

LEST WE FORGET.

If we read the utterances of the United States papers and United States Reciprocity advocates, the basis of the agitation is clearly seen. The same objection is apparent as of olden time, and all succeeding years, up to the present, viz., the Americanization of this Northern Continent, the absorption of Canada, and the absolute dominance of the United States at the expense of British power and Canadian Nationality.

This objective was sought in 1774 and later, first by trying to persuade us to become rebels, in which they

This objective was sought in 1774 and later, first by trying to persuade us to become rebels, in which they were unsuccessful, and then in attempts at conquest, which proved equally futile. The methods next adopted to secure the same destred end, were trade and fisheries compulsion. They used prohibitions, now intercourse acts, and high tariffs to influence us as regards commercial relations, and systematic depredations and harassments upon our fishing grounds and encroachments upon our well known fisheries right. On the Atlantic, and on the Pacific, this policy was persistently pursued by the United States fishermen in their operations, and was as persistently upheld by the United States Government in their support of the pretensions and depredations of their fishermen. At great cost we were compelled to police and protect our shores, and more than once or twice were saved only by the intervention of the British Government and the British Fleet.

In 1870, therefore, we, in conjunction with the British Government, began a vigorous enforcement of our fisheries rights. What favors could not bring about, was accomplished by this vigorous enforcement of our rights and the treaty of 1871 followed. This treaty was to come into force July 1st, 1873, but, at the request of the United States, Canada granted the privilege of inshore fishery to United States fishermen from April 1st, so that they might enjoy the whole season unbroken.

The United States forgot to give Canada the treaty equivalent of free entry for her fish to their market for the same period,—they got free fish from us, we paid oustoms duty to them. Newfoundland and P. E. Island pursued the same generous course, and were met in the same niggardly fashion. P. E. Island threw open her fisheries two years in advance on the understanding that the President of the United States should ask Congress to refund the duties in the meantime collected. The United States forgot to carry out this arrangement,

The treaty provided that fish oil and fish should be free from duty. The United States proceeded straightway to impose a duty on packages, and turned a deaf ear to all our remonstrances as to this flagrant breach of faith. Fresh fish for immediate consumption were to be free. When ice was added to the package, the United States ruled that these fish were not intended for immediate consumption, and collected duty on all such. They made a treasury department ruling that "seal oil" was not "fish oil," and charged it thereafter with a duty of twenty per cent.

The Reciprocity treaty of 1854 expired as denounced on March 17th, 1866, and Canada extended to United States fishermen the privileges of the treaty as regards free fishing for the remainder of the year. The United States refused to allow Canadians the equivalent of free entrance to their markets for the balance of the year for Canadian fish. They never even thanked us for the free gift we made them.
