

The prices have not changed since last issue, but, owing to the abnormal demand now setting in at the packing centres, may at any moment. It is difficult to get orders filled, and the supply is not at all equal to the demand. Ham Butt is \$93.50, Fat Back and Clear \$91.50, wholesale. No one expects lower prices for pork during the next four months at least. Owing to the high rates local buying has fallen off about 33 per cent.

### BEEF.

'Scarc and dear' are the words that characterize the beef market at the present time. Importers here find it difficult to get their orders filled, and have to wait for weeks before the shipments are placed on the coast. The stocks of cattle are reported to be short of the normal at the packing points, and assurance of big war orders makes it difficult for ordinary business requirements to receive prompt attention. This, also, is

the season of the highest demand, both for home and foreign consumption. There are no prospects of cheaper beef for the next six months.

## Criminal Law Against Combines

The Canadian Government has recently passed an Order-in-Council under the authority of the War Measures Act as a remedy to meet the continued increased cost of living.

It makes it illegal combinations in restraint of trade, or for the enhancement of prices, makes it illegal for any company as well as any private individual to hoard up unduly food, clothing, fuel and materials of manufacture entering into the course of life, provides for investigation, either by the Dominion Labor Department or by any Municipal Council, of any case of price enhancement, and requires sworn statements and full disclosures of costs, stocks, contracts, selling agreements, etc., by all accused firms.

The Order in Council defines as necessities of life a staple or ordinary article of food, whether fresh, preserved or otherwise treated, clothing and fuel, including the products, materials and ingredients from or of which any thereof are in whole or in part manufactured, composed, derived or made.

The penalty for infraction of any of the regulations is a fine not to exceed \$5,000, or imprisonment for any term up to two years, or both.

## Needs Attention

The retaining wall and road just west of The Guardian Office, on Water Street, needs immediate attention. Already drivers of horses have experienced some difficulty because of the accumulation of snow on the north side of the road. As the season advances this inconvenience will increase. The snow accumulates in huge bulks on the north side of the road, and a dangerous sliding is the result. We have seen load after load capsize at this point, endangering the life of the driver and his horse besides damaging harness and elide. The road and wall is worse than usual this year, and we hope our energetic Road Board will attend quickly to this matter.





**Western German Too Confiding**


Calgary—Thousands of Germans in Canada, and hundreds of thousands in the States are but waiting the word to rise and help in the final crushing of Britain about the end of July or the beginning of August, according to confidences unrespectfully made to a German speaking Scotchman, by a naturalized German, formerly of the Calgary districts, Reynold Hordon, who was arrested recently by the city police on a charge of sedition.

Hordon, who was in the city on business connected with his farm, entered into conversation in a hotel room with the Scotchman, whom he saw looking over a German paper and who has a distinctly Teutonic appearance.

In the exchange of confidences that followed, Hordon boasted that the final blow would be struck against Britain, which must be crushed at all hazards towards mid-summer. Germans all over the States and Canada were organizing with a view to helping in making that blow decisive. Getting naturalized is just part of the game, he said. 'We've instructed to do that.' He said that the Germans in Canada could do a great deal of damage, observing that 250 men could wipe out Calgary.

Hordon made further boasts as to his personal skill at shooting and his ability to handle a bayonet.

He has been in the country for nine years, his farm being at Aberdeen, 60 miles north of Calgary, and has hitherto palmed himself off as a Finnlander.

**General Gordon's Prophecy**

It is dangerous to prophecy, but General Gordon was not far wrong about Germany. It was just a generation ago that he wrote these prophetic words to a friend:

'Every Briton should think of the future of his country, and cause each one to insist on the Government passing a measure for compulsory universal military training. So far as England is concerned, she need not, for the next quarter of a century, be under any apprehension of serious difficulties arising with any of her European neighbors, but in 1910 or thereabouts there will have arisen a naval power which may prove mightier than she; and should she—Germany—gain the supremacy, England will become extinct, both as a sea and a land power, and all her dependencies, including India, will fall into Germany's clutches. You may live to this; I shall not; but when the time comes remember my words.'

**Peace Not Near Says Dr. Prince**

**Allies Will Never Let Up Until German Imperialism Is Crushed**

Talk about peace in Europe until the menace of German militarism is crushed for all time is futile and shows an entire lack of comprehension of the spirit of the people of England and France, according to Dr. Morton H. Prince, who has just returned from Europe, where he went as a representative of the Serbian relief committee and as a bearer to France of the 'Address to the people of the Allied Nations,' signed by 500 American sympathizers.

Dr. Prince says that nearly every one with whom he talked expects the war to last another year. Certain military authorities with whom he talked were certain, he said, that the allies would break through by next summer, unless the Germans retreated and withdrew their line soon.

