OTTAWA NEWS.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 23.—The government has accepted an invitation from New Zealand to participate in the provincial exhibition to be held there from November 1st, 1906, to April 7th, 1907. The department of agriculture is sending out diplomats to 1,500 farmers of Canada whose produce helped to win trophies for the Canadian display of goods at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The display contained samples of honey, grain and maple sugar gathered in all the provinces. Deputy ministers have been in daily communication with Hon. Mr. Prinfantine by wireless telegraphy. Hon. Mr. Emmerson, minister of railways, returns to Ottawa from the Pacific coast next Monday. ZEMSTVO CONGRESS DISCUSSES MANIFESTO

Warsaw, Nov. 23.—Governor General Skalon has sent a confidential circular to the temporary military governors recently appointed in the ten Polish provinces, ordering them to consider agitators and rioters as "enemies of the state" and to shoot them down until they are all exterminated, and also to disperse public meetings by the use of firearms. KIEL, Russian Poland, Nov. 23.—Troops are pouring in to reinforce the garrisons in Poland. One additional regiment arrived here today and two regiments passed Kiel marching in the direction of Dombrova.

### BALFOUR'S RESIGNATION LOOKED FOR AT ONCE.

Leading Government Organs Announce That it May Come at Once—Elections Not Likely to be Called Until After Christmas—Great Excitement Prevails in Political Circles.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Tremendous activity developed in political circles today consequent on the circulation of a well founded report that Premier Balfour had decided to bring his ministry to a close and to direct or indirectly appeal to the country. Rumors regarding the resignation of the cabinet and the dissolution of parliament have been thick for three months past, and when two of the leading government organs today almost in the same terms "suggested" the immediate resignation of the premier on account of the unimpeachable breach in the unionist party over the fiscal question, the "suggestion" was looked upon as having been inspired by Mr. Balfour himself. This was strengthened by the knowledge that prior to the publication of the editorial, Mr. Balfour met certain influential persons at his official residence in Downing street. These two facts when coupled, led to the belief that the premier had intended to resign, and as he had just returned from a visit to King Edward at Windsor Castle, it was believed that his majesty had been informed of Mr. Balfour's intentions. Beyond this, however, there is not the slightest official confirmation of the report. All political interest now centres in the cabinet meeting to be held tomorrow, at which, it is understood, the situation will be discussed.

Conservative and unionist papers are in favor of the resignation of the cabinet, which will place the liberals on the defensive in case Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman consents to form a cabinet, but the radicals say that the resignation will only mean dissolution, as Sir Henry, if requested to form a ministry, would certainly decline to do so until the verdict of the president became known.

The liberal papers point out that while Mr. Balfour may attempt this "tactical move," they are confident it will fall on every side and that therefore the dissolution of parliament is believed to be imminent. There is no thought, however, that a campaign would be forced prior to the beginning of the year with the elections somewhere about the end of January.

### WHOLESALE GROCERS HAVE BUSY SEASON

Orders From Up the Bay Points Are Better Than Last Year.

Judging from the amount of business done by the wholesale grocers on North and South Wharves and elsewhere, this season's operations in the woods will be extensive. The grocery trade is an accurate indicator of the lumbering industry. Two years ago the merchants up the bay ran short of supplies in the spring and made up their minds never to do so again. Last year they would have sent in large orders only for the fact that the lumber operators were reducing the cut and not nearly so many men would be employed. Hence trade was rather dull, but the merchants and operators got all the goods they needed.

This season orders are coming in thick and fast, the wholesalers are kept on the jump sending out shipments, and there is a great briskness among the schooner captains to squeeze in as many trips as possible before the bay fits with ice. The schooners carry a large proportion of the freight, but much also goes by the Intercolonial. There are no important changes in price of groceries.

### NOVA SCOTIA CAPTAIN SHOTS HIMSELF ON VESSEL.

BOSTON, Nov. 22.—Captain William Lockhart of the British bark J. E. Graham of Windsor, N. S., committed suicide by shooting on board the vessel at Mystic wharf, Charles River, today. Capt. Lockhart was found in the bathroom of the vessel by Steward John Marshall and he died an hour and a quarter later.

Lockhart fired one shot from a 28 calibre revolver into his head. The other officers said that Capt. Lockhart had been dependent of late. Captain Lockhart was 55 years of age and a native of the province, but his home during recent years has been in Brooklyn, N. Y. The Graham is loading lumber for Buenos Ayres.

### CRUDE COBALT FROM CANADA.

English Metal Dealer Wants to Handle Large Quantities—U. S. Seiners Off N. S. Coast.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 22.—A report from Mr. McNamara, Canadian agent at Manchester, to the trade department, states that a large metal dealer in that city is desirous of handling crude cobalt from Canada. He is in correspondence with Liverpool and London brokers on the subject, and says he is prepared to smelt 500 tons per week for the silver contained in the ore provided he receives satisfactory assurances that the brokers would give him a monopoly of all the shipments to Great Britain passing through their hands. This he deemed essential owing to the expense entailed in fitting up a proper smelting plant for the extraction and separation of the various constituents contained in the ore.

