



TO TRINIDAD.

MAILS FROM CANADA

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 23.—The post office department issued a notice to-day that a convention is now in force between Canada and Trinidad for the direct exchange of closed parcels by mail. Under this convention parcels sent from Canada to Trinidad are subject to the following conditions: The maximum weight of a single parcel is 7 pounds and the maximum dimensions

maximum weight of a single parcel is 7 pounds and the maximum dimensions shall be 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. The rate of postage is 16 cents for each pound weight or fraction thereof.

Every parcel is to be accompanied by a customs declaration which shall be affixed to the parcel showing the value of the contents, and all parcels shall be subject to the customs regulations of the country of destination. No parcel shall contain any article the transmission of which is prohibited under the regulations relating to other classes of material or any article prohibited by the regulations of the Trinidad post office.

A letter or communication of the rature of personal correspondence may

ture of personal correspondence may not be written or enclosed with, or attached to any parcel.

No parcel may contain an enclosure intended for delivery at an address other than that borne by the parcel

Itself.

Under the new arrangement all parcels for transmission to Trinidad by parcel post are to be forwarded to St. John, N. B., post office, where the parcel mails will be made up.

Notice has been received by the post office department of Canada to the effect that mail communication with Russia via Stockholm is uncertain, but that correspondence for the city and government of St. Petersburg for the north and northwest of Russia and for Finland will be forwarded by every available opportunity and that it is important that the addresses of letters, etc., should be as full as possible, also parcels can be sent at present.