**No Peace Yet**

Nevertheless, there is a very wide divergence of opinion on the subject of the probable duration of the war and no one can predict with any degree of certainty just how, and when the end will come, he says.

During his stay in France Dr. Prince made painstaking inquiries among all classes to learn the sentiment of the people toward an immediate peace.

'I talked with many thoughtful and responsible people and found them agreed on one proposition,' said Dr. Prince, 'and that is that there should be no peace until the menace of German militarism is completely eradicated. Taking people as a whole, they are actuated by different motives. As regards the motives by which they are inspired, the French people may be divided into three groups.

'The first group comprises a large part of the army and people in the northern district, people whose homes have been mostly devastated, whose women have been outraged and who have been forced to submit to every other kind of atrocity. They are actuated by the feeling that Germany must be punished before peace can be made. You may call it the spirit of revenge.

'There is another group comprised of Frenchmen who believe that under no circumstances should any peace be considered which does not have as a condition precedent the restoration of the lost provinces of Alsace and Lorraine.

**Duty to the Future**

'The third class is by far the largest and comprises a majority of the citizens of France. They are actuated by what they regard as their duty to coming generations of Frenchmen. They are determined that their children and their children's children shall be spared the suffering which German militarism has brought to them in the present war. To that end they are ready to make any sacrifice—to sacrifice the present generations, if need be. That feeling is the inspiration of the French in this war. It is a religion with them.

'England agrees with France that the German peril must be forever obliterated,' replied Dr. Prince in answer to a question. 'They have not arrived at that conclusion by precisely the same mental processes as those of the idealistic French, however. The English look upon the subject in a practical way. They know only that they have a disagreeable job to do and one that must be done so thoroughly now that it will never be necessary to do it again. They are not considering the length of time that will be required or the cost. They feel that it must be done and they are determined to do it. As Lloyd George expressed it: 'There is no clock and no calendar in the British Army.'

'England and France feel that they are fighting the battle of civilization and humanity and the battle of democracy,' continued Dr. Prince. 'They are cheerful and confident of the final result. This confidence, which is reflected in the splendid morale of the troops, is admirably illustrated in one of the latest French posters. It pictures a "Poldi" the French equivalent for the English "Tommy" charging. One hand is raised aloft and in the other he is carrying his gun. 'We've got them,' he is shouting.

'We've got them! That's the universal feeling of the people of England and France. To them, their position in the war is comparable to that of an eleven in a Harvard-Yale game en-

**Superiority of Allies**

'Then, they have a superiority in men and reserves. In this respect Germany is growing weaker and the allies stronger.

'In another respect, and one that is most important, the French and English are immeasurably superior to the Germans. I refer to their mastery of the air, due to their greater numbers and above all, to the superior quality of the English and French machines.

'One doesn't realize the tremendous value of this superiority unless he has been at the front and seen the work of the aeroplanes and the observation balloons. Their value to the intelligence department is incalculable. They not only locate the guns, observe the operations of the enemy and the location of the enemy's trenches and furnish other information that is of tremendous value, but direct by wireless the gun fire of the allied batteries.

'Then, of course, their direct offensive value is important. They bombard trenches, railroads and factories, often seriously impeding the enemy.

Dr. Prince's attention was called to the fact that instances of French and British planes being brought down were reported much more frequently than like disasters to the Germans.

'Of course,' he replied. 'The reason the Germans lose less planes is that owing to this mastery of the air by the French and English, few German aviators dare to make flights over the allied lines where fighting is going on. In a certain period, I was told, the French and British aeroplanes made 3000 flights over the German lines on the Somme, while in the same period the Germans made only 14 flights over the allied lines. The German aviators rarely venture within the enemy's lines.'

**Find A Coal Substitute**

Washington, Nov. 4.—Manufacture of coal from waste materials of paper factories—an industry which holds forth promise of reducing the cost of paper and furnishing at a small cost an excellent substitute for coal as a fuel product is described in a report made public today by the Department of Commerce from American Consul General Dennison at Christiania, Norway.

The project is said to be practicable and an exploiting corporation has already been formed by Norwegian interests.

Department officials discussed whether such a project could not be undertaken successfully in the United States, particularly in paper producing localities, and pointed out that if this were done it might provide some relief from the threatened coal famine and prove valuable to paper manufacturers.

The Old Story

From the city press we learn that at present there is not a single unoccupied bed at the General Hospital, St. John's, and that upwards of 100 persons, principally from the outports, are quartered in boarding houses, awaiting admission to the hospital.

It is patent to even the most casual observer that the hospital accommodation at St. John's is altogether insufficient to meet the needs of the island generally, and that some means will have to be devised to afford better care and attention to the sick and afflicted among our outport population.

