

BOSTON AND ST. JOHN.

Enormous Summer Exodus to the City by the Sea.

Str. Calvin Austin Filled to Her Utmost Capacity—Recent Deaths of Former Provincialists.

The Lumber Market.

BOSTON, Aug. 5.—An enormous exodus from this city and surrounding towns to the north and east has been in progress during the past three or four days. The Eastern Steamship Company's new boat, the Calvin Austin, is said to have broken all records for passenger traffic this year between Boston and St. John today, when she sailed out of the harbor with from 700 to 800 persons on board.

Much surprise and regret followed the announcement today that Rev. Jas. A. Francis, pastor of the Clarendon Street Baptist church, was suffering from nervous breakdown, and had resigned his pastorate.

PORTLAND IS JOYOUS.

Laurier's Government Will Make That City Its New Railway Terminus.

Open Boasting That the Line to Moncton Will Never Be Built—Grand Trunk Almost Ready with Big Campaign Fund to Carry the Canadian Elections for the Liberals.

BOSTON, Aug. 5.—The proposed Canadian railroad legislation and the political developments arising out of it are being watched with intense interest in New England, especially in Portland, where naturally there has been some anxiety lest the Grand Trunk railroad would be compelled to lessen its Canadian shipments at that port.

It is openly claimed in Portland that the proposed Moncton line will never be built, and that this proposed section of the new system is only a part of a huge game of politics.

The fear that was recently felt here that a construction of the proposed Canadian route of the Grand Trunk might seriously injure the interests as a shipping port has been completely dispelled.

Government Intimates That It Will Be Raised to \$1.50—The Lumbermen Want a Lower Rate.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 5.—The lumbermen's conference called by the surveyor general for the purpose of considering the government's proposal to increase the stumpage, and very many important questions connected with the administration of crown timber lands, met this morning.

The surveyor general invited opinions and suggestions relative to this question. He announced also that the government had under consideration the appointment of permanent assessors.

After his address the members of the government retired, and the lumbermen and limit holders' association, organization, organized last night, re-convened with Senator King as presiding officer.
