**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY**

(Continued.)

FRIDAY, MARCH 8th.

THE PREMIER (contd.)—Dr. Lloyd this morning had adopted the well-known principle 'Where you have no case, call the other side names.' There had been no extravagance, but the time had come when the country had to think in millions, and undertake great works, large services, to sculp our people for further development. The necessities of the country must be met. He, the Premier, had the other day gone into this question of the public needs in great detail. We were to day under an expense for the public services of \$1,000,000 a year more than the last government, because we had so much better services, and so much more, look at the schools, the light-houses, the old age pensions, the extra \$30,000 a year to widows and orphans, and still did not half meet the case; and the things he had for nothing could, and that looked at the end of the day, was more than the Government could afford to do. affairs of the country, and to have been blamed for it. Seventy-one thousand dollars had been spent on telegraphs last year, and one third of it had been spent for that never were delivered, and men had been paid for days when they were drunk. He did not blame the Government, but the superintendent. The Agricultural money was equally wasted. He did not say that the salaries paid to the commissioners were wasted. They were intelligent and hardworking men, and they were worth more than they were paid. He referred to the fact that the logging bill had been treated in the Upper House. Not a man up there would take charge of it. He intended from that day to do everything he could do, and say and write with a view to the abolition of the Upper House. The A. N. D. Co. and Mr. Crowe approved of that bill; only the Albert Reed Co. opposed it on the plea that they were losing money. But they were losing money in other countries until lately, and they complained not. While he had breath he was going to work for the destruction of the Upper House. As to New Zealand, it was its trade unions that had made it great.

THE PREMIER said that as to the allegations of drunkenness and waste on the telegraph line this summer, it was no better man to build telegraph lines than Mr. Cunningham; his results were under the estimate of cost. He, the Premier, was generally acquainted with his work. The men in charge of telegraph construction were excellent men, and of long service.

MR. COAKER said it was on the main line, not Mr. Cunningham's line, which was a good line.

HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY said the allegation that poles were paid for the not delivered was a serious one, and would be investigated, as would any other charge made, if Mr. Coaker would furnish a note of them. He had taken a great interest in fox farms, and supported the prohibition of export of foxes with a view to establishing a fox farm industry in this country. Free export would mean the defection of our foxes. There were cases where it was a hardship on individuals not to be allowed to sell foxes abroad; and he was often the case that a few had to suffer in the interests of the many. We must try to establish an industry, as in Prince Edward Island; and if ranches outside could not get our foxes, they would come and establish here; and this was already coming about, and would in a few years amount to a very large industry. As to the tax on increasing taxes was always unpopular, and was always criticised in the same way, whether it was necessary or not. The Government were in no hole. We had the same prediction of ruin five years ago when Sir Edward Merri's manifesto was published. He did not think it was genuine to state about the fishermen being poor, and that they ought not to be taxed. The fishermen were better off now, and they were men enough to want to pay their share for what they wanted. All the public work done during the past five years had been of benefit to the fishermen, and they could not be had for nothing. He was glad that there was beginning to be a better feeling in the matter of public moneys. The sooner the members of the House were free of the administration of public moneys, the better. Local moneys should be locally spent, and the members for the District were called on for too many trivial things that people should not expect them to do.

MR. MOORE referred to the fact that Mr. Coaker had lately in the House intimated that his company had received improper plumbing contracts; and that he himself had bought a house out of the proceeds. He desired to inform Mr. Coaker that his firm had tendered in reply to public advertisement, had tendered lower than any other firm; in the case of the Hospital his tender was \$1,750 lower than the next best. The late leader of the Liberal Party gave orders that only one firm was to get plumbing and heating contracts on Government buildings; and one firm got it all for 17 years.

MR. COAKER said his principle was that no man who occupied a seat on

the Government side should have any government contract. He himself would never take a cent out of his connection with the house. He never intended to be Premier, and he never intended to take a department.

MR. MOORE asked if, when the hon. member got to this side of the House, if ever, he would never take a subsidy for the Kintail.

MR. COAKER said no. No company with which he was connected would ever get a cent. He himself intended to die a poor man, and that was to be his glory.