Time and again various sections of the press, and far-seeing correspondents have advocated the creation of outport hospital service, but those in authority have failed to take any steps or bring forward any measures to try and alleviate the unnecessary inconvenience and suffering entailed by our altogether inadequate hospital accommodation.

Conditions as they exist are a disgrace to any civilized country. We have been brought very much before the eyes of the world by the splendid specimens of manhood contributed by us to help the cause of the allies in the great war.

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How About It

We have received information that some produce dealers in settlements a little removed from Bay Roberts are selling turnips and giving only 150 pounds to the barrel, but charging the full current price of \$1.50.

The parties referred to, we are informed, claim that the weight has been reduced, and that 150 pounds is now the standard.

Mr. W. H. Goodland, partner in the firm of Gray & Goodland, printers and stationers, St. John's, passed away on Thursday morning last from an attack of pleurisy. Mr. Goodland was foreman of the Evening Telegram Office for many years before forming the partnership with Mr. Gray, and was well and favorably known by the Editor of The Guardian, who served his apprenticeship under Mr. Goodland.

Passing of Rev. Samuel Snowden

We publish herewith a tribute paid to the memory of the late Rev. Samuel Snowden by a very close and intimate friend, Mr. J. Alex. Robinson, late Editor of The Daily News, and now Postmaster General.

"Rev. Samuel Snowden passed away at Keighley, Yorkshire, England, on Nov. 3rd. This information will be received with sorrow in many a home in Newfoundland, both in the city and outports. Mr. Snowden's ministry in this island commenced forty-three years ago, and until ill health compelled his retirement from active work, he was in labours abundant. The sorrows of many a mourner have been lightened by his kindly ministrations, for in time of heartbreak no messenger brought greater comfort.

"Strong in his realization of the eternal verities, his message came with a rare power, inspiring confidence and hope. If an epitaph were asked, perhaps no words could more aptly sum up his life work than 'Barnabas, the son of Consolation.' Mr. Snowden was intensely orthodox. What is orthodox and what heterodox, may be matter of debate. Each Church, possibly each individual, has its own opinion on that point. Methodist orthodoxy implies adherence to the theological precepts enunciated by John Wesley, and embodied in his sermons, and Mr. Snowden was essentially a Wesleyan Methodist. To him, as to the great apostle of his Church, the world was his parish. To his circuits he devoted his life with zeal and energy, but wherever there was suffering or sorrow, there he was found. The 'ologies and 'isms had no attraction for him. He was no student of modernism, no 'philosopher' as the world counts philosophy. Content to be a faithful servant of his Master, his one absorbing passion was the salvation of souls, and the bringing of consolation to those who were the sons and daughters of affliction.

"For temporal preferment he cared little. He sought no honours, but honours found him, and the action of the Conference at Grand Bank in 1907 in electing him to the Presidency, was one that did honour to the hearts and heads of his brethren. To Mr. Snowden the preferment came as a great surprise. Moving quietly, content to serve his God, his Church and his people in any capacity, his one ambition being to make life happier for those who sorrowed, and to bring the gospel of salvation to the homes and hearts of the people, when thus signally honoured by his brethren he was almost overwhelmed. His tenure of office, however, demonstrated the wisdom of their choice. Mr. Snowden measured up to the standard, and his influence was felt throughout Methodist circles in the island in the spiritual uplift which resulted from the strong evangelistic note which characterized his every thought and action.

"Mr. Snowden was a Yorkshire man by birth. He was also a Yorkshire Methodist, and what that means, or what it meant forty years ago, was illustrated in his life. These traits he carried with him to every parsonage and on every circuit. He knew how to stir the hearts of his hearers, not by eloquent periods or dramatic gestures, in my eye, but by his strong faith, sincerity of purpose and singleminded devotion to duty. Mr. Snowden lived as he preached, and preached as he lived.

"Amongst the circuits on which he laboured were Musgrave Town, Flat Island, P.B., Sound Island, Fortune, Bay Roberts (twice), Topsail, Old Perlean, Blackhead (twice), Catalina, Heart's Content and Briggs. About two years ago, just before the War, a great longing came over him to once more see the land of his birth, and with Mrs. Snowden he left for England. His health was then fast falling, and few who bade him good-bye expected to witness his return. Sidelined by the war in which Britain was so unexpectedly plunged, he grew more feeble month by month. The untiring care and tender ministrations of his devoted wife will never be forgotten by his friends, either here or in the Old Country; but even these could not long delay the final summons. It has come, but has brought with it no bitterness. Death has no sting, and the grave no sorrow for such as Samuel Snowden.

"He leaves to mourn his passing but to rejoice in his triumph, a widow formerly Miss Oldford, of Musgrave Town, Bonavista Bay, and one daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Atkinson, Bay Roberts. J. A. R."
