Two Young Fools Die Together in Taxicab

READUNG. Pa., Fab. 17.—While speeding alorg in a taxicab here early today Stella Rocktashel, 18, was shot and killed by her companion George E. Kraut, 20, after directing the chauffeur to hurry to a hospital, turned the revolver that killed in the girl upon himself and sent a bullet into his own heart, dying almost instantly.

The couple engaged the taxicab in the business section of the town shortly before 2 o'clock this morning and when the vicinity of the young women's home was reached the chauffeur Lewis Becker, was startled by the report of a shot inside the cab. A moment later, Becker, declares, the man in the cab yelled to him excitedly to drive to the hospital and just as he entered the Reading hospital grounds, he said he heard a second shot inside the cab. Halting at the hospital door the young woman was found dead in a heap on the seat of the cab with a bullet wound in her head. The bullet had passed completely through her head. The hurrled examination of the man showed that he too, was dead, having shot himself through the heart. Kraut was a telephone inspector. The authorities believe it is a case of murder and suicide.







250 GERMAN MOTHERS BLESS NATHAN STRAUS

Sandhausen, the town near here, where Nathan Straus, the New York philanthropist, has reduced the infantle death rate to less than half of the average rate for the last five years, yesterday had a remarkable demonstration in honor of the first anniversary of the founding of the Straus pasteurized milk depot in the town.

There was a mass meeting, at which Herr Franz Hambrecht, the burgermeister, presided, and told of the checking of sickness and death among the babies of Sanchausen by the use of pasteurized milk. He pointed out that the great saving of infant lives must be attributed to the use of the Straus milk for the reason that there Straus milk for the reason that ther Straus milk for the reason that there had been no other change in the conditions affecting their health, and that they had used the same milk as before, only it had been pasteurized.

At the meeting were 250 mothers with their children, whom they proudly exhibited as evidence of the benefits of pasteurized milk. When a resolution was offered thanking Mr. Straus for his establishment of pasteurized milk depot in the town the mothers all rose and held their children above their shoulders in token of their approval.

The burgermeister was directed to cable Mr. Straus:

"Death rate cut to less than one-half; 250 mothers ask you to continue your work here."

Dr. Arthur Randolph Green, who has been distributing supplies for Mr. Straus among the earthquake survivors in Calabria, arrived here today, having left the work at Reggio in charge of Dr. Bach.

Dr. Green went on to Vienna this afternoon to set up the pasteurizing plant that Mr. Straus has given to the Austrian capital to help reduce the infantile montality in that city. The plant will be maintained out of the jubilee fund raised in thanksgiving for the Emperor Frans Josef's sixtieth anniversary of his accession to the throne. The work will be under the personal patronage of the premier, the Baron von Eienerth, at whose invitation, when he was minister of the interior, Mr. Straus gave a demonstration of the pasteurizing process in Vienna last summer.
