

TYPICAL NEW YORK CAMPAIGN.

Many elections are taking place today in many States of the Union, but as usual on these off years in politics. New York City captures the attention of the nation. The contest for the mayoralty did not promise much excitement at the beginning. The city is democratic under ordinary conditions, and Judge Gaynor was regarded as an able and respectable member of the party. He was not associated in the public mind with any of the rings which have discredited the New York democracy, and might have claimed the support of some of the independent moral leagues which make occasional protest against Tammany methods.

But after Mr. Gaynor became a candidate he was endorsed by Tammany. That is held to mean that he has made a bargain with the old enemy of good government. When this alliance was announced, Mr. Hearst was heard from. Mr. Hearst is an owner of newspapers, and had been in a fight with Tammany before. He had been a comrade of Judge Gaynor, and had persuaded him to be a candidate, promising him