According to a report received by the department of marine today, there are still ten United States mackerel seiners off the Nova Scotia coast, near Cape Sable. Until these vessels depart for their home ports the Canadian protection cruisers will remain in commission.

### MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Bodies of Man and Woman Found in Woods Near Boston & Maine Track.

CLAREMONT, N. H., Nov. 22.—A case of murder and suicide was revealed today when the bodies of a man and a woman were found in the woods near the Boston and Maine railroad tracks in West Claremont.

Clasped in the man's right hand was a 22 calibre revolver with two chambers empty. The bodies were recognized as those of a couple who registered at the Junction House as W. E. Jones and wife of Portland, Maine, who left the following day. In the man's pocket were found papers bearing the name of Harry W. Leavitt and W. H. Leavitt, and a letter addressed to Mrs. Mary J. Leavitt, Lisbon Falls, Maine.

The coroner expressed the opinion that the couple had been dead about two weeks.

### MAJORITY REDUCED.

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Nov. 22.—The returns today still further reduce the liberal majority. The totals are: Conservative, 1,232; Liberal, 1,188; a majority for Conservatives of 237.

### SKATED TOO SOON; WERE DROWNED.

WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 22.—Six-year-old Bostrom, 14, and Louis Makowski, 12, were drowned this afternoon, having broken through the ice on Hermitage Pond, a small body of water in the green hill property which the city voted a week ago to buy for a park. Levi Bruglund, 34 years old, trying to save the Makowski and Bostrom boys, broke through the ice and was rescued by two men who were working near.

### RECENT DEATHS.

SISTER MARY CHRISTINA.  
The death took place at St. Vincent's Convent yesterday morning of Sister Mary Christina, one of the oldest members of the community of the Sisters of Charity in the maritime provinces. Before entering the community the deceased's name was Miss Mary Ann Collins. She was born in Londonderry, Ireland, 80 years ago and had been a member of the community for a great many years. Prior to entering the community the deceased resided with her parents at Woodstock. After teaching for some time in several missions of the community, Sister Mary Christina came to St. John, where she spent the last fifteen years of her life. Though she had been in failing health for some time it was not until Wednesday that she was confined to her bed. The funeral will take place on Saturday morning after Requiem Mass has been sung.

### SEVENTEEN MEN INJURED BY DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Seventeen men at work in the tunnel which the Long Island Railroad is excavating from Long Island City to the foot of 62nd street and thence to the Grand Central Station, were wounded early this morning by the explosion of the stick of dynamite at the bottom of a seventy foot shaft, near Third avenue. Six of the workmen were so badly hurt that they were removed to a hospital, while the others, suffering from cuts and bruises had their injuries attended to by surgeons.

Fifty men were at work when the explosion occurred. Immediately there was consternation among the residents of that portion of the city.

The presence of the dynamite could not be accounted for, but it was probably left in a cleft by one of the day shift.

The explosion was followed by a stampede by those not in the immediate vicinity. Several of the men near the explosion were rendered unconscious in all directions. Policemen hurried to the rescue. First reports gave many fatalities and ambulances were immediately summoned from half a dozen hospitals and surgeons came from all directions. By the time the hospital aid arrived the injured were being carried from the base of the shaft to the street. Several were unconscious. The surgeons believe, however, that none will die.

### STOLE BAPTISMAL TANK FROM CHURCH.

BOSTON, Nov. 22.—Convicted on a charge of stripping a church of all available metal, including the plumbing and baptismal tank and of selling the material as junk, Henry A. Kelly was sentenced today by Judge Stevens in the superior court to the house of correction for twenty months.

Last May Kelly appeared at the Oliver church in Roxbury and offered to undertake the work of renovating the edifice and to assist the society in other ways. It was shown in court that Kelly made contracts with carpenters, masons and plumbers and had the church stripped. The material was disposed of by Kelly, who was alleged to have taken the proceeds but neglected to pay the workmen for their time. As the result of Kelly's operations the society has been called upon to pay a large number of bills.

### GOLDEN WEDDING.

FARRSBORO, N. S., Nov. 22.—Last Monday evening Mr. and Mrs. Francis L. Jenks celebrated the fifth anniversary of their marriage. Upwards of seventy guests took part in the celebration, and among them were seven or eight who were guests at the wedding of fifty years ago. Among those present were Mrs. A. Gilmore and Mr. and Mrs. J. Willard Smith of St. John. Mrs. Gilmore is a daughter of the long-wedded couple, and Mr. Smith is a nephew of Mrs. Jenks. Mr. and Mrs. Jenks are in good health and look as if they might celebrate many more anniversaries.