MR. JENNINGS referred to the question of the cost of coals supplied to lighthouses. In some cases this was excessive, also to the cost of stores supplied, and to the sums paid for carrying small amounts of freight to various light stations, which he considered excessive. He had experience of lighthouse matters. He had been very pleased with the reception in the House of the logging Bill, which he knew was much needed. The conditions had killed many of the weaker men. It was not enough to depend on the generosity of the employers. Many fishermen could afford to pay more taxes; but most were living only from hand to mouth. He agreed however that the sooner our people learnt that they themselves had to find the public moneys, the better.

MR. WINSON thought there was a good deal of waste of public money that probably the Government knew nothing about. He referred to some of the money that would be spent on the reduction of salaries in a great many cases, and increase in others.

MR. TARGOTT thought that there had been a lot of money wasted, though the Government had its good points.

MR. STONE considered that the people of the country were overtaxed.

DR. LLOYD repeated his statement that the Premier's mandate from the people was to do all the works mentioned, but without increased taxation. The Opposition were not disputing that the work was done, but only said that it had not been done as promised, without taxation. Although the revenue had greatly increased, we were now asked for more taxation.

THE PREMIER again said that the statement he made in his Manifesto of 1909 was absolutely and critically correct, and had been absolutely and critically sustained. But he could talk till Doomsday without convincing Dr. Lloyd of that. He had said all the things that he had said, and the platform could be carried out if we got \$1,000,000 instead; and the Government, besides its platform, had carried out a thousand other things. And that is why Dr. Lloyd had said that he had found Trinity District so different from what he left it 6 years ago. And the same was true of every other District.

DR. LLOYD said that the Premier had promised to do all these things, and not increase taxation; and he had not done it. We had been told that this year's revenue would pay for all these things.

THE PREMIER said the increases were to cover new services not included in the estimates last year, but included in those of this year. Dr. Lloyd denied this.

MR. COAKER said that the extra expenditures in Trinity Bay were only made to try and get Mr. (Continued on page 3)

This is contrary to the proper rate of postage on Newspapers sent from Newfoundland to Great Britain, which is the same as that payable on ordinary printed matter, viz., One Cent per every two ounces or fraction thereof.

The public will please take notice that in future all such insufficiently prepaid Newspaper packets will be marked for taxation before despatch in accordance with Article 11 of the detailed Regulation for the Execution of the Postal Union Convention of Rome.

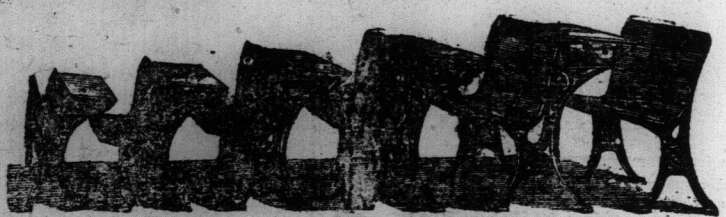

## HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

(Continued from page 2)

Squires in spite of the Opposition side would never be convinced by any argument of the necessity of putting on this increased taxation, which was only due to extravagance. It was no good trying to justify the Government. They must only reject.

The PREMIER said Mr. Coaker was astray in his statements about the expenditure in Trinity Bay. All money was spent on a per capita basis, and every District was treated alike utterly regardless of its population. And Opposition Districts never got their share of surplus before; but this Government had given them their share per capita. The Premier would produce figures to that effect. It was not under the past Government. In the year 1908 there was nearly \$25,000 additional spent in Twillingate, while Bonavista never got a cent. Under this Government every District got its share per capita.

DR. LLOYD said that the remark about Trinity Bay originated on the Government side.

THE PREMIER said it was incorrect. MR. DEVEREAUX said that Placentia got its share of everything to a cent, just as well as Trinity. He had made the remark in reference to lighthouses, that Placentia got only one. But Burin got its share, and the Burin lighthouses were in Placentia Bay. He would never hear of any District getting more than its share while Placentia did not. They had had their full share of public works. He was glad to notice in the course of debate that everybody felt that the agricultural policy was beginning to make itself felt. He referred to the growth of the English national debt side by side with the vast prosperity of England. National debts were a very different thing from private debts. Sir Edward Morris would go down to posterity with Sir Wm. Whiteway as our most courageous statesman; and though these two conditions in Newfoundland were immeasurably better than 30 years ago, our people were better off, better educated.

MR. STONE said there were a great many hush grants and private grants made in Trinity District. Mr. Walsh had said Trinity Bay got more than Placentia.

MR. WALSH said that all he had said was that if Trinity had as good roads as is was said to have, it must have been getting more than its share, but he had mentioned no figure. He had no definite facts.

MR. HALFYARD thought that three-man Districts got more than one-man Districts. As to the carry-

ing out of the Manifesto, what had been done for the herring fishery; had any bounty for clearing land been granted; had representation been given to Burin; had our coal areas been examined; these things were promised in the Manifesto. It was no use for the Government to argue; they were open to criticism in too many ways. He objected to the taxation of lumber.

DR. LLOYD said that he had understood that the members for Placentia Bay were jealous of what Trinity District had got. Now he heard it was not, he wanted to know why Placentia had got more than its share; for that was the case.

MR. DEVEREAUX said it had not.

MR. KENT said he would have some further remarks to make on the third reading.

MR. GRIMES referred to various matters in connection with agriculture, and to some appropriations for public works which he considered wasteful. He referred to New Zealand and said they had resources which we had not, and recommended Government ownership of railways, etc.

The Committee rose and reported, having passed the Bill without amendment. It was ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

MR. SPEAKER acquainted the House that the Council had passed the Saw Mills Act, with some amendments. These were read a first time and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Second reading of the Sealing Bill was deferred till to-morrow.

The Public Service Bill was read a second time, and ordered to be referred to Committee of the whole House on to-morrow.

MR. KENT referred to an article in the Daily Mail referring to the synopsis of the debates published in outport papers, and also to the partisan nature of the public despatch. He also said that there was unfair discrimination in the admission of persons to the House of Assembly.

MR. COAKER said with regard to the report in the paper that this was the style of report that had been published for some time, as to admission, sealers had told him that they had been turned away while others were admitted.

MR. CURRIE said that the outport papers were in the habit of taking copy from the city papers, instead of waiting for the regular synopsis.

MR. KENT said it was unfair for the supervisor to be expected to give an intelligent synopsis up to date in conjunction with his own work. He was not surprised to learn that papers had felt unable to wait for the regular synopsis.

The Premier gave notice of the suspension of rules for Monday next.

MR. COAKER gave notice of question.

MR. HALFYARD referred to the Outport Despatch, which should be of a non-partisan nature.

The House adjourned till Monday at 3 p.m.

## Railway Matters

Construction work on the branch railways is now in full swing, and about 800 men are employed, which number will be largely augmented during the present month.

On the Fortune Bay branch, which is being built under the direction of Construction Supt. Cobb, about 400 men are now employed, and getting through about a mile of work each day. The Supt. is camped at Piper's Hole at present, but will move toward the terminal as the work progresses.

About 150 men are employed on the Hear's Content branch at completion work, which will finish before the close of the season. Supt. John Campbell is in charge directing the work of trimming up, building sidings, snow fences, stations, platforms, putting in culverts, etc.

Supt. A. Graham is directing the finishing work on the Trepassay branch, and has about 150 men under his charge. These are building stations, platforms, bridge supports, snow fences and other accessories, and are making good progress each day.

On the Bay de Verde branch Supt. Harry Burton is looking after the work, and has over 100 men employed. They are engaged at track laying, building snow fences, platforms, bridges, etc. There are about four miles of track to be laid and some ballasting to be done, together with final trimmings all of which will be completed the present season.

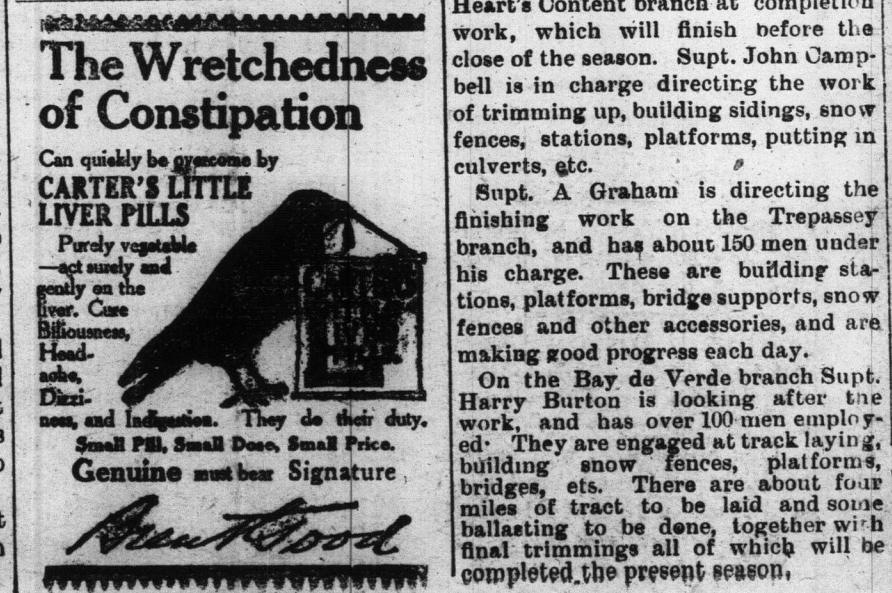

## PUBLIC NOTICE

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished on posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

## NOTICE.

The Attention of the Public is Called to the Following Provisions of the Act Respecting Saw Mills, 1914s, Namely:—

Sec. 1.—Any bona fide fisherman who wishes to operate a saw mill for the purpose of preparing staves for heading, for making barrels, for fishery requirements, or for the making of shingles, lobster laths, or lobster boxes, whose whole cut of timber for other purposes does not exceed 10,000 feet, board measure, in any one year, may obtain, free of cost, a license to operate a saw mill for such purposes, and any other purposes in such quantity subject to the following conditions:—

(a).—The license may be granted by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines for one year from the 30th November upon the application of the bona fide fisherman as aforesaid, who shall set forth in his application that he is such fisherman, and also the situation of his mill, its capacity, and the period during which it has been in operation. The Minister of Agriculture and Mines may in his discretion, renew the said license annually.

(b).—No person without obtaining a license as hereinbefore provided shall operate a saw mill of the class described in this section after six months from the passing of this Act, under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under said license shall be due and payable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be lawful for the Minister of Agriculture and Mines to issue licenses to persons or companies who are at present operating mills on what is known as the 'Three Mile Limit' and not on the holders of timber or pulp licenses under the Crown Lands Act, to cut timber to operate saw mills for one year from the 30th November, which said license shall be renewable at the discretion of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines on payment of a fee of Five Dollars. The licensee of any such license shall pay as a royalty the sum of one dollar per thousand feet, board measure, on all lumber sawn or manufactured in the mill operated under authority thereof.

(c).—Application for such license shall be made to the Minister of Agriculture and Mines accompanied by fee of Five Dollars, and before the issue of such license the Minister of Agriculture and Mines shall cause to be published for a period of thirty days, by affixing the same at a Post Office or other public building in the neighbourhood of the situation of the mill proposed to be operated under such license, a notice setting forth the fact that such license has been applied for.

(g).—No person not being the holder of a timber or pulp license under the Crown Lands Act shall, without obtaining a license as in this Act provided, operate after one month after the passing of this Act a Saw Mill for the manufacture of timber cut on Crown land under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for every day when such mill is operated; and all such licenses issued before the 30th November of the present year shall terminate on the said date, on which date also the first royalty under such licenses shall be due and payable.

Sec. 4.—The Governor in Council may when it shall be made to appear to him to be for the interest of the Colony by proclamation to be published in the Royal Gazette, prevent the felling of growing or standing trees on the public lands of the Colony or portion of the same, or lands held under license, lease or grant, for the purpose of taking away the rinds of the said trees for any purpose whatever.

Sec. 5.—The penalty for the infraction of any of the provisions and conditions of this Act, where such penalty has not been fixed by any preceding section of this Act, or by the Crown Lands Act, shall be a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each infraction thereof. All penalties under this Act may be sued for in the name of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace by any Timber Infractor or other person authorized by the Minister of Agriculture and Mines.
